## THE ORO DENORO

### Is Fast Coming to the Front.

## SPUR TO BE BUILT SHORTLY

### Will Enter the Dividend List Within the Near Future.

The present output of the Oro Denoro averages from 750 to 1150 tons per week. This ore is taken principally from two quarries but there are five other places where ore is found in large quantities, three of these being in tunnels below the railway and not at present available, but will be as soon as a spur is built at the base of the hill upon which the ore exposures are. In the No. 2 tunnel there is over 40 feet of ore cut at a depth of 140 feet showing the highest values yet found on the property. Six tons of the better class of ore from it gave over 10 per cent copper and \$1.05 in gold and silver per ton. When the snow is gone two large surface exposures will be opened up and it is expected that by June the output will be largely increased.

The extension of the V. V. & E. rail

way (of the Great Northern system) from Grand Forks to Phoenix will be commenced this spring and will be built across the Oro Denoro and provide shipping facilities from the three tunnels. This will allow a great expansion in shipments before the end of the year. Arrangements are under way for development on a considerable scale under charge of a skilled superintendent (Mr. F. W. MacLennan, M. E.) who has just been engaged with a view to increasing shipments to 2,500 or 3,000 tons per week when these additional railway facilities are secured, as they will be in a few months.

If the ore bodies of the Oro Denoro prove as extensive as the many large exposures of ore seem to indicate, the chances for a large return to the shareholders out of a net profit of \$1 per ton would seem to be excellent. The management of the Oro Denoro has been careful and economical, the total cost of mining the ore running from 45 cents to 80 cents per ton, and comparing very favorably with the biggest mines of the district. It is possible that the Denoro will enter the dividend list within the near future.

### Poor Grand Forks.

If the action of the Grand Forks city council last Monday night is any criterion to go by, then the knights of the green cloth will have to walk. At the last session Monday night Alderman Clement introduced a motion to the effect that the council support the "closed town" movement. Upon a vote being taken a tie resulted, whereupon the mayor was forced to cast a deciding vote, which when learned fell like a thunderbolt to the "open town" faction.

### Baseball Club to Organize.

A meeting is called at eight o'clock on April 7th in the Board of Trade rooms, Windsor block, to organize a baseball club for the coming season. Those who are interested in the game are requested to attend and help make the organization a thorough one. The business men of the city are invited to attend as the team should have their financial as well as their moral support. The clearing and fixing up of the ground is going to require a great deal of hard work as well as a heavy expense on the boys' part, of which a part should be met by the citizens and business men in general, so that it will be an encouragement to keep a well organized club together.

### Captured a Live Deer.

While returning light from Grand Forks to Cascade on Tuesday, engineer McKenzie and fireman Dewar observed a deer trying to get through the Page wire fence that encloses the track between these two points. The deer's frantic efforts to get through the fence proved fruitless and the engine crew managed to capture the animal and tie it down with the bell cord which came in handy for the purpose. They put the deer on board and carried it into Cascade where it was untied and placed in a box car in charge of brakeman Curtis, attached to conductor Crosbie's train and sent to Nelson, where it can now be seen at the Zoo on Carbonate street of that city. The men are delighted at their capture and consider it an athletic feat on their part, not often heard of.

### New Club Organized.

Since the last issue of the Times Messrs. Thomas Pickhart, Ernest J. Cartier, Henry B. Madden and Philip McDonald have applied for and secured a charter under the Benevolent Societies act of the province, to organize an association to be known as The Boundary Club.

The objects of the association are social intercourse, mutual helpfulness, mental and moral improvement, rational recreation and the promotion of good fellowship among its members.

Negotiations are pending for the securing of suitable premises and it is expected that within a few weeks the club will be opened to the society.

### Scared the Coyote.

For the purpose of scaring away a band of coyotes an Italian at Fernie discharged a stick of dynamite in his hand, the other day. He was badly mangled, lost both eyes and had to have the greater part of his hand amputated.

