RUSSIA GETS FREEDOM

Czar Nicholas Will Now Be a Figurehead Only.

WITTE WILL LEAD GOVERNMENT.

The People Have Become Delirious With Their New Found Power and Liberty--Odessa Christens Freedom With Bloodsheds--Death an Disorder at Warsaw.

[SPECIAL TO THE CLAIM.]

St. Petersburg, Oct. 31.—Last night the authority of the Romanoff's and the old order of things ceased to exist in Russia.

Emperor Nicholas has surrendered and Count Witte comes into power as minister and president with an Imperial mandate which will permit him to convert the farcical-like national assembly into a real legislative body elected by greater extended suffrage and to confer upon the people fundamental civil liberty, including free speech.

The welcome tidings reached St. Petersburg this morning that Count Witte had spent the whole of Monday with Emperor Nicholas at Peterhoff going over the final draft of the manifest which includes the freedom of speech, the right of assembly and the immunity of the prison, the latter including the right of habeas corpus.

A late Moscow despatch states that never at any previous period have conditions in that city been so serious as at present. The strikers have seized the public water conduits between Moscow and Mytisichki and large areas of the country are wholly without water. The strikers have also seized the post and telegraph offices and are preventing the dispatch of all mail and telegrams. The police are wholly unable to cope with the situation and the strikers have long since lost all regard for law and order.

A FLEET MUTINIES.

Odessa, Oct. 31.—There are persistent rumors afloat in this city to the effect that the crews of the Black Sea fleet mutinied while on the coast of Asia Minor and killed Admirals Birileff and Choutanin and then sailed back to Sevastopol after hoisting the revolutionary flag.

Odessa, Oct. 31.—Sunday last was a day of strife and bloodshed in this city. It is utterly impossible to approximate the number of persons killed, for as soon as the fighting ceased the dead and wounded were hurriedly removed from the streets and hidden away. The wildest excitement still prevails and a notable feature of the demonstrations is the large number of troopers of all regiments who are to be seen marching around with the people.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 1.—The people of this city and surrounding

districts have almost gone mad in celebrating their recently obtained liberty, and the many scenes which are being enacted were never before witnessed in Russia. The tremendous crowds which continuously throng the principle thoroughfares are totally unrestrained by word or deed. Men and women on bended knees in the streets render thanks and thronged at corners orators harangue the ever surging populace. Count Witte today summoned a conference of all the editors of the city's newspapers and asked their co-operation in an endeavor to restore normal conditions. The editors expressed unanimous confidence in M. Witte as premier and promised him their unstinted aid but they declared that they could not publish their several papers until the consent of the strike committee had been obtained.

Baltimore, Md., Nov. 1.—The British cruiser squadron in command of Prince Louis of Battenberg arrived at Annapolis today. They were met and welcomed by Admiral Robley Evans with a United States battleship squadron.

Odessa, Nov. 1.—The mad rioters in this city broke loose again yesterday and much fighting and bloodshed resulted. Fully 100 persons were killed and scores of others injured. The police and soldiery are absolutely unable to quell the disturbances. The foreign consulates are guarded by strong cordons of troops. The people have become panic stricken.

Warsaw, Nov. 1.—Disorders still continue in this city and street conflicts between the police and rioters are of frequent occurrence. The authorities are charged with misconstruing and ignoring the true meaning of the recently issued imperial manifesto.

Stockholm, Nov. 2.—The old union flag of Norway and Sweden has been struck throughout the country and a newly designed Swedish ensign has been hoisted.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 2.—It has been semi-officially announced that the emperor will proclaim amnesty for all political offenders tomorrow.

Odessa, Nov. 2.—Street fighting was continued all day Wednesday and 37 people were killed and 81 others severely wounded. The rioting was continued today with increased ferocity and over 100 persons have been killed and thousands injured. The streets have become a shambles and the outlook is most appalling.

Warsaw, Nov. 2.—In a conflict between the police and demonstrators in this city last night 20 persons were killed and fully 200 were wounded.

Vancouver, Nov. 2.—The British Columbia Wire & Nail factory in this city was destroyed by fire yesterday. The loss, which is said to be almost entirely covered by in-

surance, amounts to \$100,000. The company will re-build immediately.

