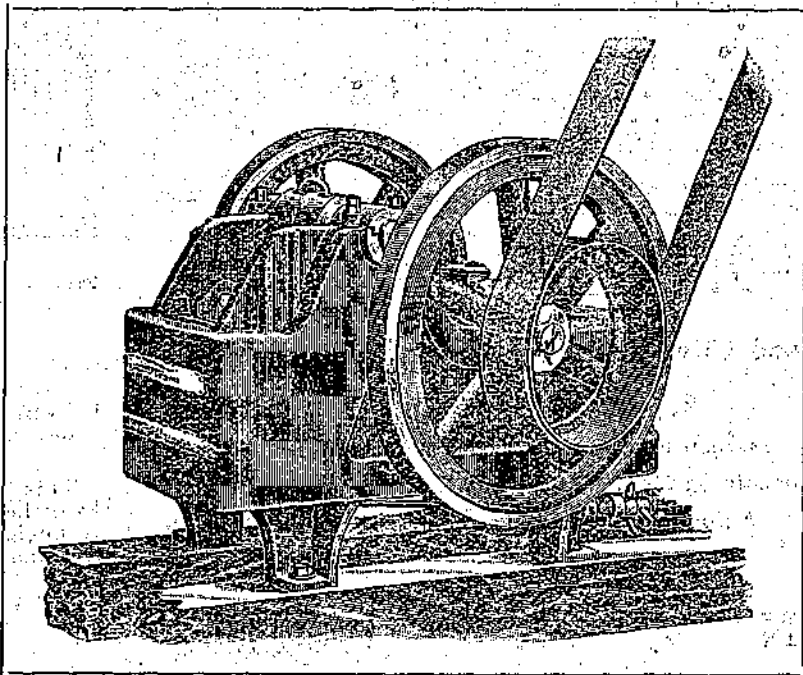

#### MINING NOTES

Dr. Reddy and Mr. Hickey went up to Camp McKinney on Monday to look after their many valuable mining interest in that camp.

The reference to the Camp McKinney Gold Mining company, which appeared in the Times last week, was not quite accurate. The block of shares which were placed on the market were not treasury but promoters' shares. These were speedily purchased at 1½ cents. The company is now fully organized and the treasury stock has been placed on the market at five cents and is finding many purchasers at this price.

Mr. Young, the business manager of the Spokesman-Review, spent several days in the district last week. He is one of the incorporators of the Crescent Gold Mining company, and is associated with Harry Shallenberger in the ownership of the Lake and other Skylark camp properties. Mr. Young is heavily interested in mining ventures in different districts, but he is so impressed with the wonderful resources of Boundary Creek that he has decided to give the district greater attention in the future.

Camp McKinney was well represented in Greenwood Sunday and Monday. A Camp McKinney party would not be complete without Hugh Cameron, the popular proprietor of the Camp McKinney hotel. He arrived in the city on Sunday afternoon and was accompanied by his brother, Malcolm McQuaig of Rock Creek, and his attorney, J. P. McLeod of Midway. Dr. J. F. Reddy and P. J. Hickey, the well known mining men, arrived from Spokane the same day. The object of the visit was to make the final payment on account of the bond which the latter held on the famous Fontenoy property. The payment was made and the Fontenoy passed into the hands of the the Fontenoy Gold Mining and Milling company, recently organized by Dr. J. F. Reddy and others.

The Fontenoy is a new provincial company and was registered at Victoria last week. The capital is one million dollars. It starts business backed up by the Dunsmuirs' millions. Mr. James Dunsmuir has secured the controlling interest in the company. He has associated with him the Hon. C. E. Pooley and B. J. Perry, while P. J. Hickey, Dr. Reddy, J. D. Farrell and C. P. Chamberlain retain interests. The fact that Mr. Dunsmuir has decided to take hold of the Fontenoy speaks volumes for the merits of the property. Mr. Dunsmuir has always been chary about gold mining speculations, and outside of the Noble Five, in which he is heavily interested, he has made but few investments in gold mines. He has taken hold of the Fontenoy with a vim, however, and intends to speedily prove that Hugh Cameron's prognostications relative to the hidden wealth of the Fontenoy were correct. A plant has been ordered and will be taken to the mine as speedily as possible. Development work will be pushed vigorously.