### Large Dividends.

The Tennessee Copper Co., which has just paid a dividend of nearly a quarter of a million, although owning and making a profit out of its smelting and converting plants, reports a total profit of \$1.45 per ton. The big Anaconda copper Co., at Butte, that has paid \$23,250,000 in profits, makes out of its mining, smelting, converting and refining its own ores less than \$2 per ton. The great Treadwell gold mine, which has paid its owners over \$5,000,000 in dividends, made a net

profit last year of but \$1.09 per ton. In fact, with few exceptions, the big dividend paying copper, gold, iron and coal companies make a profit of but \$1 to \$2 per ton on their output. The Granby Co. also contracted to treat the output of the two quarries at its Grand Forks smelter upon terms which, applied to all the ore that had been shipped, would give a clear profit above all costs of over \$1.50 per ton. This is a substantial profit for a large low grade proposition.

### City Council.

Council met Monday, members all present except Aldermen Caulfield and Ross; Mayor Naden in the chair. Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed.

The proposed Liquor License by law was brought up and discussed at considerable extent but no definite action was taken. It was proposed to issue licenses to two saloons and twelve hotels.

The clerk was instructed to notify the electric light company of the dangerous condition of the wire at the corner of Washington street and request that the matter be put in a safe condition without delay.

The city solicitor was instructed to notify the B. C. Copper company to complete the crossing on Sutherland avenue, and the city engineer was instructed to make repairs necessary at Deadwood camp.

Council adjourned to meet again on Monday, April 11th, the 4th being a holiday no meeting will be held.

### Too Hot For Turner.

Editor Turner, who has been pushing the pencil on the Times for the last four weeks, left on Monday for Phoenix where he will occupy a similar position on the Pioneer. Editor Turner was over in Nelson and Rossland the latter part of last week and evidently the sights he saw while in the Queen city set his blood to boiling, and arriving in this valley, where the warm spring breezes kissed his sun browned cheeks, he found the climate too warm to cool his blood down, so he took himself off to a city which enjoys the distinction of possessing thirteen feet of snow and ice.

## CONSERVATIVE MEETING

### In the Interests of Martin Burrell.

The Conservative meeting on Wednesday evening in the interests of Martin Burrell of Grand Forks, the Conservative nominee, was well attended. The chairman, Dr. Spankie, opened the meeting with an address setting forth the high ideals of the Conservative platform, and making comparisons of the past and present administrations, and after inviting any who wished to speak in behalf of Duncan Ross, the Liberal nominee, introduced the speaker of the evening.

Mr. Burrell with a few well chosen remarks launched into his subject and for over an hour kept the attention of his audience without a break. He rehearsed the trip of Mr. Ross through Cariboo, varying somewhat as to his idea of the number of Conservative votes likely to be polled in that quarter. The tariff question was ventilated considerably and the Grand Trunk Pacific policy also was given an overhauling. Mr. Burrell is a pleasant and fluent speaker and many of his remarks were considerably jocular and at times witty. If he did not win any new votes it is quite safe to say he promoted the utmost good feeling in his audience and his address was listened to with interest from start to finish.

The meeting was exceptionally orderly for a political meeting, only an occasional "hear hear" being heard, and as no speaker appeared for the Liberal candidate the meeting adjourned at an early hour.

Messrs. Wm. Meddows and E. M. Cudwood each brought into town a load of live hogs this week, which were purchased by P. Burns & Co. The latter gentleman returned home with a load of furniture. Trade of this kind is growing in this community and bids fare to become an important factor in commercial enterprise.

## WORK BEGINS ON CARMI

### The Big Property of the West Fork Starts Work.

## ACTIVITY IN WEST FORK

### Two Shifts We Be Put on Within the Next Two Weeks.

The West Fork country after years of waiting is on the eve of considerable activity this spring and summer.

Today Robt. Longly and Ben Peterson left for the Carmi mine, the latter of the West Fork, to make all preparations on that property. The boarding and bunk houses and shaft house require a general overhauling. There is about 400 feet of water to be pumped out of the mine before any work can be started and this will require about two weeks time. In the meantime a crew of eight or ten men will be gathered and the work of development will be vigorously pushed forward. The coming summer will in all probability see the Carmi one of the big shippers of the West Fork to our local smelters.