Victoria, Nov. 2.—A wire has been received in this city from John Houston, who is at Goldfields, Nevada, stating that he will be on hand at the next session of the British Columbia legislature. John also states that it is not his intention to resign.

GENERAL NEWS.

Sir Thomas Lipton has announced in London that he will again challenge for the America cup in 1907.

A Tokio report says that on Oct. 24th the mikado reviewed a great naval parade of 308 vessels and the popular enthusiasm surpassed that of all the events of the war.

The exact figures of the comptroller at Dawson shows that the Yukon's gold output for the season just closed was \$7,758,904.80, reckoning gold at \$16 per ounce.

The international waterway commission held a meeting at Buffalo, N. Y., on Oct. 27th for the purpose of devising ways and means to stop poaching on the great lakes.

A Stockholm despatch says that the Karlstad treaty with Norway was signed on Oct. 27th and the authorities of Sweden formally recognized Norway as an independent nation.

The Railroad hotel at Hot Springs, Ark., was burned on the morning of Oct. 27th and six of the guests were cremated. Among the dead was H. Roberts, a railroad man of Tacoma.

Charles Bassett, who was recently sentenced to eight years imprisonment for robbery at Albany, N. Y., has been pardoned by Governor Higgins to permit of his being tried on the more serious charge of murder.

Statistics show that during the twelve months ending June 30th, last, 885 persons were killed and 13,783 were injured on the railroads of the United States. There were 1,213 collisions and 1,535 derailments. The total property damage was \$2,401,671.

The news comes from Dawson that Fred Menier, a pioneer who had been in the Yukon since 1887, committed suicide on Oct. 23rd by shooting himself with a revolver while at No. 5 below on Bonanza. Menier had become melancholy over money matters and had been drinking heavily.

A Winnipeg despatch states that a tract of 40,000 acres of land lying north of Melford, Saskatchewan, has been purchased by Mennonites from southern Manitoba, whose purpose it is to form a Mennonite colony there. The land is especially adapted to the growth of wheat, being the best in the northwest.

Kate Kennedy's roadhouse, the "Hillside," on Lower Hunker, Yukon, in which was included the post office, was burned to the ground on the night of Oct. 24th. There were many narrow escapes but no one was injured. The fire was caused by an overheated stove in the bunk room. The loss was about \$10,000.

Conrad's Windy Arm Mines

Examined by Mr. Robertson, Provincial Mineralogist, Who Says They are Best Yet Seen.

Dr. H. E. Young, M. P. P., arrived from Conrad City this morning and is very enthusiastic in his account of the proposition. The Hon. Mr. McBride wired Dr. Young that Mr. Fleet Robertson, the British Columbia Provincial Mineralogist, was coming up with the idea of reporting and looking into the situation in general. Dr. Young immediately made arrangements to meet Mr. Robertson upon arrival at Cariboo. Mr. Conrad made arrangements whereby every facility was given to Mr. Robertson to examine the various properties.

Conrad City, on the shore of Windy Arm, is the terminus of the aerial tram which has been built to the Montana claim. The tram will be completed in a few days, when the work will progress much more quickly than at present. The mine lies at an elevation of 3,500 feet above the Arm and 5,800 feet above the sea. A winding trail six miles long has been built. The tram is four and three-quarter miles long. A stone house 120 feet long has been built at the mine.

On the Montana claim a drift has been run on the strike for 250 feet with a slope about 50 feet above the level. This passes through one fault but has been found on the other side. The next claim, the Mount Hero, has been opened through a mass of slide and float. A drift 80 feet long was driven to the solid matter and then an upraise run until the vein was struck. The distance between the two drifts is 1,850 feet, which argues an ore shoot of that length. The vein averages 36 inches.

Mr. Robertson has the reputation of being very conservative in his opinions on mining propositions but in this case he remarked that it was the best vein he had seen during the time he has held office, some seven years. Such a statement, coming from a gentleman who has examined nearly all the propositions in the north, was most encouraging.

The adjoining properties were gone over and the next day the trip was extended over the B. C. line.

The doctor cannot, of course, give in detail the report which Mr. Robertson will make officially but he feels that he is not betraying Mr. Robertson's confidence when he says that he knows the report will be most favorable.

