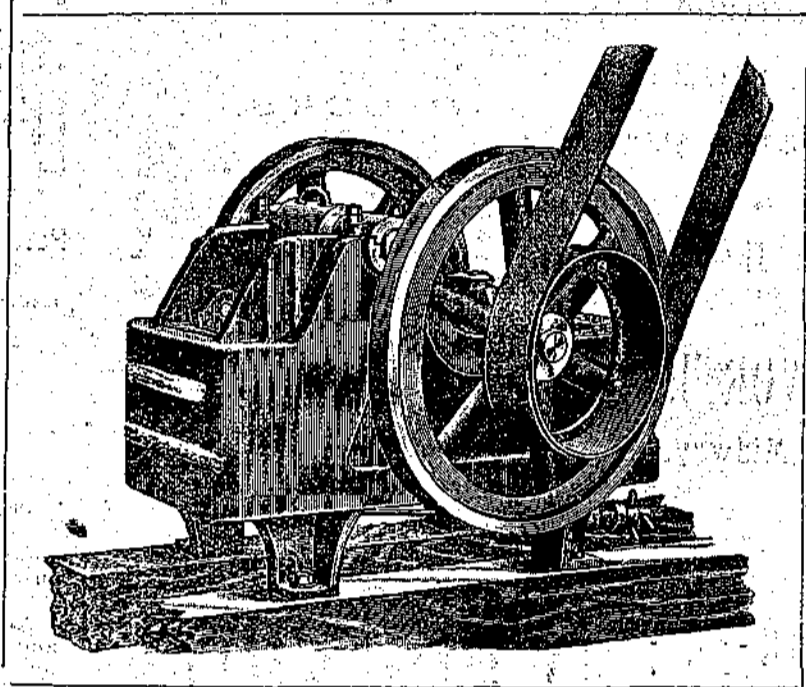

SUNSET COMPANY

FLOATED - IN - MONTREAL

Under the Name of Montreal Boundary Creek Mining Company.—The Lemon Mine of Camp McKinney.—Some Recent Strikes.—Mining Notes.

Montreal has added another to the rapidly growing list of big mining companies that are floated to develop Boundary creek properties. The "Sunset" group in Deadwood camp comprising the Sunset, Crown, Silver and C. O. D. have been acquired by the Montreal Boundary Creek Mining Company. The Sunset group was owned by W. L. Hogg of Montreal. He visited the properties about a month ago and upon his return to Montreal succeeded in interesting some capitalists in the company which he floated to take over the properties. The Montreal Boundary Creek mining company is capitalized for \$2,000,000. Hon. Senator Ogilvie, the millionaire flour king is president, W. Barclay Stephens, manager of the Western Loan & Trust Co., is vice-president, and W. Jacques, secretary. The other directors are Hon. Richard Turner of Whitehead & Turner, Quebec, W. L. Hogg manager of the Investment Company, Montreal; T. W. Horn, Luxfer Frislin Company, Toronto; J. G. Ross, Montreal, and Herman Young, Quebec. A limited number of shares were placed on the Montreal market at 20 cents and were all subscribed. The company has secured one of the best known and most promising properties in the Boundary creek country. The greater portion of the work has been done on the Sunset. A shaft has been sunk on the property to a depth of 220 feet and 1175 feet of tunnel work done. A crosscut at the 100 foot level encountered an 80 foot ledge of gold-copper ore. Nearly 60 feet of this ledge is solid ore. Surface values from the property range from \$7 to \$50 to the ton. The average value is about \$20. The development work is being continued under the superintendence of J. H. Macfarlane. As soon as the railway is completed a big plant which has already been ordered will be brought to the mine. The Deadwood-Copper camp branch of the railway which is now being built from Greenwood will pass through the Sunset. The Sunset group is situated about one and a half miles from this city.