The beginning of work in the West Fork means much to Greenwood as she is the natural shipping point of this whole West Fork country.

The Carmi has been closed down for about two years and a half. Mr. Thurston, the owner, at the time of the close down received quite a lot of publicity over the building of the West Fork road.

The Carmi has a shaft down 100 feet with 120 feet of drift from the bottom. It is the intention of the management, just as soon as possible, to put two shifts to work drifting on the ore. Several carloads of ore have been shipped from this property to the Greenwood smelter which gave very high returns, but the cost of hauling was so great in the absence of a wagon road, of which the government has been trying for the last five years to build, it was thought wise by the management to close the property down until such time as the wagon road would be completed. With that view the property was closed down and Mr. Thurston left for England.

The Carmi is equipped with all the modern machinery necessary for the further prosecution of deep mining.

Within two weeks the people of the West Fork will hear the welcome and old familiar sound of the Carmi whistle.

### Death of Mrs. West.

The death occurred on Wednesday morning of this week of one of our most respected citizens in the person of Mrs. Thomas H. West. Deceased had been ill for the past two years and death was not unexpected. A husband and three daughters survive her, Mrs. Dalmage, Vancouver; Mrs. Mills of this city, and Misses Nora and Flossie who reside at home. The funeral took place on Thursday afternoon and was largely attended.

The services were held in St. Jude's Hall Thursday afternoon at 2 p. m. Rev. W. A. Robins administering the last sad rights. The pall bearers were Messrs. H. B. Munroe, L. B. Hodge, E. T. Wickwire, J. Morgan, McKinley and McKenzie.

The new runway connecting the clay and copper quartz bins with the matte elevator at the B. C. Copper company's smelter is now completed. The dust chamber will be connected with the steel converter stack by a steel flue.

A gang of men are at work on the clay bank below Boundary Falls belonging to the B. C. Copper Co. The clay will be used to line converters at the smelter here, and it is expected if it turns out satisfactorily a siding will be put in.

CANADA MAKES HEADWAY-

First Installment of Her Mammoth Exhibit Arrives at Fair

Five carloads of exhibits from different parts of Canada have arrived in St. Louis. A car of fruit has also been placed in cold storage awaiting shipment. The exhibits already arrived include a pick of Canada's agricultural, forest and mineral wealth. Commissioner General William Hutchison is authority for the statement that the Canadian display at the St. Louis exposition will be far ahead of the former efforts of the Dominion. The general policy is to give prominence to the items of natural wealth peculiar to Canada, or rather those not found in the other countries making exhibits. For example, in minerals, Canada's almost exclusive resources of nickel, corundum, chrome iron, peat and asbestos, are to be featured. The displays will not be confined to show cases, but unique and striking displays will also be made. Separate pyramids of asbestos, mica and nickel are to be built and placed in prominent positions in the Canadian quarters. These pyramids will illustrate the processes the ores undergo in the transition from the crude state to the finished product. The nickel pyramid is to be 20 feet in height. The ore, as turned out of the mine, will form the base, above it will be a section containing the nickel product after the roasting process. Above it again will be a section containing the copper and nickel matte, and the apex of the pyramid will be finished in the refined nickel. Surmounting the pyramid is to be a statue made of the refined nickel and truly Canadian in design. In the line of precious metals Canada will not be found wanting. It is the intention to place in a commanding position a trophy bright with gold and silver. In agricultural products the exhibit will be superior to anything yet shown. British Columbia's giant woods exhibit will be greater than has been. In short, people will straighten up and stare when they get inside the Canadian sections at the universal exposition.

English Syndicate Buys Kingston.

A report from Portland says that Portland, McMinnville and Rossland people have sold the Kingston mine, on Lexington mountain, Lardeau district, to an English syndicate, the sale price being \$100,000. Among Oregon people interested in the deal are Governor Chamberlain, H. L. Pittock, L. H. Burton, all of Portland; and M. U. Gortner and Dr. Goucher, of McMinnville. The property transferred consists of 250 acres and the new owners will take up active development at once. F. R. Blochberger, of Rossland, engineered the deal. Minneapolis capital represented

in the Marie-Marillia Mining Company; the Metropolitan Gold & Silver Mining Company, and the Kootenay Consolidated Mining Company, has secured during the past two years, some of the pick of the Lardeau galena properties. Fully \$200,000 in cash has been spent in the acquisition of prospects and partially developed mines, and the coming season promises further large expenditure by this trio of corporations.

