## TELEGRAPHIC.

### Aylesworth Sworn in as Postmaster-General.

### THE DEATH OF SENATOR FULFORD.

### Railway Crossing Accident—Vancouver Warehouse Burned—Murderer Captured—British Officers Held for Ransom—Sir Henry Irving Is Dead.

Ottawa, Oct. 19.—Hon. A. B. Aylesworth was on Monday sworn in as a privy councillor and Postmaster-General by the Governor-General, Earl Grey. Sir William Mulock, the retiring Postmaster-General, has been appointed Chief Justice of the exchequer division of the High Court of Ontario, which is a newly created position.

Judge Lemieux will shortly go to England to argue before the Privy Council against the decision, recently handed down by Justice Anglin, that Canada has no right to deport aliens under the Alien Labor Act. Senator Fulford, of Brockville, is dead as the result of an automobile accident of a few days ago.

Halifax, Oct. 19.—A train struck the carriage of a party which was on its way to church on Sunday morning last and killed Mr. Henry Ernest and his son. Mrs. Ernest was seriously injured.

Vancouver, Oct. 19.—A three story warehouse on Water street in this city, which was occupied by G. H. Cottrell, has been burned with a loss of \$70,000.

On Saturday last the citizens donated \$1,300 in response to the hospital ladies annual appeal.

Several Minneapolis capitalists have secured 43,000 acres of fir and cedar timber limits on Vancouver island and will erect an immense sawmill in the near future.

W. Remy, who is wanted in Montana on a charge of murder, was arrested in this city yesterday after a desperate struggle with two detectives.

After a hard fight on Wednesday a fire in the dry kiln of Heaps & Co.'s saw and planing mill, in the east end of this city, was got under control and the mill buildings saved from destruction.

Tangiers, Oct. 19.—Two of the officers from the British repair ship Assistance, which was recently wrecked on the Moroccan coast, have been captured by the Angera tribe and are being held for a large ransom.

Winnipeg, Oct. 19.—Exactly 3,312,750 bushels of this season's wheat were inspected during the week ending October 16th, which exceeds all previous records of either Canada or the United States.

London, Oct. 19.—Sir Henry Irving, the actor, was stricken with apoplexy here on Saturday night last and died before a physician

could arrive. He had just finished the last act of a performance of his great play "Becket."

(Sir Henry Irving, whose real name was John Henry Brodribb, was born at Keinton, England, on February 6th, 1838, and he made his first appearance on the stage in 1856 at Edinburgh and in London in 1859. He made no distinct mark until 1870, when he played Digby Grant in Albery's "Two Roses." In 1878 he became manager and made a great success of the Lyceum theatre in London. In 1891 he toured America with his company, of which the famous Ellen Terry was a member. He was especially distinguished in "Hamlet," "Othello," "The Merchant of Venice," "Richard III.," "Richelieu," "The Bells," "Louis XI." and "Becket." He was knighted by the late Queen Victoria in 1895.)

London, Sept. 20.—The body of the late Sir Henry Irving will be buried in Westminster Abbey.

Tokio, Oct. 20.—The Russian battleship "Pobieda" was refloated at Port Arthur yesterday.

Paris, Oct. 20.—Unless Venezuela apologizes to France immediately, French warships will at once commence to bombard the Venezuelan coast. The proposed action has been approved of by the United States.

London, Oct. 20.—The Prince and Princess of Wales started on a six months tour of the provinces of India today.

Paris, Oct. 20.—A despatch received here today from Rome states that the Mad Mullah has again taken the field in Somaliland and is threatening Italian colonists.

### GENERAL NEWS.

A strong earthquake shock was felt at Montevideo, Italy, on Oct. 10. Lord and Lady Grey were tendered a reception last week at Winnipeg.

A Dawson report states that no further steamers will leave there this year for lower Yukon points.

Russia's new homestead law will throw open to settlement millions of acres of unoccupied land in Siberia.

At Lexington, Ky., last week Dan Patch lowered the world's pacing record to 1 minute 55 1/4 seconds.

Prince Sergius Troubetsky was stricken with apoplexy and died within two hours at St. Petersburg last week.

Vice Admiral Voel, commanding a British squadron in Asiatic waters, and his officers were last week banqueted at Tokio.

W. R. Hearst, the newspaper man, has agreed to accept the nomination of the Municipal League for mayor of New York.

General A. W. Greely, head of the United States signal service, has decided to install wireless telegraphy between Zamboango and Jolo

islands to overcome the difficulty of the cable chafing.

Up to last Saturday, when the exposition closed, over 8,500,000 persons had attended the Lewis & Clark fair at Portland.

