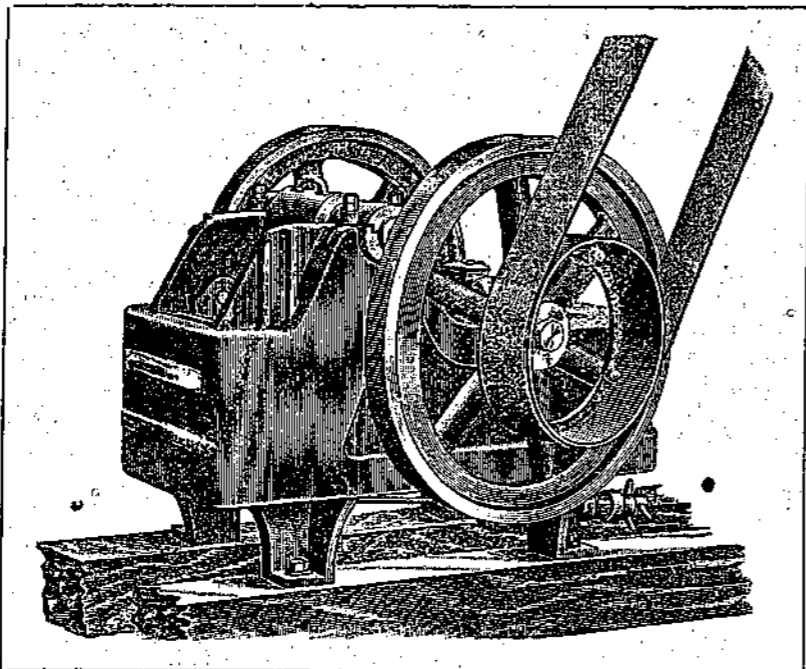

A MATTING PLANT

PURCHASED FOR THE B. C.

Work Has Been Resumed on the Big Summit Camp Property—A New Vein on the Winnipeg—Development of Other Properties.

John M. Scrafford of Rossland arrived in the city on Thursday evening. He was accompanied by sixteen practical miners who proceeded to the B. C. mine. Mr. Scrafford has been appointed superintendent of the property. He has been with the McQuaig syndicate for several years having had charge of the work on the Gertrude and Coxe near Rossland.

The B. C. is to be operated on a large scale. Until the new plant purchased by the company arrives, the men will be employed in development work from the old shaft. The company have purchased a large plant from J. D. Sword the B. C. agent of the Ingersoll Sergeant Company. The plant includes a 30 drill compressor, a hoist that can be used to a depth of 1000 feet and two steel cages. The plant is not expected on the ground for some time yet. When it is installed a new working shaft will be sunk. It will have three compartments, two of which will be 4 feet 6 inches square and the third 4 feet 6 inches by 3 feet 6 inches. It is the intention to sink this shaft to the 1000 foot level.

In addition to the above the company has decided to matte its ore in the vicinity of the mine. A 40 ton matting plant has been ordered. This is the first matting plant ordered for the district and its installation and operation will be eagerly watched by those interested in the big mines of the district.

As was stated in the TIMES some time ago the new company operating the B. C. have ample funds to undertake work on a big scale. Montreal capitalists were so anxious to secure shares in the company that they oversubscribed by several thousand shares. A half a million dollars was placed in the treasury to work the property.

New Strike on the Winnipeg.

A five foot ore chute has been added to the wealth of the Winnipeg mine. The latest discovery was made at the 300 foot level. There was no indication on the surface or at the other levels that this vein of rich ore existed but when the 300 foot level was reached, Superintendent McIntosh decided to crosscut both ways from the shaft. He expected to meet the main ledge on the west side but was agreeably surprised to run into a five foot chute of rich ore after crosscutting a few feet on the east side. The lead is what is known as a blind one. Several leads of a similar character have been found in Wellington camp. The ore is of a similar character to that in the

other veins in the Winnipeg. It held high gold values and is well defined.

As soon as the main lead is met the force on the Winnipeg will be increased. With more development work it is impossible to conjecture what modern wealth is contained in the Winnipeg. Sufficient has been uncovered to demonstrate the great richness of the property.

