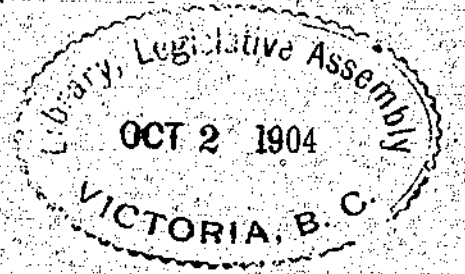

MINING NEWS.

NEW DISCOVERY.

Stampede to Gladys Lake.

O. C. Solt and J. M. Buchanan, who have been prospecting all summer on Consolation Creek, which empties into Gladys Lake and is some ten miles long, have been rewarded with good prospects. The discovery claim was staked on the 14th inst. and is about half a mile from Gladys Lake. The discoverers have opened a cut some 100 yards for drainage, and although good pay has been obtained, they have not yet worked on bed-rock. They intend to get in machinery next summer. The creek runs through very high gravel benches and in its channel are large boulders. Quite a stampede has been taking place to that locality during the past few days. Consolation Creek was staked in 1898, but was abandoned without being prospected.

The few cold days of the past week have been the cause of a shortage of water among the mines.

The French Company on Boulder Creek have reduced the force of men on their hydraulic operations, owing to scarcity of water, and are now preparing for winter work on an extensive scale.

Mine-owners and laymen are preparing agreements for the winter season, and from all accounts a large amount of ground is to be worked on lays.

Mining Tit-Bits.

The Straits Settlements furnish 60 per cent. of the world's supply of tin.

The richest sulphur mine in the world occurs in Louisiana, from which is shipped over 500 tons daily.

New Zealand, from 1853 to 1904, has produced \$317,000,000 in gold. She is now producing at the rate of \$9,500 a year.

The Britannia Mines, on Howe Sound, near Vancouver, are expending hundreds of thousands of dollars in opening up.

The experiment of importing Japanese coolies into Mexico under contract to do work in mines is proving disastrous to all concerned.

Meerschmann is found on the plains near Eski-Shehir, in Asia Minor, where it is mined in larger quantities than in any other part of the world.

The Transvaal Colony is rich in many minerals besides gold, which received no attention during the Boer regime. A furnace for smelting iron ore has been erected near Pretoria; large deposits of iron, coal and limestone abound there in close proximity. A rolling mill and other iron works are under contemplation in the same region.

There has been a large increase in the production of copper in recent years, but authorities maintain that the consumption has gained proportionately.

Nickel was first made known as an element in 1781 by Cronstedt. Canada is the largest producer of nickel; its production in the United States has shrunk to almost nothing.

Radium, in appearance, much resembles the common table salt. Its power lasts indefinitely, without any apparent physical or chemical change, and is the marvel of the age.

There are over 50 bucket dredges at work in placer districts in California. The first dredge of this type was used in New Zealand, where there are over 200 in operation.

PLATINUM.

The platinum expert, Howard Dubois of Philadelphia, has been spending this summer in different parts of British Columbia, trying to discover localities where platinum can be found in quantities to work it on a commercial scale. He has prospected or otherwise examined all likely places in the United States but failed to find any place there where it could be handled with profit. Platinum is found only in placer localities, with black sand, and it is thought there is not a placer mine in Caribou but is losing more or less platinum because the miners are not sufficiently interested to make the necessary alterations in their sluice boxes to save it. The demand for platinum is far greater than the supply. It is principally used in manufacture of electric lamps and dental supplies and runs in value from \$13 to \$20 an ounce, according to degrees of fineness. Its source is supposed to be serpentine rock.

Rhodium is one of the most expensive of the platinum group of metals, being worth \$300 per ounce, but the annual production hardly exceeds a hundred ounces.

