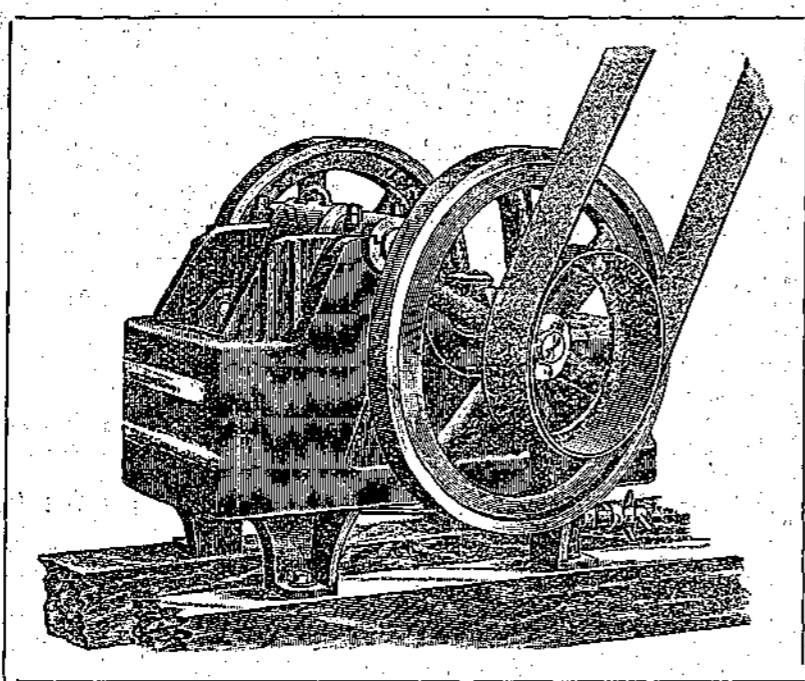

LAWYER'S OPINION.

SOLICITOR ADVISES COUNCIL.

Ald. Naden Withdraws His Resignation.—Action to Fill North Ward Vacancy Deferred Until Monday.

Thinking possibly that the city council would put on another act in the farce comedy at the special meeting on Thursday evening, a few spectators graced the bare clinkless wall of the court room with their presence. The farce was reserved for another night and the council did a turn in the heavy legal parts of the municipal programme. The leading man was the city solicitor. He was armed with the consolidated statutes and extracts from the decisions of learned judges in the province of Ontario where they sometimes have municipal troubles of their own. His worship Mayor Hardy presided and seated around the council board were Ald. Naden, Galloway, Sutherland and Campbell.

Ald. Naden rising to a question of privilege announced that as the council had refused to take action on his resignation he decided to withdraw the same. Ald. Galloway moved a motion to the effect that Ald. Naden be allowed to withdraw his resignation. The motion was seconded by Ald. Campbell and carried unanimously.

Ald. Naden's withdrawal of resignation shortened the list of matters upon which the city solicitor was to advise the council. Mr. Leamy dealt with the matter of resignations however and quoted the law to the effect that a council was quite free to refuse a resignation and that the courts could issue a mandamus forcing an alderman to serve for the term for which he was elected.

Dealing with the vacancy created by Dr. Jakes' resignation Mr. Leamy believed that the council could follow the same course as they did in Rossland and under section 82 of the Municipal Elections Act appoint a duly qualified man to fill the vacancy. Mr. Leamy was always of the opinion that Dr. Jakes was not qualified. He held that since he was not properly qualified the council could appoint a man to fill the vacancy. The alternative was to order a bye-election.

Ald. Galloway asked about Ald. Nelson's qualifications. Mayor Hardy replied that they had no word from the coast yet. They were waiting for some of the "would be purifiers of municipal politics" to take action to unseat him.

The council adjourned until Monday when the question of filling the vacancy will be finally settled.

No Change Wanted.

The good people of Nelson and Rossland are getting unduly excited over the customs ports in the Kettle River district. The residents of Nelson began by petitioning the Dominion government to have the customs offices in the Kettle River district attached to

the office in that city instead of the New Westminster office as at present. The people of Rossland at once took the matter up and passed the following resolution:

To the Controller of Customs, Hon. William Patterson, Ont., Dear Sir: "Whereas, it has come to the attention of the Rossland Board of Trade, that a movement is on foot to attach the custom outports and preventive offices in the Kettle River district, B. C., to the Nelson port of entry, said offices being attached at present to the port of New Westminster; and

Whereas, said offices are all within the boundaries of the Rossland Provincial Electoral district is in most intimate business relations with the said city of Rossland and in no way connected with the city of Nelson, therefore be it

Resolved; That the citizens of Rossland protest respectfully against the customs outports and preventive offices of the Kettle River district being attached to any other port of entry than Rossland, and be it further

Resolved, that said customs outports and preventive offices ought to be attached to the port of Rossland until such time as the customs business of the said district warrants one of the said outports being created a port of entry."