Drifting on the ledge at the 150 foot level is being continued at the Golden Crown. The ledge is widening considerable and the values are continuing high.

Some of the prettiest ore specimens to be found anywhere are being taken from the Hartford adjoining the Winnipeg. The copper can be taken from the quartz in leaves.

The new boiler in the Old Ironsides is being placed in position.

The work on the Nellie Cotton is being continued. The shaft is being sunk in a strong ledge of ore.

Mr. Burgess came over with Mr. Brelich from Nelson to take charge of the Copperopolis and Magnolia. There are seven men employed on these properties.

NEWS FROM THE CAPITAL.

Exciting Times Over a Bye-Election—New Legislation.

VICTORIA, January 28.—Before this appears in print the hottest election campaign ever waged in the province will be closed and three good men and true elected to represent Victoria. It is an unsafe thing to venture an opinion regarding an election but judging from the conduct of Victorians in the past the government candidates are going to win. Victorians like to be on the winning side and as the Semlin government has now a good working majority they will likely consider it expedient to return government members and expect their reward in the shape of appropriations or appointments.

The work of the legislature is progressing very satisfactorily. Several useful measures have been put through.

The government is determined that railway companies asking for provincial franchises shall pay something for their franchises. It is provided in the South Kootenay Railway bill that the company shall be bound to carry over its line of railway without charge all persons whose transportation would otherwise be a charge against the government of this province and also all members of the legislature.

It is reported that J. F. Deane, M. P. P., intends to resign because the government took the unusual course of paying its subscription to the Kamloops Sentinel of which paper he is managing editor.

A. S. Farwell who almost defeated Hon. J. Fred Hume in the general election has announced himself as an independent candidate in the bye-election.

Ere this all your readers will know something about the meeting between the Hon. Joseph Martin and Price Ellison. Mr. Ellison at a public meeting called the attorney general a carpet-bagger. Mr. Martin met Mr. Ellison in the lobby next day and gave him a piece of his mind. He said politicians should not forget to be gentlemen. That a man's private affairs ought never to be brought into public discussion. He called Mr. Ellison a low contemptible cur. Mr. Ellison appealed to the house and after two or three discussions the matter dropped.

Premier Semlin has introduced a bill respecting the inspection of steam boilers. It is not intended to apply to railway locomotives or boilers subject to inspection under the laws of the parliament of Canada. The lieutenant-governor in council may constitute such portions of the province as he may think proper into steam boilers inspection districts and appoint inspectors for such districts. Inspectors shall be authorized to charge a fee of \$5 for the inspection of each single boiler and its steam connections, and shall grant a certificate of inspection, which shall be kept posted up in a conspicuous place on the boiler or in the engine room where such steam boiler is being operated.

Another cold snap struck Southern Yale this week and the mercury went down once 30 degrees below zero.

IMPROVE THE ROAD.

At the last meeting of the council, Ald. Galloway reported that the business men were anxious to see the main trunk road running through the town northward, properly repaired before the spring. It was pointed out that this road would be used extensively by railway contractors and unless something were done it would be impassable during soft weather. The council expressed an anxiety to carry out the wishes of the business men but the members could not see any way of getting the necessary funds.

The same difficulty presents itself to every council in every city at the beginning of the year. It will be several months before money comes into the city treasury from ordinary taxation. To meet this, provision has been made in the municipal act, giving the council power to borrow money temporarily. The necessary money for pressing needs can be borrowed from any of the local banks. The road mentioned should be repaired. It would be a serious matter if the only road leading to Long Lake and Summit camps and along the line of railway should not be fit for traffic next spring.

HEALTH MATTERS.

The recommendations of Dr. Selton, the medical health officer

should be adopted. A city growing as rapidly as Greenwood is, without any sewerage system, and whose only water supply are the two creeks running through it, is always in danger from fever. Now is the time to fight fever germs that lurk in unsanitary back yards and in other quarters. The Board of Health should be organized. Under the provincial board of health act the Mayor, the police magistrate, the city clerk, the city engineer and the medical health officer constitute the local board of health. With health matter in the hands of those gentlemen Greenwood might be a clean and wholesome city.