A deal was closed in this city during the past week, for the bonding of a group of three claims, the Yankee Boy, Yankee Girl and Bell on Hardy mountain, to a syndicate of Spokane and eastern capitalists, represented by Harry White of the City of Paris and

Lincoln; the sum named in the bond ranging between \$20,000 and \$30,000. The deal, we understand, being worked up by W. A. Wilcox, assayer and mining broker of Nelson, Wash. The properties are located on the east slope of Hardy mountain, about three miles from Grand Forks, immediately adjoining the Coryell ranch, and are among the best known on that mountain of rich mineral. The properties were located several years ago by Lee Merson and W. P. McGregor who have held and worked them since, doing a considerable amount of work and showing up a large amount of good ore. A shaft has been sunk 35 feet on the ledge and shows in the bottom over two feet of ore running \$65 in gold, 5½ ounces silver and a slight trace of copper. Beside the shaft a tunnel has been driven 33 feet to tap the lead and at the present writing has just reached it, although no crosscutting has been done as yet.—Grand Forks Miner.

#### THE CITY COUNCIL

Two Aldermen Resign—Another Telephone Franchise.

The regular meeting of the city council was held on Monday evening. Mayor Hardy presided and Aldermen Naden, Galloway and Sutherland were in their seats.

Messrs. C. A. Stone and J. B. Donald of the Columbia Telephone company were present. Mr. Stone briefly addressed the council. He stated that his company were anxious to put in a local system to connect with their main line. They had 225 miles of wire on the American side and had given contracts for erecting poles and stringing wires between Cascade and Camp McKinney. They would undertake to have the system in operation by July 1st. Mr. Stone answered many questions regarding the plans of his company. He assured the council that the rate for 'phones in the city would not be more than \$2 for residences and \$3 for business houses. The instruments will be placed free of charge.

Alderman Galloway gave notice that at the next meeting he would introduce a Columbia Telephone company right of way by-law.

Alderman Galloway pointed out that a map furnished by the Boundary Creek Telegraph and Telephone company showed that this company intended using both sides of every street and placing poles at every corner. The map was referred back to the company for explanation.

The resignations of Aldermen Campbell and Nelson were received.

Alderman Campbell, who was present, explained that he had transferred his property and was no longer qualified.

Mayor Hardy stated that Alderman Nelson had been notified that proceedings had been taken to unseat him, and consequently he decided to resign. Both resignations were accepted.

Alderman Naden inquired about the North ward, and Mayor Hardy stated that he understood Alderman Phelan was going to hand in his resignation. He had intimated as much to the mayor. The mayor had told Alderman Phelan that if he was in doubt as to the legality of his appointment he had better resign.

Alderman Galloway—He ought to come here or resign. His course is not fair to the city.

Alderman Naden—What does an election cost?

The Mayor—Oh! it don't cost very much; from \$15 to \$75.

No further action was taken in the matter.

Several bills were ordered paid. Permission was given A. M. Rice to erect a stairway to the Hart building, which he is to use temporarily as an office.

Alderman Galloway, after a brief discussion relative to funds, gave notice that he will introduce a temporary loan by-law at the next meeting.

Alderman Sutherland then retired from the meeting, leaving the council without a quorum.

There have been several real estate transfers during the past few days. Messrs. Stewart & Boomer, the well-known railway contractors, bought several lots in the valley. Mr. Arthur Nowat secured two Copper street lots below the hill for \$1,750. The Town-site company sold several lots in different parts of the city.

**THE ESTIMATES.**

The government has not been quite so niggardly in its estimates as the telegraphic reports would lead one to believe. A careful study of the sums granted to her majesty does not make pleasant reading for the electors of Boundary Creek.

The most important part for a new district is the for roads and bridges. The grant for East Yale is \$13,000 and for Rossland \$15,000. Boundary Creek, thanks to the last redistribution bill, knows not whether to look to Rossland or East Yale for its share, and the outlook is not hopeful in either case. The grant in each case is inadequate to meet the requirements.

The government has failed to realize the urgent requirements of this important section. Thousands of dollars are voted for the Atlin Lake district, simply because the coast people are more directly interested in this new Eldorado. A greater and more permanent district than Atlin is left with nothing but the crumbs that may fall from the scantily furnished table of East Yale or Rossland.

The government must be given credit, however, for realizing the importance of the WestFork district and

granting \$5,000 for constructing a road to this district. The sum of \$4,000 is also granted for a road along the Main Kettle river.

Greenwood has been singled out for special treatment. Every fire department in the province, with the exception of that in Greenwood, has been voted a sum not exceeding \$250 and not less than \$150. The ways of the government are almost as inscrutable as those of providence, and it is simply useless attempting to find a reason for such treatment.

The sum of \$3,000 has been granted for the purpose of erecting and furnishing a school building in the city. This sum will erect and furnish a two-roomed building.