The last clause of the above resolution should convince the Minister of Customs that there is no necessity for a change. The Kettle River district can stagger under the incubus of being attached to New Westminster until transportation facilities are afforded when Boundary Creek will be a greater and more important district than either Rossland or Nelson and it may then be in the public interests to attach the offices in those too ambitious cities to a central office in Boundary Creek.

The Engineer's Figures.

The report submitted by the city engineer at the last meeting of the council should be carefully considered by the ratepayers. The very first item \$2,350 for completing the water-works is entirely inadequate to meet the requirements. It is quite possible that the sum will lay the pipe and patch up the present dam. More is wanted however. With a proper dam and reservoir no better system for fire protection can be found anywhere than that which Twin creek will afford. Neither the present dam nor the reservoir can be considered permanent. The present basin is too small and it will scarcely be filled unless something is done to stop the flow of water which percolates through many portions of the dam. A sufficient sum ought to be voted for water-works to build a substantial dam, to clean a large reservoir and to do everything that will make Twin creek servicable for fire protection purposes for years to come.

ICE HOUSE COLLAPSED.

Several Men Injured by the Roof of an Ice House Falling In.

Several men were injured yesterday afternoon when the roof of the building in which Hugh McKee was storing several tons of ice fell in. There were about a dozen men in the building at the time, packing ice when without a moment warning the roof came tumbling down. Most of the men were injured with serious results. One man's leg shall was pinned. He was taken out some difficulty, and his leg had been broken above the knee. It was taken to the Ottawa house where Dr. Schon attended to him. The break is an ugly one and it will be some time before he will be about. It is supposed that as the building became filled, the ice pressed out the sides, causing the roof to fall in.

ENOUGH IRREGULARITIES.

With all due deference to Mr. Leamy's legal opinion, we think the council has been ill-advised through his suggestion that the vacancy in the North Ward caused by the resignation of Dr. Jakes can be filled by the council without reference to the electors. The case and that in Rossland to which he referred are not analogous. It is a moot question whether the Rossland council did not stretch the law in appointing Ald. Clute. In Rossland Ald. Barrett resigned because he was not properly qualified, just as Dr. Jakes

resigned. The Rossland council accepted the resignation just as the Greenwood council did and ordered a new election. Nomination day was fixed and the electors nominated four candidates. Before election day all of the candidates withdrew. The council then took the position that the electors had neglected to fill the vacancy and appointed Ald. Clute.

Judging from Mr. Leamy's remarks, he bases his contention on the legal belief that Dr. Jakes was not qualified and consequently the people had not the legal right to elect him and having neglected to elect a properly qualified person, the council may under section 82 of Municipal Election Act appoint an alderman. Mr. Leamy will agree with us that this is a question of law and not of fact. His opinion nor the opinion of the council has no authoritative weight as far as Dr. Jakes' qualification is concerned. The council has no authority to act on the assumption that Dr. Jakes' was a legal disqualification without a decision from the courts. In the absence of such a decision the council is legally bound to assume that he was regularly elected, that his resignation was regular, that the acceptance of that resignation was regular and that the only legal course left for the council is to order a new election.

There have been already too many irregularities to warrant the council in encouraging any more. No candidate whom the council might appoint would accept the position when his right to take the seat would be questioned, and when he and the city would likely be plunged into litigation.

Section 82 of the Municipal Elections act reads as follows: "In case, at any annual or other election, the electors from any cause fail, decline or neglect to elect the requisite number of members of the council of a municipality on the day appointed, the new members of the council elect shall appoint as many qualified persons, including mayor or reeve, if not elected, as will constitute or complete the number of members requisite; and the persons so appointed shall, if they accept office, make the necessary declarations under the same penalty, in case of refusal or neglect as if elected."

A PROMINENT ratepayer has sent THE TIMES a letter dealing with Ald. Naden's resignation. As Mr. Naden has withdrawn his resignation since the letter was written, the writer will agree with us that the necessity for its publication has been removed.

