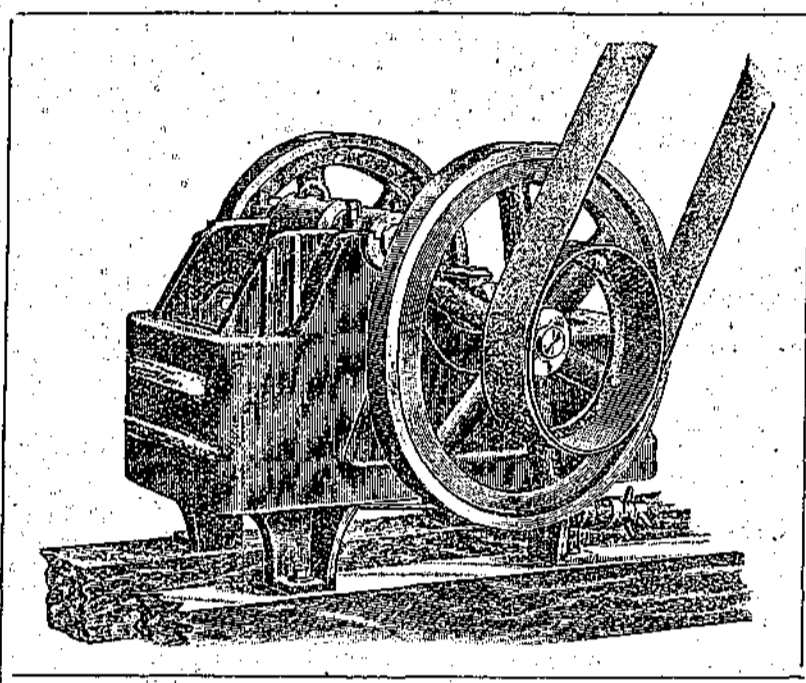

BY THE BACK DOOR

MR. PHELAN GETS IN COUNCIL.

The Mayor's Vote Elects Another Member of The Council. An Effort to Starve Out The City Clerk. The Collectors Rake Off.

The regular meeting of the city council was held in the court house on Monday evening. Mayor Hardy presided and Ald. Naden, Galloway, Sutherland and Campbell were in their seats. The minutes of last meeting were read and adopted. Several accounts were referred to the finance committee.

The Boundary Creek Printing & Publishing Co., informed the council that since the city was incorporated they had published by-laws and other notices at the rate of eight cents each nonpareil line for the first insertion and two cents for any additional insertions and that the company were prepared to continue at this rate. W. J. Lee tendered to do the work for 5 cents for first insertion and 5 cents for each additional insertion. After the communications were read Mr. Lee stated to the council that he was ignorant of the procedure on this side of the line and thought city by-laws had to be published only once. From the opinions expressed by the council, this was probably an erroneous view and he was prepared to do the work for five cents first insertion and three cents each additional insertion.

Ald. Sutherland: "I move Mr. Lee's tendered be received and filed."

Ald. Naden: "I am pleased to second that motion."

At the suggestion of the mayor action was deferred for one week.

Mayor Hardy: I have something to say to the council. I don't think it would be beneficial to have an election. I think we can save the city the amount of the election expenses and appoint as good a man as the electors. We must curtail expenses, keep them as low as possible, we can do this by acting on section 82 of the Municipal Election Act. Of course I leave this matter with the aldermen and will be guided by their decision.

Ald. Naden: "On Thursday evening the city solicitor gave as a precedent for this course the action taken in Rossland. There is no similarity between the two cases after a certain point. Mr. Barrett was not qualified. He resigned. A new election was ordered and it was only when those nominated refused to stand for election that the council filled the vacancy. The people were given an opportunity in Rossland to elect an alderman. If Rossland is the only precedent for such a course I think it a very bad one and I am much opposed to this course."

Mayor Hardy: "We must follow the city solicitor's advice. If he is wrong that's his look out, we won't be far out if we follow his advice. I am strictly opposed to having an election."

Ald. Campbell. How much will an election cost? The cost of an election

was discussed for some time and ranged all the way from \$15 to \$75 according to the views of the members.

Ald. Galloway: "While I am quite at one with you Mr. Mayor about removing any expenses I do not think that the method you suggest will result that way. We asked for the solicitor's advice and got it. Everybody knows what that advice was and a good many think that it was not proper advice. I happen to know that if you pursue the course you suggest the matter will be tested in the courts. The safer way is to have an election. There is no doubt about that being legal."

Mayor Hardy: "If solicitor's advice had not been taken there would be some excuse for the expense of an election."

Ald. Sutherland: "I move that Michael J. Phelan be and is hereby appointed a member of the municipal council of the City of Greenwood to fill the vacant seat in the North ward for the balance of the year."

