

ON THE ORO DENORO IN SUMMIT

Camp-Face of Drift at the 220 Foot Level is in Solid Ore-A Trail Wanted to Franklin Camp-The No. 7 Mine in Central Camp.

The writer visited the Oro Denoro working shaft was being sunk under the superintendence of Dave O'Neill. Mr. O'Neill stated that drifting would begin at the 220 foot level which he expected to reach in 20 days. The statement was then made that the drift would surely encounter ore as the sur- The ore is a quartz, carrying galena, parallel ore belts that ran at right angles to the direction of the proposed drift. That statement has been more than verified. The drift which is now in about 80 feet, has run into the most striking body of ore that has yet been exposed in the Boundary Creek country. The whole face of the drift is in solid copper ore. A large block was taken to Eholt by Mr. O'Neill, and it created considerable excitement among railway men who have extensively purchased King Mining company shares. At once several interested parties went to the mine and examined the drift. They confirm the statement made by Mr. O'Neill. There does not appear to be an inch of waste in the similar in character to that already found on the Oro Denoro, giving good gold values and running high in copper. This drift will be continued and will cut through two or three other ledges that can be traced on the sur-

The citizens of Grand Forks are very properly taking considerable interest in Franklin camp, up the North Fork of the Kettle river. The camp is nearly 60 miles from Grand Forks, but the merchants are reaching out for the trade. They succeeded in inducing the provincial government to baild a trail to connect with the wagon road. That the camp possesses merit is evidenced by the fact that Henry White, the well iown mining man, nas congeu prop erties there. Greenwood took very little interest in this new camp, because few realized that it could be made tributary to the city. A well known prospector is the authority for the statement that Franklin camp is not over thirty miles from Greenwood and that a trail could be built for a comparatively small amount. There is a good pass from the head of Long Lake to Franklin camp. This route has a much easier grade than that from Grand Forks. If the trail were built, it would shorten the distance one-half and the trade would actually be diverted to this city. The matter is well worth the investigation of the Board of Trade.

Business Transacted at the Regular Meeting Monday Evening.

At the regular meeting of the city council held Monday evening Mayor Hardy presided, and Ald. Sutherland, Cameron and Fisher were present. J. F. Junkins, of the Manufacturers Life Insurance company, wrote regarding the sale of additional depentures. R. B. Kerr, on behalf of W. S. Fletcher, applied for a license for a theater. The council decided to grant the license, leaving the question of the sale of liquors to the board of commissioners. J. D. Ronald, of fire engine fame, wanted to sell one to the city but his letter was filed.

Mr. Nicol, of Silver street, was anxious to ascertain what the council intended to do with his building if the street were widened. He was advised to consult a lawyer.

Some weeks ago the council called for sealed tenders for gum boots and mackinaw coats for the firemen. Tenders were received from several firms, that of Rendell & Co. being the lowest. Instead of awarding the contract the mayor appointed a committee to get the best bargain possible. The appointed committee is Ald. Sutherland, Fisher and Cameron.

A resolution endorses the construction of the C. & W. railway through the city and extending to them "such privileges as to streets and alleyways, crossings and otherwise as we may by law be entitled to do," was placed before the council. Advertising A City.

The question of profitable advertis ing is occupying the attention of different Boards of Trade. Recently the Victoria Board of Trade discussed the matter which lead the Colonist to offer

the following very sensible remarks: "There was some discussion at the Board of Trade yesterday as to the best means of advertising Victoria. The subject is a very important one. Doubtless any kind of advertising is good, provided it reaches the people who want to learn about the city. We are quite in favor of the proposal that a a pamphlet descriptive or the city and its many and varied advantages shall be prepared for the use of the agentgeneral in London, but the members of the board will not, we hope, be offended, when we say that they appear to lose sight of the fundamental principle which governs successful advertising. Most of them are familiar with the great New York papers, and and know that advertisements appear on pages where no one could possibly see them by accident. They are seen only by those who look for them. This is what ought to be the dominant idea in advertising, namely, the advertiser ought to have in mind the people who will be looking for his advertisement, not the chance customer who may happen to run across his advertisement or whose attention is drawn to it because it is "top column next to reading matter." There is not much use in advertising snowshoes in a community where there is never any snow. The people whom business men ought to seek to reach by advertisements are the people who look into the newspapers for information contained in advertisements. One member of the board said that he would give more for one editorial than for three times as much advertising; but this, though complimentary to the editorial, is not sound from a business point of view. It is not the advertising of the city as a whole that pays, but what the individual advertiser tells about his own business. If the merchants of Victoria supported the papers as liberally as the merchants of Seattle support the papers printed there, if the Victoria papers were enabled to print page after page of commercial advertising as those papers do, this city would be