J. M. Kellie, M. P., is the father of the Truck Act. The object of the measure is to make it a penalty for a company to force men to board at the company's boarding house or buy goods at the company's store or pay men in time cheques in lieu of cash. The provisions of the act apply only to incorporated cities or within three miles thereof. Mr. Kellie believing that the scalping of workmen's time cheques is an abuse has introduced a bill to amend last year's act making it an offence punishable by a heavy fine to scalp time cheques.

L. G. McPhillips member for Victoria has given notice to amend the Alien Labor Law. His amendments are intended to remove the disabilities against British companies which the act now contains. He also intends that all persons not British subjects may purchase claims and own them by inheritance or bequest.

Hon. Mr. Martin addressing a public meeting in Victoria last week stated that the government did not consider that the magistrate should be a member of either the police or licensing boards. They did not consider that in connection with licenses he should be mixed up in any way with matters which might come before him as magistrate. As a police commissioner, the magistrate could not fail to be acquainted with the operations of the police, and he was virtually their head, yet under the present system he had to go into court and try cases in which he was virtually the prosecutor. "We propose to change the law," said Mr. Martin, "so that the magistrate shall not be a member of either of these boards."

An act has been introduced cancelling all such appointments on June 30. Old appointees may of course be re-appointed.

Until recently the Dominion government was in the habit of appointing Queen's Counsel. The Privy Council decided that the appointment lay within the rights of the provinces. The Attorney-General has introduced an act to appoint two Q. C.'s yearly.

Mining And Commercial.
The regular meeting of the Mining and Commercial association was held in Rendell's hall on Wednesday evening. President Anderson was in the chair. A letter was read from D. J. Matheson of Cascade, acknowledging receipt of petition re the appointment of resident gold commissioner and government agent and stating that the taxpayers association of Cascade would take the matter up.

In response to a letter from J. Roderick Robertson president of the Nelson Board of Trade, the association decided to urge upon the government the desirability of appropriating a sum necessary to assure a B. C. mineral exhibit at the Paris Exposition.

Other matters relating to the district were discussed and the meeting adjourned.

A gentleman who has just come over from Nelson stated that there is a warm contest between Hon. J. Fred Hume and A. S. Farwell. In his opinion Mr. Hume will be returned by an increased majority.

J. L. White a graduate of the Ontario College of Pharmacy has opened the Greenwood Pharmacy in the Bannerman building.

The firemen are going to make the ball on St. Valentine's day a success. The best music has been procured and all the arrangements point to an enjoyable evening.

The report that Mr. F. Elkins is an applicant for the position of night watchman is unfounded. Mr. Elkins is not an applicant for this or any other civic office.

The Golden Eagle claim on the North Fork is to be developed by a company which is being incorporated in Greenwood. There is a large body of rich ore on the property.

The official Gazette contains notice of the Hunter-Kendrick Co. There is a cash capital of \$50,000. The officers are, President, James Hunter, Rossland; Vice-President, Chas. S. Slawson, Northwood, Dakota; Secretary and General Manager, A. T. Kendrick. Robert Hunter, Rossland; John C. Hunter, Fargo, and Robert Riddell, Minneapolis, complete the board of directors. Business will be carried on at Greenwood and Grand Forks.

The Seattle mining case is again being heard in the courts. The Seattle Mining Company represented by Cummings & Manly of Grand Forks are the plaintiff. In 1897 Robert Clark sold the Seattle to Hay & McCallum and afterwards Cummings & Manly induced Clark to sell to them. Hay & McCallum brought suit to confirm the sale to them and were successful. Cummings & Manly are now endeavouring to recover Clarke's interest in the claim after Hay & McCallum have been satisfied. Messrs. Tupper, Peters and W. A. MacDonald are fighting the case at Nelson for Cummings & Manly and E. V. Bodwell is defending.

Alex. Dick, the well known mining engineer, came over from Rossland yesterday.

Okanagan lake was frozen over this week. The steamer Aberdeen was unable to make Pentiction on account of ice on Monday night, consequently there was no mail on Wednesday. The government having granted the request to have all mails from Boundary Creek routed by American lines, the inconvenience on account of no Pentiction mail was not so serious as it would otherwise have been.

