Power-Boat Service to South Bentick Arm

The announcement has been made that several local business men have decided to put one or more large and commodious power boats on the run between Bella Coola and South Bentick Arm.

The promoters are confident that the local farmers will be glad to have access for their produce to the excellent market provided by the numerous logging camps, while it is not doubted that the employees of the camps will often avail themselves of the opportunity of visiting here.

Man Falls Off the Approach to Wharf

Charles Lord, an employee of the B. C. Packers Association at the Bella Coola Cannery, met with a serious accident on Saturday night last.

While returning from a visit to town Mr. Lord had the misfortune to walk off the approach to the wharf, falling some ten feet, fortunately the tide was out and he alighted on a soft place. The handrails had been removed by parties engaged in public works, and although the night was dark no proper precautions had been taken to warn pedestrians. Mr. Lord sustained a very severe shaking and is still suffering from the effects of the shock.

Short Cut to Upper Chilcoten District

For the purpose of devising means by which persons will be able to reach the Upper Chilcoten country three days after leaving Vancouver, the provincial government, according to Mr. W. W. Foster, deputy minister of public works, will send a survey party over the road this summer. The surveyors will locate a trail or wagon road to connect Bute Inlet with the Chilcoten district, thus doing away with the fortnight's journey to that spot via the Upper Fraser and Clinton. The assertion which has been made by a number of prospectors to the effect that the east slope of the Coast range is rich in minerals, has led to the government's action, says Mr. Foster.

To Survey Townsite at Kimsquit

Kimsquit, B. C., March 31. V. Schjelderup, B. C. L. S., and Fosberg Hamilton, civil engineer, are engaged in surveying out a townsite. The land was staked some two years ago by Mr. Hamilton, and in view of the fact that this port has been much spoken of as a possible railroad terminus, significant importance may be attached to the work of these two gentlemen.

Pierpont Morgan Dead

Great Financier Passes Away at Rome

Rome, April 2.—J. Pierpont Morgan died here on Monday morning at the age of 56 years. The great financier had been suffering ill health for some time, death finally resulting from nervous prostration. The remains are being conveyed home on an Italian warship which started last night.

The Pope, the King and scores of foreign diplomats joined in doing homage to the memory of the great financier.

A death mask has been taken by his ward, whom the deceased man was having educated in art.

A fortune, estimated at not less than three hundred million dollars falls to the son.

The deceased man's daughter and son-in-law where the only relatives present when death occurred.

Nelson in Darkness

Nelson, April 2.—Members of the Federated Labor Union, embracing all trades, have gone out on strike, causing a general tie-up. The whole city is in darkness and business is paralyzed.

Turkey Accepts Terms of Peace

ATTITUDE OF MONTENEGRO CAUSES GRAVE SITUATION

Constantinople, April 2.—The Turkish Government have accepted the terms of peace as offered by the Allies and fighting has ceased.

Montenegren troops captured four forts at Scutari while peace negotiations were pending. The city is in flames.

The latter action by Montenegro may cause serious complications as it is understood to have been undertaken in direct defiance of the Powers.

Grand Trunk Pacific to be Completed Next Year

Vancouver, April 2.—Superintendent Donaldson of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway announces that according to present arrangements the last spike on the pacific section should be driven next year.

London, April 2.—It is announced as highly probable that the Prince of Wales will visit Canada and the United States during the summer.

Burial of King George of Greece

Scene of Unsurpassed Magnificence

Athens, April 2.—The burial of his late majesty, King George, took place here today amid awe-inspiring magnificence never before witnessed in the modern city of Athens.

The processions were of great length, eastern and western nationalities being easily distinguishable by their distinctive costumes. All branches of the army and church were represented.

Big Prize Offered for Trans-Atlantic Flight

London, April 2.—Four entries have already been received for the projected trans-atlantic aeroplane race.

A prize of fifty thousand dollars is offered, and the race is open to all nationalities, the course to be completed in seventy-two hours. Mons. Paulham, winner of several great races, says that the flight will undoubtedly be accomplished two years hence.

Manila, April 2.—Gansico, a Filipina, has been arrested for stealing military plans.

President Wilson Will Lower Tariffs

Washington, April 2.—President Wilson and chairman Underwood have agreed to materially reduce the tariff affording protection to nearly every American industry.

The readjustment of the tariffs by Congress will be based on a lower scale of wages.

City of Dayton Faces Serious Problem

Dayton, Ohio, April 2.—The city is today facing the most serious problem ever presented to any city in the world. Food supplies have to be found for one hundred thousand people for an indefinite period. Already thousands are subsisting on the most scanty rations and the energies of the authorities are being taxed to their utmost to prevent a famine.

