## THE ELECTION.

### Sloan, the Liberal Candidate, Addresses the Electors.

Mr. Wm. Sloan, candidate for the Dominion Parliament, addressed the constituents of this District at Discovery on Saturday last and at Atlin on Monday. Both meetings were exceedingly well attended and quite enthusiastic.

At the meeting in Kootenay Hall, Monday evening, Mr. J. Kirkland occupied the chair.

Mr. Sloan remarked that there were no great issues at stake, and confined his address principally to reading extracts from the leading Conservative papers respecting the Grand Trunk Pacific deal. He said he was in no way connected with trusts and corporations and that he had every confidence in the success of the Liberal party in the coming election. He stated that the All-Canadian Route to Dawson would soon be under construction and that the navigability of the Atlin would receive his best attention if he went to Ottawa.

Dr. Young, M. M. P., who was asked to speak, touched briefly on the Grand Trunk Pacific deal from the Opposition standpoint; he also referred to the Lumber question.

Mr. Sloan responded by giving a long list of figures, showing the gradual increase of exports, both of lumber and manufactured goods, under the Liberal administration.

Mr. Woods then took the platform and stated that since '96 he had quit the Conservative party and joined the Liberals, whom he claimed the younger generation had reason to support. His remarks caused some surprise and were interrupted, amid laughter, by Charlie Queen, who in turn, got free advice from our late magistrate.

Mr. Jas. Stables confined his remarks to the candidate, Mr. Sloan, who, he said, had been "up against it," like many of us, and had gone to Dawson in the early days; he was a miner and knew our needs, and should receive the support of the working man.

Between the speeches, Mr. Wm. Moore entertained the audience with several of his specialties which were encored several times.

At the conclusion of the meeting Mr. Sloan was escorted to the steambot, which was in waiting, by a torchlight procession, and he departed with cries of good wishes from his supporters.

Mr. Sloan, the candidate, is a free miner, and has the proud distinction of having hoisted the first bucket of dirt out of Eldorado Creek. He is a resident of Nainimo, where he is greatly respected and admired.

The Yukon Election takes place December 16th; and nominations at Dawson, November 18th.

## General Telegrams.

Seattle, Wash., Oct. 8th.—The United States Battleship Nebraska was successfully launched at Morau Bro's shipyards. Fully 100,000 people witnessed the event.

Ottawa, Ont., Oct. 8th.—Laurier commences his Ontario tour with addresses at Hamilton on Monday.

Winnipeg, Oct. 8th.—R. I. Richardson, Conservative, will run against Clifford Sifton at Brandon.

Toronto, Oct. 8th.—Geo. E. Foster, Conservative, is a candidate for North Toronto. Mayor Urquhart will probably be his opponent.

Coquille City, Ore., Oct. 11th.—The Beaver Hill Coal Mine has been set on fire from an electric spark.

Berlin, Oct. 11th.—Fresh trouble has broken out in German South Africa. The government is much concerned over the rising of the Witbois tribesmen who had hitherto been faithful to Germany.

Sandwich, Ont., Oct. 11th.—Edward Slaughter (colored) has been sentenced to be hanged for the murder of John Ridden.

Montreal, Oct. 11th.—"Shamrocks" defeated "Capitals" six to one.

Winnipeg, Oct. 11th.—The building permits this year to date amount to eight millions.

Winnipeg, Oct. 13th.—J. H. Ashdown's hardware and several smaller buildings have been destroyed by fire. The damage is estimated at one million dollars.

Hamilton, Oct. 13th.—Sir Wilfred Laurier opened his campaign tour here with a lengthy address, in which the chief features, besides the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway

project, were the industrial situation and British preference. He says he would stand or fall by his railway policy.

## WAR NEWS.

Tokio, Oct. 8th.—It is reported that the fire from the Japanese land batteries severely damaged four Russian warships in the harbor at Port-Arthur. It is stated one of the vessels was completely wrecked.

Mukden, Oct. 13th.—A bloody battle is now raging six miles north of Yentai railroad station. No details.

The Russian advance was checked by the Japanese artillery fire which was directed with great skill.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 13th.—The Russian public are warned now that the tables are turned and that the Russian army is advancing, but they can not expect news which might reveal Kuropatkin's plans to the Japanese.

Kuropatkin's superiority in numbers is bound to compel the Japanese to fall back upon strong positions within the triangle formed by the Yentai, Liao Yang and Sykwantun, where the decisive battle of the war will probably be fought in a few days.

