#### BUILDING PERMITS.

8847—W. J. Brown, garage, 3543 6th  
Ave. West, \$100.

NELSON—If engineers can assure  
total reclamation, the Kootenay flats  
will be reclaimed.

TRAIL—Wm. K. Carpenter has started  
building a \$2500 California bungalow  
on Cedar Ave. for Ike McLeod.

VICTORIA—The Cameron Lumber  
Company has taken out a permit for a  
power house at the Garbally Road  
plant costing \$5000.

VICTORIA—It has been decided by  
the department of public works to in-  
stall a cable ferry across the North  
Thompson river, about 19 miles from  
Kamloops.

WEST VANCOUVER—The school  
Board has decided to proceed with the  
programme of calling for tenders for  
the clearing of the school site on 27th  
Ave. The municipal engineer has given  
the board a good idea of what  
would be required.

VICTORIA—Damage by fire to the  
amount of approximately \$1000 at the  
sash and door factory of Moore & Whit-  
tington, corner of Bridge Street and  
Hillside Ave.; a loss of between \$500  
and \$600 at the dwelling at 1119 Fis-  
gard St., and a small loss through a  
roof fire at the rear of 1313 Wharf St.,  
was occasioned at three fires here.

VICTORIA—The project to erect  
municipal swimming baths in Victoria  
is still being worked upon by the spe-  
cial committee appointed by the Board  
of Trade, consisting of Messrs. Frank  
Higgins, W. H. Spaulding, J. C. N. Keith  
and R. R. Neild. By the time the next  
monthly meeting of the board takes  
place, on Thursday, November 8, the  
committee expects to have a complete  
report of its investigations ready.

VICTORIA—The Minister of Public  
Works will receive tenders up to noon,  
Monday, Nov. 12th for the erection of  
a two-room school building at New  
Denver; also a hot-air heating installa-  
tion at the same school. Plans, specifi-  
cations, etc., may be seen at the office  
of J. Mahony, Govt. Agent, Court house,  
Vancouver; R. J. Stinson, Govt. Agent,  
Kaslo; S. S. Jarvis, Govt. Agent, Nelson;  
A. Watson, Secy. to the School  
Board, New Denver; or the Dept. of  
Public Works, Victoria.

VANCOUVER—Amendments to the  
existing city building by-law designed to  
provide for better fire regulations for  
the different forms of public and  
private garages, were discussed at the  
meeting of the city health and building  
committee Monday. These amendments  
define what is a public as well as a  
private garage and specify what forms  
of construction must be employed in  
public garages and repair shops in a  
very clear and concise manner. City  
Building Inspector R. A. McKenzie pre-  
pared them. The amended bylaw was  
read, clause by clause, and with the  
exception of a few minor amendments,  
finally approved. It will be put through  
its final stages as an amendment to  
the city building bylaw at the next  
meeting of the council.

### BUSINESS NOTES

and other items of interest to the  
business man.

KAMLOOPS—At a meeting of the  
Kamloops Chamber of Commerce the  
subject of an evaporating plant for this  
city was given serious consideration.  
Messrs. G. A. Carnes, S. J. Wilson and  
Capt. Worsnop were selected as a com-  
mittee to make a report thereon.

NEW WESTMINSTER—W. R. Gilley  
of Gilley Bros., explained to the coun-  
cil at the last meeting he would have  
to increase the price of cement, sand  
and gravel for the building of the re-  
taining wall at the Fraser River bridge.  
An increase of 20 cents per barrel on  
cement was asked, 40 cents on sand  
and gravel, and 50 cents on one-man  
rock.

VANCOUVER—In response to a pe-  
tition from the master and journeymen  
plumbers of the city, presented to the  
city council some time ago, a special  
committee of the council has recom-  
mended to the civic health committee  
that the existing plumbing bylaws of  
the city be amended so as to provide  
for the licensing of all plumbers and  
requiring them to pass an examination.

NEW WESTMINSTER—At the last  
council meeting the mayor, the chair-  
man of the finance committee, and the  
chairman of board of works, were em-  
powered to make the necessary exten-  
sion of time for the completion of the  
New Westminster-Burnaby joint sewer.  
The engineer in asking for this ex-  
tension, stated that most of the work  
was carried on by convict labor, and  
that during the past year it was dif-  
ficult to get much accomplished on  
account of the shortage of this class  
of labor. He asked that the period be  
extended to 1920.

NANAIMO—That this city holds  
forth unusually attractive inducements  
to the builder of an apartment house,  
appears to be the general impression  
in real estate circles as well as in the  
minds of the public at large, owing to  
the steadily increasing demand for  
housing accommodation to be noted at  
present.

Enquiry into the local situation re-  
veals the fact that the realty market  
for house properties has recently taken  
a strong upward trend, this in spite of  
the nearness of Winter, when it might  
be expected that prospective buyers  
would prefer to wait a few months be-  
fore purchasing. It is reported that  
many houses which a few months ago  
stood vacant are now occupied while  
daily enquiries continue to be received  
for three, four and five-roomed houses,  
of modern construction and with mod-  
ern conveniences. Houses of all kinds  
are said to be at a premium, if not ut-  
terly impossible to obtain, on Kennedy  
Street and further out towards Five  
Acres.

Under existing conditions it is felt  
that the builder of an apartment house  
in an attractive location, well equipped  
and suited for small families, would  
reap a rich reward on the necessary in-  
vestment. The popularity of the apart-  
ment house plan of living, especially  
in the Winter months, it is felt has  
grown to such a degree that the vast  
majority of persons, now renting  
houses, would much prefer to move  
into apartments, where they would be  
relieved of the heating and snow  
shoveling problems which confront the  
householder during the cold months of  
the year.

