## BLUE CANYON.

Successful Operations of a Mining Partnership.

What a Combination of Miners May Accomplish—Much Good Work With Satisfactory Returns.

This week a visit was made by our representative to the property owned by the Blue Canyon Mining Partnership, near the head of Spruce creek, where he was most hospitably entertained. This partnership was formed over a year ago by the individual owners of adjoining placer claims, in the neighborhood of what is known as the upper canyon of Spruce, about two and a half miles from the head waters of the creek and five miles above discovery claim. The partnership is composed of Messrs. R. A. Jackson, E. M. N. Woods, Capt. Yoe, J. Carlson, T. Prichard, J. Doyle, Rose, Koloff, Prescott and H. Dewey, Secretary, and the property consists of

rights and several benches, though the past season has been mainly one of installation, the returns which the property have yielded have been highly satisfactory. A ditch of over a mile in length has been dug, and during the early part of the season the benches adjacent to the lower line were ground-sluiced off. It was from these benches that the \$592 nugget—reported in our issue of July 13th—was found. The bed-rock is slate, broken in places by the intrusion of a dike of porphyry. Through the slate irregular stringers of quartz occur. In almost every instance where a "contact" occurred much good gold was won.

During the latter part of the season the construction of the bedrock flume was commenced and about 150 feet have been laid. Everything is now being put in shape for next season's work and full precautions are being taken against high water. The prospects for the future of the company are exceptionally encouraging, and there is abundance of water, pressure and dumping ground. This winter it is the intention to run a series of drills into the benches on the south side, where good pans have been obtained, though no actual work has been done on them up to the present.

The Government built a very good pack trail from the Spruce wagon road to the Blue Canyon, but, contemplating the amount of freighting which will be done in future for this and adjacent properties above the wagon road, it becomes a matter of necessity that an appropriation should be made to extend the wagon road to or near the head of the creek.

## BEDROCK PAY.

Nearly \$100 Sluiced from Two Yards of Pay Streak.

Drifting Operations to be Added to Hydraulic Mining—The Boulder Creek Company Assured of Success.

The bed-rock layer of the pay gravel taken from the shaft sunk on the Boulder creek hydraulic ground, 50 feet west of the flume and in the supposed centre of the creek channel, has already produced upwards of \$75 of very coarse gold, giving the lead a value of between \$40 and \$50 a cubic yard at this depth.

The 12 foot thickness of pay is therefore estimated to yield not less than \$15 a yard, a figure that promises to place this proposition among the first rank of dividend payers once the point is reached from which the whole pay streak can be piped into the sluice.

We are informed by the manager of the channel some 50 feet below the stream than the face of the present workings. From this point of commencement drills will be run to work out the intervening pay, the grade at its disposal not permitting this initial portion of the ground to be otherwise worked.

These operations will likely be begun early next spring, and, once well under way, will considerably add to the force permanently in the company's employ.

The seasons work on this property has been largely of a preparatory nature, the results from which have proved highly satisfactory to all concerned, the successful development of the proposition along the lines adopted this year being now assured. The cut started to replace that of last year is expected to tap bed-rock in the centre of the channel within the next 100 feet, after which piping will commence in earnest.

## The Yacht Race.

The Columbia Proves Herself the Better Boat, But the Shamrock no Mean Adversary.

The chief news from the outside, seems this week to have been upon the Yacht Race, but, as far as we are concerned, the result is decidedly against us, as the following telegrams will show:

The Dominion assay office recently established in Vancouver is not only holding its own against American competition, but promises, through its more perfect equipment, to take the lead in the work for which it was established. The plant—originally intended for the new United States mint at Philadelphia—has been in operation some months, and returns from it have proved so satisfactory to gold shippers, that much of the season's gold product of this Province is now finding its way to the home office, Seattle, San Francisco and New York taking second place in the race for supremacy in this regard. In a recent test of efficiency made by the largest shippers of placer gold in this province, the Cariboo Hydraulic Company, returns from Vancouver were so far in excess of those had from either New York or San Francisco that further business between our British Columbia gold and American shippers may be considered at an end. A saving of some \$300 in a total of \$17,000 worth of crucible gold stands to the credit of the home office, or a loss of an quarter of an ounce, against thirteen ounces in the case of the New York assay.

Whether the failure of the New York office was due to the poorness of its plant or to carelessness in handling matters little. The fact remains that the home office has amply demonstrated its ability to handle important shipments of the precious metal with the lowest possible ratio of loss, a fact which the mining fraternity of the province will assuredly remember in making future shipments.

The Coast papers thus speak of Atlin's Golden Souvenir.

Mr. A. C. Hirschfeld, Editor of the Atlin "CLAIM," was a passenger on the Hating and brought down with him a nugget chain which is to be presented to the Duchess of Cornwall and York as a souvenir of the people of the Atlin district for the throne. The chain is a handsome one, the nuggets being linked together by a gold chain, and on the central pieces of gold are the letters forming the name of the district from whence the memento comes. This unique gift is one of great value, and has been contributed by the miners of Atlin, who have deputed Mrs. Hitchcock to make the presentation. This presentation will probably be made to Her Royal Highness immediately after the presentation of the Civic Address of Welcome.

## THE MOTHER LODE.

### Further Details Concerning the Pine Creek Ledge.

J. M. Ruffner and Associates Pushing Development.

The recent discovery of a rich zone of free-milling ore crossing Pine creek, in the vicinity of Discovery, seems to prove conclusively that the placer gold of the district is derived from small, but exceedingly rich, veins and stringers of quartz cutting the softer magnesian rocks which floor the greater part of Pine valley; thus accounting for the comparative absence of heavy quartz wash in the gravels with which such gold is here found associated.

