SMITH CURTIS COMING

Member for Rossland Will Hold a Public Meeting in the City Hall Next Week—Current Political Issues will be Discussed—Liberals Association Elect Officers

Smith Curtis M. P. is coming here. The restless free lance of the Kootenay has decided that it is time for him to say something regarding the present political situation. Next week, the date to be announced later, in the city hall Greenwood he will make what is practically his first pronouncement to his constituents since he left his former leader Joseph Martin. He will doubtless defend his course and as there have been strenuous times in the political arena since the member for Rossland met his constituents, his speech will be an exceedingly interesting one. Besides, the member for Rossland is easily one of the best debaters in the legislature and in the days of Raleidoscopic political changes many eyes and ears are turned towards the member for Rossland. The politicians are anxious to learn what he intends doing. The meeting will begin at eight o'clock sharp.

British Columbia is easily preserving her reputation for being the home of the most remarkable political acrobats on earth. The people had scarcely recovered from the shock occasioned by Mr Dennis Murphy, who although one of Prior's bitterest opponents, entered his cabinet as provincial secretary, when Denny gave them a further shock. After being a full fledged cabinet minister with an honorable prefix to his name for a period of five days he resigned out of the government, out of the legislature and out of politics. These lightning changes were the result of a visit to his constituents at Ashcroft. Opposition men from the Fraser and the Kootenay from Vancouver Island and from all parts of the province, made Ashcroft their Mecca and their pilgrimage had but one object. They were after the scalp of Dennis Murphy. Dennis Murphy decided his scalp was too valuable so he disconcerted political friends and enemies by quitting.

W. W. B. McInnes came to the rescue of the gallant Colonel and accepted the office of provincial secretary. His fate will be decided on December 16th. The North Victoria constituency has been opened up and T. W. Paterson is opposing, the government candidate H. Robertson.

Chas. A. Semlin the ex-premier has consented to run in the opposition interests in the district of West Yale made vacant by the resignation of Mr. Murphy. This is Mr. Semlin's old constituency and he will have no difficulty in again carrying it.

The annual meeting of the Greenwood liberal association held in the city hall last Thursday evening was largely attended. J. R. Brown was re-elected president for the third year; C. W. Wilson Vice-President; Kenneth McKenzie Secretary-Treasurer and the following are the executive committee S. Darry Youill; A. Nicholson, A. A. Crowston, W. S. Graham, Dr. H. S. Simmons and Duncan Ross. Letters were read from Senator Templeman and W. A. Gahner M. P. acknowledging a resolution in favor of granting rights asked by the V. V. & E.

A resolution was introduced protesting against land grants or cash subsidies to future railways. The resolution will be debated at the next meeting of the association, the date of which will be arranged by the executive and to which the public will be invited.

The association is increasing in membership and an effort will be made to arrange a series of meetings during the winter at which important public questions will be discussed.

LOCAL AND PERSONAL

The half-yearly meeting of the board of licence commissioners for the Boundary Creek Licence District will be held at Grand Forks on Monday afternoon

15th instant. There is much anxiety among holders of liquor licences lest the amendment to the Liquor License Act made last session which forbids the issue of a liquor licence to "any person who is not on the list of voters for the legislature of the province of British Columbia" be now strictly enforced. Some of the present licencees are taking steps to have their names placed on the voters' list; but as most of those not thus qualified are not British subjects they find themselves unable to immediately comply with the law in this connection.

J. R. Brown of McLeod & Brown returned last week from Vancouver where he was counsel in the appeal cases of McKenzie vs. Knob Hill company and Hutcheson vs. B. C. Copper company. In the former case, the dependent company appealed against the award of the jury in favor of McKenzie who was badly injured in the Knob Hill mines and in the latter Hutcheson appeal against the judge setting aside the jury's verdict. Mr. Brown represented McKenzie and Hutcheson. He had associated with him E. P. Davis K. C. of Vancouver. The supreme after listening to the arguments reserved its decision. J. A. MacDonald of Rossland acted for the Knob Hill company.

M. F. Mytton manager of the Canadian Bank of Commerce will leave about the tenth for a few weeks vacation which will be spent on the coast. H. D. F. Sewell of the Portland branch will have charge here during Mr. Mytton's absence.

W. G. Moore representing Gavin Spence and Flora McDonald, the scottish entertainers, who delighted a Greenwood audience about a year ago, was here this week to arrange for their reappearance in the city. The talented entertainers will be here under the auspices of the St. Andrews Society, on Tuesday January 13th.