Each hospital in the province gets a grant of \$500 and 50 cents a day for every patient. The Greenwood hospital is possibly included unless it is placed on the same footing as the fire department.

Turning to officers, there is a general reduction in salaries. Some of the offices have been abolished. There is no provision for gold commissioners. The Osoyoos-Kettle River division is to have a government agent at a salary of \$100 a month and a clerk with a salary of \$45 a month.

The sum of \$15,000 has been granted to assist in defraying the expenditure in connection with a provincial exhibit at the Paris exhibition.

**MIDWAY TO PENTICTON.**

THE Victoria, Vancouver and Eastern chartermongers received the treatment they deserved from the provincial legislature last week. The worst enemies Boundary Creek and the Coast cities ever had were Messrs. Maxwell and McInnes, M. P's, and McLagan, Milne et al. They used their influence in parliament and out of parliament to keep Heinze from building into the district. They used the same influence to prevent Corbin from building. They hawked the rights accorded them by the legislature and bonded their charter and their influence, accepting a small cash consideration with the hope of receiving the balance as a reward for services, not in the public interests but in the interests of a few individuals.

The legislature punished them for their selfish, unpatriotic actions. The subsidies for a road from Point Roberts to Boundary Creek district, which these chartermongers treated as an asset which they could dispose of to the highest bidder, has been cancelled.

In order to encourage legitimate railway construction, however, the attorney-general has introduced a bill, granting a subsidy from Midway to Penticton or some other suitable point on Okanagan lake. There are some new provisions in the bill which make interesting reading. Below are the important clauses:

"There is hereby granted for and in aid of the construction of a standard gauge railway from a point at or near Midway to a point at or near Penticton, or some other point on Okanagan lake, approximately one hundred miles in length, a sum not exceeding four thousand dollars per mile.

"The lieutenant-governor in council may enter into any agreement with any person or company undertaking the construction of such railway for the due construction and operation of such railway.

"Said subsidy shall not be payable until the railway is completed and in running order to the satisfaction of the lieutenant-governor in council, nor until security or guarantees satisfactory to the lieutenant-governor in council is or are given for the continuous maintenance and operation of the railway.

"In case said subsidy is granted to a railway company entitled to a land grant for the construction of such line, the same shall only be payable in case said company abandons its claim to such land grant.

"No Chinese or Japanese person shall be employed or permitted to work in the construction or operation of any railway subsidized under this act, under a penalty of five dollars per day for each and every Chinese or Japanese person so employed in contravention of this section, to be recovered on complaint of any person, under the provisions of the Summary Convictions act.

"The lieutenant-governor in council may incorporate any number of persons as a railway company for the purpose of constructing and operating such railway and receiving such subsidy and any provision contained in any railway charter passed during the present session of the legislative assembly may be applied to such company. Such company shall be subject to the British Columbia Railway act.

"Said subsidy shall not be given to any railway company not under the exclusive jurisdiction of the Province of British Columbia."

AMENDMENTS TO MUNICIPAL ACT.

Only a few amendments to the Municipal act were introduced in the house this year. The attorney-general had charge of the bill. In explaining the measure, Hon. Mr. Martin stated that:

"By section 175 the licensing of such clubs as that which became famous at Steveston, is forbidden. Hon. Mr. Martin taking the opportunity in passing of condemning the practice of the past with respect to clubs that should never have been authorized to exist by the municipalities interested. The attorney-general also intimated that there might well be a change at some future date in connection with the powers of city clubs, where it is now permitted for liquor to be sold to so many members and so many friends. As to the boards of police and licensing commissioners, the bill stipulates that police magistrates are no longer to have seats thereon by virtue of their office, this change having been mentioned to Magistrate Hall at the time of his appointment in Victoria. The object was that magistrates should be as far removed as possible from the police and license matters with which they would be brought in contact in the discharge of their magisterial duties. The two clauses last referred to read:

"In city municipalities the licensing commissioners shall be the mayor and two persons appointed annually by the lieutenant-governor-in-council, one of whom must be a member of the council of such city. The term of office of such commissioners to be appointed shall expire at the same time as that of the aldermen for such city, and the alderman so appointed must be a member of the council for the period for which he is appointed. In case of the absence or inability to act of the mayor the council may appoint an alderman to act in his place as such commissioner during such absence or inability. Any two members of such board shall constitute a quorum."

The clause in reference to the appointment of commissioners of police is the same as the foregoing.

Camp McKinney Gold Mining Company.

