## TELEGRAMS.

### Young Girl Murdered a Child in Toronto.

A Russian Governor Killed--Fatal Accident at Fornte--Children Burned to Death.

Toronto, Ont., May 22.—Today when a Mrs. Murray returned to an alley-way between T. Balon & Co.'s and Gough's stores in this city for her baby, which she had left there while shopping, she discovered that both the child and a go-cart which it was in had disappeared. She immediately reported to the police, with the result that a girl named Josephine Carr, thirteen years of age, was apprehended. It appears that the girl in question has a mania for stealing go-carts, which are left outside of departmental stores by ladies while shopping, and that, finding no empty go-carts today, she had taken the one which was missing and had killed the child.

Ottawa, Ont., May 22.—Mr. W. W. B. McInnes, ex-M. P. for Alberni, B. C., has been appointed Governor of the Yukon Territory.

St. Petersburg, May 22.—No advices whatever have been received at the war office from Admiral Rojestvensky for the past ten days.

Lae du Bonnet, Man., May 22.—In a farm house fire near here today three children named Henrickson were burned to death in sight of their parents who stood by absolutely unable to render any assistance.

Ottawa, Ont., May 22.—Mr. Hyman, M. P., has been appointed Minister of Public Works, and writs have been issued for elections in both London and North Oxford on June 13th. Nominations June sixth.

St. Petersburg, May 23.—A despatch from General Linévitch at the front announces that two Russian detachments have occupied the valleys of Kaak and Khanda River, on the Mandarin road, after having dislodged some Japanese cavalry and infantry.

London, May 23.—The sittings of the House of Commons last night was marked by scenes of the wildest disorder, growing out of a motion by Bannerman, Liberal, to adjourn the House so that he might take up and discuss his charge against Premier Balfour of having violated his pledge not to deal with the subject of Colonial preference without first appealing to the country. The Speaker was unable to quell the disturbance, so he put into force for the first time the new ruling empowering him to adjourn the House in case of a grave disorder.

Baku, Caucasia, May 24.—The Governor of Baku was assassinated while being driven through the

streets here today by a bomb, which was thrown under his carriage by an unknown man who escaped arrest. Two other persons were also killed by the same explosion.

London, May 24.—A Shanghai despatch states that Admiral Togo's fleet is still off Mesampho, south-western coast of Korea.

Fernie, B. C., May 24.—Word was received here this morning that the C. P. R. depot building at Craubrook had collapsed and that eleven people had been badly injured, four of whom will die.

Ottawa, Ont., May 24.—The Minister of Railways has approved the plans providing for the location of the Grand Trunk Pacific coast terminus at Kaien Island, off the Tsimpsean Peninsula, about midway between the mouth of the Skeena River and Port Simpson. The company will have to go before the Railway Commission to get what lands are necessary.

Winnipeg, Man., May 24.—President Shaughnessy, of the C. P. R., has sanctioned the survey of a proposed branch line from Moosejaw to the "elbow" of the Saskatchewan River, and there is every prospect that the road will soon be built.

Vancouver, B. C., May 24.—W. Sloan, M. P., arrived here today from Ottawa, accompanied by Mrs. Sloan, and left immediately for Nanaimo per S. S. Joan. While here Mr. Sloan stated that he had returned from the east on private business, but that he would only remain about four days.

A carload of lobsters which Mr. Sloan has secured for British Columbia waters will arrive here in about a week.

Chicago, May 25.—The teamsters strike, which has been spreading rapidly during the past few days, assumed a very serious aspect this morning. Over 4,000 deputies have been sworn in and some 50,000 rounds of ammunition have been distributed. The troops will probably be called out, and it is feared in many quarters that there will be disturbances.

St. Petersburg, May 25.—A report just received here states that Admiral Togo's squadron had met the combined Russian fleets and had suffered a severe defeat. No confirmation of the despatch can be obtained.

## FIRE SWEPT.

### Business Portion of Whitehorse Destroyed.

Started in a Barber Shop--Merchants Open up Again in Tents--Re-construction Commenced.

