OUR DISTRICT.

Visit of the Provincial Mineralogist.

Compared with other mining camps, Atlin is certainly in a very favorable position at the present moment, its showing up to date places it very favorably before the Province, and, in fact, the whole world.

Since the discovery of placer gold here, much has been accomplished; large areas of auriferous gravel have been proven, and over three million dollars worth of gold has been recovered. The early miners practically worked out the principal creeks and parts of the benches; to-day, hydraulic and dredging operations are being carried on in the most energetic manner, involving large capital expenditure, under skilled miners, and these operations are largely productive and promise success. The possibilities of successful mining here are so great that other forms of mining, suitable to the conditions obtaining, are already under consideration, more especially the installation of steam shovels which will undoubtedly reap a golden harvest where hydraulic or dredging is impossible.

Quartz mining, which up to last year received very little attention in the camp, is now being carried on with every prospect of success; numbers of claims are being developed and in some instances ore is being shipped from mines which give every promise of becoming regular shippers.

The report of the Provincial Mineralogist, Wm. Fleet Robertson, who has just left Atlin after visiting most of the prominent workings here, will in all probability do much towards helping this district, as we feel sure that he will do justice to the importance of both placer and quartz possibilities. Mr. Robertson said he regretted not being able to remain longer and see more of the country, and expressed himself as satisfied with the outlook for the future.

Steam Shovels Coming.

Mr. R. D. Fetherstonhaugh left on Thursday for the coast, accompanied by Mrs. Fetherstonhaugh. He is going direct to Marion, Indiana, where he purposes placing an order for one or two steam shovels, one of which will be placed on Spruce Creek. Mr. Fetherstonhaugh has been closely connected with gravel mining for the past four years and has had the steam shovel under consideration for two years. He is an optimist, and is satisfied that the steam shovel will prove a boon to the camp and will handle gravel which could not be worked at a profit by any other

method. The shovel can be worked two weeks earlier in the spring and one month later in the fall. The shovel in question, to be placed on Spruce, will have a capacity of 1,000 yards per day and will be run by steam from a 50-horse-power boiler.

WAR NEWS.

Tokio, Oct. 15th:—General Oku reports the capture of eight additional Russian guns, making a total of thirty, together with ammunition wagons and 150 prisoners.

Tokio, Oct. 17th:—As a result of the bloody battle of October 14th, the Russians left 2,000 dead on the field. Oyama's troops have driven the enemy north to along Shakhe River. They are vigorously pressing the pursuit and will probably inflict further damage on Kuropatkin's forces. Latest advices state that the Russians left 4,500 dead in front of Kuropatkin's army alone and that the total Russian losses are estimated at over 30,000. The Japanese captured 30 guns and an enormous quantity of ammunition and rifles.

Mukden, Oct. 17th:—Kuropatkin's army is in retreat; but he is, however, fighting doggedly, so as to spare the Russian army from utter route. All roads leading to Mukden are crowded with wounded.

Falkenberg, Denmark, Oct. 18th:—The Russian Baltic fleet, comprising twenty-four ships, has anchored in Langeland Bay to take on coal.

Tokio, Oct. 18th:—It is authoritatively reported that the Russian fleet at Port-Arthur is suffering severely from the fire of the Japanese land batteries.

Tokio, Oct. 18th:—General Oku

reports that up to and including the 14th he lost 3,500 men. The Japanese loss is small in comparison with the great losses of the Russians. Oyama reports that 8,500 Russian bodies were buried by the Japanese and many others still lie on the field.

Mukden, Oct. 18th:—The battle of the last few days has been one of the bloodiest episodes of the war. A Russian regiment marched under cover of darkness and bayoneted several battalions of Japanese, many of whom died while they slept. The few Japanese who escaped returned and attacked the Russians and literally tore them to pieces with bayonets. The Russians could not reach the Japanese trenches and only a few returned where companies had charged.

Tokio, Oct. 19th:—Russians enveloped an advance column of Japanese on October 16th and captured 14 guns and 150 prisoners.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 19th:—Kuropatkin's story of recent engagements leaves the Russians still holding the north bank of Shake River, but it is the general belief here that the Russian army as a whole is retiring towards Mukden, having suffered, at the most conservative estimate, the loss of 30,000 men.

It is understood that all correspondents have been ordered to Harbin. All hopes of advance to the relief of Port Arthur have been abandoned. It is estimated that at least sixty thousand of both sides have either been killed or wounded since the armies closed in combat.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 20th:—Under date of October 18th, Kuropatkin reports: "During the night the Japanese attacked our advanced positions at Lone Tree Hill but

were repulsed. Everything quiet up to ten o'clock this morning. Heavy rainfall and roads greatly damaged."

The flush of enthusiasm over the capture of Lone Tree Hill and repulse of Japanese with the capture of 14 additional guns, has given way to more sober appraisal of these partial successes. No official confirmation of the report that Kuropatkin had resumed a genuine offensive movement has been received.

During a terrific storm, Oyama's forces made a desperate but unsuccessful attempt to recapture Lone Tree Hill.

Tokio, Oct. 20th:—The official report giving details of the envelopment of General Yamada's column, says: "On October 16th his column was proceeding to reinforce a detachment of the left army, which was attacking the enemy north of Shakhe. It was returning to its original position after defeating the enemy, when suddenly we were enveloped by about a division of the enemy. We succeeded in breaking through and regaining our original position. We were compelled to abandon 14 guns."

The Hospital Gives Thanks.

Among the out-going passengers on Monday's boat was F. T. Blunck, Esq., the genial president of the Pine Creek Power Co., who, in his well-known liberality, called on the secretary-treasurer of the Hospital Board, Mr. J. A. Fraser, and handed him his annual subscription, of \$50, to the Hospital.