In the fight against filth and dirt, and sanitary indifference it would be well for the Board of Health to instruct the chief of police to round up some of the worst culprits. It would be well for the big chief to strike terror into some people who appear indifferent regarding their own health and that of their neighbors. A city scavenger should also be appointed, someone who would devote all his time in the work of keeping the city clean.

TELEPHONE FRANCHISE.

A BOUNDARY creek prospector takes the right view regarding the granting of municipal franchise under ordinary circumstances. But circumstances do materially alter cases. A paternal government forced upon Greenwood an incubus in the shape of a liberal franchise granted to a strong telephone company before the city was incorporated. It would be an act of folly to remain so wedded to the principle of preserving municipal franchises that a company over which the city has no control would thereby secure a monopoly. The giving of a franchise to the Boundary creek Telegraph and Telephone Company means competition and competition is what we want.

ENGLISH CAPITAL.

THE companies floated in London, England, to carry on mining in Canada during 1868 numbered 122, and were capitalized at £11,000,000 as follows: British Columbia, £7,449,540; Klondike, £2,459,100; Ontario and Quebec, £1,417,400; Nova Scotia and Newfoundland, £515,000. During the year 1898, 509 mining companies were floated in London for £55,000,000; British Colonies got £36,000,000, and Canada £11,000,000. The above figures show that English capitalists gave more attention to Canadian investments than to those of any other country in the world.

A BROAD ESPLANADE

CREEK TO BE STRAIGHTENED.

Wide Drives to be Graded on Each Side of the Creek.—The C. P. R. Contractors have Charge of the Work.

Boundary creek whose sinuosities within the corporate limits of the city of Greenwood, disturbed the equanimity of the enterprising Townsite company is to be straightened. The creek will no longer be allowed to meander through valuable real estate, or pour its waters over the banks in spring time. From the time it enters the city limits above Mr. C. A. Shaw's residence until it reaches higher banks near the Greenwood brewery it will be forced to run through a straight channel dug for that purpose. The Townsite company and the Canadian Pacific Railway company have so decided.

The plans for the work show that the originators of the scheme also kept in view the beautifying of the city. Silver street from the upper bridge to the northern limits of the city a distance of over half a mile is to be made 100 feet wide. Through the centre of this street, the channel for the creek is to be cut. This will leave a drive of over 30 feet on each side of the stream. The channel will be 12 feet wide at the bottom, and the depth will be over six feet. The banks will slope until the channel will be over 30 feet wide on the top. Grass is to be sown in early spring along the banks and in all probability shade trees will be planted. Silver street will then be one of the most beautiful drives to be found anywhere.

Mr. L. M. Rice, the C. P. R. engineer is busy preparing plans for the work. As soon as he has finished Pat Welch will take charge and carry on the work with his railway plant and men. It is expected that the work will be completed before high water in the spring.

The channel will be completed in such a manner that there cannot be the remotest possibility of an overflow at any time. It will be sufficient in size to carry off the largest quantity of water that can come from the Boundary creek watershed. The undertaking is of great importance to the city and particularly to property owners in the northern portion.



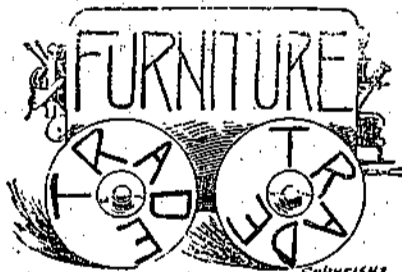

BY-LAW NO. 18.

BOUNDARY CREEK TELEGRAPH AND TELEPHONE COMPANY, LD., RIGHT OF WAY BY-LAW, 1899.

A BY-LAW to authorize and ratify the execution by the Mayor and City Clerk of a certain document relating to the right of way granted to the above named Company, within the limits of the City of Greenwood.

The Municipal Council of the City of Greenwood enacts as follows:
(1) That the Mayor and clerk of the City of Greenwood be, and they are hereby authorized

to execute a certain agreement made between the Corporation of the City of Greenwood, on the one part, and the Boundary Creek Telegraph and Telephone Company, Limited, parties of the second part, to be dated the day of the final passage of this by-law, which said agreement is marked "A" on the first page thereof, and published herewith.