Whitehorse, Y. T., May 23.—A fire broke out in a barber shop in the rear of the Windsor hotel here at 4 o'clock this morning and, before the firemen, with the assistance of all the residents, had got the conflagration under control, it had wiped out the entire business portion of the town, included in which were some of the best stocked stores and finest equipped hotels in the north. The district laid waste extends from the post office on the south to the Dominion Government Telegraph Building on the north. The loss is placed at \$250,000 and it is a known fact that but a small portion of this is covered by insurance. The following were the business establishments destroyed: The Windsor Hotel, Golden Eagle Hotel, Vancouver Hotel, Commercial Hotel, Seattle Hotel, R. Lowe & Co., Central Drug Store, Martin's confectionery, Bon Marche dry goods, Commercial Cafe, Main Street Laundry, Salvatore Cafe, McKeown's Drug Store, McLennan Hardware Co., Taylor & Drury, H. F. Seward, Stoddard Jewelry Store, Halbe Cafe, Sharpe's Barber Shop, Unsworth Hardware Co., Arctic Trading Co., P. Burns & Co., Royal Restaurant and the White Pass Station. The White Pass Railway Company have already commenced the construction of a new depot building. Nearly all of the mercantile houses will re-open in tents tomorrow and, taking the stocks on hand into account with those on the way in, there is no danger of running short of necessities. Permanent buildings will be erected as fast as circumstances will permit. Luckily, as far as known at present, the fire was unattended by any loss of life.

## The Mail.

### A Thing of the Past--For Nearly Two Weeks Atlin has had no Mail Either Way.

At the time of going to press the outgoing mail which left here Sunday, 14th inst., in charge of mail-carrier Kirkland, had not reached Log Cabin. On the 17th instant mail-carrier J. Hyland left Log Cabin for Atlin via the Tan Trail route with about 60 pounds of letter mail. Anyone knowing the route will not believe that both men are hung up between Log Cabin and Golden Gate, and, if John Kirkland made Hales City, which he was quite able if willing so to do, there can only be two reasons why he did not make Log Cabin. He must have met with a serious accident, which is hoped has not happened, or, finding the travelling rather hard and the road-house accommodation rather good, has decided to sit down and, like the hounds of old, dream of the old chases and times that have gone, waiting till conditions change. This may be all right from the economic standpoint of a mail contractor, but it is very poor consolation for those that have important despatches going out. It has been the usual thing during past seasons for freight and passengers to pass the mail at all stages, and it seems quite in keeping that the mail should be hung up even now though others can get in and out.

### Mining Notes.

The warm weather of the last few days has caused all the creeks to rise.

Birch Creek had a flood last Tuesday but no considerable damage was done.

On Pine Creek things were somewhat different and a few water flumes were washed out.

Spruce Creek suffered more than all the others and portions of several dumps were washed away. It will be impossible for some days yet to say just what the actual damage done will amount to.

Some damage was done on Boulder Creek by the stream breaking into the company's pit and flume, but after considerable exertion the water was got under control.

The Spruce Creek Hydraulic Company have commenced piping. A number of the lay-men on P. C. are getting good results.

In our issue of last week we referred briefly to the question of the price of the town lots in Atlin, and suggested that the property owners make a concerted effort to meet the proposition made by the Government. Briefly, the proposal made by the Government is, that public notification be given that after a certain date the right of all persons to complete the purchase of lots which they had acquired at the auction sale would be cancelled, and the deposit paid by them forfeited, provided payment in full of the balance overdue was not made within that time, and that after that date the lots so reverting to the Crown would be re-opened for sale at public auction at reduced upset prices. In other words, the money already paid would be forfeited, a nominal upset price put on each lot and bid in by the owner, who would then receive his Crown grant. The value of all improvements would of course be added to the upset price, and in this way those who have placed buildings on their lots or otherwise improved them would be amply protected.

The present condition of affairs is, we must say, satisfactory neither to the Government nor property holders. The upset price set by the Government during the rush has not been justified by the subsequent development of the district, and has proved detrimental to all improvement. Many property holders would no doubt improve their lots if they owned them outright, but they do not feel inclined to complete the purchase at the high figure placed on the lots by the Government, and they feel less inclined to spend money on ground for which they have no title. This matter has been allowed to drag. We believe the proposition of the Government is a good one and well worthy of consideration. The advance in real estate values will be slow, but it must be remembered that Atlin is in a rich mineral belt and is bound to be the distributing point for this northern country for years to come. It only requires some united effort on the part of the property owners to put this matter through and to bring about encouragement to local development and improvement of property.

In our telegraphic despatches the appointment of Mr. W. W. B. McInnes, M. P. P., to the position of Governor of the Yukon is announced. Mr. McInnes is at present the representative in the Provincial House for the constituency of Al-

berni, and his appointment will result in throwing that constituency open. There will no doubt be a bye-election held before the house meets in 1906.

