### JEW'S RAISE BIG MONEY.

#### Fresh Disorders and Bloodshed Near Odessa.

### ENGLISH TORPEDO INVENTOR DEAD.

#### New York Life on the Rack--Riots in Progress at Vladivostok--Oyama's Army is to Evacuate Manchuria--Another Political Strike--Poisoned Beer.

[SPECIAL TO THE CLAIM.]

London, Nov. 16.—The Jews of this city have subscribed \$355,000 towards the relief of the Jewish sufferers as a result of the recent riots and massacres in Russia.

New York, Nov. 16.—The state insurance committee today peremptorily demanded of President McCall, of the New York Life Insurance Company, that he give the necessary order for the immediate return from Europe of Andrew Hamilton, the lawyer who had full charge of all legislative matters in connection with that company.

Odessa, Nov. 16.—The news has just been received here that fresh disorders have occurred in the town of Krivozer. Over one hundred persons are reported to have been killed. The town was set on fire by the rioters and over half of the business and residential sections were entirely destroyed.

San Francisco, Nov. 16.—A despatch received here today from Vladivostok says that serious riots are at present taking place in that city and vicinity and that the military has been turned out in large numbers in an effort to subdue the demonstrators. The city was fired at several points and great destruction of property has already ensued. The rioters are doing everything in their power to hinder the firemen and to prevent them from extinguishing the flames.

Upperville, Va., Nov. 16.—The American hounds won the decision over the English competitors here today in the Grafton middle fox contest.

London, Nov. 16.—Mr. Robert Whitehead, inventor of the torpedo of that name and which is used in the leading navies of the world, died in this city today.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 16.—The latest reports received here from Vladivostok indicate that rioting in that city has not yet been suppressed, although all the available military has been brought to bear on the mobs of rioters who are endeavoring to burn the city. The sailors stationed in the fortress and a battery of artillerymen participated in the outbreak but most of them have since been imprisoned. The rioters however continued to increase in numbers and violence

and the commandant lost his head, with the result that the situation has got beyond control.

Tokio, Nov. 16.—A despatch has been received at the war office from the headquarters of the Japanese army in the field stating that Field Marshal Oyama has named November 25th as the date of his departure from Manchuria.

Pekin, Nov. 16.—The new bridge across the Yellow river which has just been completed by the Peking-Hankow railroad company was formally opened on Monday last.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 16.—It has been given out by the authorities that all the universities throughout Russia will positively remain closed until January 28th next, and perhaps longer.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 17.—A proletariat which has just been issued summons everybody who will for another general political strike, and as a result 100,000 men have today walked out of the city. An appeal made to the surrounding country districts to join the movement met with but little response.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 17.—A ukase will shortly be issued granting a large portion of the imperial domain, at present the property of the emperor and the grand dukes, to be distributed gratis to deserving peasants.

Tokio, Nov. 17.—It is estimated by the government officials that the number of unemployed which will follow as a result of the returning home of the troops now in Manchuria will fully exceed 700,000. In view of the industrial depression which at present prevails throughout the country the contemplated hordes of unemployed is causing much uneasiness.

St. Catharines, Ont., Nov. 17.—Mr. W. McCleary, formerly the Conservative member of parliament for this city, is dead.

Nelson, B. C., Nov. 17.—John Houston's paper, the Tribune, has become defunct, it having ceased publication on Saturday last.

Vancouver, B. C., Nov. 17.—Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Jackson, of this city, drank poisoned beer yesterday. Mr. Jackson is dead as a result but hopes are entertained that his wife will probably recover. It is not known at present whether the poisoning was deliberate or accidental.

### GENERAL NEWS.

Prominent citizens in Chicago and many other American cities have started a fund to aid the suffering Jews in Russia.

A Baltimore despatch says that the constitutional amendment restricting negro suffrage in the state of Maryland was defeated last week.

The news comes from London that the powers have agreed to make a combined naval demonstration at Constantinople in order to compel the Sultan of Turkey to

keep his word and to institute and enforce the reforms promised in Macedonia.

Prince Louis of Battenberg last week entertained a crowd of New York newspaper reporters in his cabin aboard the flagship of the visiting English cruiser squadron.

Reginald McMichael, aged 28 years, a son of Customs Inspector McMichael of Toronto, committed suicide at the Walker House in that city on the 6th inst. Despondency is assigned as the cause.

Prescott, the New York bank clerk who by a clever scheme got possession of \$100,000 in negotiable stocks and bonds, and who later confessed that it was all a huge joke, was on the 10th inst. sentenced to five years in Sing Sing.

Philander Buckholder, a farmer living near the village of Tapleytown in western Ontario, murdered his wife and month old baby and then committed suicide on Nov. 6th. Buckholder is said to have been despondent for some time.