(2) This by-law may be cited as the "Boundary Creek Telegraph and Telephone Company Right-of-way By-law, 1899."

Done and passed in open council the 30th day of January, 1899.

AGREEMENT A.

This indenture made the _____ day of _____ A. D., 1899, between the Corporation of the City of Greenwood hereinafter for themselves their successors and assigns called the City of the first part, and The Boundary Creek Telegraph and Telephone Company, Limited, hereinafter for themselves, their successors and assigns, called the Company, of the second part.

Whereas the said Company is desirous of installing, maintaining, and operating in the City of Greenwood, in pursuance of the powers contained in its memorandum of Association, a telegraph, telephone, and cable system:

Now this Indenture witnesseth that in consideration of the premises and of the sum of one dollar now paid by the said Company to the said city (the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged) and of a yearly sum of Five Dollars per annum, as rental, payable on the first day of January in each and every year to the said city, the said City hereby covenants with the said Company, and the said Company hereby covenants with the said city, as follows, that is to say:

(1) That in consideration of the covenants on the part of the city hereinafter contained, and of the rights, powers and privileges hereinafter granted, the said Company for itself, its successors and assigns, covenants and agrees to and with the said city and its successors, that the said Company will within six months from the final passage of the by-law confirming these presents, erect, install, equip and place in operation within the limits of the said City, a complete telegraph and telephone system for the use of the public, and the said Company hereby agrees to furnish to any and every citizen of the said city of Greenwood, requiring the same, at any and all points within the city, wires and telephone instruments, and connection by means of the same with the Company's system of telephones at fair and reasonable charges for installation and rental thereof.

(2) And for the consideration aforesaid, and mentioned in the last preceding clause, the city doth grant to the said Company, for the period of Twenty-five years from the day of the date hereof, the right, privilege and franchise, under the supervision of the city engineer for the time being, to erect poles and lay overhead or underground wires, on along, or under, all or any of the streets, roadways, lanes, passages and other public highways and places of the said city of Greenwood, for the use and transmission of electricity for telegraph and telephone purposes only, and for the purpose of erection, laying, construction, maintenance, alteration and repair of such poles and wires to enter upon any such streets, roadways, lanes, passages, and other public highways and places, and to make such excavations and to do such acts and things as may be necessary for the purposes aforesaid.

(3) The said company will at all times during the term of this agreement, the laying of any wires, and the construction of any buildings or works, and during repairs or alterations of the same, take proper care and precaution for the safety of foot and other passengers, and of horses and carriages passing along the said streets or any of them on which erection, laying, construction, alteration or repair is being performed, and will not interfere with or impede the public right of travelling on or using the same, or in any way obstruct the entrance to any door or gateway, or the free access to any building.

(4) That after such erection, laying, construction, alteration or repair, the said company shall and will repair and mend the said streets, roadways, lanes, passages, and public highways and places, and leave them in their former condition in so far as the same is compatible with such erection, laying, construction, alteration or repair, and all such repairs to streets, roadways, lanes, passages and public highways shall be performed as directed by the city engineer for the time being.

(5) And the said company agrees to indemnify and save harmless the said City from all actions, claims, demands, and costs, that may at any time during the continuance of this contract be made against the said City by reason of the said Company erecting poles, or overhead wires or any plant or appliances, under or over any of the streets, lanes, passages, or public highways of the City or by reason of the operation of the Company's plants or equipments and from and against all actions, proceedings or suits at law, and costs thereof, that may be brought against the said City by any person or persons body corporate by reason of the said Company so breaking up any streets, lanes, public ways or places and erecting poles and laying wires, thereunder, thereon, or thereover.

(6) This agreement shall not be taken as granting a franchise to the said Company or the exclusion of other companies which may hereafter apply for like rights, privileges and franchises.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF the said Company has caused the corporate seal thereof to be hereto affixed and the signatures of the President and Secretary thereof to be hereunder written and the said City has caused the corporate seal thereof to be hereto affixed and the signatures of the Mayor thereof and City Clerk to be hereunder written.
