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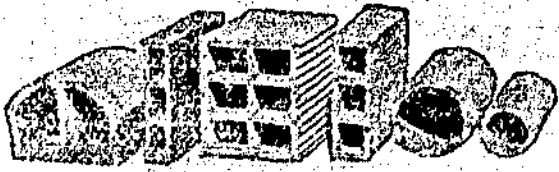
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## OCTOBER ORDERS PLACED FOR STRUCTURAL STEEL PROVE LOWEST OF YEAR

NEW YORK (Special) — According to the report of the Bridge Builders and Structural Society, orders placed for fabricated structural steel in October amounted to only 45,000 tons, as compared with 77,700 tons during the month previous. The October orders were equal to only 25 1/2 per cent. of the capacity of the bridge and structural shops of the country, as against orders engaging 43 per cent. of the country's capacity in September. During the first ten months of this year the average monthly volume of orders placed has been equal to 53.8 per cent. of the shop capacity, as against a monthly average of 48.5 per cent. 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## LOCAL ARCHITECTS DESIGNS ACCEPTED

Twizell, Birds & Twizell are Successful Competitors for Pentiction Church.

From among a list of nineteen designs submitted in open competition for a new Anglican church and parish hall at Pentiction, B. C., the design of Twizell, Birds, & Twizell, Vancouver architects, was placed first in order of merit by the assessor. The local firm will be accordingly commissioned to supervise and carry out the construction of the buildings when the necessary financial arrangements are completed by the church trustees.

The group of new building at Pentiction is designed in the perpendicular Gothic style of architecture in masonry construction with the tower on the northwest corner of the church, rising to a height of 65 feet. The buildings will comprise a church with a seating capacity of 450, a morning chapel accommodating 35 worshippers, and a parish hall to accommodate 250 persons.

It is proposed by the church trustees to expend \$50,000 in erecting the first units, but ultimately the complete group as designed, with church furnishings, will cost more than \$100,000.

Mr. J. C. Keith, architect of Victoria, was appointed professional assessor by the church trustees and adjudicated the nineteen designs submitted in the competition.

## TENDERS IN ON PRINCE RUPERT COURT HOUSE

Tenders closed yesterday (Thursday) on the Prince Rupert court house on which bids were asked by the provincial government. This structure is to be of stone construction and three storeys high. The estimated cost is in the neighborhood of \$400,000. It is understood that a considerable number of Vancouver, Victoria, Prince Rupert and other eastern firms tendered on this important undertaking as well as the sub-contracts. It is expected that the announcement of the successful tenderer will be made in about a week, or immediately after the provincial elections.

## LARGE SCHOOL SWELLS POINT GREY'S PERMITS

Point Grey, B. C. — Building permits issued in Point Grey for the week ending November 18, aggregated in value the high total of \$179,625, which is the highest figure that has been achieved in any one week for some time. The unusually large total is largely due to one large permit, that for the new High School at Marpole, which is being erected by the Point Grey School Board at a cost of \$170,000. Outside of that large single permit, which will help to make the month's total a record one, there were three new residences authorized during the week.

## MAY GET AWARD OF LABOR TEMPLE JOB

Mr. Thos. Carson Rumored to be Successful Bidder on Technical School Contract.

While definite confirmation of the award of the contract for the alterations on the former Labor Temple building to fit it for its future use as the Vancouver Technical School, is lacking at present, it is currently reported on reliable authority that Mr. Thos. Carson, 4592 St. Catherine's street, is the successful bidder on this job. Actual corroboration of this fact could not be obtained up to a late hour yesterday owing to the fact that Mr. Carson was absent from the city attending to several other contracts at outside points which he has in hand.

The necessary alterations and remodeling to the Labor Temple building will involve an estimated outlay of between \$10,000 and \$11,000. The work is to be rushed, according to the provisions of the tender, as the school board desires to get possession of the building early in January in order to locate some of its manual training and technical classes there and thus relieve congestion in some of the other schools by making room for other classes.

Mr. Carson has two other school contracts, recently awarded by the provincial government, now under way. One of these is a school at Vanderhoof on the G. T. P., and the other is a two-room addition to the school at Powell River. He is at present at Powell River, where work has just been started on that contract.

## VULCAN IRON WORKS TO MAKE FOUR BIG BOILERS

In keen competition with a number of large British and American steel firms who bid on the same contract, the Vulcan Iron Works of this city has submitted the lowest tender and been awarded the contract for the manufacture of four large boilers for the new C. P. R. coasting passenger steamer which is now under construction at the Wallace Shipyards, North Vancouver.

The four big boilers are to be manufactured at the Vulcan Iron Works plant on Granville Island. The boilers are to be of the Scotch marine type of 1,150 indicated horsepower, and made to carry a working pressure of 180 pounds to the square inch. The shell plates are to be 1 7/16th inches in thickness, and each boiler will be 16 feet in diameter and 12 feet in length. Work on the fabrication of the boilers is to start at once.

