Clearing Right of Way Starts on New Line

New Westminster, March 7.—Actual work has been started by the Northern Construction Company in clearing the right of way for the Lulu Island branch of the Canadian Northern railway. The first camp is located at Mile Six, below New Westminster, and a large force of men is employed on the property purchased by the railway company.

Explorer's Widow at Wellington

Wellington, N. Z., March 1.—Lady Scott, widow of Captain R. T. Scott, the British explorer, who lost his life on the return trip from the South Pole, arrived yesterday from San Francisco on the steamer Aorangi. She was met at the pier by her brother, Lieutenant Bruce, and Commander Evans of the Terra Nova. Lady Scott controlled her feelings. She said she learned of her husband's death by wireless while aboard the Aorangi.

Dr. Friedmann May Come to Canada

Ottawa, Feb. 28.—In the House this afternoon, A. K. MacLean, of Halifax, asked the government to send an official representative of Canada to New York to confer with Dr. Friedmann in regard to his cure for tuberculosis. MacLean suggested that if possible Friedmann should be induced to come to Canada and give, under government auspices, a demonstration of his cure here. Premier Borden said the government already had the matter under consideration and if expert advice warranted the step suggested by MacLean, the government would take prompt action.

Prospector Kills and Eats Companion

Edmonton, Alta., Feb. 28.—With an account of how he had killed and eaten his companion, Len Leclaire, scrawled on the door of his cabin, trappers arriving here today told of the finding of the body of Henry Leclaire, a prospector, five miles north of Mile Fifty-Three, B. C. The remains of Lemieux's body, which had been hacked to pieces with a hunting knife, were found nearby. Leclaire was frozen to death. It is supposed the men, while prospecting, were overtaken by a blizzard and, unable to reach a settlement, lay down to die.

G. T. P. Express Jumps Track

Many Persons Injured

Hanover, Ont., Mar. 6.—The Grand Trunk Pacific express from Stratford jumped the track near here today, several coaches being derailed. The accident was attended with serious results, three passengers and seven of the train crew being badly injured. Officials of the Company express the belief that the accident was the result of an attempt to wreck the train.

Bandits Rob Jewelry Store

Nine Thousand Dollars Worth of Jewelry Got Away With

New York, Mar. 7.—Entering a Broadway jewelry store, three bandits opened fire on the clerks and in the excitement got away with over nine thousand dollars worth of jewelry. As the robbers were entering a taxi cab, after leaving the store, they were fired on by detectives, but succeeded in making good their escape leaving most of their plunder in the taxi cab.

England Threatened With Railroad Strike

London, Mar. 7.—A threat to tie up the whole railway system in England has been made by the railwaymen's Unions. The dismissal of a guard, by one of the leading railway companies for an alleged petty offence, is the cause of the trouble. It is reported that an investigation by the directors of the Company will be instituted and that a general strike will be averted.

Seek to Raise Term of Residence For Aliens

Calgary, Feb. 28.—Demand that a residence of five years in Canada, is to be made of the government by the Board of Trade of Calgary.

King George V Land

Melbourne, March 1.—The new land discovered by Dr. Mawson in the South Polar regions will be named King George V Land. The explorer sent a message to the King through Lord Denman, asking His Majesty's permission to so name the land. The territory lies between Victoria Land and Adelie Land.

U. S. and Mexican Troops Clash

Mexican Force Fare Badly.

El Paso, Texas, March 6.—An exciting encounter occurred today, on the border in the neighborhood of Douglas, between American troopers and Mexican soldiers.

It is claimed that the Mexican's opened fire on a small party of American officers.

The American troopers attacked and a running fight ensued, the Mexican's beating a hasty retreat. During the encounter four Mexicans were killed with but one American trooper slightly wounded.

President Wilson Inaugurated

Immense Crowd Witness Ceremony.

Washington, March 5.—Over half-a-million people were present to witness the inauguration of President Wilson.

The parade presented a magnificent scene and was by far the largest in the history of the Capital.

Latest Additions to Cabinet

Late despatches state that the latest additions to the Wilson Cabinet include the following:—Secretary of Interior, Franklin K. Lane, of California; Secretary of Agriculture, David F. Houston, of Missouri; Secretary of Commerce, W. C. Radfield of New York; Secretary of Labor, W. B. Wilson, of Pennsylvania.

Highwayman Captured After Exciting Chase

Much Shooting With Little Damage

Vancouver, Mar. 6.—Caught in the act of holding up a woman, an Italian named John Matilio was captured last night by constable Knox. Matilio showed considerable speed and a running fight ensued during which thirty shots were fired. It was probably only due to faulty mechanism in the holdup man's gun that constable Knox still enjoys good health as the highwayman attempted to shoot Knox in the head at close range when the cartridge jammed in his gun.

Germany to Spend Large Sum on Army and Navy

Berlin, Mar. 7.—The Government intends appropriating the large sum of two hundred and fifty million dollars for increases in her naval and military forces.

Turkish Garrison Forced to Surrender

32,000 Men Lay Down Arms

Athens, Mar. 6.—The officials of the Greek war department state that the strongly fortified town of Janina has surrendered with a garrison of thirty-two thousand men.