Mr. R. A. Jackson, and other out-going passengers on Thursday's boat, also remembered the institution, all of which was gratefully received and thankfully acknowledged.

Why this work was not done this season we are not in a position to say, but it seems to be a pity that concessions such as this one, giving the right to take water from Surprise Lake, should not be utilized at the earliest possible moment. What is the reason for delay?

Atlin Branch of the P. M. A.

A meeting of the Atlin Branch of the Provincial Miners' Association was held in the Grand Hotel last Saturday evening. Mr. C. D. Mason, president; Capt. Hathorn, secretary, and Major Nevile, were in their places. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and adopted.

After some discussion, the members present agreed to adjourn the meeting for a week—till Saturday, 22nd inst., 8 p. m., at the Grand Hotel,—to consider several questions of importance which will be placed before the Executive at an early date, viz.: "The representation of leaseholders who have purchased individual claims within their leases," "What ought to be the size of a discovery claim," "The most simple system of gauging a miner's inch," "How leases thrown open may best be made public," "Advertising water-rights and leases in the local paper instead of only posting notices on the Government Office board,"—where they are sometimes placed in un conspicuous positions and their time-limit expires without the knowledge of those persons who might be affected by them.

As it is to mines and miners that this Camp has its existence, so it is the duty of every man in the District to belong to the Association and take a living interest in its work. We ought also to look upon the Association as an educative institution. The more we understand the value of the mining industry to Atlin and the Province generally, the more fitted will we be for whatever line of business we occupy.

Fire Protection and Trustees for Cemetery.

The public meeting held on Monday, to elect a Fire Chief and to appoint trustees for the burial ground, was very poorly attended and reflected great want of interest on the

part of the citizens generally. The question of fire protection is certainly one that deserves the aid, both morally and financially, of every person in the camp, more, especially those holding property.

Mr. Stables was voted to the chair and Mr. F. W. Dowling acted as secretary.

The matter of the appointment of Fire Chief and Sub-Chief was first taken up and owing to the shyness of attendance it was deemed advisable, on a motion moved accordingly, to leave the matter in the hands of the Council of the Board of Trade with full power to act.

The appointment of trustees for the cemetery resulted in the election of Captain Hathorn, Dr. Cameron and Mr. Herb. Cancellor. The meeting then adjourned.

LATE NEWS.

King George of Saxony, aged 72 years, died on the 14th.

James Hamilton Ross, M. P. and ex-governor of the Yukon Territory, has been appointed to the Senate.

Dr. Alfred Thompson has been unanimously nominated as the Conservative standard-bearer of the Yukon Territory for Parliament.

Edinburgh, Oct. 15th. — The Duke of Connaught, while driving in his automobile, collided with a cart. The Duke was thrown out, severely wounding his head and rendering him unconscious.

Chatham, Mass., Oct. 15th. — The schooner Wentworth, from Nova Scotia, ran on a sand bar during the night, and was completely wrecked. All on board perished.

Four "tyee" Chinamen of Victoria were arrested a short time ago for suborning a witness in connection with a murder case. Bail was fixed at \$15,000 each, and in less than five minutes the whole \$60,000 was paid.

H. B. Shadwell, collector of customs at Whitehorse, died there on Friday of last week. His little daughter Flora died only three days before. Mrs. Shadwell and two of her four sons are laid up. Tonsillitis, of a very malignant form, is the cause.

Lord Milner has resigned the High Commissionership of South Africa, on account of ill-health. Colonel Sir Charles Edward Warde (present British Under-Secretary of State for War and formerly Director of Supplies for the South African Field Forces) is considered likely to get the appointment.

The largest bill the Japanese have had to pay to foreign countries since the war began was for coal. Between the 1st of January and the 30th of June, 1904, the government imported 750,000 tons of coal from Great Britain, at an average cost of \$5 a ton, in addition to burning 300,000 tons a month from their own mines.

The comments of the foreign press on the results of the British mission to Tibet are interesting, indicating as they do the sentiment in official and popular circles in foreign countries towards Great Britain. Japan expresses satisfaction. In France, Italy and Austria there is generous appreciation of what the British mission has achieved and a recognition that the expedition was necessary. In Germany there is a somewhat reluctant admission that the enterprise has been very successful and that Great Britain has again had her "usual luck." In Russia, as was to be expected, the realization of the fact that British influence and prestige have been greatly strengthened in Asia, while Russian prestige has suffered, calls forth hostile criticism of the terms of the treaty.

Pekin, Oct. 17th. — China is preparing for war, either for the purpose of being ready for internal troubles or else take sides with Japan against Russia.

Russian or Japanese spies are thought to have caused the wreck of a freight train, at Potter, North Dakota, last week, on which were two knock-down submarine boats en route to Seattle, where they were supposed to have been intended for either Japan or Russia.

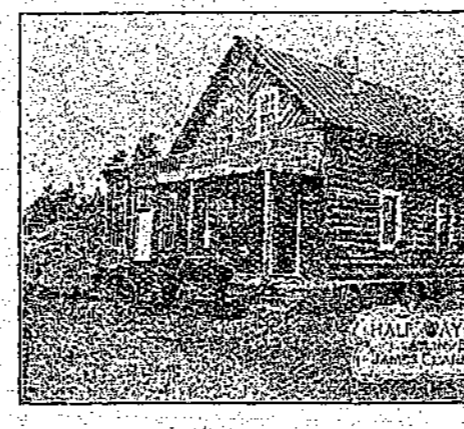