Parcels Post System to be Revised

Ottawa, April 2.—It is proposed that the same regulations that govern the parcel post system in the United States be applied to Canada.

Under the present system Canada handles all incoming parcel post without obtaining any benefit therefrom.

Australia Plans Large Increase in Navy

Sydney, April 2.—The plans for the next three years are to be on an extensive scale and include the laying down of three destroyers, two submarines, several battleships and a supply ship.

Suffragette Leader Will Defend Herself

London, April 2.—Mrs. Pankhurst, today, pleaded not guilty to the charge of inciting to destroy property.

The suffragette leader refused assistance of council and is conducting her own defense.

New Ambassador to Britain

Washington, April 2.—According to an announcement made today it is considered highly probable that Walter H. Page will be the appointee to the ambassadorship to Great Britain.

Mr. Page is well known as a prominent publisher.

Eastern Fishermen Leave for Seattle

Boston, Mass., April 2.—Nearly one hundred Boston and Gloucester fishermen left for Seattle where they are to obtain berths on vessels operating in the halibut fisheries of the northern Pacific.

The Disfranching Bill

The "Courier" has already pointed out that the settlers in the remote parts of the North would have no opportunity of making application to have their names placed on the Voters' Lists.

It now appears very doubtful if the Government ever intended that these settlers should have the opportunity.

The following article which we take from the Victoria Times shows the preventive measures employed when an honest effort was being made to reach the electors of one of the many remote parts:

A prominent Liberal from Northern British Columbia has furnished the Times with the strongest possible evidence of the length the machine will go to disfranchise the electors.

He went to the government printing office for forms and was told there were no forms available, but that he could get 500 the following Friday. He went again on Friday and the clerk in charge informed him that it was impossible to get any forms.

pert in due course, the Commissioner was sent inland, and when he opened his bundle of forms he discovered that they were forms—for the registration of births and not for the registration of voters.

Exploded the Wrong Way

The cheers with which the Tories greeted Mr. Winston Churchill's Memorandum in which he obliged Mr. Borden by telling the Canadian Premier that Canada was not fit to either build, man or maintain battleships, have been succeeded by a feeling of dismay as they observe the wave of resentment which has spread throughout the country at this piece of ill-timed and rather contemptuous advice from the First Lord of the Admiralty.

Mr. Carvell lost no time in replying to the supposed bomb and exploded it pretty thoroughly. After the Tories had finished cheering from Mr. Churchill's statement that Canada could not get the plant or mechanical skill to build battleships and that Canadians would not join the navy, Mr. Carvell pointedly remarked, "I had no idea that

Ministers of the Crown would applaud this statement that you could not get Canadians to join the navy. Apparently these gentlemen think you can not get Canadians to do anything but pay. I am ashamed that Canadians would applaud sentiments of that kind."

"I do not wonder that the Prime Minister did not want to read this document," he continued, "in his place I would not have wanted to insult the people of Canada by reading such a letter." And then as a man connected with steel plants and shipping, Mr. Carvell showed that Mr. Winston Churchill had shown hopeless ignorance of the capabilities of Canada.

Majority Rules Only When It Has People's Mandate

When Premier Borden asserts that a majority in Parliament must be empowered to put through legislation for which it has a mandate from the people, we agree with him.

But the contention of the Liberal party is that, on this important and vital question of direct cash contributions to the British Admiralty, the government of the day has not the mandate of the people.

At the last election the issue in all the provinces but one was reciprocity, a trade question. In only one province, Quebec, was the navy an issue at all, and Quebec spoke against either di-

rect contribution or a Canadian establishment. Laurier lost 15 seats there because he proposed a naval expenditure. As the result of a situation that is probably unique in British history, the Borden party by methods that it is not necessary to go into here reaped the benefit of those 30 votes on a division.

To say, therefore, that the Borden government has a mandate on this policy of direct cash contribution to the British Admiralty is a gross perversion of the facts.

When the Borden government has such a mandate obtained at a general election there will be no opposition in Parliament and his bill will be put through with expedition.