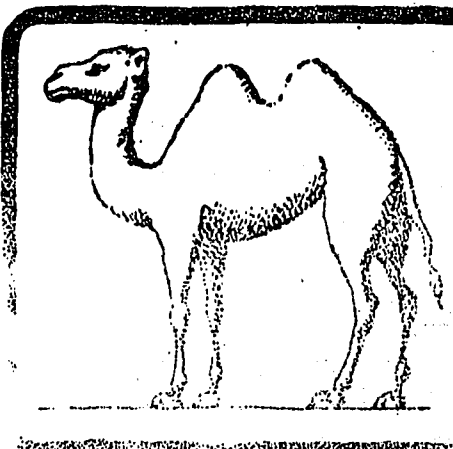

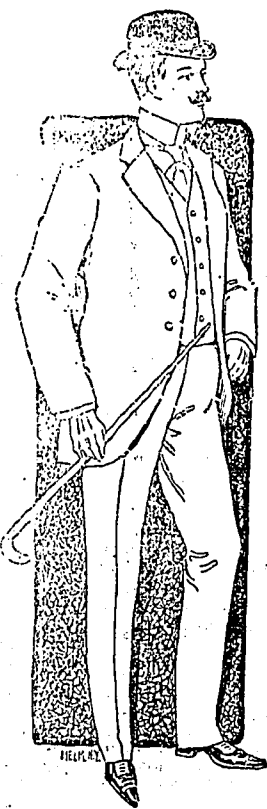

### STRIKE ON THE WILCOX.

Some Remarkably Good Ore Has Been Obtained.

Nelson, March 28.—A. H. Tuttle, secretary treasurer of the Broken Hill Mining & Milling company, is at the Hume. The company operates the Wilcox mine near Ymir in which an important strike has been made. Mr. Tuttle brought a bottle of the sulphurets from the new strike for J. Fred Hume's cabinet, and it was much admired yesterday.

Mr. Tuttle said that the ore from the strike was black sulphurets and pyrites, carrying gold, silver and lead. The gold values are 12.1 ounces; silver 17.4 ounces and from 10 to 15 per cent lead, the values being \$266.03, exclusive of the lead. The average sample taken for the purpose of assaying, was not assayed for lead.

The find was made in the tunnel at a vertical depth of 240 feet. The ore for the first 15 feet in the drift on the ledge was galena which averages \$75 to the ton. Then high grade sulphides were encountered. The sulphides in the ledge are of the same friable nature as those in the bottle in Mr. Hume's mineral cabinet. The ledge where the high grade shoot has been found is two and a half feet wide and the sulphides from 14 to 16 inches wide, the balance of the vein being high grade milling ore of the most important that has yet been made in the mine.

#### Republic Mines.

The Mountain Lion has shipped 300 tons to the Trail smelter the past six days, over the Kettle Valley lines. The Nelson smelter, which has been taking the Knob Hill ore for some time has cancelled its agreement for the time, and for a week no ore has been shipped. Ore is now being loaded for shipment to Crofton. The Quilp has shipped its ore to Everett. The Mountain Lion mine has an arrangement with the Trail smelter to take its ore, but no contract has been made as to the length of time the arrangement is to last. The mine is putting out 60 tons per day. The water has been pumped from the 425 foot level and ore will be mined next week.

The report of the Postmaster-general for the year ending June 30, 1903, shows that the people of British Columbia sent \$1,021,704 more out of the province by post-office money orders than they took in from the same source. In other words, the drain was \$5 for every man, woman and child in the prov-

ince. And the express money order department is yet to be heard from.

