MAY BUY INTEREST

Palouse Delegates Inspect the Strathmore.

ARE FAVORABLY IMPRESSED

Belief Expressed That Greenwood Has a Great Future.

The fate of the Greenwood high grade belt has reached the Palouse.

J. H. Richardson of Colfax, Wash., and James Gorman of Spokane arrived here Monday for the purpose of negotiating for the purchase of a large interest in the stock of the Strathmore mine. It is understood that they represent a syndicate composed of residents of the Palouse and a number of Spokane people. An announcement of the closing of deal is expected to follow the return of the visitors, who left here Wednesday after inspecting several high grade properties and the big mines at Phoenix. Both gentlemen, who were accompanied by Fred Knight, of Grand Forks, expressed themselves as amazed at the mineral wealth of Greenwood and the Boundary generally.

"We had heard a great deal about the country," said Mr. Richardson, "but came here unprepared to witness such enormous development. Our visit has proved a perfect revelation. We realize now that the Boundary is one of the richest mining regions on the continent. There is money here both for the capitalist and for the man with moderate means."

"We were especially taken with the high grade properties, every one of which seems to be a dividend-payer or on a self-sustaining basis. What the Providence and Elkhorn have accomplished indicates the possibilities of the Strathmore. We inspected a six inch lead containing free gold, selected our own samples and obtained very satisfactory results. It won't be our fault if we don't convince our friends that Greenwood camp is the place to make profitable mining investments."

"Yes, and our trip, I hope, will lead to other deals," added Mr. Gorman. "If this camp were on the American side people would be falling over each other to buy your rich bonanzas."

WANT MORE LIGHT.

North End Residents Petition City Council.

At last night's meeting of the city council a petition from ratepayers in the north end of town asking for an extension of the street lighting service from the terminus at Wood street to the Elkhorn brewery, was presented. After discussion the petition was referred to the fire and light committee with instructions to report next week.

The slag pots at the Mother Lode smelter will shortly be hauled by an electric motor, thus doing away with the steam locomotive.

The smelter returns from the first carload shipment of Last Chance ore ran one-third higher than was anticipated by the management.

The Great Northern extension from Grand Forks reached the lower town in Phoenix on Monday. The construction of the trestle across gulch is so far advanced that trains will likely be able to cross tonight or Saturday. The arrival of the first locomotive was hailed by the tooting of the whistles at the big mines.

Mrs. J. R. Brown and child, accompanied by the former's mother, Mrs. Whitmarsh, left yesterday for Spokane where they will spend the winter visiting relatives.

Jack Northey, formerly foreman at the Jewel mine, died at Atlin a fortnight ago. He left here two years ago and subsequently visited England. He was an old timer in the Boundary.

AN AMBULANCE.

TAX SALE.

Arrears of \$20,000 Were Paid During the Year.

There was a small attendance at the tax sale held at the city hall on Wednesday. G. B. Taylor, city clerk, took up the list in alphabetical order, disposing of about thirty lots for approximately \$1,500 cash. Property owners have one year to effect redemption but the recent buyers will have to be repaid with interest at the rate of six per cent per annum. The tax sale was adjourned for a fortnight when the unsold lots will again be offered for sale by auction. Those disposed of the other day are properties in the business section. Wednesday's auction was the first tax sale ever held in Greenwood. The date having been well advertised property owners who had the funds, settled promptly, the arrears of taxes paid in during the year exceeding \$20,000. On Tuesday a non-resident property owner forwarded \$3000 to the city treasurer in settlement of old scores.

DINED EMPLOYEES.

B. C. Copper Company Entertains Smeltersmen Christmas Day.

The British Columbia Copper Co. entertained its smelter employees to dinner at the Windsor on Sunday. The social affair was in the nature of a "continuous performance," as the members of both shifts arrived at different hours. The first guests sat down at 3 p. m. and five hours elapsed before the last smelterman had left the table. The bill of fare was excellent, reflecting great credit on Harry Coutes, the manager of the dining room. J. E. McAllister, supt. of the smelter, and over fifty employees participated in the good cheer.

The thoughtfulness and hospitality of the company was duly appreciated by all the guests.

TUNNEL AND STOPE

Two furnaces at the Boundary Falls smelter are treating 700 tons daily.

Le Roi No. 2 last month shipped 3000 tons of ore to the Mother Lode Smelter.