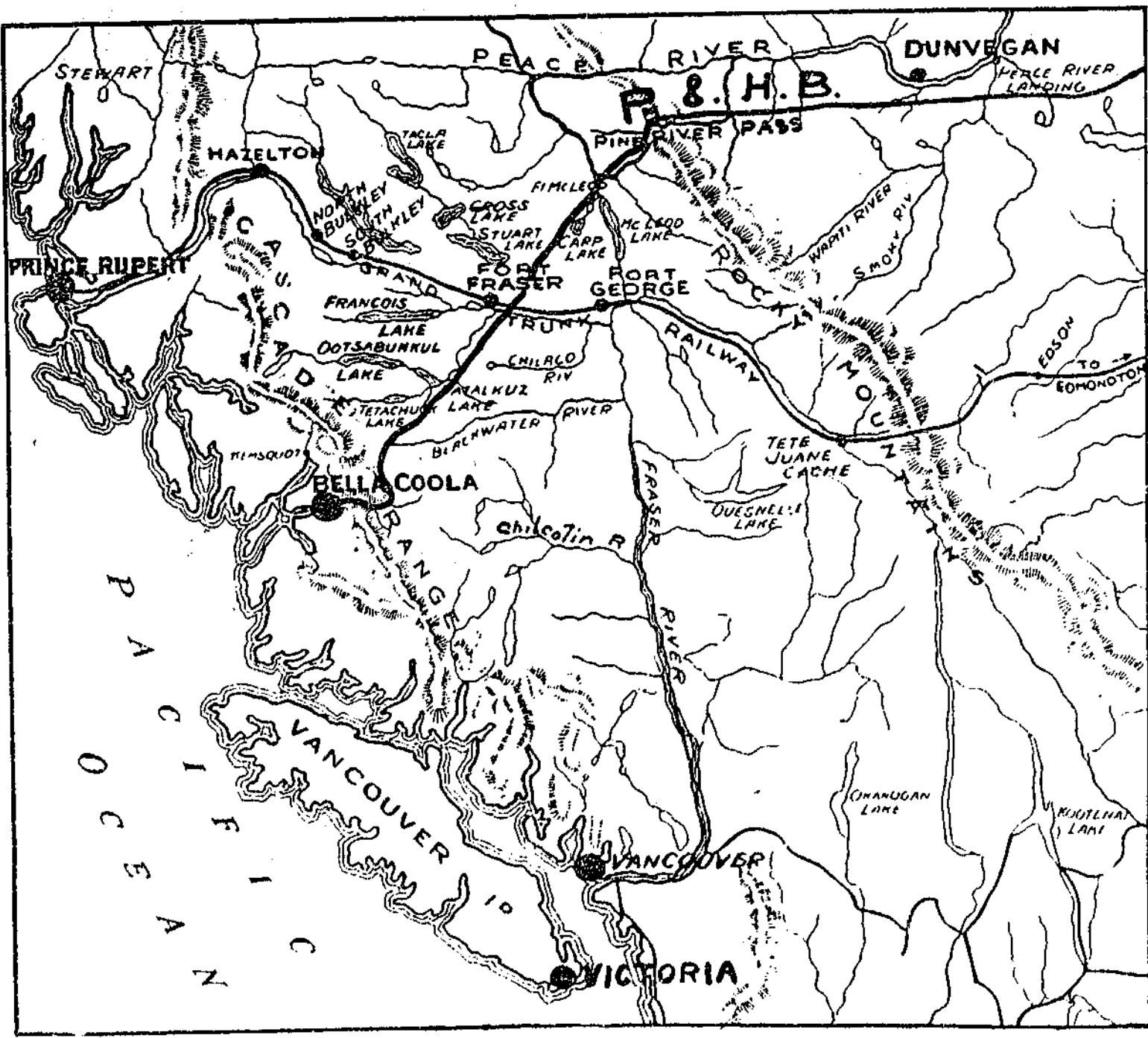

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SYNOPSIS OF COAL MINING REGULATIONS

COAL MINING RIGHTS of the Dominion, in MANITOBA, SASKATCHEWAN and ALBERTA, the Yukon Territory, the North-West Territories and in a portion of the Province of BRITISH COLUMBIA, may be leased for a term of twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1 an acre. Not more than 2,500 acres will be leased to one applicant.

Application for a lease must be made by the applicant in person to the Agent or Sub-Agent of the district in which the rights applied for are situated.

In surveyed territory the land must be described by sections, or legal subdivisions of sections, and in unsurveyed territory the tract applied for shall be staked out by the applicant himself.

Each application must be accompanied by a fee of \$5, which will be refunded if the rights applied for are not available, but not otherwise. A royalty shall be paid on the merchantable output of the mine at the rate of five cents per ton.

The person operating the mine shall furnish the Agent with sworn returns accounting for the full quantity of merchantable coal mined and pay the royalty thereon. If the coal mining rights are not being operated, such returns should be furnished at least once a year.

The lease will include the coal mining rights only, but the lessee may be permitted to purchase whatever available surface rights may be considered necessary for the working of the mine at the rate of \$10.00 an acre.