A man named Alex. McDonald fell down a shaft on Eago hill near Dawson last week and received painful but not serious injuries.

A Toronto despatch says that the general board of Presbyterian home missions has resolved to stamp out Mormonism in the Canadian west.

A Washington report says that the United States government will shortly establish a life-saving station, with a complement of 20 men at Nome.

Thirty-seven of the leading society ladies of Chatham, Ont., are being prosecuted for smuggling goods from the United States into Canada.

The output of gold of the Tanana mines this season has been \$6,500,000, while to date for this year the Yukon has shipped \$6,000,000 to the outside.

Edward Cunliffe, the man who stole \$100,000 from the Adams express company at Pittsburg, Pa., is in hiding in Montreal. Detectives are hot on his trail.

Senator Edmonds, of California, has been found guilty of accepting bribes. Mrs. Edmonds, who was in court when the finding was made, fell to the floor in hysterics.

General Wm. T. Clark died in New York on Oct. 12th at the age of 74 years. He was the last surviving member of General Grant's staff, of which he was chief.

A late census gives the population of Ottawa as 65,108, an increase over last year of 1,596. This does not include the suburbs, which would make it over 100,000.

Joseph B. Tyrrell is suing the Bronson & Ray concession people in the Yukon territorial court for \$45,000 for his services as consulting engineer and for acting as their agent.

Pinkerton detectives last week arrested a brakeman of the Great Northern railroad at Spokane on suspicion that he was implicated in the recent express train hold-up at Ballard.

A Vladivostock report says that the state of seige which has existed there for some months past has been abolished. The schools have been re-opened and trains are running regularly.

Thirty-seven firemen of the steamship Oceanic, White Star Line, have been sentenced to seven days imprisonment at Liverpool for disobeying orders of the captain on the high seas.

Germany is greatly excited over the statement published in the Paris Matin that, in case of friction between Germany and France, Great Britain would go to the assistance

of the latter. The German press claims that in case of such friction it would be Britain's place to remain neutral.

At Dawson last week the case of John Grant against Dr. Alfred Thompson, which was brought for the purpose of removing Thompson from his seat in the Dominion house, was postponed until December.

A St. Petersburg despatch says the negotiations between Great Britain and Japan are progressing most satisfactorily to Russia and a complete understanding regarding the Asiatic questions has been arrived at.

The British cruiser squadron under Prince Louis of Battenberg is expected to arrive at Annapolis, Maryland, today. Admiral Robley Evans, with a United States battleship squadron, will be on hand to welcome them.

The home of George Alfreds, superintendent of the coal mines at Ravendale, Wash., was blown up with dynamite on Oct. 9th by Frank Hadevis, a miner who had been discharged. Alfreds' family had a narrow escape, but none of them were injured.

An Ottawa despatch says that it is now certain that the Grand Trunk Pacific terminus will be the most northern available port on the British Columbia coast. A branch of the road will be constructed to Vancouver through a combination with Jim Hill.

A Paris report says that a different phase has been placed on the Franco-German situation by the attitude of Great Britain, she having officially assured France that in case of an attack made on her by Germany, she, Great Britain, is in readiness to mobilize a fleet with the view of adopting aggressive measures.

### Mining Notes.

The cold snap at the beginning of the week closed down practically all open placer mining operations in the district. Some, however, have resumed work since the change to soft weather occurred.

The North Columbia Gold Mining Co., J. M. Ruffner, manager, had all their pits closed down but have succeeded, after a hard effort, in resuming operations again. On Thursday night, however, their south ditch broke down, which was caused by frost, and they will not have the repairs completed until some time today. This company have about 12 days steady piping to do to clean up all their season's pits.

The Willow Creek Co., F. H. Brackett manager, were also closed down for a few days, but are hard at it again. They also require about two weeks to finish up.

The Northern Mines Ltd., on Spruce Creek, A. H. Bromly manager, have closed down. They had practically finished for the season, but would have been in operation 10 days longer had the weather remained mild.

Cox & Co., of Spruce, also suffered by reason of the severe weather. They are now making arrangements for their winter operations.

#### Approaching a Crisis.

A late Moscow despatch says that Russia is again fermenting and there is no question but that an outbreak such as never before has taken place is about to occur. Everybody is arming for the trouble that will be general throughout the empire. Large quantities of arms have been seized by the revolutionists at Kiev, Riga, Odessa, Moscow, St. Petersburg, Saratof, Tiflis, Baku, Batum and other places. In Caucasus the revolutionists have declared war on the Cossacks. Recently 11 bombs were thrown among Cossack troops with fatal results in many instances. Several people have been killed by the soldiers, and recently a woman was killed in the street while assisting a wounded girl.
