A Budget of Interesting News From Many Quarters.

Kamloops, B. C. Nov. 15th—H. Stout, wanted for horse stealing in Alberta shot and killed Robert Williams, a rancher at Little Fort last week. Williams was killed while trying to arrest stout, the murderer is still at large.

London, Nov. 15th—The German Emperor was given a great ovation upon his arrival at Windsor on Monday last.

Vancouver B. C. Nov. 15th—After searching three days for Clementina Nahu, the seven year old daughter of Captain Nahu, the body was found in the woods near Lonsdale Gardens in North Vancouver where the child had been outraged and murdered. The police are scouring the district for a negro named Roger Vinnetto, who was seen the neighborhood shortly before the child disappeared.

Seward, Alaska, Nov. 15th—The Bark "Servia," loaded with 40,000 cases of salmon is ashore and is a total loss three of the crew were drowned.

Vancouver, B. C. Nov. 15th—The Provincial Sanitarium for the treatment of tuberculosis at Tranquille, Nicola Valley B. C. is now ready, only incipient cases will be taken at present.

Liverpool Nov. 15th—Arrangements are being completed between Cunard Line and G. T. P. whereby the former will handle all the passengers and freight by their lines of steamers to be placed on both the Atlantic and Pacific.

Duluth, Minn., Nov. 15th—The fire which started in the Great Northern elevator destroyed over three millions worth of property, including elevators, power house, three flour mills, and 40 dwellings.

Seattle, Wash. Nov. 15th—Thirty three persons were injured in a head-on collision between two street cars, three who were terribly mangled will die.

Trenton, N. J. Nov. 15—McFadden the editor of physical culture was today sentenced to two years in the penitentiary and was also fined \$2,000 for sending obscene matter in magazines through the mails.

Bellingham, Nov. 15—John Maloney, of Juneau, announces the sale of placer claims on the Kalhena river, near Haine in the Percupine district, to a New York Syndicate for One Hundred and Twenty-five Thousand dollars.

Rome, Nov. 15—The Pope has been bedridden for the past two days suffering from an attack of heart failure. All appointments have been canceled and no one is permitted to see his holiness.

Winnipeg, Man. Nov. 15th—Hon. Fielding is conferring with the Canadian Banks and has been assured that the financial resources will be available for moving the crops of the Prairie Provinces. OUR CHIEF INDUSTRY.

Regardless of what some of our citizens may think, placer mining, and not "bean peddling," or any of the numerous vocations followed by those not directly engaged in mining our chief industry. The Mines support our merchants of both wet and dry wares, our sawmills and professional classes, besides being the main source of Government revenue. The sooner all learn to appreciate these facts and live up to them the better for the industry.

During the past season all of the operations, with one or two exceptions, the reasons for which will appear later, have been a decided success, in most instances an advance on previous years when all things are taken into consideration.

There have been some somewhat startling surprises, due to both ignorance of the laws governing placer mining and also of the laws governing practical business methods as applied to placer mining, in other words, sending a boy to do a man's work.

The first surprise of the season came as somewhat of a "jolt" to Mr. Obalski, manager for the Societe Miniere, the French Syndicate, operating on Boulder Creek, on his return to Atlin the later part of April last.

On his arrival here found that a goodly portion of the placer claims held by the company on Boulder had lapsed, in fact had lapsed in some instances over a year previous and wonder of wonders for Atlin had so soon as discovered been relocated, "Jumped" he called it, but relocated is nicer.

Another surprise for the same Gentleman, was this Fall, on working up to the end of their Creek ground, to run into a lot of timbers in a bench claim belonging to the Company to find the same all drifted out, and by the state of the timbers the work must have been done several years ago.

Who was to blame for the first error is rather hard to say, at all events gross carelessness is to be laid at somebodys door, and in the meantime the company are looser the ground in question. It looks like, "Penny wise and pound foolish." Better to pay some one in the business to look after titles than to loose ground. As to the as to the working out of the Bench in question, well that was done by parties now out of the camp, and the company was not responsible for the thieving propensities of some of their neighbors.

From a mining point of view the Company has had a very successful season. During the last winter some 8 to 10 men were engaged drifting on the creek property, with very handsome results, to the miners who had the lay and to the company for percentage, altho it was a mistake to drift out ground that really should have been piped, there being enough ground there that is easier to drift than too pipe, owing to the amount of gravel to be handled with only a small and limited quantity of water.

This spring the Company started

operations Early in May and continued till the middle of October, altho during September and October the water was very low, and piping was carried on under great difficulties owing to the large amount of heavy material that had to be handled by hand.

Twelve men were engaged by the Company during the summer season and some 80,400 cubic yards of gravel were moved, not a bad showing. The total amount of gold recovered for the year being \$41,000.00 at a profit of \$16,000.00

During the present winter the Foreman Mr. J. Traber will work some 6 to 10 men drifting on a portion of the Company's ground on which he has a lay. This ground cannot be piped to advantage but should be drifted with considerable profit to the laymen.

Next season it is the intention of the management to work on the East limit of the creek lease and probably continue the present cut on the West limit up through Telfords Creek claims and the bench claims of the Company adjoining same, and also to open up the deep ground below present workings. This Company owns all the back benches on both sides of the creek under leases, but no work has ever been done to demonstrate their values. It also holds some of the Front Benches and Creeks further up stream, the creeks having been previously worked, but a second working will pay handsomely.

Until the Company acquires all the property below Discovery, and workes same in a systematic way, they need never look for any great results, this however is only by the way.

Mr. Obalski and his forman certainly deserve praise for the way they have handled Boulder during the past two seasons. The first that there has been any appreciable profit.

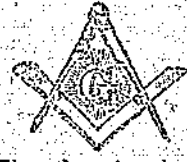

Synopsis of Canadian Homestead Regulations.

ANY available Dominion Lands within the Railway Belt in British Columbia, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres more or less.

Entry must be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situate.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.

Coal lands may be purchased at \$10 per acre for soft coal and \$20 for anthracite. Not more than 200 acres can be acquired by one individual or company. Royalty at the rate of ten cents per ton of 2,000 pounds shall be collected on the gross output.