President Roosevelt last week informed a delegation from Oklahoma that in his forthcoming message to congress he will recommend single statehood for Oklahoma and Indian Territory. The former proposition was to annex the two and have them go in as one state.

A Stockholm despatch says that word has been received in that city from Aboak, a town in the province of Abo-Bjornsborg, Finland, stating that Borgenstrom has joined the constitutionalists and has a garrison of 1,700 men, including 100 Cossacks, who will obey his orders in all things.

An Ottawa despatch says that on his birthday last week King Edward conferred the following honors upon Canadians: Senator Gowan, K.C.M.G.; Lieut. Col. H. M. Pellett, K.B.; Commodore Paget, K.C.M.G.; Major General Lake, C.M.G.; William Saunders, C.M.G.; Dr. A. C. Doughty, C.M.G.

A Winnipeg despatch says that the new wage schedule between the Canadian Pacific Railway and its conductors provides that the wages of conductors of passenger trains shall be \$137.50 per month and that freight conductors shall be paid four cents per mile. This is the highest rate paid by any railroad on this continent.

Elkam Adler, brother to Chief Rabbi Adler of London, Eng., returned to that city last week from a visit to St. Petersburg. He says that Count Witte is now the only man standing between Russia and anarchy. Witte, whose wife is a Jewess, is distinctly friendly to that people but was in no way responsible for the late massacres.

A duel was fought at Nome on Oct. 20th by two sets of claimants to a mining claim. Homer Bounds and Lee Bounds, his son, were the contestants on one side. B

Shaughnessy and Walter Lanigan on the other. At last accounts the elder Bounds and Shaughnessy were said to be dying. The weapons used were knives and clubs.

A St. Petersburg correspondent states that the details of what happened in many places in Russia during the recent riots and the means and methods of torture and death employed in numerous instances grow more revolting with every new feature brought to light. In the Baltic provinces murder and incendiarism prevailed in the most atrocious manners conceivable. In Poland the clergy, Protestant and Catholic, stood together in deprecating the bloody methods employed and they participated in manifestations in favor of autonomy. In southwestern Russia there is not a city or town which escaped Jewish massacres to a greater or less degree. In fact, Jews were most brutally murdered wherever found. The revolutionary wave is gradually declining at all points with the exception of the Caucasus, where riots continue to occur.

A Calgary despatch of the early part of the week stated that 23 of the 25 constituencies in Alberta had been heard from and the returns showed that Premier Rutherford and his colleagues had swept nearly everything. ### Spruce Creek Miner Robbed.

A sneak thief got in his work on a Spruce creek miner on Thursday evening. Shortly after 6 p.m. John de Fontaine left his cabin and called on a neighbor whose house is less than 50 yards distant from his own. He returned home in half an hour to find that during his absence some one had entered his cabin by removing a window and had relieved him of between fourteen and fifteen ounces of gold dust. The thief also secured some fifty odd dollars from a purse which, after emptying, he left lying on a bed. In all the robber secured fully \$285 worth. The police were immediately notified of the fact but as the sly one was careful not to leave any clues there is not much chance of him being apprehended.

#### WINDY ARM.

Walter Sweet and party have returned from a prospecting tour in the country around Windy Arm. They spent most of their time on the British Columbia side and are very well satisfied with their trip.

They report that the country is barely touched. The staking already done is principally around the water fronts and those parts easy of access.

They predict a boom in the spring and give very encouraging accounts of the work done at Windy Arm. In this connection we publish an extract from the Whitehorse Evening Star as showing some of the possibilities of this northern country. We also notice that the Conrad City water works company, an electric power company and a telephone company are asking for incorporation. The telephone company are asking for the right to string their wires from Whitehorse to Caribou and Conrad City and

such other points as may be deemed necessary.

The Star says: "Conrad City, Y. T., Nov. 10, 1905.—There has been considerable excitement here during the last few days. Messrs. Farrington, O'Hara and Chause, while on a hunting expedition, came across a ledge which, in the language of the native, "looked good to them," and they accordingly brought specimens to camp. Assays show the rock to be very rich in free-milling gold, and as a result there was quite a stampede when the facts leaked out, and now every man in camp considers himself a second Rockefeller. The ground is located about a mile north of the city and close to the lake. Work is being done on several other properties and the showing is very good all round."

The shaft of the Lee Roi No. 2, at Rossland, is being sunk to the 1,400 foot level.

Nearly all the asbestos imported into the United States is obtained from the Canadian deposits and is of the chrysotile variety. The value of the asbestos imported into the United States last year was \$751,862.

The rise in the price of copper which led the New York Commercial a few days ago to say was due to the fact that many large orders are upon the market and cannot be filled, is said to result from the rapidly increasing demand for the metal in China and Japan. If this is the reason, the present high price may be safely regarded not only as likely to be kept up, but as by no means representing the figure likely to be reached.