BOUNDARY CREEK TELEGRAPH AND TELEPHONE COMPANY, L.D., RIGHT OF WAY BY-LAW, 1899.
A BY-LAW to authorize and ratify the execution by the Mayor and City Clerk of a certain document relating to the right of way granted to the above named Company, within the limits of the City of Greenwood.
The Municipal Council of the City of Greenwood acts as follows:
(1) That the mayor and clerk of the City of Greenwood be, and they are hereby authorized

to execute a certain agreement made between the corporation of the City of Greenwood parties of the first part, and the Boundary Creek Telegraph and Telephone Company, Limited, parties of the second part, to be dated the day of the final passage of this by-law, which said agreement is marked "A" on the first page thereof, and published herewith.
(2) This by-law may be cited as the "Boundary Creek Telegraph and Telephone Company Right-of-way By-law, 1899."
Done and passed in open council the 30th day of January, 1899.

AGREEMENT A.
This indenture made the day of A. D., 1899, between the corporation of the City of Greenwood hereinafter for themselves their successors and assigns called the city, of the first part, and The Boundary Creek Telegraph and Telephone Company, Limited, hereinafter for themselves, their successors and assigns, called the Company, of the second part.
Whereas the said Company is desirous of installing, maintaining, and operating in the City of Greenwood, in pursuance of the powers contained in its memorandum of Association, a telegraph, telephone, and cable system:
Now this indenture witnesseth that in consideration of the premises and of the sum of one dollar now paid by the said Company to the said city (the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged) and of a yearly sum of Five Dollars per annum, as rental, payable on the first day of January in each and every year to the said city, the said City hereby covenants with the said Company, and the said Company hereby covenants with the said city, as follows, that is to say:
(1) That in consideration of the covenants on the part of the city hereinafter contained, and of the rights, powers and privileges hereinafter granted, the said Company for itself, its successors and assigns, covenants and agrees to and with the said city and its successors, that the said Company will within six months from the final passage of the by-law containing these presents, erect, install, equip and place in operation within the limits of the said City, a complete telegraph and telephone system for the use of the public, and the said Company hereby agrees to furnish to any and every citizen of the said city of Greenwood, requiring the same, at any and all points within the city, wires and telephone instruments, and connection by means of the same with the Company's system of telephones at fair and reasonable charges for installation and rental thereof.
(2) And for the consideration aforesaid, and mentioned in the last preceding clause, the city doth grant to the said Company, for the period of Twenty-five years from the day of the date hereof, the right, privilege and franchise, under the supervision of the city engineer for the time being, to erect poles and lay overhead or underground wires, and under all or any of the streets, roadways, lanes, passages and other public highways and places of the said city of Greenwood for the use and transmission of electricity for telegraph and telephone purposes only, and for the purpose of erection, laying, construction, maintenance, alteration and repair of such poles and wires to enter upon any such streets, roadways, lanes, passages, and other public highways and places, and to make such excavations and to do such acts and things as may be necessary for the purposes aforesaid.
(3) The said Company will at all times during the erection of any poles, the laying of any wires, and the construction of any buildings or works, and during repairs or alterations of the same, take proper care and precaution, for the safety of foot and other passengers, and of horses and carriages, passing along the said streets or any of them, and the erection, laying, construction, alteration or repair, is being performed, and will not interfere with or impede the public right of travelling on or using the same or in any way obstruct the entrance to any door or gateway, or the free access to any building.
(4) That after such erection, laying, construction, alteration or repair, the said Company shall and will repair and mend the said streets, roadways, lanes, passages, and public highways and places, and leave them in their former condition in so far as the same is compatible with such erection, laying, construction, alteration or repair, and all such repairs to streets, roadways, lanes, passages and public highways shall be performed as directed by the city engineer for the time being.
(5) And the said Company agrees to indemnify and save harmless the said city from all actions, claims, demands, and costs, that may at any time during the continuance of this contract be made against the said City by reason of the said Company erecting, poles, or overhead wires or any plant or appliances, under or over any of the streets, lanes, passages, or public highways of the City or by reason of the operation of the Company's plans or equipments and from and against all actions, proceedings or suits at law, and costs thereof, that may be brought against the said City by any person or persons body corporate by reason of the said City any so breaking up any streets, lanes, public ways or places and erecting poles and laying wires, thereunder, thereon, or thereover.
(6) This agreement shall not be taken as granting a franchise to this Company to the exclusion of other companies which may hereafter apply for like rights, privileges and franchises.