Although the figures are not complete shipments of high grade ore from this camp in 1904 will probably exceed 1800 tons, valued at over \$225,000.

The shareholders of the Royal Victoria Gold Mining Co. will meet here on Jan. 9th to authorize the sale of their property, the Golden Eagle mine, north fork of Kettle river.

A diamond drill hole rarely goes straight for the point aimed at; it invariably "drifts" or deviates from the line. In drilling a horizontal hole the drill will almost invariably drift upwards.

The Montana output of copper for 1904, it is estimated, will aggregate 265,000,000 pounds, of which the Butte district will be credited with 260,000,000 pounds, an increase in the production of the Butte mines of about 15,000,000 pounds over the preceding year. The production of the various Amalgamated companies will amount to 195,000,000; the United Copper, 35,000,000; Clark, 24,000,000, and miscellaneous producers, 6,000,000 pounds. The increase is due to a greater amount of ore mined than in 1903, the mines of Amalgamated and United Copper companies having been in almost continuous operation throughout the year, only slight interruptions having marked the business, whereas last year there were several general and extensive shut-downs. There has been no change in the values of ores mined. It is estimated that with the additions of the Pittsburg & Montana company and the Lexington group of mines, to the list of producers next year, the copper output of the Butte district will be fully 350,000,000 pounds. The Amalgamated Copper company has done very little development work in its mines during the present year. The shaft of the Anaconda mine has been made 200 feet deeper and is now down 2400 feet.

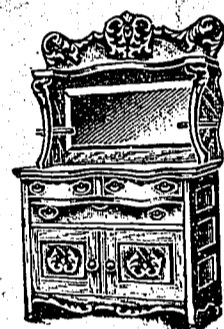

Any male or female, being a British subject of the full age of twenty-one years who

a. Is the owner of real estate of the assessed value of not less than one hundred dollars, or

b. Is the representative, being a resident British subject duly authorized by the directors of an incorporated company, which is the assessed owner of lands, or of improvements of lands, situate within the municipality, or

c. Is the holder of a trades license, the annual fee of which is not less than five dollars, or

d. 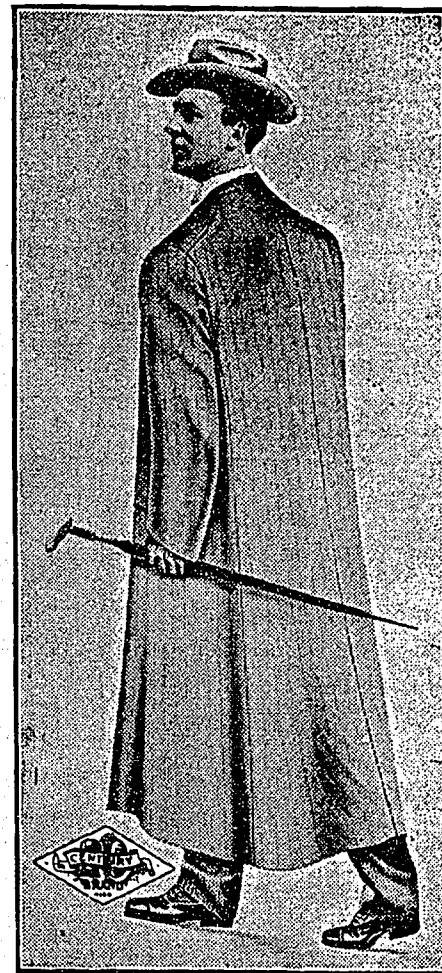

STABBING AFFRAY.

Railway Man at Eholt Carved by an Unknown Individual.

The provincial police are hunting for an unknown man who committed a murderous assault upon Wm. Gibson, a railway employee, at Eholt last week. Gibson received an ugly cut from a knife across the cheek and his chest and left hand were also badly slashed. His condition was quite alarming until his removal to the hospital here. The wounded man, who is still weak from the loss of blood, left the hospital on Thursday of this week and announced his intention of co-operating with the police in bringing his assailant to justice. From all accounts there is a woman in the case. Gibson says he had been wrongfully accused of having insulted an Eholt landlady and that interested parties hired a man to do him up. He also claims he would be able to identify his assailant. According to the story related here Gibson hasn't any enemies. He was employed on the Great Northern at Grand Forks until a month ago when he went to Eholt to hunt for work.

BELL TO HANG.