M. J. Grevy the president of the Lemon Gold Mining company of Omaha was in the city for several days this week. Mr. Grevy purchased from Harry Howson the local agent of the Wm. Hamilton Manufacturing Company a No. 5 Cameron pump which will be shipped to the mine immediately. The Lemon group including the Lem-

on, Pennsylvania, Last Chance, Standard and another claim is situated in Omaha camp about five miles this side of Camp McKinney proper. The ore is rich free milling and concentrating and was the only British Columbia free milling ore awarded a medal at the big Omaha exhibition held last year. Mr. Grevy had an excellent exhibit at the exhibition. Considerable work was done on the properties during the winter under the superintendence of Mr. Patterson. There is an incline shaft on the Gold Standard 141 feet in depth. Drifts and crosscuts were run at the 125 foot level. The pay chute at this depth is fully three feet wide and averages \$53 in gold. The company intends doing a large amount of work during the coming summer. Mr. Grevy who had just returned from Camp McKinney reported that Joe Murphy, the superintendent of the Waterloo had gone to Penticton for the hoist, engine and boiler for the property. Recently a mill run of 260 pounds of Waterloo ore was made in Spokane. \$18 to the ton was secured from the plates and \$343 in concentrates. The Fointeroy company are making a good showing, having plenty of money to develop the property. A big strike was recently made on the North Star a Douglas mountain property. A crosscut ran through 4ft of rich Galena ore. Work will shortly be started in the Old England a promising property situated near the Lemon group. The work on the Eudor cut through a five foot ledge of rich ore. It is reported that the Rock Creek company will shortly resume operations on the Victoria mine.

R. M. McEntire of the firm of McEntire, McDonnell & Co., has returned from a twelve days trip to Nicola and Similkameen. He bonded two claims, the Peacock and Boulder on Nicola lake. The showings are very large. There is a 23 foot shaft on one of the properties all in ore. Mr. McEntire predicts a big future for the Nicola on a copper producing country. He also reports great activity in the Similkameen district.

Dr. Deek of Montreal was in the city last week after returning from the Similkameen country where he bonded several properties for himself and Montreal associates.

Mayor Leckie made a flying trip to the Similkameen country last week.

E. A. Bielenberg has seven men at work on the Iron Top, a claim near the famous Buckhorn. Mr. Bielenberg believes the Iron Top a bigger and better claim than the Buckhorn, and the development goes to prove his statement.

Rufus Pope, the principal shareholder in the Buckhorn Mining company, is expected here in a few days.

A. L. McEwen and Col. Ray have visited several properties in the district. They intend spending some time in the Similkameen district.

The big plant has been installed at the Winnipeg mine, and the work of pumping the water began yesterday.

Some strong ledges have recently been uncovered in Kimberley Camp. Mr. Shearer, who has been working on properties held by himself and W. McCurrach, made a rich strike last week.

NOTES.

E. Escalet of the Clarendon has returned from Rossland where he sold a Sophie mountain property at a big figure.

H. B. Plummer and C. N. Corbus, of Granite Pass, Oregon, are in the city. Both are prominent mining men who have heavy interests in placer mines in Oregon. They are anxious to invest in Boundary Creek mines, and with that object in view are examining properties in the district.

Chief MacLaren is showing suspicious characters no mercy these days consequently the chain gang is increasing. The other evening an individual on horseback informed the crowd that he was a tough from the Cœur d'Alenes. The chief happened to come along and pointed the road out of the city. The Cœur d'Alener sized up the chief and got as fast as his horse could carry him. The chain gang is being employed in clearing the alley between Government and Copper streets.

A HEALTHY PUBLIC SPIRIT.