The uncovering of this portion of the mineralized zone, and its identification as part of the Mother Lode of the district, appears now to have been the result of systematic investigation rather than the outcome of chance, and we are indebted to Mr. J. M. Ruffner and his associates in the lucky find for the following interesting details of their remarkable strike.

The "Golden Rod" bench claim, whose bed-rock first disclosed the presence of a rich lead, adjoins Discovery claim on the south bank of Pine creek. In the course of its development during the season of 1900, it was noticed by its owners, that while its upper areas proved only fairly productive, its lower portion gave exceedingly rich returns. This change in values seemed to coincide with a corresponding change in the nature of the bed-rock; a much decomposed and heavily oxidized magnesite replacing the harder diorite previously encountered. The gold from this portion of the claim was, moreover, very coarse and rough in character, considerable quartz adhering to the nuggets found, while much of it glistened and sparkled as if just torn from rock in place. Much of the coarser gold was in the form of slabs, from one to three inches in length and an eighth of an inch in thickness, none of which showed the slightest trace of being water-worn; while the small proportion of the fine gold taken from the boxes proved equally bright and angular.

The present season's work, conducted on a much larger scale, revealed precisely the same conditions, when the pay strike of last season was reached. It was at once concluded that a rich vein lay somewhere in the vicinity, and a 'still hunt' for it began.

The decomposed and shattered condition of the bed-rock, however, rendered investigation somewhat unsatisfactory and on providing drainage it was concluded to cut the drain ditches much deeper than usual, in order to get below the mass of mixed and broken matter and cross-cut as it were the more solid formation. This disclosed a vein in place, having free walls and dipping 62 degrees S. E. striking with the general run of the creek.

ing this little yellow streak in place", says Mr. Ruffier, "I was fairly picking gold out of the rock, crushing and breaking the ledge matter with my hands alone."

The property was at once bonded from parties having the mineral right thereon, and several tons of the ore sacked and shipped to the coast for a mill test. In extracting this shipment the ledge widened to 18 inches on going down some three feet and from appearances its width promises to further increase with depth.

Other veins similar in appearance and carrying equally high values have since been uncovered in the neighborhood, and the five-stamp mill recently on the Monro Mt. mine is now being installed to give the whole ledge, so far as uncovered, a thorough and exhaustive test.

Dr. A. C. Robertson, Inspector of Mines in the Yukon, places the life of the district as a paying placer proposition at a minimum of twenty years, and says for the next ten the annual output of gold will be from \$5,000,000 to \$18,000,000. He has reached this conclusion after a careful examination of the country, but in arriving at it has taken into account improved methods of mining, cheaper transportation and consequently cheaper labor and a lower cost of living. He thinks that it will be found profitable to re-work every foot of ground that has already been mined.

### PART IV.

"WATER CLAUSES CONSOLIDATION ACT, 1897."

(1.) This is to certify that the "Pine Creek Power Company, Limited," established with the object of carrying on the business of a "power company" within the meaning of Part IV. of the "Water Clauses Consolidation Act, 1897," in the Atlin District, Province of British Columbia, and incorporated on the 23rd day of June, 1901, has submitted its undertaking to the Lieutenant-Governor in Council for approval, and that the said undertaking, as shown by the documents and plan filed, has been approved, and that the same is as follows:--

To make available water for the working of a large area of placer mining ground which is at present unworkable. Beginning

at a point, approximately 18,000 feet above the Discovery Claim on Pine creek, to be known as "point of diversion of water," and proceeding thence westerly along Pine creek to its mouth, and extending laterally on either side of Pine creek so as to embrace the Pine creek watershed, the Sunrise Gulch, Twin Gulch, and the lower portion of Spruce creek below the Discovery Claim, embracing that part known locally as the "Stevendyke."

That for this purpose the Company will acquire by purchase three thousand five hundred miners' inches of water; to be diverted from Pine creek, using the present channel of Pine creek to the point of diversion, 18,000 feet above Discovery Claim, and thence by ditch and flume along the north side of Pine Creek to and below the Sunrise Gulch, and thence by a system of steel pipe line to reach Pine Creek at and along parts approximately 9,500 feet below the intake, and again at the Discovery Claim 18,000 feet below the intake, and again at Sunrise Gulch 26,000 feet below the intake. To siphon across Pine Creek with a 24-inch steel pipe line approximately 3,000 feet above the Discovery Claim, and thence by ditch and flume along the south side approximately three miles and to return all of the said water into Pine Creek at an elevation below the intake varying from 35 feet to 400 feet.

(2) And this is further to certify that the Company propose to begin their undertaking by extending the ditches and pipe lines.

(3) And this is further to certify that the amount of the capital of the Company, which will be duly subscribed and paid up before the Company commences the installation of additions, or exercises any of the powers of the "Water Clauses Consolidation Act, 1897," Part IV, in that behalf, is hereby fixed at the sum of one hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$150,000.00), and the further amount of capital to be subscribed and paid up, above the cost of the first mentioned portion in respect of the remainder of the undertaking, before the same is commenced, shall be fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000.00).

(4) And this is further to certify that the time within which the said capital shall be subscribed and paid up, shall be fixed at six months from the date hereof, and the date by which all the proposed undertaking shall be in operation is fixed at two years from the date hereof.