An Ottawa despatch says that the case of Joshua Bell, under sentence of execution at Kamloops on January 13, was discussed by the cabinet. He was convicted of murder at Greenwood and in view of the judge's report and the man's record in the United States, there is not much doubt that Bell will pay the penalty for his crime. Bell, it will be remembered, murdered a woman at Phoenix last fall.

A later despatch added that the government has decided to let the law take its course.

A NEW DEPARTMENT.

The administration of the Interior department by Hon. Clifford Sifton has earned the encomiums of even his political opponents. Success was largely due to the fact that Mr. Sifton is one of the strongest and ablest men in political life. He took the precaution to surround himself with capable assistants who thoroughly understood the requirements of the West. The retirement of J. A. Smart, the deputy minister, will be regretted by western men but they will find consolation in the fact that his successor, W. W. Cory, has the ability and the knowledge to fittingly wear his mantle. No man knows the West better than Mr. Cory and none more enthusiastic regarding its future. Notwithstanding the splendid record of Mr. Sifton and his assistants, the time has arrived when the department should be divided and placed in charge of two ministers and two assistants. Mr. Smart practically killed himself with hard work. The administration of public lands, Indian reserves, and all details incident thereto and an energetic immigration policy should keep one minister busy. Mining and the geological departments should be created into a department in charge of a member from British Columbia and that minister should be Hon. Senator Templeman.

The year now drawing to a close has proved an epoch-making one in the Boundary district. It is safe to say that no other mining region has experienced the same growth and development in the corresponding period. The ore output will considerably exceed eight hundred thousand tons. A significant feature has been the increased attention devoted to the high grade properties in the vicinity of Greenwood. Claims that had been neglected have not only become self-sustaining but now belong in the category of dividend-payers. The people of Greenwood may well rejoice over the bright outlook for the com-

ing year. Twelve high grade properties are tributary to this city, and indications point to the number being doubled ere six months elapse. The payroll now represents 116 men, the majority of whom reside within the city limits. In reviewing the possibilities of the mining industry in this district other important considerations should not be overlooked. It is safe to assume that with the enlargements contemplated or under way by the three smelters, the treatment capacity before the end of 1905 will have been found to exceed 1,500,000 tons.

The C. P. R. with commendable enterprise is carrying out a gigantic irrigation project in the foot hills of the Rockies. It is intended to bring under cultivation an area of three million acres, lying east of Calgary, by an artificial supply of water from the Bow river. The land lies on both sides of the main line. The irrigation canal, which will tap the river near Calgary, will be about twenty miles in length and will have a width of sixty feet and a depth of ten feet. The first section of the work will include the construction of this canal with about one hundred miles of secondary distributing canals. This will irrigate 3,000,000 acres for agricultural purposes, and will open up 500,000 acres for grazing and dairy farming. The expenditure involved will exceed four and one half million dollars.

The people of several northern and western states are quite aroused over the exodus to the Canadian Northwest and already the question of stringent methods for the suppression of the movement is being discussed in the press. Minnesota is especially alive to the necessity of keeping its farmers at home. The state authorities are proposing to drain two million acres of swamp lands and sell them on stringent conditions of settlement. The efforts to stem the tide of immigration to Canada will prove unavailing. Our vast heritage remained neglected for nearly two decades after the completion of the C. P. R., but now the tide has turned and nothing can divert home seekers from our fertile prairies, or ranching lands. The construction of the new trans-continental line will open up new regions quite as attractive as those already made accessible by existing railways.

The provincial legislature meets on Thursday, Feb. 9th. A McBride organ reassures us that if the opposition should wisely

decide not to cause delay by useless obstruction or by frivolous attempts at blocking the government measures, the session should be comparatively brief and the legislation enacted be promptly put into effect. This gratuitous advice is not likely to be followed in view of the demoralization which exists among the ranks of the government supporters. It has at last dawned upon the socialists, to whom Mr. McBride is indebted for his tenure of office, that no community of spirit exists between them and the conservatives. Mr. McBride's fate will probably be settled at the socialist convention to be held at Vancouver tomorrow.

A writer in the Nelson News advocates the employment of Chinese labor in British Columbia metalliferous mines, pointing to the alleged success of the experiment now being carried out in South Africa. He argues that the cost of labor is retarding the development of our mineral resources. It is quite apparent that there is a vast dissimilarity between conditions here and in South Africa. This is primarily a white man's country and far better would it be to witness the industry languish rather than see the rights of the self-respecting Canadian or American miner ruthlessly sacrificed to benefit Asiatics or absentee capitalists.