The Spokesman-Review states that J. R. Riorden is back from a visit to the Homestake mine in Summit camp B. C. and that work would shortly be started on the property.

Salvation Army.

Special services will be held in the Salvation Army Barracks on the evening of the 11th and 12th inst. Staff Captain A. E. Taylor of Spokane will be here and conduct the meetings.

Ensign Southall and Liet. Johnston have left Greenwood, the former going to Winnipeg to meet General Booth and the latter to Grand Forks. Before leaving a farewell social was held in the Barracks. The new officers are expected in a few days.

PROHIBITIONISTS FAILED

Temperance Sentiment is Strong in Ontario.

Toronto, Dec. 4.—Ontario will not have prohibition. Though the actual vote will not be determined for probably a couple of days, enough is known at this hour (9.30) to indicate that the prohibitionists have failed in the task the legislature set them to poll 212,723 votes, or one half of the total vote cast in the election of 1898. Without the stimulus of a party organization and the presence of political excitement in the campaign the task proved too much but nevertheless the prohibitionists have succeeded in recording that so far as they and their opponents were able to bring out the vote, that the sentiment of Ontario is largely in favor of prohibition.

At 9.30 incomplete returns from 50 out of 94 constituencies show a total vote of 72,200 for and 45,920 against.

Examination of the details of these returns show that they are about two-thirds of being complete, and making allowances the majority in favor of prohibition given by these constituencies may be placed at about 40,000. This is a most liberal estimate.

On the same basis the 93 constituencies of Ontario would give a majority for prohibition of about 70,000, but majorities do not count in this contest. If a liberal estimate can only give 108,000 votes for fifty of the leading constituencies it is easy to see that the remaining 44, included among which are the more sparsely settled constituencies, can hardly be expected to contribute 105,000 votes.

How far the prohibitionists will come from attaining the desired number of votes it is as yet impossible to state, but based on the returns received it will not be surprising if they are at least 40,000 shy.

Toronto was the greatest surprise of the day. It had hitherto recorded itself in favor of license, but today voted by 1470 in favor of the act. The other dwelling centres of the province were North Waterloo, Windsor and Belleville, which voted against the act, North Waterloo by 1700, Windsor by 547 and Belleville by a scant 25.

The cities which voted against the act were Kingston, 22; London, 161, St. Catharines, 222; Ottawa, with suburbs, 700; Hamilton followed Toronto with a majority of 573 for the act.

For Slaughtering Deer.

The provincial authorities decided to put a stop to the wholesale slaughter of deer for the market. This week officer Geo. Cunningham arrested at Midway William Green and Sanford Dixon and brought them to Greenwood. They are charged with killing deer in excess of the number allowed by the Game Act viz ten to each man. At the time of arrest they had ten carcasses with them which they were bringing to the market. It is alleged that they had brought several loads of deer to Greenwood and Phoenix previous to this. They appeared before Judge Hallett on Friday morning and were remanded for eight days to give the police time to gather evidence.

THE RICH PROVIDENCE

Big Returns From Recent Shipments—Granby Company Increasing its Shipments—Mr. Underwood Discusses the Proposed Amalgamation.

Mark F. Madden, president of the Providence Mining Company arrived from Chicago on Saturday last. On Monday the second payment was made by the company to William Fowler, the amount being \$12,500. There are two further payments of \$12,500 each to be made one on March 1st and the other on June 1st. From present appearances these payments can be easily made from the proceeds of the mine, if the management desire to increase the shipments.

The Providence mine is a surprise to mining men. Three months, Mr. Fowler made a shipment of 43 tons to the Trail smelter, and this shipment netted the owners over \$6500. The property was then acquired by the present company. It was believed that the narrow veins of rich ore would yield sufficient to cover purchase price with big profits for the owners. But the veins have widened with development work and the values are increasing. Returns received from a shipment of twenty and a half tons sent to the Trail smelter were of the most encouraging description. The gross value was over thirty three hundred dollars and the net proceeds to the company was \$287.34. Last Saturday a shipment of 20 tons was sent to the Trail smelter and it is expected that the returns from this will be even better. The Providence is evidently the exceptional high grade mine in a low grade district.

Mr. Madden is naturally well pleased with his initial investment in the Boundary district. He had no difficulty in disposing of Providence stock to his business friends in Chicago, and should the venture turn out as well as all appearances would indicate, there is plenty of Chicago money for further investments in the Boundary.