Janina is one of the most important strategic positions on the north-west frontier of Turkey.

Greek Transports Sunk by Turkish Cruiser

Constantiople, Mar. 6.—A Turkish cruiser attacked a number of transports engaged in conveying troops to the seat of war. Three Greek ships were sunk all on board losing their lives.

Several other transports conveying Servian soldiers were seriously damaged but succeeded in making their escape.

Complete Deadlock in House of Commons

Both Sides Stand Firm on the Naval Question

Ottawa, Mar. 7.—The deadlock which has arisen over the Government's proposed vote of thirty-five million dollars to Great Britain for the construction of three Dreadnoughts still continues. Both sides of the House are determined to stand firm. The Liberals threaten that unless the Government gives way the discussion will be continued until Saturday night. The Government declares that there is absolutely no possibility of an adjournment unless the opposition consents to allow the particular clause under discussion to go through.

Intense Excitement Prevails

For the first time in the history of the House no attempt is being made to discuss the point at issue, both parties being loud in their declamation of each other. Intense excitement prevails and it is feared that some disorder may occur unless either side make some concession soon.

Auto Collides With Car

Vancouver, Mar. 6. An auto colliding with an inter-urban car was responsible for the death of Mr. Davidson, manager of the Royal Transfer Company.

A live wolverine captured by the brothers Hendricks was brought into town last Thursday. The animal is in splendid condition and should prove a valuable addition to some Zoological garden.

A Noble Vision

We call attention to the following from the Sydney (Australia) Morning Herald:

"We have no wish to intervene in the political controversies of sister dominions, but we feel that Canada's only satisfactory manner of joining in Pacific defence is the establishment of a local naval unit, co-operating with the other Imperial Pacific forces.

Here is the noble vision outlined by Sir George Reid speaking in London recently:

"Our young navy is going to fly the white ensign. It is stationed in the south seas and has the Australian flag at the jack staff, but the white ensign at the peak. I cannot help thinking that the anxieties of British statesmen will be vastly diminished when Australia guards the southern seas, when Canada guards the North Pacific and North Atlantic, when India and South Africa guard the eastern seas, and when Great Britain guards the heart of the Empire and, of course, adds largely to the guardianship of the trade routes of the Empire."

How humiliating that the government's policy precludes Canada from taking her share in this magnificent scheme.

Upon Australia, and we believe New Zealand, will devolve the heavy task of protecting Britain's interests on the Pacific.

THE ESTIMATES

An error in the provincial estimates as printed, made it appear that the appropriations for 1913-14 were \$12,769,010. The correct sum is \$17,833,266, as follows: Public works, \$9,691,600; other services detailed, \$5,069,010; miscellaneous, \$3,086,410. The estimated revenue is \$10,336,085. This seems to leave a deficit of \$7,500,000.

Some Little Known People

BY SPHINX

There is, for many people, something alluring about the unknown or the problematical, and pleasure is often to be had by speculating as to the whole truth of but scantily known facts.

The comparatively recent discovery by the explorer Stefanson, of the actual existence, in the far north, of a race of white Eskimos, is a case in point.

For a number of years the existence of these people had been hinted at in various rumors, and now they have actually been located.

The question arises as to whom these people are, whence came they, and how did they originate? At present this is a matter of speculation. Certain it is that their mode of life is extremely primitive, although this is in part due no doubt to the climatic and other conditions under which they live.

The probability is that they are descendants of some early explorers of European origin. It has been proved beyond a doubt that the old-time Norsemen penetrated with their ships to the shores of Greenland and Labrador; it is not unreasonable to suppose that some of them may have settled in Northern Canada and gradually wandered westward, becoming in time separated from their own countrymen, and in the course of time may have intermingled with the aboriginal tribes, and so by degrees have lost their original identity.

There is a remote possibility that there may have been a few survivors of the ill-fated Franklin expedition, who may have fallen in with some Eskimo tribe, and inter-married with them, though this is doubtful, or they may have originated from some entirely unsuspected source.

Possibly, when fuller particulars of these people have been gathered, as to their mode of life, traditions, characteristics, and so forth, their origin may be definitely ascertained, until then however, we can but speculate.

Leaving the frozen North, and passing to the tropics, we find again rumors of the existence of a white race said to inhabit the scarcely explored and almost impenetrable country about the sources of the Amazon River.

The actual existence of this latter race has hardly yet been proved to satisfaction owing to the difficulty of penetrating the dense forests in that part of the world.

Supposing them to exist however, who are these people, and what is their origin?

Possibly they may be the descendants of the Incas of Peru, who may have fled before the advance of the early Spanish conquistadors; or again they may be actual descendants of Spanish or other European explorers.

With the gradual exploration and opening up of the hitherto waste places of the earth, many facts which have formerly been merely rumored, proved or disproved, and what is a matter of surmise to one generation, becomes one of common knowledge to the next.