A novel scheme for colonizing along the route of the Grand Trunk Pacific has been submitted to the Dominion government. Its author, a veteran railway contractor, believes that it will be difficult to build the new railway unless some steps are taken to supply the market. His plan is to import a few thousand men from the British Isles and by way of inducement, guarantee to each a couple of years steady work at a stipulated rate of wages, and at the expiration of the job a section or half-section of land at merely nominal cost.

Now that the final returns in all the federal constituencies of the province are to hand a fair estimate can be made of the relative standing of the liberal and conservative parties in the provincial constituencies. Out of the 34 constituencies in the province 29 have gone liberal, 4 conservative and 1 socialist. Judging by seats, the liberals have a still higher standing, as the ridings won by them represent 37 members out of a house of 42. The outlook for the McBride government is anything but encouraging.

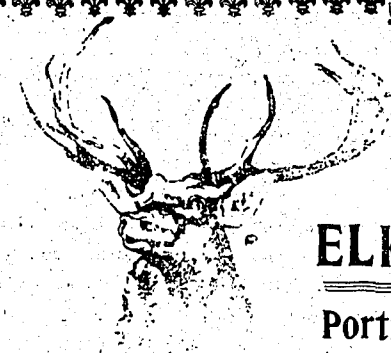

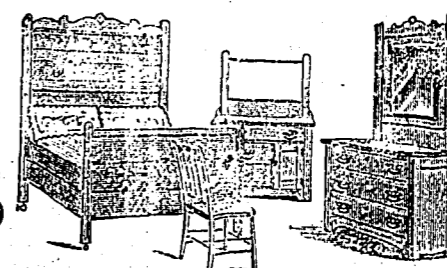

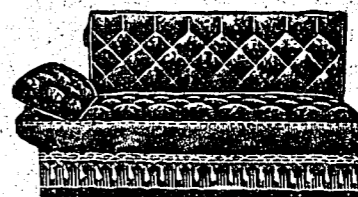

Among The Mines

It has been decided to capitalize the Skylark mine at \$250,000.

The Nelson Daily News will issue a special mining edition on New Year's day.

A pump is to be installed on the Coronation, south of the Providence and Elkhorn.

Rich looking ore is being extracted from the Combination claim, north west of town.

The values in the Barbara continue to improve. Two men are now engaged sacking the ore.

R. W. Williams, agent for the Jenchues Machine Co., Rossland, was here on business this week.

The Silver Cloud will resume sinking operations within the next fortnight. A supply of wood for the boiler is being cut.

Ernest Levy, supt. of Le-Roi No. 2, Rossland, was here this week on business with the B. C. Copper Co.

The new shaft on the Bay is being sunk on ore that continues to carry free gold in large quantities.

The Sudbury claim in Deadwood camp has a carload and a half of ore on the dump ready for shipment.

Henry White, the original locator of the Knob Hill and Old Ironsides, is visiting the Nevada mining camps.

Geo. R. Naden and John H. East start work next week on the Paymaster fraction, a promising copper proposition, three miles west of Midway.

It is reported that the Silver King lead has been traced and definitely located on Hope No. 2, the adjoining claim now being developed on a working bond by E. W. Cornish.

In less than ten hours 10,000 shares of the treasury stock of the Skylark mine, par value \$1, were underwritten.

at 50 cents per share, Phoenix people being the principal buyers.

The lead on the Astro, Deadwood camp, is being opened up. It has been proven to be the same as the Morrison lode on the Morrison, the adjoining property. The Astro is owned by Sam Stingley and other local parties.

The Lost Chance continues to make a carload shipment weekly. Owing to the excess of iron in the ore, the Trail smelter has given the Lost Chance an \$8 freight and treatment rate.

R. A. Anderson is paying a second visit to Summit camp. His name and that of S. F. Parrish are mentioned in connection with a deal for the lease of the B. C. mine. Mr Anderson admits the correctness of the reported negotiations but declines to give particulars at present.

Boundary ore shipments in 1904 exceeded 818,000 tons. The growth of tonnage in four years was as follows: 1900, 99,730 tons; 1901, 390,000 tons; 1902, 507,545 tons; 1903, 684,461 tons.