The half a million mark will easily be overreached by the Boundary district in the matter of ore shipments this year. Seven furnaces are now running full blast, the Granby company has trebled its shipments and unless some extraordinary circumstance intervenes, the remaining three weeks of the year will make the record jump. It was expected earlier in the year that the shipments would reach 650,000 tons but the Fernie strike and accident and consequent shortage of coke for smelters and the shortage of power at the Granby smelter combine to knock out the original estimate. Notwithstanding the drawbacks, the Boundary will lead all other districts as a producer.

Phoenix Dec. 3.—Beginning tomorrow the Granby mines in this camp will send out 35 cars of ore daily or over 1,000 tons, an increase of 50 per cent over the daily tonnage of the last several months, and the next day 52 cars or over 1,500 of ore will be shipped and

continued every day thereafter, according to present programme.

The two heavy Shay locomotives, one of which has been working on Deadwood hill, will once more handle the Phoenix ore traffic, and it will be all they can do to take care of it.

This increase of ore shipments is due to the completing of final arrangements by the Granby company so that all four blast furnaces, two of which have been idle since June 1st, on account of coke shortage and then on account of power, can be placed in commission as well as the two converters.

All details for transmitting power from the falls at Cascade have finally been carried out, and the current is now turned on so that it can be used as an auxiliary at the Granby smelter in order that there may be no further trouble on account of the shortage of power.

H. N. Galer assistant manager of the Granby company, returned a few days ago from a trip to Fernie, where he was given assurance that the smelter should have whatever coke was needed to operate its works to the fullest capacity. At present there are about 250 men employed by the Granby company at its mines, and this force will of necessity be augmented at once by about 200 men in order to break down and get out the increased tonnage of ore, and at the smelter probably 75 or 100 more men will be employed. Latterly a good many men have been arriving in camp and it is thought there will not be any trouble in securing all the skilled and common labor required.

The blowing in of the two additional furnaces at the Granby smelter means that all seven furnaces in the Boundary smelters are now in full blast, treating about 2,500 tons of ore from the Boundary mines each 24 hours.

At Fairview B. C., last Monday an Anarchist mountain farmer named C. Coss was charged by Customs Officer Sidley with having brought a bull calf into Canada without reporting to the customs and paying the duty on same. One witness testified that Coss bought the animal at Molson, Washington, and paid him \$17.50 for him. Another man stated that he had seen the bull in a field on Coss' farm on the British Columbia side of the line, and that Coss, after telling him that he had bought the animal from R. L. Cawston of Keremeos, had offered him a half interest in his purchase for \$25. The accused stated that he sold the bull to a man named Wallace for \$20 south of the line and that he did not bring him into Canada, as charged. As he brought no evidence to corroborate his statements the magistrate, C. A. R. Lambly, S. M., fined him \$50 and costs and also mulcted him in the value of the bull, \$17.50, as in usual the cases of smuggling stock across the line.

The Curling Club.

A largely attended meeting of the Greenwood Curling Club was held at the City Hall on Monday evening with J. A. Russell in the chair. The secretary read the agreement between the club and Mr. Winnett for the rink and reported that 45 members were enrolled. Since then three others have joined. Officers for the year were elected, as follows; President, J. A. Russell, (re-elected); Vice President, W. G. McMynn; sec., J. M. Humphrey (re-elected) and committee of management, J. S. Birnie, W. L. C. Gordon and Jas. McCreath Jr. The rink is nearing completion and the ice should be ready next week.

CHAPTER 40.

An Act to amend the Liquor Licence Act 1900. 1900 c 18.

(21st June, 1902.) His Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislature, Assembly of the Province of British Columbia, enacts as follows:

1. This Act may be cited as the Liquor Licence Act (1900) Amendment Act, 1902.
2. Section 37, of chapter 18 of the statutes of 1900, being the "Liquor Licence Act 1900" is hereby repealed, and the following substituted therefor:
"37. No license under this Act shall be issued or transferred to any person of the Indian race, or to any person who is not on the list of voters for the Legislature of the province of British Columbia."

WISE OLD GRAND TRUNK.