Reciprocal Trade Still Beckons

If a case need be made for Reciprocity, it is surely made in the evidence given before the Agricultural Committee of the Dominion House of Commons by the representatives of the British Columbia fruit-growers. Mr. Douglas, of Strathcona, we read, said he had been much struck, "when in Vancouver recently, to see no British Columbia fruit, but all Washington fruit," offered for sale and consumption. Mr. W. S. Foggo, a director and member of the British Columbia Fruit-grower's Association, promptly explained that this was due to quicker delivery from Seattle, and also to the very natural fear excited and entertained among Vancouver fruit-dealers that huge American consignments of fruit would arrive that could be sold more cheaply than the home product. There had been more of such consignments this year, he said, than ever before. Mr. Foggo explained that in Saskatoon, a part of the Canadian Northwest market, whither the British Columbia grower naturally looks for disposal of the goods he produces, there were seventy-three cars of consigned American fruit on the tracks in one day. Moreover, we read, Mr. Foggo pointed out that the duty on American fruit coming into Canada is 13 cents a box, whereas the American duty against Canadian fruit entering the States is 25 cents a box. In other words, as the tariffs now stand, Canadian fruit, in the fight for the market against fruit grown in the United States, has to overleap a barrier almost double in height that which is interposed against the entrance of United States grown fruit into Canada.

It is all very well for the Borden Administration to relegate the meeting and the dealing with practical difficulties of this sort to the adroit and resourceful Mr.

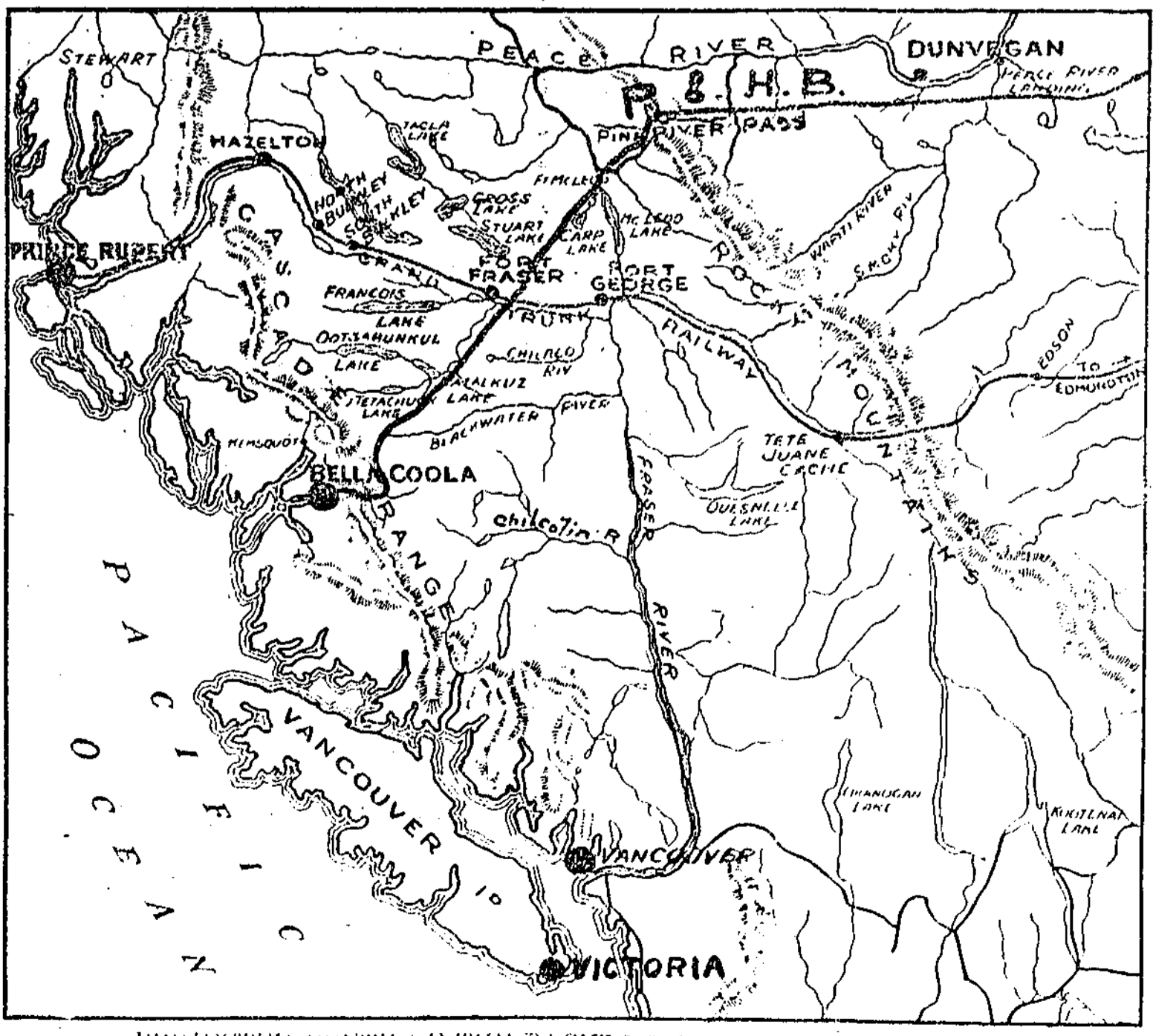
