OVER \$7,000 TO THE TON

Don Pedro Strikes High Grade Ore.
Other Mining Notes

While drifting on the Elkhorn Monday the richest ledge of high grade ore ever uncovered in Canada was struck. Specimens are on exhibit in P. George's window and at the Arlington hotel. The specimens weigh from 50 to 200 pounds, and carry gold and silver values of over \$3.50 a pound. This recent strike means that the Elkhorn mine is classed amongst the best of them in America, and also means a great deal to the Boundless Boundary. Is it any wonder that Phil Macdonald and James Sutherland, the owners, commenced the New Year looking happy and prosperous.

Don Pedro Looks Good

At a depth of 30 feet on the Don Pedro, in Providence camp, rich high grade ore was struck this week. The work thus far done proves that the Chicago and B. C. Mining company has a good thing, and before long the Don Pedro will be another Boundary shipper. H. H. Shallenberger, the manager, is elated over the strike.

The year 1903 was a fairly good one, viewed from a business standpoint. The volume of business was about the same as in 1902, but it was on a better basis. The output of the mines was supplemented by the product of sawmills, and the output of the two industries was an increase over that of 1902. Let everyone in the Boundary pull together to make 1904 the banner year for this district.

The Provincial Mining Association needs money. That's nothing. So does the Times.

This being leap year Miss Canada is going to propose to Wilfrid to make it one term more.

Even moons swear off. Next month there will not be a full moon. This only happens once in nineteen years.

The city of Greenwood should own and operate an electric light plant. It would be a paying investment for the city.

A 50-story skyscraper is planned in New York. This is two stories higher than the one contemplated by the Times this year.

What the city of Greenwood needs this year is a mayor with brains and an energetic and progressive board of aldermen.

The provincial house will re-assemble next Monday. Fellow pilgrims, let us pray that something will be done for this fair province.

Wouldn't this burn you? There were nearly seven billion cigars and over three billion cigarettes used by the American people last year.

General manager Charles M. Hayes of the Grand Trunk railway says: "The Grand Trunk Pacific will certainly be built." That settles it now.

King Alfonso of Spain is to be married to his cousin. It would be better for all concerned, if the kid king, instead of getting married, would go off somewhere and die.

The Nelson Tribune says that ex-governor Mackintosh of Rossland will get the nomination for Kootenay district if he will accept it. He might get the nomination, but will never be elected. Mack isn't even deuce high in Kootenay district.

John Alexander Dowie, the Prophet, says he isn't the son of his father, but the elder Dowie insists that he is the father of his son. How in the world is the public to decide a dispute of this character? Better put in your time figuring on Ann's age.

Hon. A. G. Blair has been appointed chairman of the railway commission. As the Tories have been hailing him lately—as the greatest railway expert in the world, they will doubtless be delighted to see Andy appointed to the chairmanship of the railway commission.

Hon. James Sutherland, minister of public works, says that Port Simpson has been definitely decided upon as the Pacific terminus of the new transcontinental road. Jim speaks confidently of the satisfactory prosecution of the Grand Trunk Pacific scheme.

John Houston of Nelson intends, after the legislature adjourns, to leave Nelson for good. Mr. Houston has done more for Nelson and the Kootenay country than any 417 men in it. The people of Nelson and district will realize that they lost a true friend when he quits the camp.

It is not generally known that Sir Wilfrid Laurier, premier of Canada and leader of the liberal party, is entitled to a medal for his services to his country during the Fenian raid, when he shouldered arms in the Arthabaskaville volunteers. Sir Wilfrid has shown in many practical forms his loyalty to his country.

The Freeman's Labor Journal now appears as the Spokane Record. The change is a good one, as the former name was a hoodoo. Since T. S. Heskett became editor and manager he has made many changes, and today the paper is a welcome exchange, and should be read by every union man this far north. It is ably edited and well printed.

The people of the United States, thanks to their "prosperity-producing" high tariff, have had to economize in their expenses and when people have to economize they naturally begin with their amusements. Harper's Weekly is authority for the statement that since the beginning of the theatrical season no less than 180 companies have had to disband, and 3000 actors are out of employment. But here in low tariff Canada, people are not retrenching any of their expenditures upon amusements or anything else.