better known everywhere than it now

is, for the papers could then afford to push their circulation as they cannot

now. It is very easy to find fault with

the newspapers, but do the men in charge of other lines of business in

Victoria feel called upon do business at

a loss? They certainly do not. Then why should they expect the newspapers

"The best way to advertise a city is to advertise in its newspapers, not by inserting write-ups and circulating a lot of extra copies, but by steady and continuous publication of abundant attractive commercial advertising. But there is much that can be done in other ways. Much can be said in the press and otherwise to make the city known. But we tell the people frankly that it is a thankless piece of work to do it in this city. The Colonist has printed hundreds of columns of matter setting forth the advantages of Victoria, and scores of columns enlarging upon the advantages and resources of Vancouver Island. Does any one fell called upon to speak a word of encouragement? Well, hardly. Here is a sample of the things that are said: There was an editorial reference a few days ago to a certain mine. The only comment that came to the ears of the Colonist was a remark, made in all seriousness, that it was wrong for the paper to lend its aid to any man to get rid of his mining stock. A few weeks ago there was a strong local reference to some mines on the west coast. The only comment this called forth was from a gentlemen who stopped the editor on the street and criticized very severely the policy of permitting wildcat projects being exploited in the press. And so it goes. Then the Board of Trade meets and spends an hour and a half in telling the Colonist that it ought to do this, that and the other thing."

C. P. R. MAGNATES.

A LARGE PARTY OF RAILWAY MEN

Make an Official Tour of Inspection of the New Railway-President Shaughnessy Speaks About Boundary Creek-The Gentlemen in the Party.

The C. P. R. officials from the big sachem down, came and saw Greenwood and went away satisfied that it was by long odds the liveliest, most enterprising city and the commercial and mining center of the Boundary Creek district. A special train brought in a valuable cargo on Wednesday evening. Had one of Porter Bros'. big trestles given away or a flaw cropped up in Pat Welch's rock work, it would be impossible to imagine what might have happened the C. P. R., because on board were nearly all the men and brains that so successfully conduct its enormous operations. They took no chances, however, and brought along with them Tim Foley, Peter Larsen, and J. W. Stuart as sureties that the journey would be made in safety.

Included in the party were T. G Shaughnessy, president of the Canadian Pacific Railway company; Wm. Whyte of Winnipeg, manager of the system in the west; L. A. Hamilton. Winnipeg, the gentleman who straightens out all townsite difficulties and looks after all the C. P. R. lands; H. C. Cambie, chief engineer of the Western division; Geo. McL. Brown, executive agent for British Columbia, whose special mission is to pour oil upon the troubled waters and make everybody pleased with the C. P. R. whether they want to or not; R. Marpole, genera! superintendent of the Western division; W. F. Tye, chief engineer of the Columbia and Western; T. G. Sullivan, his assitant; A. C. Dennis, one of his staff; P. A. Peterson, chief engineer of the entire system; Capt. Troup, who runs the company's steamboats in Kootenay; T. A. Gutelius, general manager of the Columbia and Western; W. H. Aldridge, general manager of the Trail smelter; H. S. Holt, the well known Montreal railway contractor; and A. W. Ross, of Columbia.

The party were met by the C. P. R. engineers and H. Wilgress at the station and driven to the Clarendon. where dinner was served. Afterwards they visited the Greenwood club and met several of the citizens. They returned on Thursday morning. Mr. Shaughenessy will visit to the coast before returning east.

From a newspaper man's standpoint the only fault that could be found with the party was its plethora of railway magnates. Any one of them was worth a column and advertising space is so valuable in these prosperous days. So the Times representative summoned all the Scotch courage at his command and tackled the president for copy.

The task was not a difficult one. ome one has aptly said that the greatest man in Canada today is Thos. G. Shaughnessy. If a man's greatness can be measured by his power and influence, this statement is not exaggerated. The C. P. R. is Canada's greatest enterprise and its president and managing director cannot but have the great influence. I If Mr. Shaughnessy were not at the head of the C. P. R. he would still be a great man. By his own pluck and ability he rose from an ordinary railway man to the magnate that he is today. His rapid progress in the railway world has not spoilt him. He is still as affable and courteons as ever, and was quite willing to talk to a newspaper man!

"I am well satisfied with my trip,' said he. "When I thought of the large amount of money we were spending in this Boundary Creek country I had some doubt regarding the wisdom of venturing so much in a new district, but after becoming more intimately acquainted with your wonderful resources I have every confidence that the investment by the C. P. R. will eventually turn out a profitable one. We are showing our confidence in the district by building branch lines to all the cams; something we never did before.'

"Have you arrived at any decision, Mr. Shaughnessy, regarding the extension of the road from Midway westward?"

"No, we will not build for some time," was the reply. "We have already expended nearly five million dollars in this district and we are anxious secure

If such be the case we will not engage in the smelting industry. We do not ! care to build smelters unless forced to

"Is there any truth in the rumor that yon intend to build to Republic?" "None whatever."

Mr. Shaughnessy referred to the wild country through which the railway passed and also to the Corbin charter.

"Why didn't you buy the Corbin road, Mr. Shaughnessy; too patriotic?'

"Yes, if I do say it myself. Our policy in this western country in the construction of new roads, is to build up Canadian industries. If we went over to the other side we would no longer be a Canadian road."