## GETS MILLION DOLLAR JOB ON WATER PLANT

SEATTLE. — Involving an expenditure of nearly \$2,000,000, a contract for constructing the water portion of a huge filtration plant on the Sacramento River in the suburbs of Sacramento.

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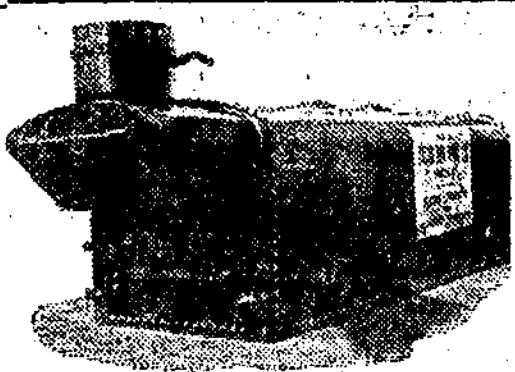
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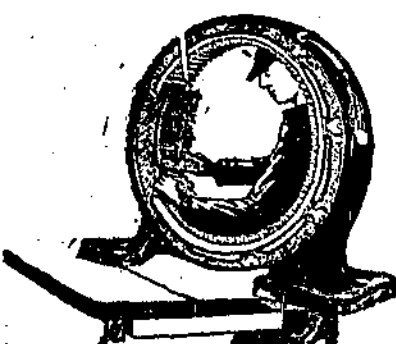
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**THREE CONDITIONS WHICH MAY  
REDUCE BUILDING  
COSTS**

An authoritative investigation has  
recently been carried out by govern-  
ment officials in both Canada and the  
United States to obtain an answer to  
the eternal question asked by persons  
in need of new buildings or desirous  
of constructing an addition to exist-  
ing buildings. The question they are  
asking is "When will building costs  
be lower?"

According to the building trade ex-  
perts who have attempted to answer  
this question, there are only three  
conditions which might bring about a  
reduction in building costs. These  
are:

A reduction in demand.  
A reduction in wages of labor.  
A reduction in price of building  
material.

Reduction in the demand for ad-  
ditional construction is highly improb-  
able in view of the present shortage  
of business space throughout the  
country resulting from the slackening  
of commercial and industrial building  
during the war. In the United States  
the shortage throughout the country  
amounts to about three and a half  
billion dollars' worth of normal build-  
ing construction. In Canada, and par-  
ticularly Western Canada, the short-  
age is even worse than in the United  
States, owing to building operations  
being interrupted by the earlier entry  
into the war and the cessation of all  
but the most urgent building construc-  
tion for nearly five years.

As to the hope for a reduction in  
building costs due to a reduction in  
wages paid for labor, it does not seem  
probable that the laboring man will  
be content to accept any reduction in  
the size of his pay envelope. His at-  
titude in the majority of cases has  
rather tended to force wages to higher  
planes. Wages of the building trades  
have risen steadily during the past  
seven years. The latest to demand a  
very marked increase are the brick-  
layers. And still labor is dissatisfied  
and relentless.

The hope for a reduction in the cost  
of building materials rests very large-

ly on the hope for a reduction in  
wages, because for every dollar spent  
for brick, cement or steel which goes  
into a building, from 85 to 90 per  
cent. of such price ultimately goes  
back to the laborer who dug the clay,  
mined the coal, burned the brick,  
ground the cement, rolled the steel  
and transported all of them over the  
railroad lines or by water to the site  
of the work and built them into the  
structure. Until these related wages  
go down, therefore, it is not reason-  
able to expect any substantial reduc-  
tion in the price of building materials,  
reliable authorities claim.

cent. for the corresponding period in  
1919. Orders for the entire year 1919  
averaged 53 per cent. of capacity; and  
in 1918 55 per cent. The October  
figures are the lowest since April,  
1919, when orders amounted to only  
43,800 tons.

Representatives from Russia are  
here for the purpose of buying steel  
rails and pipe. They are prepared to  
pay 75 per cent. in gold and the  
balance on credit. The order for rails  
on which they are getting bids  
amounts to 100,000 tons, and the value  
of which will run close to \$5,000,000.  
It is not more. The order for pipe,  
which is to be eight-inch galvanized,  
threaded and coupled, involves over  
2,000,000 feet, and at the very lowest  
estimate will cost \$4,000,000. There  
is also an order for 220,000 feet of two-  
inch pipe for shipment to the Mexi-  
can oil fields in the market. This is  
by no means an unusual order from  
this quarter, as an extensive export  
business has been carried on with this  
district right along.

The provincial public works depart-

struction of a new highway bridge  
across the Salmon River near  
Fairmont, B. C. The contract will be an  
important one, as it involves the re-

ning that stream. Tenders will be  
received by Mr. G. P. Napier, assist-  
ant public works engineer, up to noon  
of Thursday, December 2.