The new camp of Goldfields, in Nevada, was re-visited in November of this year by Mr. J. E. Spurr, of the United States Geological Survey. This district lies about 23 miles south of Tonapah, and was located late in the spring of 1903. Shortly after the discovery of gold in this district it was visited by Mr. Spurr. A little work was then in progress on what is now known as Columbia mountain, but up to that time no good strikes had been made. In January and February 1904, however, rich finds were made in certain spots south of Columbia mountain. The district has now an approximate population of 6,000. The town of Goldfields has sprung up, and a number of smaller adjacent camps have been established. It is estimated that up to the present time about \$2,000,000 worth of ore has been shipped from the district. Most of these shipments have been made in the last five months.

Ten thousand h. p. is being developed on the Bull river, East Kootenay.

An underground telephone system has been installed in the Granby mines.

The November payroll of the Crow's Nest Pass Coal Co. amounted to \$126,842.

The E. P. U. mine shipped another carload of high grade ore to the Trail smelter this week.

The litigation over the Lucky Jack group at Poplar Creek has been amicably settled.

The large iron deposits in East Kootenay are to be developed by a C. P. R. syndicate.

The new air compressor at the Brooklyn mine will be started up early in the new year.

Electric machinery for the tramway equipment of No. 3 tunnel of the Granby mines has reached Phoenix.

The Great Northern will not start hauling ore from Phoenix until about February 1st.

Ten blast furnaces in three Boundary smelters are now in operation—six at Granby, two at the B. C. Copper and two at the Montreal & Boston.

The freight rate on Crow's Nest coke delivered at the Trail smelter has been reduced to \$2 per ton.

The output of the St. Eugene mine last month was 21,000 tons, of which 15,000 tons were silver-lead concentrates.

According to an official return copper exports from Canada during the past four months were 10,221,951 pounds valued at \$1,272,210, exclusive of gold and silver.

The officers of the Phoenix Gold and Copper Co., owning the Nellie Cotton and Mystic claims, adjoining the Granby mines, are as follows: President, Hal J. Cole, Spokane; vice-president, J. E. Everhart, Chicago; secretary, Chas. Murray, Chicago; treasurer, Mark Sands, Chicago.

The American postal authorities have declared the Chicago Silver Co., 225 Dearborn street, a fraudulent concern and have stopped the delivery of its mail. A citizen of Greenwood, attracted by an advertisement, remitted money to this firm and was amazed to have the express order returned a few days ago by the postal officials.

A COMEDY IN SEVERAL ACTS.

Arthur Percival Procter is a medical practitioner in the town of Kamloops. He proclaims himself a Liberal but generally votes Tory because he is a friend of F. J. Fulton, K. C., the Conservative member for Kamloops provincial riding who has certain patronage at his disposal that is of considerable advantage to a medical man residing in the city of Kamloops.

John Thomas Robinson is a political fortune hunter, who attends to everybody's business but his own. He is a friend of Dr. Procter and also of F. J. Fulton.

John Fremont Smith is one of those affable gentlemen who are often used by schemers like Dr. Procter and John T. Robinson.

Dr. Vereertbrugghen came to Kamloops some months ago. He had a very large and successful practice in Europe but his health failing him he travelled for some time. He reached Kamloops and decided to settle there because of its splendid climate and its bright future as the inland capital. He went before the medical council of the province and secured his diploma. Of good family, well educated, an attractive personality, and with a successful record as a medical practitioner he soon built up a large practice in the city of Kamloops.

The Medical Council of British Columbia in past years was composed of mossbacks in the medical profession. The mossbacks still dominate the Medical Council. Dr. Procter is a member of the Medical Council, but it is not suggested that he is one of the mossbacks.

John T. Robinson has an office in Kamloops, and John F. Smith sometimes visits John T. Robinson's office. Dr. Vereertbrugghen was invited there one day and he entered. During the conversation which ensued, Dr. Procter's name was mentioned. John T. Robinson afterwards made an affidavit in which he declared that Dr. Vereertbrugghen made certain charges against Dr. Procter, to wit, that previous to his examination he had intimated to Dr. Procter that he was somewhat rusty regarding text books on the brain. When he went up for examination Dr. Procter was the examiner on this particular subject and three out of five of the questions dealt with the subject, regarding which the doctor confessed he was rusty and that it looked as if Dr. Procter desired to pluck him. To give the charges an air of reality and respectability, Mr. Robinson succeeded in getting the board of directors of the Inland Hospital to take the matter up. Dr. Procter is physician for the hospital and the hospital is run more or less as a political institution.