BOUNDARY Creek has passed the prospect stage. It is now a full fledged mining district. Its riches have been proclaimed throughout the money centres. The capitalist in Montreal, Toronto, New York, Chicago or any other eastern centre has read and knows something about the wonderful possibilities of the district. It took time and money and hard work to disseminate this knowledge. Is it not time to make generally known the further fact that the metropolis of this great mining section is Greenwood? The great trouble is that while the business men of Greenwood are enterprising enough in connection with their own affairs, a healthy public spirit is lacking. Board of trade meetings are no longer held because of lack of interest. No organized effort, is being made to keep the city prominently before the public and the majority of the business men who do take any interest in public affairs confine their attention to purely local affairs that are of little importance. Greenwood has grown from a village to a healthy city. There are a hundred ways by which the interests of the city could be

served. North and south, east and west new mining districts are being opened up. Is a vigorous policy of expansion being pursued in connection with this trade and are Greenwood business men as aggressive as of yore in securing all the business. The other day a prominent mining man who is working a property fifty miles from Greenwood informed the writer that he bought everything in Greenwood. His reason for doing this was that he could get goods here at a lower rate than elsewhere and he was always sure to get what he wanted because merchants carried large stocks. Every mining man should be taught to recognize the same fact.

Then the business men ought to organize to watch the railway company when the line is completed. One business man has but little influence in unravelling freight tangles but a strong organization has. Railways have a convenient habit of making discriminating rates where possible and the very best of them will stand watching. The business men of Greenwood should see that they get as good rates as business men in other cities and better if possible. Many suggestions might be offered regarding the matter of promoting the best interests of the city. The great desideratum is the cultivation of a healthy public spirit by the citizens.

It is wonderful how speedy bad news travels. A malicious individual sent out the news that the new Boundary Creek channel had overflowed its banks and a portion of the city had been inundated. There was no truth in the report, but nearly every paper copied it. The Boundary Creek channel has so far been able to take care of the high water, and with still further contemplated improvements will be proof against the highest water.

The flotation of the Sunset group in Montreal will bring Boundary creek into still greater favor in the Canadian metropolis. With property of undoubted merit and officials who stand high in the financial world the Montreal Boundary Creek company will do much towards directing greater attention to the mineral riches of this district.

IT TAKES people to make a city. Men with plenty of confidence and push can make a city anywhere. That the people of Greenwood have the necessary confidence and push is demonstrated by the fact that a better and more expensive class of buildings is being erected here than in any city of a similar size in the Dominion.

FORTUNATELY thieves are often not possessed of sufficient temerity to rob Her Majesty's mails in Canada. Would it not be well for the authorities to inquire whether the reign of economy has not emboldened the robbers. Economy in policemen is often expensive.

A FATAL ACCIDENT.

Hugh McDermott Drowned in the Similkameen River on Friday Last.

Word reached this city that on Friday evening Hugh McDermott was drowned in the Similkameen river on the trail between Princeton and Copper mountain, at a point about two miles above Princeton. McDermott and two companions were at the ford and he and one of his companions crossed the river successfully, although it was running rapidly, being high in its banks from the effects of recent thaws and the consequent melting of snow. When they got on the opposite bank they looked back and saw that the third horse refused to enter the water, and desiring to help their companion out of his trouble they started to recross the stream to his assistance. Both horses lost their footing and succeeding in unseating their riders, McDermott lost his hold of his horse and was immediately swept down the rapids, and although an excellent swimmer and a strong man the current was too strong for him and he soon disappeared beneath the icy waters. His companion clung to his horse and safely reached the shore. McDermott's horse, after a hard struggle, landed on terra firma.

When the snow in the mountains is rapidly thawing the Similkameen river is a raging torrent, the foaming of which at the most favorable points is a very perilous undertaking, horses often being carried of their feet by the swiftly moving water, in which case the rider's only hope is to cling to the animal and rely upon it to bring him safely to the land.

Realizing the necessity of a bridge on the Princeton-Copper mountain trail those most concerned had applied to the government for the construction of a bridge and this had been built and in use two days when the fatal accident occurred. It is palpable therefore, that McDermott and his companions were not aware of the existence of this bridge or they should not have attempted the dangerous ford. Under these circumstances the unfortunate affair is all the more deplorable.

McDermott is said to have been a native of the Maritime provinces and has been in the Similkameen district for several years. He was the owner of several claims on Copper mountain and had properties in other portions of the country. His brother is a resident of the camp at Kennedy mountain and was there at the time of the accident.—Rossland Miner.

The Similkameen Country.