The B. C. Mining Review published in London, across the fog pond, contains the following, on intelligent Englishmen. One day this week one of our staff called at the London office of a steamship company ostensibly trading with Canada, and inquired which Canadian port they intended to favor this winter. To his surprise, he was informed by the secretary that their line was running to a United States port, as all Canadian ports are ice-bound in winter. This is a typical case of the gross ignorance about Canada obtaining in many commercial circles in London, but we scarcely expected to find it in a shipping office.

The British government has appointed a commission to inquire into the alleged physical deterioration of the working class. The subject was brought up in parliament on the statement of the secretary of the board of education, which declares that 60,000 children now attending the schools are physically unfit. The director of the army medical service reports that one out of every three offered recruits is unfit, yet the standard has been lowered there several times in 50 years. Insufficient food, hard work and miserable lodgings are having the effect of dwarfing the man. The people produce enough, but it is taken from them to support the nobility and the capitalist class.

Big Bill Galliher, M. P., is to be congratulated on the success of his efforts in having justice done to the men who were beaten out of their wages on the Lardeau railway. He took up the case of the men employed on the road who lost their wages by the failure of the contractors. Mr. Galliher contended that, as the dominion government subsidized the line, it was their duty to protect the men employed on it. The government endorsed Mr. Galliher's view, and took steps to give effect to it. The C. P. R. opposed it tooth and nail, employing the best legal talent. But Mr. Galliher won out, and the government will pay the wages and stop the amount from the subsidy to the company.

MODEL GLASGOW

Proving That Public Ownership Is
Practical and Profitable

Ever since Glasgow undertook the
task of enlarging the Clyde river,
making it 300 feet wide and 30 feet
deep, instead of 200 feet wide and 4
feet deep, at a cost of \$50,000,000, it
has been one of the most progressive
cities. Some of its enterprises are as
follows:

1. It bought and pulled down forty-
six blocks of slums and built 2519
comfortable homes for working people.
 2. It owns and manages seven model
lodging houses, charging 7, 8, and 9
cents a night for lodgers.
 3. It built a family home for widowers
who have small children. Last year
110 widowers with 217 children were
lodged here.
 4. It bought out the private water
company and reduced the water rate
from 24 cents per thousand gallons to
8 cents.
 5. It bought out the gas companies
and reduced the price of gas to 52 cents
per thousand feet. It spent \$12,000,000
and made a profit of \$2,000,000.
 6. It bought the street car system,
doubled the business, and cleared over
a million dollars' profits last year.
 7. It established a public telephone
system with a 2-cent rate.
 8. It has opened nineteen children's
playgrounds and set aside 1055 acres
for public parks.
- It has done all this and at the same
time reduced the rate of taxation, pro-
viding that public ownership is a
practical and profitable way to settle
many city problems.

A Modern Wrong

"A girl got drunk—shocking!" This
is a sample of the exclamations we hear
when an occurrence of this kind hap-
pens—and everyone is ready to tear
down her reputation as speedily as pos-
sible. She will go to some gathering
and she will be a wall flower, shunned
by all good (?) people, although she
was a rattle-snake. The world be-
lieves that if a girl gets drunk, she is
a bad girl, and she will be shunned
and she will not touch her, and
then lock themselves in a man's arms,
said man being hardly able to stand
upon his feet from intoxication, and
whirl in a giddy waltz and think she is
being honored. For example we will
take a young girl who has been led
from the paths of right and virtue; let
her enter a ball room and some of the
so-called nice people will get up and
leave the room and declare they will
not stay where such people are allowed,
and perhaps at the same time they are
dancing with the man who was the
cause of the girl's downfall. Where
did such a thing that govern society
originate? Who gave the man the
privilege to do as he pleased and com-
pels the woman to do as he pleases?
Who laid down the law that a woman
should be kicked out of society for an
offense that would not be noticed in a

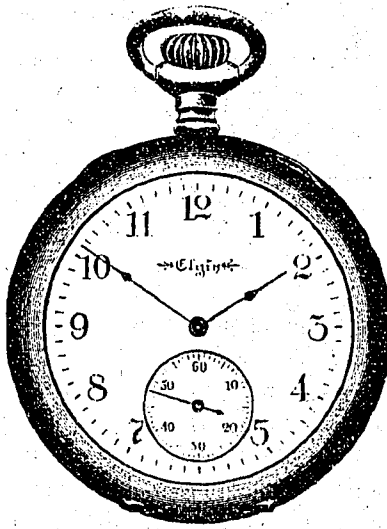
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