There is an up-to-dateness about the movements of the Grand Trunk officials which augurs well for the future success of the road. When general manager Hayes announced that the old railway would be continued to the Pacific coast, the good people of the east rejoiced that no subsidy or subvention was asked. The building of railways without plundering the public, extracted encomiums even from Sir Thos. Shaughnessy. This public spirited policy might look all right in Ontario, but the Grand Trunk officials well knew that they could never secure an entrance into British Columbia unless they ask for something. So they sent Mr. Morse and their old war horse Wainwright to Victoria. He immediately made himself persona grata with the government by announcing "The purpose of my visit to the coast is to see the government and people regarding the Grand Trunk Pacific, and we shall ask for subsidies similar to other transcontinental lines." That announcement will make the way easy for the Grand Trunk in this province. They won't be troubled with opposition from the government, nor with injunctions, nor with quo warranto proceedings. Let them go the other transcontinental lines one better and ask for more and they will make life long friends of all members of the government and the majority of the legislature. Every man is judged by success. Wainwright in some respects is a

greater railway man than Jim Hill. The latter tried to get into British Columbia without asking for subsidies and he met with nothing but opposition from the start.

The Grand Trunk is not as sleepy as it looked away back in Bruce county.

THE COKE SUPPLY.

The Fernie Free Press has spoken. We would be indeed ungrateful if we did not hasten to express our appreciation of the presumably semi-official assurances that there is going to be no shortage of coke. Amalgamations may take place, smelters may be increased, new smelters may be erected, but the Crow's Nest Pass Coal Company will always be ready with the goods. Jay P. Graves is quite wrong. He need fear no shortage of coke.

We have a faint recollection of similar assurances coming from Fernie some time ago. Empty coal and coke bunkers, and none in transit alarmed smelter men but they were buoyed up by those seductive assurances that came from Fernie. There must be an exception to every good rule and the rule that Fernie is always ready to supply coke did not escape. The spectre of silent mines, cold smelters, idle miners and general stagnation of the mining industry still haunts us, but in the future everything is going to be lovely.

There will be no more strikes, no more accidents, and the British Columbia smelters will always have first consideration.

We are glad to hear it. The Crow's Nest Pass Coal Company deserves success. It invested a large sum of money in the development of its mines it has done a great work despite great obstacles and accidents, we are prepared to give it due credit. The point we wish to emphasize, however, is that in a country like this rich in its coal measures, the mining industry should never be stifled by lack of fuel for the smelters.

The City Council.

At the regular meeting of the City Council, on Monday evening amendments to the water rates by-law were considered. Two matters were discussed at length. The first was the use of water for garden sprinkling. It was felt that regular consumers of water should be encouraged when desirous of using water to beautify their grounds, but that the city could not afford to install a service for lawn sprinkling alone. It was finally decided that a minimum charge for water for any purpose should be \$12 a year and that regular consumers should be charged \$3 per annum additional when water was used for sprinkling.

Another matter was the fixing of a charge for running service pipes to the street lines. In all other towns a charge is made for this work but heretofore in Greenwood the city put in the service pipe to the street line without expense to the consumer. The city engineer was asked to fix the lowest possible flat rate to cover this cost and the by-law will be further considered next Monday evening.

W. E. Hodges was appointed city auditor at a salary of \$150 per annum.

THE EDITOR'S E A Y CHAIR.

Those who helped to organize a mock parliament in the little red school house or in the school room of some modest church, and who played at the game of politics in an educative sort of way, cannot but be struck with the striking similarity between the crude legislative organization and the political affairs of this province to-day. In the mock parliaments of the red school house or village church, governments were often wrecked by the vagaries of some of its supporters. Without notice and without explanation, supporters often went over to the opposition. This week a beardless youth would hurl anathemas against a corrupt government; next week he would be found a full fledged cabinet minister enjoying the emoluments of office, and basking in the smiles of his quondam opponents. The object of these mock parliaments was to drill the rising generation in the art of public speaking. Versatility was more of a necessity than consistency. It was considered a feat of oratory to be equally at home on both sides of a subject. No responsibility was attached to the speaker's utterances. He was not there to explicit any particular principle. Consequently he was free to appear on the side of the government or opposition.

In British Columbia today public life appears to be regulated in a similar way. In the absence of well defined parties, principles are merely for the purpose of securing election and are not intended to bind a man after he gets in the house. Indeed there is no guarantee that a man can find his platform or his principles if he wished to be bound by them. Under such circumstances what could the poor fellow do? The easiest way out of the difficulty is to accept a seat among the mighty at a salary of \$4000 a year.

The mock parliament of the little red school is no greater travesty on responsible government than the provincial government of to-day. All sorts of remedies may be suggested; all sorts of political parties may be organized to purge our politics and bring better conditions but there will be no stability until the two great political parties of

this country decide that British Columbia is worth fighting for and they make a serious effort to divide the people into two distinct parties. If this were done it would be impossible for a bright young man like Dennis Murphy to make an ass of himself.