Ald. Galloway: "That will lead to more expense. The city will be saddled with legal costs. Have you any assurance that he will accept?"

Ald. Sutherland: Oh pass this and then we will see.

Mayor Hardy: "He said he would accept."

Ald. Campbell: "If Mr. Leamy's opinion is correct I have much pleasure in seconding the motion."

Mayor Hardy: I don't think those people who talk about taking action in the court care to part with the necessary money to unseat Mr. Phelan.

The resolution was then put. Ald. Campbell and Sutherland voted for it and Ald. Naden and Galloway against it was declared carried on the astringent vote of the mayor.

For some time the council has had an option on R. Hall's ranch two and half miles up Boundary creek and containing 320 acres. It is to be used for park and cemetery purposes. Ald. Galloway was instructed to close the deal for \$2,500.

The securing of revenue from houses of ill fame was then considered and the police commissioners will be asked to set the law in motion with this object in view.

It was decided to call for tenders for city scavenger work after the council selected a site for the city refuse.

The mayor was authorized to make the best arrangements possible for the care of the indigent sick.

Ald. Galloway asked the mayor about Ald. Nelson's qualification and the reply was that there was no word from the coast yet.

The questions of salaries then came up for consideration.

Ald. Sutherland: "I move that the city clerk and treasurer (Mr. Taylor) be paid \$50 a month."

Ald. Naden: "This motion has not been seconded Mr. Mayor, but if you will allow me I would like to state that the work is not in proportion. The city clerk has to be at all meetings of the council, the license and police commissioners. His whole time should be devoted to city work."

Ald. Galloway: "I cannot see any consistency in Ald. Sutherland's motion. He moves to give 30 cents an hour to men working on the streets and then moves to pay a man \$50 a month to act as city clerk and treasurer. Mr. Taylor or any one else can't live on that salary in this country."

The Mayor: "That's for Mr. Taylor to say after the salary is fixed."

Ald. Sutherland: "I am not in favor of low wages. There is lots of other things the clerk can do. I am willing to do what's right."

Ald. Campbell then seconded Ald. Sutherland's motion. Ald. Naden moved an amendment to make city clerk's salary \$65 and treasurer \$25 or \$90 in all as at present. Ald. Galloway seconded the amendment. It was put and Ald. Galloway and Naden voted for and Ald. Sutherland against.

The Mayor: "Did you vote Ald. Campbell?"

Ald. Campbell (trembling)--n-o.

The Mayor: "Then the amendment is carried."

The original motion as amended was then put. The vote was the same excepting that a still small and quivering voice was heard from the direction of Ald. Campbell's seat voting with Ald. Sutherland. The mayor thought \$50 a month sufficient compensation for the work and defeated the amended motion. This left the council where they began and Mr. Taylor having signified his willingness to accept \$50 if allowed to reside on the outside, the question was again deferred for a week.

It was decided to pay assessor \$9 a day for 15 days and the collector 3 per cent on all collections. The assessment will have to be returned before March 6th next.

MR. PHELAN'S APPOINTMENT.

MICHAEL J. PHELAN is nominally an
alderman by the grace of His Worship
Thos. J. Hardy. Mr. Phelan is too
good a man, too estimable a citizen to
be burdened with the indignity of
being pulled through a back door into
an aldermanic seat by a man who
appears to be ignorant of, or dis-
regards the provisions of the law
which regulates municipal affairs. The
City of Greenwood is in a pitiable state
if its alderman are to be elected not by
the voice of the people but through the
advice of a man who bases his conten-
tion on no law, no precedent, no custom,
no decision of the courts but to meet
the pressing exigencies of those to
whom he owes his appointment. Mr.
Hardy and his working majority may
revel in a saturnalia of illegal actions
but their course must be a short lived
one. The future of the city, the due
observance of the law are too impor-
tant to be continually sacrificed to
satisfy the viscous inclinations of
those whom the people were pleased to
place in charge of the affairs of the
city.

The TIMES has not the slightest
objection to Mr. Phelan as an alder-
man. We have stated that his record
has been a good one and still believe
that under ordinary conditions he
will make an excellent representative.
We must strongly protest however
against the method of appointment.
We have too high a respect for Mr.
Phelan to believe that he will accept
the position under the circumstances.

PAID FOR USE OF NAMES.