A meeting of the incorporators of the Camp McKinney Gold Mining and Milling company was held on Monday evening last, when the following officers were elected: President, D. A. Cameron, manager of the Bank of Commerce; vice-president, R. Smiles, of the firm of Rendell & Co.; directors, Thos. McDonnell, R. H. Palmer and C. W. H. Sansom; secretary-treasurer, W. B. Paton. It was decided to place a block of 25,000 shares of treasury stock on the market at 5 cents. As soon as this decision was arrived at, 7,000 shares were immediately purchased for an eastern investor. The balance of the block is selling rapidly. Local men who have a knowledge of the company's properties and their locations are buying freely. The company own the Aloha, George Hurst and Burlington. These claims lie north west of the Sailor group and are in a direct line with the trend of the Cariboo vein. F. W. Groves, C. E., is surveying the properties, and as soon as his work is completed a force of men will be put to work.

Okanagan lake has been open for navigation for over a week and the mail by the Penticton stage has consequently increased.

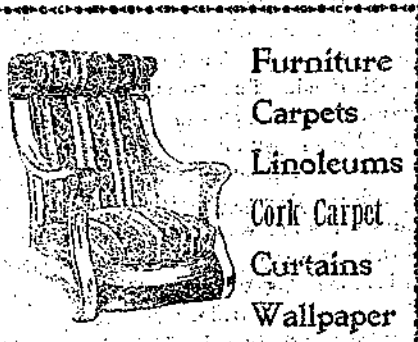

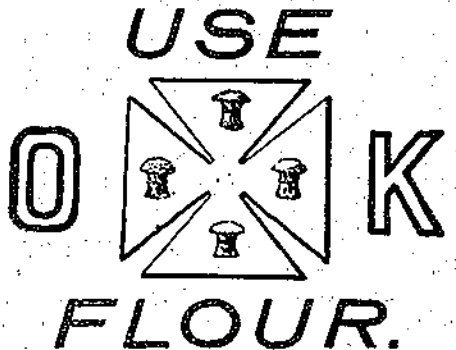

### BUILDING OPERATIONS.

A Large Number of Business Blocks in the Course of Erection.

Messrs. Wallace, Miller and George, who purchased the three lots at the corner of Center and Copper streets, have decided to erect a two-story brick building on the property. The building will occupy all the lots, and consequently will have a 75-foot frontage on Copper street and will run back 115 feet on Center. Mr. George arrived from Nelson last Saturday and is making arrangements to excavate the lots. A brickmaker is also coming in to start a yard. This will be the first brick building erected in Greenwood.

H. B. Munroe has leased a lot on Copper street, the second below the Barrett block. He intends erecting a building thereon in the near future.

The building occupied by Messrs. Smith & McRae is to be removed to the rear end of the lot and a two-story block will be built at the front. The premises will be occupied by Messrs. Smith & McRae.

Arrangements are being made to build a large first-class hotel near the corner of Louise and Government streets. The building, when erected, will cost \$30,000.

Work is well under way on the big building for the Hunter-Kendrick company. This is to be a busy locality in the building line. In addition to Mr. Powell's big hotel and the Wood-Fletcher-Elkins blocks, it is quite possible that the Odd Fellows may erect a hall in the vicinity. W. S. Fletcher is also likely to build on the lots recently purchased from Shipley & O'Rourke.

### UNIVERSITY EXTENSION.

Mr. R. E. Gosnell, the Well-Known Author, Visiting the District.

Mr. R. E. Gosnell, Victoria, who is making a tour of the interior of B. C., in the interests of the university association, of which he is general secretary for the province, arrived in Greenwood this week and went out to-day to Camp McKinney, taking in Boundary Falls and Midway en route. He will return in a few days. Mr. Gosnell,

who is well known as the former provincial librarian and author of the Year Book of B. C., is also taking general observations of the country for journalistic purposes, and is visiting all the leading mines. This is his first visit to the Boundary country, and notwithstanding all that has been "said and sung" about this district the reality was a surprise to him.

The object of the university association, with which Mr. Gosnell is at present associated as organizer, is what is known as "university extension," and as such is peculiarly adapted to the needs of a country like B. C., where facilities for higher education are limited. The work is carried on by university professors, the instruction being given in the form of a printed syllabus, issued monthly, twelve numbers constituting a year's course in each subject. The subjects so far arranged are Universal History, Universal Literature, Religion and Theology, Political Economy, Astronomy and Practical Geology. The courses are very complete and the cost of each so low as to bring them within the reach of all, viz., \$3.75. The studies may be taken privately or in connection with a reading center. A large number have joined. Mr. Gosnell will appoint a representative here before returning to the coast. The particular object of his visit here, however, is to see the country.