"You will admit, Mr. Shaughnessy, that the agitation for the Corbin road induced the C. P. R. to build more

'No, we would have built any way. tell you what it did do. It cost the C. P. R. \$1,000,000. We would have secured a \$10,000 a mile subsidy had the Corbin charter not come up. I think the people of the district will be better served by a Canadian railway than by an American road. We intend o do everything possible to encourage the development of your mines. What we want is tonnage. We want to haul large quantities of ore and large quantities of supplies into the district."

The Times representative was prepared to admit that the C. P. R. could do a great deal for the district.

"I am glad to think that you and others in Boundary Creek have reformed. You gave us considerable trouble two years ago."

"I have not reformed. People are so constituted that they must kick against something, and a big railway company is a most convenient target."

"You are quite right," replied Mr. Shaughnessy, "and it is a good thing of these areas approximating 10,000 ASSAY VALUES.—A great many for the railway company. They are for the railway company. They are anxious to serve the best interests of the public and properly directed criticism often draws attention to matters that might otherwise be overlooked. We intend to give a good service here daily trains will be started to Grand Forks next week and to Greenwood just as soon as the road is in good condition. The branch lines will be rushed so that the camps may be reached at an early date."

"Are you going to give a uniform freight rate in the Boundary Creek country, Mr. Shaughnessy?"

"Well, it will be only proper to add mileage.'

"But couldn't you make the same through rate for all the Boundary Creek towns?"

"We'll see about that. We want to make a little money here. It should be our turn now."

Mr. Hamilton with Mr. Wood and Mr. Wilgress considered several matters relating to the townsite and the C. P. R. interests here. Mr. Hamilton apologized for the joke about "Le holt" and placed the responsibility on an innocent Winnipeg newspaper man.

Mr. Marpole is interested with Mr. Barnard in the ownership of the Windsor. They looked over the ruins and decided to build a larger and hetter Windsor.

Mr. Hamilton tells the following story regarding Mr. Chipman, the Hudson Bay company commissioner. He accompanied Mr. Hamilton on his last visit here. It was the night the Greenwood club was opened. Next morning was Sunday and the party had to leave for Penticton. Mr. Chipman was anxious to invest in Greenwood real estate but could find no one that would sell. He didn't know whether it was their religious scurples that kept the real estate men off the street or the club opening the night previous. "That could never have happened in Columbia" concluded Mr. Hamilton. "You can't get away from the real estate men there."

The provincial parliament presented the British Columbia Southern company with an enormous land grant, including valuable coal areas in the Crow's Nest Pass. Col. Baker and his syndicate succeeded in selling their rights to the Canadian Pacific Railway company. They secured a big cash subsidy from the Dominion government and built the Crow's Nest road.

In the meantime F. Auguste Heinze secured a bonus from the provincial government to build a smelter at Trail. He also built a railway from Trail to Rossland and secured a charter from the provincial government to build to Penticton. A land grant of 20,000 acres per mile was to be given on the completion of this road. Heinze haunted the lobby of the provincial legislature for several sessions. He apparently could get anything he asked from the provincial government. An effort was made to secure him a cash subsidy as well as a land grant, but the legislature would not consent to this and Heinze left Victoria for Ottawa. Here he lobbied for a big cash subsidy, but he was defeated by rival railway schemers. Dr. Milne, of Victoria, and others started the Victoria, Vancouver and Eastern project to build a railway from Victoria to Lethbridge through the Boundary Creek country. They went down to Ottawa and tried to convince the government that they and not Heinze were entitled to put their hands in the Fresh Oysters In any Style public purse. While his silver tongued orators were thundering against the C. P. R., he was in Montreal negotiating with the C. P. R. officials for the sale of his interests in British Columbia. He succeeded and the smelter and railway passed under the control of the big railway corporation. The C. P. R. company were preparing to renew the request for a big | Rest... cash subsidy when D. C. Corbin went down to Ottawa and stated that if he were granted a charter, he would build a railway into the Boundary Creek country without a cash subsidy or a land grant. This unusual and unheard of proposition so enraged the C. P. R. officials that they used all their energies in defeating the man who dared to establish such a foolish precedent in Canada. Then began the hottest railway fight that was ever waged in parliament. Corbin was backed by public opinion, the Grand Trunk and any influence the American railways had at Ottawa. The C. P. R. was too powerful at Ottawa, however, and after three months of continuous fighting they carried the day, but not until Sir Wm. Van Horn had made a solemn promise to begin the immediate construction of a road to Boundary Creek. This promise was fulfilled so promptly that in a little over a year after work began the railway engine was seen in Greenwood.

Now that the railway is here most people will admit that it was built almost as soon as the development of the district warranted. Still it is impossible to disguise the fact that men of means were prepared to take chances in the district and invest their money in railways. There is no good reason why they should not have been allowed

to do so. There is too much red tape about railway legislation in Canada. It offers a premium to the professional lobbyist and the purchaser of votes. The man who wants to build a railway should not be forced to spend six months and several thousand dollars down at Ottawa. He should be told to go ahead and build.