A great many locations have been made and with the advent of the branch line, which the White Pass railroad have surveyed, and the erection of the smelter a great impetus will be given to our northern country.

With regard to the smelter, Dr. Young says that he has Mr. Conrad's permission to make the statement positive that the smelter will go up at once.

RUSSIA.

The news of the recent changes in the political policy of Russia was a great shock, but it was received with joy by the whole civilized world. All felt that the change must come, but no one dreamed that it would materialize so suddenly.

By the granting of these greater liberties to his subjects the Czar is placing them in practically the position obtained by our forefathers at Runnymede. They have a long and hard journey before them, with bloodshed and insurrections, before they reach the level of the freedom of our own people.

At first blush the dispatches indicated that a republic was contemplated, but we are pleased such is not the case. Russia is not in a condition for such a sweeping change. The people have to be educated to altered conditions and institutions. At first they will run to extremes, as at the present time. The liberties so far obtained have intoxicated and so carried away the people that they are mad with the sense of power and freedom. They turn on each other and know no restraint.

The conditions, however, will change and out of her great sorrow and trial New Russia will be born, to be a power and strength in the world.

THE MAIL SERVICE.

The winter mail service has now commenced and we have received and sent out our first mail.

The mail contractor has many difficulties to overcome and hardships to bear during the "freeze-up" in early winter and the "thaw" in late spring, all of which difficulties are thoroughly appreciated by our citizens and, we trust, due allowance made therefor.

The carrying of the mail is a matter of business and it is safe to assume that the contractor is satisfied with the price, as the contract is not compulsory. All we ask is that the contract be carried out, that an efficient outfit be employed and our mail be carried in and out with the same expedition as ordinary freight by dog team. In asking this we do not go beyond what is due us.

It is to be hoped that the contractor will so perform his services that we will in the spring be able to look back and congratulate him on the efficient service he has given us. He can do this and we feel that he will.

Attacked by a Wolverine. A Discovery Man Put up a Plucky Fight and Escaped With a Slight Scratch.

Geo. A. MacAulay, of Discovery, had a narrow escape on Saturday morning last from being badly torn by a wolverine, which is sometimes called a "Quick-Hatch" or "Hudson's Bay Bear." MacAulay was engaged at the time in cruising timber on the south side of Birch creek when he came upon the animal amongst some burned timber. The wolverine was about 30 yards from him when he first saw it and he stood still, expecting that the animal would slink off, but instead of doing so it commenced to creep towards him. Having no weapons, not even a jack knife, with which to defend himself, Mac. turned and did his best sprint for a hundred yards or so in an endeavor to reach a deserted cabin ahead of the animal. The beast gained on him and just as he passed through the open doorway of the cabin his pursuer sprang and struck him on the shoulder with one of his paws. MacAulay secured a club from the debris which littered the floor of the cabin and prepared to make a fight for his life should the animal enter his retreat. However, the animal remained outside and when Mac. tried to see what his chances were for getting away by looking out of the door his antagonist sprang and struck him on the right wrist, a couple of small rents in the sleeve of his coat and a slight scratch being the amount of the damage done. MacAulay brought his club into play and beat off the attack and then for 10 minutes he tried to scare his adversary away by alternately yelling and throwing chunks of wood at it. Finally the wolverine drew off and, concealing himself behind a knoll, prepared to watch his man. MacAulay watched the animal and understood the tactics and he decided to make a break to get

away. Crouching low he went through the doorway and gained the rear of the cabin. He then ran in the direction of a ditch by way of which he hoped to make his escape but he hadn't made over a hundred yards when he saw that the animal was after him and that a pitched battle was inevitable and, having retained his club, he faced about and awaited the onslaught. The wolverine came on with 25 foot bounds and sprang for his head but MacAulay side-stepped and landed a terrific blow on the brute's back. The same manœuvre was repeated half a dozen times, when the wolverine admitted his defeat by starting for the tall timber and MacAulay didn't wait for him to change his mind but immediately headed for Discovery. Mac. says that the animal was at least six feet long and the most aggressive article that he has ever cast his eyes on and he considers himself exceedingly fortunate in having beat off the beast's repeated attacks.