SOME very sensational evidence was
given in the libel suit brought by ex-
Premier Turner and C. E. Pooley
against Walter C. Nichols, editor of
the Province. The proceedings were
instituted because of strong criticisms
against Messrs. Pooley and Turner for
using their official position to become
associated with Klondyke and B. C.
mining companies in England. The
case came before Chief Justice Mc-
Coll and a jury in Victoria last week.
The sensational feature of the hearing
was the reading of evidence taken by
a commission in London, England,
given by the directors and secretaries
of the various companies with which
the names of Messrs. Turner and
Pooley were connected, in which it is
made plain that those gentlemen were
to receive and did receive ample re-
muneration for holding positions on
advisory boards. Each received 50
fully paid-up shares in two companies
and were to have £200 sterling salary.
Original cheques were produced for
£50 each, showing that each gentle-
man received from the two companies
£250. Turner also received 140 fully
paid-up shares in the British Columbia
and New Finds Gold Fields Company.
His remuneration as a member of the
advisory board was to be based on
results, in the way of a bonus.

JAMES MARTIN, M. P. P.

THE electors of the Rossland consti-
tuency have done well in returning
Mr. James Martin, M. P. P. He has
proved himself to be a strong worker
for his constituency. The interests of
Boundary Creek have not been for-
gotten. Mr. Martin has succeeded in
securing several special appropriations
for this section. He has always been
ready to interest himself in those mat-
ters to which his attention has been
called by his constituents. In many
ways he has proven himself to be a
useful member of the house and a
credit to those who elected him.

THE municipal council of Victoria
acting without the advice of as sound
a lawyer as Mr. Leamy, ordered a new
election last week when an alderman
resigned because he was not properly
qualified.

IMPORTANT ACTS.

INTRODUCED IN LEGISLATURE.

The B. C. Telephone Company's Bill Meet With Vigorous Opposition. Provincial Railway Charters Are to be Cancelled if Companies Building Them Ask For Dominion Charters.

VICTORIA, Feb. 11.—Some important legislation was passed during the week and other legislative equally important was foreshadowed by the Attorney-General.

When the South Kootenay Railroad Bill came up in committee of the whole, the Opposition as the acknowledged friends of the charter mongers raised the expected objection to the clause which the Government is inserting in all railroad bills to protect the interests of the Province, but the Bill went through just the same. Speaking in defence of the clause Hon. Mr. Martin stated that the Dominion Government had entirely usurped the power of the Province in the matter of granting charters to railways. Certain railway corporations have from time to time obtained lands and moneys from the legislature. They had got all they wanted and then after obtaining Dominion charters they would laugh at Provincial regulations. The Province might try to enforce the restrictions imposed by their charters but the corporations simply replied that they were working under the Dominion Act. The Attorney-General knew of two railroads which had been wholly constructed under Provincial charters and of one, at least, whose bonds were guaranteed by the Province, and yet the Province had been deprived of any legislative control. It was far better that some trouble should be occasioned to railroad promoters than that the Province should abandon any of its rights and privileges.

Macpherson's Bill to amend the Master and Servant Act passed through its final stage. Incorporated with this Bill were four new sections regulating the expenditure of sums deducted from the wages of employees for the purpose of providing a fund for medical attendance. As the law now stands employees will have full control of monies thus deducted with the right to appoint their own medical attendant.

The Kootenay members led by J. M. Martin, Rossland, made a strong fight for the rights of incorporated cities when the bill respecting the British Columbia Telephone Company came up for discussion. This company now owns all the rights and franchises of the Burrard Inlet and Nelson and Vernon telephone companies. Messrs. Martin and Green pointed out how the enormous concessions granted the Nelson & Vernon company by a previous legislature militated against the interests of Rossland, Kaslo and other cities recently incorporated. Their position was supported by Mr. McPherson and Hon. Joseph Martin. The Attorney-General held that no telegraph company should have at any time been given permission to string wires in the city or town and that the legislature had and did exercise the right to remove such wires even if authority had been given by past legislation.

The company are evidently afraid of their right for Mr. Prentice who has charge of the bill has given notice to include the following clause:

And in municipalities within which the Company has already erected poles and wires and is doing business, or in the event of a municipality being created covering territory in which the Company has already erected poles and wires and is doing business, the breaking up and opening of streets for the erection of poles or for carrying the wires underground, shall be subject to the approval of the Municipal Council of such municipalities, and in municipalities within which the Company has not already erected poles and wires, the breaking up and opening of the streets for the erection of poles or for carrying the wires underground, shall be subject to the consent of the Municipal Council of such municipalities.

An act has been introduced extending the rights of the crown to free miners prospecting for minerals on railway lands.

The jury disagreed in the famous Province libel suit, nine being for acquittal and three for conviction.

Cariboo stock has made phenomenal rises since the property was acquired by the new company. Last week the stock was quoted at \$1.60 in Toronto and hard to get at this figure. Minnehaha sold for 24 cents.

W. J. Harber manager of the TIMES has almost fully recovered from his recent illness.

Since the recent strike in the Golden Crown, the company's stock has been much in demand. It has gone up to 30 cents.

The vote on the by-law to sanction an agreement between the Corporation and the Boundary Creek Telephone & Telegraph Company is being taken to-day.