### CORRESPONDENCE.

To the Editor of THE ATLIN CLAIM, Atlin, B. C.

DEAR SIR,—The communication in your last issue, re "The Discovery Mail," would have passed unnoticed by me as I consider no communication, however directly aimed, worthy of reply when unaccompanied by the name of the writer.

I say, therefore, that this letter would have passed unnoticed but for the insinuation contained therein that I wilfully held the Discovery mail of the 14th inst. for 31 hours after its arrival in Atlin.

Had your correspondent practiced the commandment he preaches and possessed himself of a few facts before rushing into print, he might have saved himself the deep thought and elaborate preparation it must have taken to produce the communication in question, but, Mr. Editor, the opportunity for giving vent to his personal dislike for me was too good to allow any love for God or man to set it aside.

To one who knows all the regulations of the P. O. Department, as your correspondent would give us to believe he does, the following extract, from a circular received at this office from the Department some three weeks ago, might be of interest. The circular referred to is headed "Sunday Work in Post Offices," and, after giving strict instructions regarding the discontinuance of Sunday work in offices where it has been practiced, closes with the following paragraph: "If the office is not now open on Sunday the postmaster is instructed not to open the same to any extent whatever. Should any application be made in this direction by local residents, such application should be referred to the Department, which will determine the question."

It will therefore be seen that, by my actions in working in the office as I did on Sunday the 14th inst., I have laid myself open to the censure of the Postmaster-General, for, from 6.30 a.m., when I took the incoming mail from Mr. Kirkland, until 10.30 p.m., when I handed him the outgoing mail, I spent the whole day (with the exception of meal-times and about an hour before I sorted the outgoing mail in stamping and distributing mail, in booking registers, in answering Departmental letters, in answering and dispatching outgoing mail to accommodate my fellow-men. As to the Discovery mail, it was separated from the Atlin mail and could have been dispatched at a few moments notice any time after 3 p.m., and, sir, if I had had a particle of feeling for my fellow-men or the welfare of the camp at heart, I would no doubt have strapped the mail on my back at that hour and started for Discovery forthwith. As it was, however, the mail remained in the Atlin office until called for

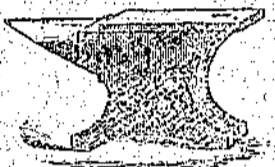

**Victoria Day Sports**

**Good Exhibitions of Baseball and Football.**

Richardson's Team Defeated Dr. Young's Ball Tossers--Atlin and Discovery Tie at Football.

Victoria Day, Wednesday last, was celebrated by the Atlin and Discovery athletes in exhibition games of both baseball and football on the old football grounds on the McKee Creek trail. Although the grounds are by no means convenient to Atlin still that did not deter the citizens, including quite a large number of the fair sex, from being on hand to enjoy the sport, and Discovery also was well represented. The baseball match, which came first on the tapis, commenced at 2:30 p.m. and considering that it was the first game of the season, and the slow condition of the ground, it must be admitted that the play during the game was exceptionally good for men who were not in the best of condition, and we are confident that if the boys would turn out and do a little practicing that they could easily hold their own with any of the teams in the north. The game resulted in a win for Richardson's team by a score of 14 to 11 and, although their batting average was only equal with that of Dr. Young's nine, the work of their battery and their in-fielding and base-running gave them a superiority over their opponents. The play of Miller, McPhee and Pillman for Dr. Young's team and Hampton, Sweet and Taylor for Richardson's nine was worthy of special mention. The decisions of Dr. L. S. Keller, who officiated as umpire, were impartial and satisfactory to everybody. Phil Hampton, pitcher for Richardson's nine, had a finger nail knocked off but he pluckily played the game out.

After about 8 minutes, play the Discovery forwards secured the leather and, after having a number of well directed shots returned by the Atlin defence, they succeeded in scoring the first goal. Although both teams worked hard and turned in some good rushes the score was unchanged at half-time. Play being resumed Atlin took the ball well into Discovery's territory and rained shot after shot at the goal only to have them stopped by Miller, Duffly and Nichols. However, after some 12 minutes play Atlin made a determined and well combined attack which resulted in them tying the score. From this time to the end of the game the play was back and forth, both teams doing their best to gain a lead but without any success. The Discovery forwards finished the game with a series of fierce rushes which kept the Atlin defence busy, Owen, Wheeling, McPhee and Alexander doing good work. Although the game ended in a tie of 1 to 1, it must be said that the Discovery boys played the best combination. It is to be hoped that these teams meet in a finish game in the near future. Mr. J.
