VICTORIA—Local bank clearings for the week ending November 16 totalled \$1,389,160.

VICTORIA—It is reported that the Standard Bank had taken premises in Victoria preparatory to the opening of a branch at the capital.

VICTORIA—The B. C. Electric Ry. Co. is calling for tenders for 500 cedar poles. Specifications can be obtained from purchasing dept.

NEW WESTMINSTER—Tenders for 1917 school supplies will be opened at a special meeting of the School Board to be held tonight.

NORTH-VANCOUVER—The district council's fire and light committee will confer with the city of North Vancouver regarding the establishment of a joint fire hall at the corner of St. George's Avenue and Osborne Road.

NEW WESTMINSTER—A permit has been issued for interior alterations to the building at one time occupied by the Royal Bank, which will shortly be used as an office and waiting room for a new interurban jitney line to be known as the Union Jack Motor Line.

VANCOUVER—Although normally one meeting of the city council is scheduled for this week—the regular meeting on Monday evening—the aldermen promise to have a busy time during the first part of the week at least. Arrangements have been made by Mayor McBeath to hold a special meeting of the council this afternoon at 2 o'clock to deal with the question of jitney bonds. The regular meeting of the council will be held as usual at 7:30 in the evening. On Tuesday afternoon, another special meeting will be held, this one being called to deal with charter amendments. It is probable that another special meeting may be held during the week, either on charter amendments or other matters.

VICTORIA—Another large mining concern to carry on-mining and development work in the Hazelton section has been incorporated in the Hazelton Rocher de Boule Mining and Exploration Company, Limited (non-personal liability) with a capital stock of \$2,000,000 and head office at Vancouver. The Yuctaw Gold Mines, Limited, with a capital of \$250,000 and head office at Vancouver, has also been incorporated to carry on a general mining business.

Other incorporations include the following: Iowa Shingle Co., Limited, capital \$10,000 and head office at Vancouver; Canadian Teachers' Agency Limited, capital \$10,000 and head office at Vancouver; Vancouver Pickle Co., with a capital of \$50,000; Wing Hong Lin Theatre, Limited, of Vancouver, with a capital of \$10,000, to carry on a theatre business.

Sharples Separator Company, a California concern, has been licensed to carry on business in British Columbia as an extra-Provincial company, with its Provincial head office in Vancouver.

Notice is given of the intention of the Dominion Educational Films, Limited, to apply for a change of name to that of the "Dominion Film Corporation, Limited.

PRINCETON—It is stated that a large creamery will be established here in the near future.

PRINCETON—It is reported that Foley, Welch & Stewart will begin at once the construction of a four-mile spur up the north fork of Granite Creek to the Coalmont Colliery.

VANCOUVER—Sidney E. Junkins, of Montreal, reached the city last week for a conference with C. P. R. officials regarding the new pier the company is to build here and for which his firm recently received the contract.

VANCOUVER—In preparation for logging fifty square miles of cedar lying on both sides of McNab Creek, B. A. Olds and G. F. Crockett have applied to Chief Justice Hunter for authority to expropriate a right-of-way for a flume through the lands of Mary Jane and Anna Collins.

VICTORIA—Approval of the application of the city of Prince George for the right to secure a water supply from the Nechaco River, a tributary of the Fraser River, for waterworks purposes is announced. The construction of the necessary works has already been commenced.

VICTORIA—The 60 business men of Victoria who returned from a tour of up-island parts last week were enthusiastic over their journey, and determined to repeat the trip next year and at an earlier date than the one which had just terminated. The result this time was exceedingly satisfactory and there is no doubt whatever that it will be mutually satisfactory to the people of Victoria and to the business men of the other island towns.

VANCOUVER—Local motorists and those interested in the big publicity scheme for the northwest are making preparations for the entertainment of probably a hundred visiting motorists who are expected to come here from as far south as Oregon on the occasion of the meeting of the directors and officers of the North-Pacific Coast Tourist Association, of which Ald. Mahon of this city is the vice-president. The meeting will be held at the Commercial Club, November 25.

VICTORIA—Sealed tenders are being invited by the minister of lands for the purchase of timber license X719, under which may be cut 7,230,000 feet of dead and down cedar and 1,000 cords of shingle bolts, on an area adjoining Powell Lake, and timber license X768 under which may be cut 182,600 feet of yellow pine and Douglas fir on an area adjoining lot 1417 Nicola River. Three years is allowed for the removal of the timber in the former case and eight months in the latter.

VICTORIA—The experiment which has been in progress during the present year with nitrogen-filled lamps, following a test made by City Electrician Hutchison on a corner downtown, has shown that a more durable lamp is necessary if the best results are to be obtained with this newer type. The lamps used are made in Holland, but a Canadian company holding the patent rights for the Dominion deals with the various authorities using them, and the city electrician has arranged that the representative is to visit here and confer with him so that better results may be obtained.

NEW WESTMINSTER — Reeve H. Bridgman and Councilors Louisa Whittaker, McLurg, Scott and Burdick, representing the district council of North Vancouver, last week waited as a deputation upon the Vancouver Harbor Board to obtain information regarding the terminal development schedule of the commissioners, including the development for the north shore.

NEW WESTMINSTER—Machinery is now being installed in the Dominion Cedar & Shingle Company's new mill at the Lulu Island bridge.

PROVINCIAL ESTIMATES ARE TAXED IN THE HOUSE

VICTORIA—A revenue of just over \$6,000,000 and an expenditure of \$11,000,000 for the year commencing April 1 next is predicted in the provincial estimates which were tabled in the House of Commons by the Minister of Finance, on Monday. The revenue shows a falling off of about \$1,000,000 from the anticipated revenue for this year, while the expenditures show a slight increase.

The exact estimated revenue is \$5,944,015 as compared with \$7,344,615 for the present year, a difference of \$1,398,600. The estimated expenditures are \$11,301,874, as compared with \$11,164,056 for the previous year, an increase of \$138,000. The increase is more than accounted for by the increase in fixed charges, which are over \$500,000.

Summary of Expenditure: The summary of estimated expenditure indicates that in four of the principal Government services, there will probably be an increased expenditure over last year. In the rest a reduction is predicted. The following are the totals: 1915-16, 1916-17. Public debt, 1,152,376; 1,422,254. Civil Government, 1,709,566; 1,657,738.

Among the appropriations in this year's estimates is a conditional one of \$200,000 for the University of British Columbia. Last year's estimate was \$170,000, included in the works and buildings department. The works and buildings department are the following: Okalla prison farm, \$15,000; improvement of government reserve Burnaby, \$10,000; mental hospital and colony farm, Essondale, \$35,000; provincial government buildings, London (completion and maintenance), \$175,000; maintenance of the appropriation for provincial normal school, Vancouver, for roads, streets, bridges and wharves in each constituency are the same as last year. Chilliwack gets \$23,500; Delta, \$22,500; New Westminster, \$45,500; and Richmond \$40,000.

Other Appropriations: Among the other appropriations are the following: Grant to B. C. regiments \$5,000; grant to patriotic fund \$5,000; grant to hockey clubs \$1,000; grant to Victoria Olympic Nurses \$500; grant to returned soldiers' aid commissions, \$15,000; Royal Commissions \$15,000 (last year \$60,000); cougar bounty \$35,000; contribution to Vancouver toward purchase of certain lanes in Ward VIII, \$5,000; Fraser River bridge, New Westminster, maintenance and repairs, \$20,200; Songhees Reserve Improvements, \$240,000.