Field Headquarters, Second Japanese Army, Oct. 14th.—The advance on Mukden began on the morning of the 12th. Oyama, learning that the Russians were strengthening their left, north of Yentai, ordered the advance.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 14th.—The armies of Kuropatkin and Oyama are again in battle, north-east of Liao Yang. Beginning with a wild Russian blow at Bentsaiputze on the 9th, the engagement spread

rapidly until today it is raging along the entire front.

Tokio, Oct. 14th.—The battle raged all yesterday and into the night, and it is believed the Russian turning movement was checked. The Russian attack on Sien-chuang was repulsed.

Mukden, Oct. 14th.—Fighting is still in progress, this being the third day of the engagement, but it is impossible to say what has been accomplished. Hospital trains are continually arriving from the south.

The Provincial Government, at the instigation of our Government Agent, has had surveyed the plot of ground used for burial purposes on Discovery Road. It remains for the citizens to appoint trustees and make proper application for same according to the Act.

The scarcity of war news is noteworthy. Unless something momentous occurs soon, both armies will have to go into winter quarters to a certain extent. It does not follow that this will mean a cessation of hostilities, but it will almost certainly prevent any decisive fighting. Which side will gain most by the necessary delay, it is hard to judge. It is a mistake to suppose, as some do, that, given a few months' time, Russia can greatly outnumber Japan in soldiers in the field. The "Victoria Times," writing editorially on the subject, says: "If Japan puts men into the field in the same proportion as the United States did during the war of Secession, she can send out seven million men to meet the Russian hosts, and with this enormous margin to draw upon, it is far from certain that with all her immense population, Russia can send more soldiers to Manchuria than Japan."

### Local Enterprise.

A. C. Hirschfeld received on Wednesday last four tons of sacks and will endeavor to ship some 200 tons of magnesite before the close of navigation. The shipment is being made in order to thoroughly get the value of the deposit and to ascertain whether or not it can be handled with a profit. The result of Mr. Hirschfeld's enterprise is awaited with anxiety. The deposit would necessarily have to be shipped in large quantities, which would mean a permanent pay-roll and a boon to Atlin.

### McPhillips vs. Sloan.

A. E. McPhillips, at one time Attorney-General in the Provincial Cabinet of Richard McBride, is prominently spoken of in connection with the Conservative nomination for Parliament in the Comox-Atlin District, in opposition to Wm. Sloan.

The Hearst papers of the United States are opposing Roosevelt with untiring energy in favor of Judge Alton B. Parker, for president.

### An Old Pioneer.

Capt. M. Foley, who came here in the early days of the camp, having recently disposed of his grocery business to N. C. Wheeling, left last Thursday for Victoria. He intends visiting his family in New York, who will accompany him to the World's Fair at St. Louis. The Captain will return to Atlin in June, as he still owns many interests here to which he intends giving personal attention. That he will have a pleasant trip, is the wish of his many friends in Atlin.

## LATE NEWS.

The Toronto "Globe" says it is time to call a halt to the corruption in politics.

Trains on the new single rail road between Washington and Baltimore are expected to travel at 100 miles per hour.

Henry C. Payne, Postmaster-General of the United States, died of heart disease on the 4th. President Roosevelt speaks of him as "the sweetest and most lovable man I ever knew."

Dawson Liberal Association expresses full confidence in Sir Wm. Laurier and endorses Mr. W. L. Thompson's campaign against the corrupt Territorial Government of Governor Congdon.

The Dominion Government pays 1 1/2 cents a gal. upon all crude petroleum produced in Canada. This is about 60 cents per barrel, and of itself gives a handsome profit to the owners of large wells.

One of the greatest engineering feats of modern times is the Simplon tunnel which has just been completed through the Alps by the government of Switzerland and Italy. It is 12 miles 456 yards in length.

Sir Wm. Hartcourt, who died on the first of this month, was one of the great Liberal statesmen of Great Britain who received their training at the hands of Gladstone and Disraeli. He served nearly 40 years in parliament.

The Postoffice Department of Canada is to be congratulated on the fact that it is at last in a position to show a surplus in its administration. For the past financial year this surplus amounts to over \$300,000. It is a fair indication of the general prosperity of the country.

Bishop Potter declared at the Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Diocese of New York that the Church must set itself against the custom of divorce, which he characterizes as a "godless license which flings aside the most sacred vows because of vexatious congeniality."