Plans and specifications of the new  
bridge may be seen at the offices of  
the district engineers at the court  
houses in Vancouver and Nelson, and  
also at the department of public  
works, Victoria. The usual deposit of  
five per cent. of the amount of the tender  
must accompany each bid sent in.

encased in brick, which will be re-  
quired to retain the heat which is such  
an important factor in the operations.  
The Acetate Products, Limited, in-  
tend to spend about \$25,000 in their  
initial outlay in preparations for the  
manufacture of wood alcohol, acetate  
of lime and charcoal, three products  
which are in great demand. The raw  
material for these is to be secured in  
abundance right in the Fraser Valley,  
and comprises the alder wood which  
grows so luxuriantly throughout lower  
British Columbia. That the supply of  
raw material will be ample is evident  
from the fact that within the last  
couple of weeks, timber cruisers have  
discovered at least 250,000 cords of  
alder wood within easy access to the  
water, where it can be towed to the  
company's plant which will have the  
advantage of both rail and water ship-  
ping facilities.

The company expect to have facili-  
ties to handle 10½ cords of alder  
wood per day in the manufacture of  
wood alcohol, acetate of lime and  
charcoal. Practically the entire out-  
put for some months has already been  
spoken for by a Japanese firm which  
is in the market for 800 tons of ace-  
tate of lime per month. This material  
is largely used in the manufacture of  
cardite. There is an equally good  
market with powder manufacturers  
for charcoal, while wood alcohol is al-  
ways in demand.

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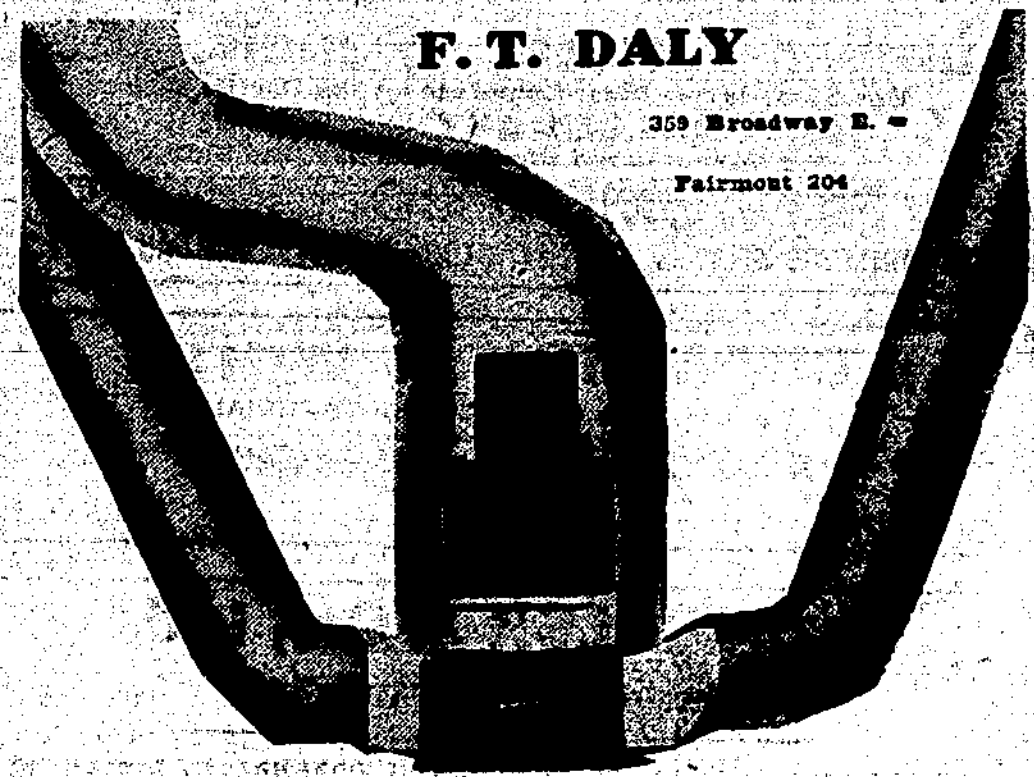
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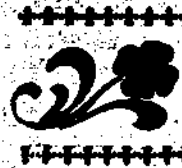
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## CITY MAY BUILD BRIDGE VIADUCT

Bid of Engineer Preston Lower Than Tenders Submitted by Contracting Firms.

VICTORIA—Although three prominent firms submitted tenders, indications now point to the building of the substructure of the Johnson Street bridge by City Engineer F. M. Preston, whose tender for the work was \$177,376, this figure being fifteen per cent. lower than either of the three bids turned in by the contracting concerns. Armstrong, Morrison & Co., of Vancouver, submitted a tender of \$212,840.40; Hodgson, King & Marble, Vancouver, \$214,174; Northern Construction Company, Vancouver, \$257,347.

The tenders on the substructure were opened at the regular session of the City Council this week and referred to a special committee for consideration. The committee is expected to make a recommendation to the Streets Committee this (Friday) afternoon favoring the acceptance of the City Engineer's tender. It is proposed to put the bridge project under way at once. The next step will be the calling of tenders for the erection of the bridge span, which will be of the bascule type.