"Elijah" Dowie is getting bungled up in Australia. In consequence of a speech insulting King Edward the government has refused him the use of public buildings, and the check which he had deposited for the rent of the Jubilee Exposition buildings in N. S. W., has been returned to him and the agreement cancelled. It is feared that the irritation

caused by his utterances will culminate in violence, and he is being urged to leave the country.

PAY UP OR GET OUT.

As the 15th of April draws near when the time expires for the payment of all back taxes, fees, etc., owing by pre-emptors, the discontent is culminating in the bitterest of feeling against the action of the government. While in many instances pre-emptors are in a position to redeem their properties by paying all back taxes and encumbrances, the vast majority are struggling along and even denying themselves many of the necessities of life in order to get their ranches on a paying basis and self supporting as quickly as possible, only to find out at the last moment that all their hard toil and labor has been for naught, and that not having the money to put up, their lands, with all the improvements reverts again to the crown and they are left out in the cold.

This is certainly a very bad state of affairs and unless some modifications are made will have the effect of driving many good settlers out of the province with very unpleasant recollections of how they were treated by the powers that be. It reminds one of the famous old picture "The Closing of the Mortgage," only in this case it is the action of a government instead of an individual.

Reports from the Midway section are to the effect that the settlers there are very indignant. They say that the short notice given them is really not so bad as the time it was sprung. Had it been later in the summer or fall they would have something to sell to raise the funds, but coming as it does at such an inopportune moment they are completely handicapped.

It is now confidently expected that work will be commenced on the Midway & Vernon railway this spring, and possibly within the next month. Negotiations, however, are still pending and Mr. Woods, the chief promoter here, is expecting definite word any day from his co-partner, Mr. Smailes, who is conducting the financial part of the business in the old country. Already definite offers have been made by capitalists to finance the undertaking, and minor details are now being considered.

Captain W. E. Gayer, a pioneer of Alaska and one of the latest arrivals from the Tanana, brings glowing reports of the rich deposits there. He says: "When I left Tanana, the diggings reminded me of the Klondike in 1897. The dumps on Pedro, Chatham, Cleary, Coldstream and Fairbanks were running together, owing to so many men being at work, the same as they did on Eldorado and Bonanza in the winter of 1897-8. Tanana is a rich district, covering a great treasure bearing area, and the people are just beginning to realize it."

The coming of summer will witness a resumption of work by the prospector. Already he sniffs eagerly for the fresh air of green hills and budding woods. The air castles of a winter time are now soon to be realized or utterly demolished. That he will "strike it rich" is a foregone conclusion. With all his foibles of character, original manners, unquenchable enthusiasm and love of ease in winter, the prospector in the warmer months, is a man of vast action. He toils up hill and down dale, over mountain and plain, inspecting with a critical eye every bit of copper stain and iron rust within the range of his vision. He is optimistic, in love with his work, free as the air, and an altogether indispensable character to society. He sees few of the soft-easy things of life, but nature reimburses him in superior health and freedom from restraint.

THE LATE MRS. WOOD.

Mother of Robert Wood of This City Passes Away at Her Home in Ontario. The following is taken from The Port Rowan News, Ont., in part of which it says:

On Sunday afternoon the tolling of the St. John's church bell notified the people of Port Rowan that Mrs. Wood had passed away from the world in which she labored so long and so ardently, and had gone to her reward. She had been a wonderful woman, great in her physical strength and in her mental power, great in her devotion to her church and the cause of religion, great in her sympathies for her fellow creatures and in her charity, great in her kindness and in the wisdom with which she was always able to find a way to help those who were in need. Her big heart with its human sympathies, her broad mind and her wonderful physical resources were all consecrated to her christian work, and the welfare of the people of the community. And when the shadow of old age crept upon her and blindness robbed her of the consoling beauties of nature, she was not forgotten, for the people who remembered her in the days of her active life were constantly enquiring for her, and the stories they were continually telling of her good deeds, filled the hearts of the younger generation with love and reverence for the venerable lady who lived such a beautiful and useful life in the days of her strength and vigor.