G. T. P. R. Terminus.

The Grand Trunk Pacific Railway officials have inspected Port Simpson and several other possible Pacific coast terminals, took a trip up the Skeena as far as Hazelton, returned to Victoria and have gone back East. Great disappointment was evident in Vancouver and Victoria owing to the officials' uncommunicativeness, and the terminus of the projected transcontinental line is still a deep, dark secret and will remain so until the directors meet in Montreal. President Hays opened out so far as to announce that the place chosen would be recommended unanimously by the members of the party.

WAR NEWS.

Mukden, Sept. 23rd.—A battle is hourly expected in the vicinity of Pushan, 30 miles east of Mukden. At present all is quiet. The weather is turning cold.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 23rd.—Kuropatkin reports that the Japanese continue to attempt to turn the Russian left but without success.

Reports from Kuroki's headquarters state that the Russians are reconnoitering along the Japanese front with a large force of cavalry. They appeared yesterday within 6,000 yards of Yentai Station and threw a few shells.

Tokio, Sept. 23rd.—While official confirmation is lacking, it seems certain the Japanese captured a fort on another hill west of Itzhian, which they carried by a desperate assault and have since resisted all attempts of the Russians to recapture. Both these heights overlook Port Arthur, offering excellent gun positions, which weakens the Russian defenses.

The oil tank steamer, George Loomis, was burned near Portland, Ore., this week.

The boundary dispute between Canada and Newfoundland will likely be referred to the Privy Council.

Anton Lloyd, a deck hand on the steamer Casca, fell overboard and was drowned, at Kirkman Crossing, on the Yukon, last week.

The charge of bribery against John Brown, the Liberal member for North Perth, Ont., has been sustained and the seat declared vacant.

In the United States, according to the census lately published, there are 1,750,178 child workers, between the ages of 10 and 15, and one out of every three is a girl.

An Omaha doctor believes he has found a cure for lockjaw, hitherto considered rarely curable. His cure consists in exposing the patient to a freezing temperature.

The French census shows the population to be 38,961,945, a gain of only 444,613 in ten years. There is no other European country in which the population increases so slowly.

Court News.

Carter vs. Kerr.—Action for balance of wages due and damages for wrongful dismissal. Judgment for plaintiff for \$20 and costs; no damage allowed. A. J. Kappeler for plaintiff and A. I. Belyea, K. C., for defendant.

Ginaca & Murot vs. McKee Creek Consolidated.—Judgment was on Thursday handed down allowing plaintiff the 90 inch of water claimed by them under the provision of Sec. 29 of the Water Clauses Consolidated Act as Amended, and \$50 damages. Messrs. Kappeler and Grant for plaintiffs and Messrs. Taylor and Mason for defendant.

Judge and Mrs. Duff left for Vancouver on Monday last. With his departure, the sittings of the Supreme Court are closed for this year.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Duff expressed themselves as well pleased with Atlin, both from a business as well as a social standpoint.

His Hon. Judge Henderson is now enquiring into the profits made by The Pine Creek Power Co. by the use of derricks. This enquiry was directed by the full court in the appeal of Slavin vs. The Pine Creek Power Co.

John Sampson, charged with shooting at Gus Anderson, on Boulder Creek, with intent to kill, elected on Thursday for speedy trial, before Judge Henderson, without a jury.

A trip of 41,000 miles is something of a record for an Indian dug-out canoe, 30 ft. long, 2½ ft. deep and 43 years old, but this has been accomplished in the last three years by Capt. J. C. Voss, in a trip from Victoria to England, via New Zealand.