The charges were referred to the B. C. Medical Council and the Council notified Dr. Vereertbrugghen that unless he apologizes to Dr. Procter before December 31st, his diploma will be cancelled.

Dr. Vereertbrugghen does not intend to apologize and has appealed to the Supreme Court.

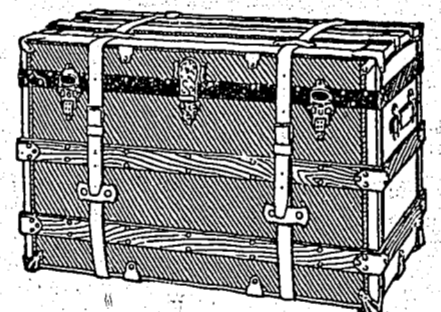

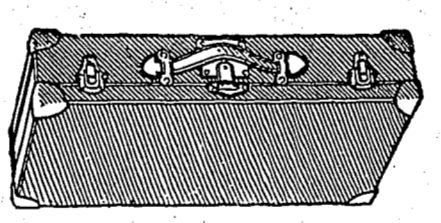

Synopsis of Regulations for Disposal of Minerals on Dominion Lands in Manitoba, the Northwest Territories and the Yukon Territory.

Coal.—Coal lands may be purchased at \$10 per acre for soft coal and \$20 for anthracite. Not more than 320 acres can be acquired by one individual or company...

The claim shall be recorded within fifteen days if located within ten miles of a mining recorder's office...

At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year or paid to the mining recorder in lieu thereof. When \$500 has been expended or paid, the locator may, upon having a survey made...

Permission may be granted by the Minister of the Interior to locate claims containing iron and mica, also copper, in the Yukon Territory, of an area not exceeding 160 acres.

The payment for a mining location shall provide for the payment of royalty on the sales not exceeding five per cent.

Placer Mining, Manitoba and the N. W. T., excepting the Yukon Territory.—Placer mining claims generally are 100 ft. square; entry fee, \$5 renewable yearly...

The lessee's right is confined to the submerged bed or bars of the river below low water mark, and subject to the rights of all persons who have, or who may receive entries for bar diggings or bench claims...

The lessee shall have a dredge in operation within one season from the date of the lease for each five miles, but where a person or company has obtained more than one lease one dredge for each fifteen miles or fraction is sufficient...

The lessee shall have one dredge in operation within two years from the date of the lease, and one dredge for each five miles, within six years from such date...

Placer mining in the Yukon Territory.—Creek, gulch, river and hill claims shall not exceed 250 feet in length, measured on the base line or general direction of the creek or gulch...

Claims are marked by two legal posts, one at each end, bearing notices. Entry must be obtained within ten days, if the claim is within ten miles of mining recorder's office...

The person or company staking a claim must hold a free miner's certificate. The discoverer of a new mine is entitled to a claim of 1,000 feet in length, and if the party consists of two 1,500 altogether...

No free miner shall receive a grant of more than one mining claim on each separate river, creek or gulch, but the same miner may hold any number of claims by purchase...

Work must be done a claim each year to the value of at least of \$200. A certificate that work has been done must be obtained each year. If not, the claim shall be deemed to be abandoned...

The boundaries of a claim may be defined absolutely by having a survey made and publishing notices in the Yukon Official Gazette.

Petroleum—All unappropriated Dominion Lands in Manitoba, the Northwest Territories and within the Yukon Territory are open to prospecting for petroleum...

At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year or paid to the mining recorder in lieu thereof. When \$500 has been expended or paid, the locator may, upon having a survey made...

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No free miner shall receive a grant of more than one mining claim on each separate river, creek or gulch, but the same miner may hold any number of claims by purchase...

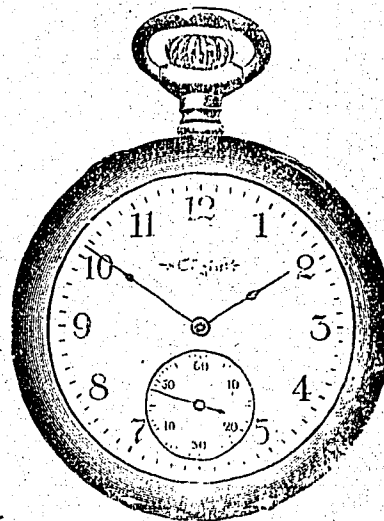