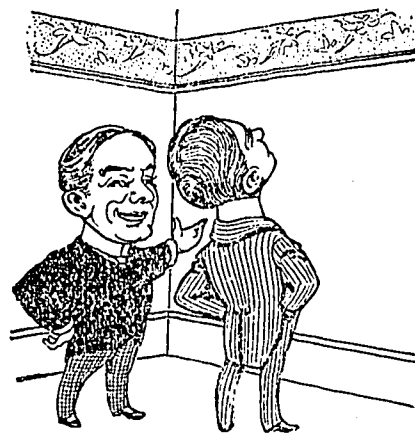

The Poplar Nugget says: In Greenwood it is so dry on Sunday that many people have been driven to drinking water.

Dr. G. M. Foster left to-day on a business trip to the coast. He will be gone about two weeks. Dr. Shone will look after his practice during his absence.

Special Easter services will be held in the Methodist church here on Sunday morning and in the evening a song service will be given by the choir of the church.

Dr. Foster was called to Phoenix on Tuesday to assist his partner, Dr. Boucher, in an operation on W. S. Doyle for appendicitis. The operation was successfully performed and Mr. Doyle's many friends will be pleased to learn that he is improving very nicely.

The Boundary is certainly a very healthy community as evidenced by the fact that the hospital has but one patient. There is not a case of contagious or infectious disease in the district, and since last fall there has been only one or two cases of pneumonia.

The P. Burns company have commenced to use the 250 head of cattle they have on hand at the farm of Frank Richter since the warm weather set in. Some fifty of these were slaughtered this week. This stock has been fed on the best of alfalfa hay so our citizens may expect a superior class of meat.

The Mackenzie-Hambly Co. millinery opening took place on Thursday and Friday of last week and the fine display of beautiful hats was particularly attractive. Torpedos, new sailors, Champagne, plad straw and green baise will be mostly worn this season. Buckles and flowers will be much in evidence, the latter worn in a trailing effect. One dark Gainsborough hat attracted particular attention. It was made in fancy black nett and straw braid with a large Gainsborough plume fastened with a gold ornament and a black stream of nett hanging down in front of left shoulder.

Here and There.

James Seals of Danville, met with a nasty accident the other day while on his way home from the Minnehaha mine. The brake on his wagon gave way and struck him on the mouth, knocking out several of his teeth and cutting open his upper lip so badly that the gash required a number of stitches.

Placer gold was first discovered in commercial quantity in British Columbia on Hill's bar, on the Fraser river, in 1858, by a party of prospectors from California. A considerable number of stamperers were soon after prospecting the bars of the Fraser river, and, following up that stream, many of them worked their way into the Cariboo mountains, a range situated to the westward of the main Selkirk range, and considered to form a portion of the Selkirk mountains.

A new invention for the treatment of sulphide ores has been made in Vancouver by one of its leading mine owners, and a plant with a daily capacity of 25 tons and costing \$15,000 has been completed to test it. It is said that this class of ore, which is almost limitless in the mountain ranges, can be successfully treated under this system at a cost not exceeding 50 cents a ton.

It is expected that the war will double or even treble the salted salmon industry in British Col-

umbia. Local Japanese are the principals in the industry, and in times of peace they did quite a trade in their own country. Now they have large orders for the salted fish as army food. Salted herring are also in demand in Japan. The fish swarm in countless thousands, particularly around Departure bay. The industry there is to be greatly extended. The Japanese war office has approved of the herring as food for the soldiers, and large quantities will be forwarded across the Pacific.

There's more truth than poetry in the following taken from an exchange, as many a quill driver well knows:

Look into a cradle and see a baby boy. At the age of 10 he is a noisy kid with half the buttons off his clothes and an eye for meanness. At 15 he is a devil in a print shop. The Rossland World says: "Despite the abnormal fall of snow the mines are doing very well and are sending out an average of ore which is 25 per cent better than the weekly average for 1903. The LeRoi No. 2 has commenced shipping once again to the Northport smelter, but is still sending the bulk of its ore to the Boundary to both the Granby and Greenwood smelters. The continuance of the snow has permitted the Kootenay and the Jumbo to continue their shipments by wagon road which will not be the case when the roads are in the transition state between runners and wheels.