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**MINING**

Ore is being packed from the Misty Morning, a claim about five miles from Trout Lake City, owned by Mrs. A. Jowett.

The Enterprise on Ten Mile, in the Slokan, is being worked by Pat McGuire under lease. He is shipping 100 tons this month to Trail.

An expenditure of more than \$1,000,000 is to be made at Copper Mountain and Princeton in the next few months by the Canada Copper Corporation.

Near Salmo, several feet of sulphide ore have been exposed at the Garnet claim of the Hudson Bay Zinc Co. A concentrator may be built at this property.

Hon. William Sloan, minister of mines, has predicted that Merritt will not only become the coal mining centre of the Nicola Valley, but has an undoubted future as a copper mining center.

**PROVINCIAL ESTIMATES ARE TALKED TO THE HOUSE**

**VICTORIA**—A revenue of just under \$1,000,000 and an expenditure of \$1,000,000 for the year commencing April 1 next is predicted in the provincial estimates which were tabled in the House of Commons by the Minister of Finance, on Monday.

The revenue shows a falling off of about \$1,000,000 for the anticipated revenue for the year, but the expenditure is expected to be \$1,000,000 more.

The exact estimated revenue is \$944,016, as compared with \$7,184,416 for the present year, a difference of \$6,240,400. The estimated disbursements are \$1,381,374, as compared with \$1,163,458 for the previous year, an increase of \$217,916.

The increase in the increased fixed charges which are over \$200,000.

**Summary of Expenditure**

The summary of estimated expenditure indicates that in four of the 14 Government services there will probably be an increased expenditure over last year, in the rest a reduction is predicted.

Present conditions have also necessitated more and larger hospitals, the suit being an annual large increase for hospitals and charities. Last year \$16,000 was voted in the way of assistance in the construction of hospitals this year about \$16,000 will probably be granted for that purpose. Grants to refuge homes, aid societies, etc. is increased from \$13,000 to \$20,000.

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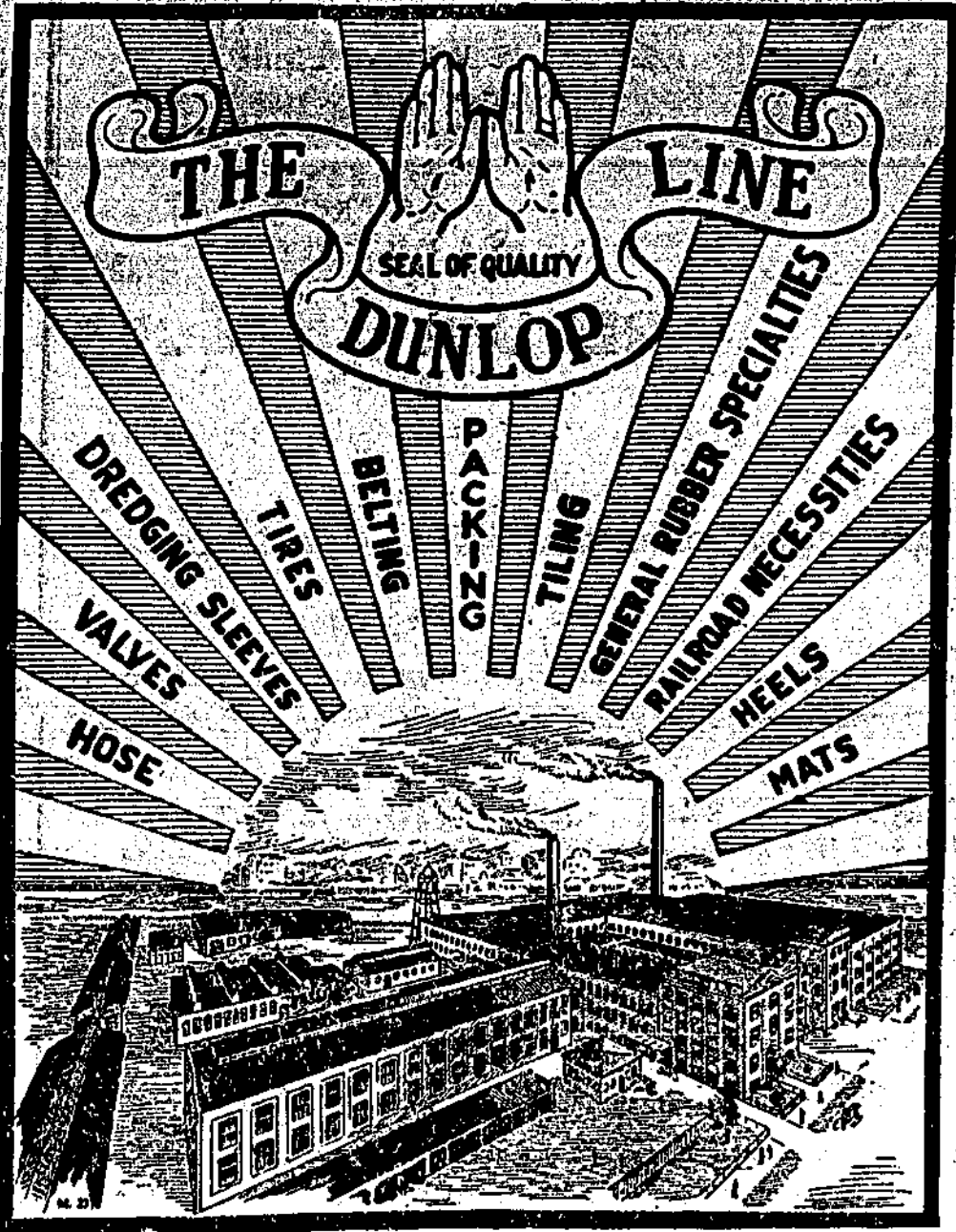