The mock parliament has its place but that place is not in the pile of stone that adds to the beauty of the Capital of the province.

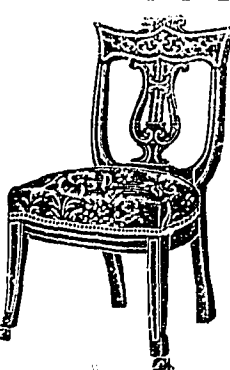

It is reported from Camp McKinney that a short time ago C. M. COKE SUPPLY.

The editor of the Boundary Creek Times reviewing in his last week's issue the coke supply question in a long editorial presents to its readers a dismal picture of closed smelters and idle mines, in consequence of recent shortages in coke. Upon the authority of Mr. Graves he states that the increasing activity in the gold-copper mining camps of the Boundary country and the silver-lead industry of the Nelson district is already making urgent demands for more smelters and he argues that since the fuel supply is insufficient to meet the present requirements the growth of those industries will be starved for the want of fuel, food, and the only cloud in his bright picture of the future is this much talked of coke shortage.

He speaks of the recent labor trouble and questions the right of either men or company to do anything to cause a strike and thus tie up the other industries of the district, and he suggests a government commission not only to adjust their differences but to enquire into the matter of securing a full supply of fuel for the smelters.

We believe the Times to be sincere in its pessimistic views and for that reason we will try to briefly explain some wrong conceptions it has taken of our main industry. The labor trouble is settled and we believe settled for good. The recent strike at Michel was merely a family quarrel which Manager Tonkin had nothing to do with. The mines at the Crow's Nest Pass Coal Company's three districts were never worked to better advantage, both the employees and the employer, than at the present time. The men are earning larger wages than they ever did, and the mines, considering the workable territory, never turned out more coal than at the present time. The prospects never were brighter for a long, uninterrupted season of industrious activity and we assure the Times that neither the company or the men are looking for trouble.

Now let us see if we cannot let more sunlight on the Times' picture by dispelling the cloud with which he has hidden the sun of prosperity. At the present time the ovens of Firnie and Michel export 700 tons of coke daily. Next year those new smelters of the Boundary country may draw supplies from 250 more ovens at Michel, and Morrissey which at the present time has no ovens will be one of the largest supply points for this important fuel. If then the demand is greater than the output no reason presents itself to our mind why the supply cannot be increased to any required extent. The coal is here in innumerable quantities, and of a quality surpassing any other for coking purposes.

In reviewing the past season the Times should not forget that strikes are not the only drawback the Coal Co. has had to contend with. The effects of the explosion of May 22nd are still

seen in our coke exports, and as the crippled condition of the wrecked mine is being improved the output as steadily increases. Coupled with this is the fact that the coal demand for domestic and other purposes is becoming greater and this market is necessarily satisfied first.

Operators of metalliferous mines are apt to forget that coal mines are not developed in a day. The Crow's Nest Pass Coal Company has spent millions in development work and the mines are still in their infancy. By far the greater part of the work done as yet is in the way of preparation for permanent and future operations and when these mines emerge from infancy into the full strength of maturity we feel confident that all the metalliferous industries of the interior will be able to get its fuel supply from our inexhaustible deposits.

Shake! therefore Brother Ross and let us rejoice in the mutual advantages our districts give. Go ahead with your mines as fast as you like and you will find the coke industry of this valley keeping even pace with you.—Firnle Free Press.

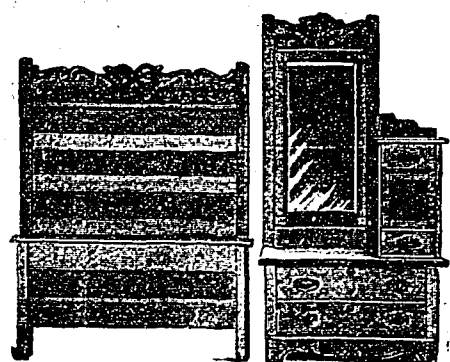
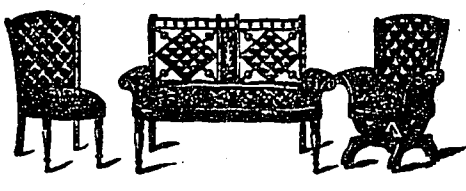