Mr. Geo. F. Grandy met with an accident at the Trail smelter last week by which he lost his left arm. He was adjusting some belting at the matte crusher when his hand became entangled in the machinery and his arm was torn off near the elbow.

**The Ymir Homicide.**

Ymir is worked up over the death of Alexander McDermid, caused, according to the coroner's inquest on Monday 21st, as the result of blows inflicted by Murdoch Campbell

The evidence adduced showed the deceased to be a dangerous man, and in a state of intoxication slandered and abused Campbell and his brother and wanted to fight them both. Campbell was heard to say that he could not stand much longer and crossed over the street to another hotel to get away from deceased. Shortly afterwards they met on the sidewalk, and, according to Campbell's voluntary testimony at the inquest, McDermid made a pass at him and he knocked him down striking him several times and possibly he may have kicked him after he was down, but could not say positively as he was so excited he did not know just what he was doing. McDermid was found later in the evening lying across the sidewalk. He was carried into the Cosmopolitan hotel and Dr. Edward Duncan was called. He was subsequently removed to the hospital where a closer examination showed that he was dead. Campbell immediately gave himself upon hearing that McDermid was dead, and probably a charge of manslaughter will be preferred against him as the result of the coroner's investigation, though under the circumstances, as now disclosed, it is not probable that a charge of wilful murder will be made.

Campbell was arraigned before P. J. Gleazer, J. P., on Friday for a preliminary hearing and was committed to stand his trial at the assizes at Nelson which will open on May 17th. He

was taken up to Nelson and lodged in the provincial gaol to await his trial. Accused appears to feel his position very keenly.

**Fisher Maiden Shipping.**

Twenty men are now employed at the Fisher Maiden, Four Mile. All are working on the big ore body, and soon large shipments will be made from that property. The ore is high in lead and zinc.

The recent carload shipped from the Fisher Maiden to the Denver, Colo., smelter netted the company more than double what it would had the ore been sent to our local smelters. Instead of having to pay a penalty on the zinc, the Denver smelter paid a royalty of over \$200 on it.

This is the smelting company represented by Geo. Huston of Sandon. Their zinc plant has recently been enlarged to treat 100 tons a day. This process is entirely new to America, and the treatment charge is much lower than any other smelter can make under the old process of treatment.—Ledger.

**To Be Admitted Free.**

Secretary Jacobs of the Provincial Mining Association, yesterday received formal notification that the following order-in-council was recently passed by the Ottawa government: "That oil (petroleum) be transferred to the list of goods which may be imported into Canada free of duty, when imported by miners or mining companies or concerns to be used in the concentration of ores or metals in their own concentrating establishments, under such regulations as the minister of customs may prescribe."

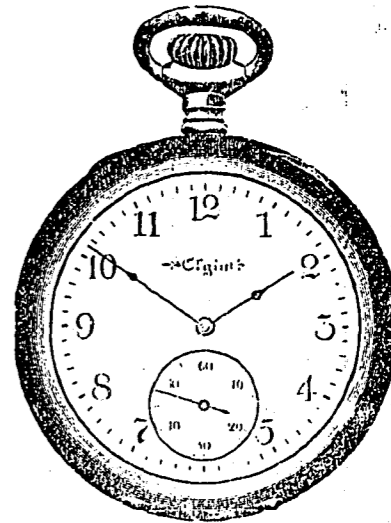

**TOPICS OF THE TOWN AND COUNTRY.**

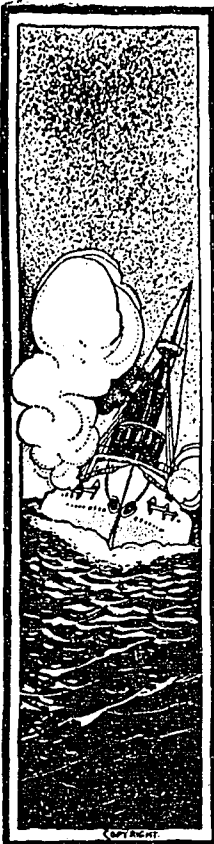
Today is all fools day.