The problem of the hour is how to place legitimate mining propositions before the investing public. During the past five years our prospectors have been remarkably fortunate in discovering well defined auriferous lodes within a radius of thirty miles of Atlin. Much money and labor have been expended in compliance with the gold laws to record necessary assessment work, and in many cases crown grants to mineral claims have been obtained. The great potential and intrinsic values of our mineral resources are frequently reported upon by eminent mining experts; and sanguine hopes are naturally raised, that the time has arrived to obtain profitable returns from the mines. We are told that an influx of capital is at hand, that capitalists have awakened to the fact,—Atlin is the richest spot in creation,—and they hunger for the golden spoil. The wish is father to the thought. And, strangely enough, capital declines to be rushed; it must be systematically humored before it will even cast a favorable glance at the richness of our fields. Therefore, we must seek the capitalist in his own market place,—it may be rather "infra dix" for our future gold kings, but they have a mountainous precedent in history and it is the easiest course to follow. Let our legitimate mining propositions be well and carefully introduced abroad, and no doubt enterprising capital will be forthcoming to assist in the development of our quartz mines and the winning of the precious metals.

The New Governor-General.

Earl Grey, who has been appointed Governor-General of Canada, beside being a man of ability and tact, has given much attention to colonial matters, and is well and favorably known throughout the Dominion. He has been identified with what is known as the "public-house trust," since its foundation, an organization established and maintained to promote sobriety among the people by offering them, as alternatives to the saloon, places of refreshment and recreation not dependent on the sale of intoxicating liquors. This trust movement, after proving its utility in England, was a few months ago explained to the people of Canada by Earl Grey in person. After the ill-starred raid into the Transvaal he succeeded Dr. Jamieson as Administrator of the Chartered South African Co's territory and was an intimate friend of the late Cecil Rhodes.

\$6,500 Reward.

For the capture and conviction of the gang that held up the C. P. R. train near Vancouver last week, the reward of \$6,500 is offered by the C. P. R., the Dominion Express Co. and the Provincial Government. The police feel confident of capturing them. The whole country in the vicinity of Vancouver and the boundary line is aroused, for every man and amateur sleuth has his eye on the big reward. The robbers are three in number, are armed with rifles and have been seen several times.

WAR NEWS.

Vancouver, Sept. 17th:—The Russian transport Korea is reported to be off the coast of British Columbia.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 17th:—Advices from Mukden indicate that the Japanese forces are again on the move. Kuropatkin's reconnaissance establishes the fact that they are massing on his east flank, and bodies of Japanese are moving up the Liao River valley. The war office believes that no serious engagement will take place for several weeks.

Mukden, Sept. 17th:—It is reported that the Japanese are advancing on Mukden from the east; but there is a strong force of Russians ready to meet them.

Twenty-six wounded men were brought into town yesterday. Particulars of skirmish not available. It is not clear whether it was simply an outpost affair or a real Japanese advance on Mukden.

Fusan, Korea, Sept. 19th:—Reports from General Kuroki state that the Japanese front is now some distance north of Liao Yang, almost half way to Mukden and confronting the outpost lines of the Russian forces.

Tientsin:—From a trustworthy source it is learned that the Japanese foreign minister has issued a circular announcing that Japan intends to turn Port Arthur, when captured, and the whole Liaotung peninsula, over to the Chinese, who will declare Port Arthur an open port for the commerce of the world.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 19th:—No fresh news has been received from the front, although outposts are in contact and some little skirmishing has occurred. The war office does not believe the Japanese are ready for another advance unless they have received heavy reinforcements.

Chifoo, Sept. 19th:—Chinese and Japanese advices agree that bombardment of Port Arthur became terrific at dawn on September 15th and continued until the 16th. The Japanese fired from Pigeon Bay and other places where heavy guns have been placed.

Berlin, Sept. 22nd:—Not since the war began has the situation been so critical as regards danger involving all Europe. The constant mobilization of Chinese troops along the Manchurian frontier is becoming ominous, and the vague reports of Japan's intention to call upon China to send these troops into territory which the brown soldiers have wrestled from Russia is more ominous.

The German Emperor believes that the domination of all Asia is the prize at stake.

Tokio, Sept. 22nd:—It is generally believed that an engagement will soon take place at Mukden. The Japanese are slowly pushing northward. The outposts are in touch near Yen Tai and skirmishes occur daily. Japanese are rapidly changing the gauge of railroad from New Chwang and will probably be in operation to Liao Yang in a fortnight.
