BIG SHOWING

ON TIP TOP

The upper shaft on the Tip Top claim, on Skylark hill, close to Greenwood, is 35 feet deep, and in good ore from the surface to the drift being run at the bottom, which is also in good ore, showing a ledge of copper carrying gold values as well, over 16 feet wide.

This property was located in 1894, the former owners doing sufficient development to obtain a crown grant. Last year the claim was sold to a syndicate headed by H. V. Fuller, of the Bay mine, an adjoining property, who sank a shaft 165 feet deep, near the copper shaft, on a quartz ledge running \$42 in gold. The Tip Top is now an incorporated company, under the laws of British Columbia, and the company has given a bond on half of the company's stock to the Consolidated Gold Mines company, of Seattle, who are developing the copper showing and will install a 10 H. P. electric hoist on the lower shaft and sink another 100 feet on the rich gold lead. The Crescent Fraction hoist will be moved at once, and work started on this fine showing immediately, under the direction of M. Bamford, one of the directors of the Consolidated Gold Mines Co., who arrived this week. Besides the two shafts mentioned, a tunnel has been started to strike the copper ledge at depth. This ledge carries 20 per cent sulphur and is a most desirable fluxing ore. A carload is now awaiting treatment at the B. C. Copper company's smelter.

\$9,000 DAMAGES

Mr. Justice Martin has handed down judgment in the case of Dimmick vs. the British Columbia Copper Company, Limited, heard at the Assizes held here in May last, giving the plaintiff and his wife damages which will total in the neighborhood of \$9,000, although the exact amount is not certain at present. The case attracted considerable attention at the time by reason of the amount of damages asked, some \$14,500 in all, and because of the circumstances under which the action was brought. The action arose from an accident which occurred at Greenwood on August 17th, 1908. The plaintiff was residing near the mine with his wife and two children, employed as a cook. A large boring was made in the workings of the defendants and shots were put in, 22 of five to nine sticks of dynamite each. No precaution was taken except the three customary whistles for warning. The result in the Dimmick home was the death of one child and the injury for life of Mrs. Dimmick, an arm and both legs being broken.

This mine is almost within the city limits and has had considerable development done in the past. Mr. Fuller deserves credit for his energetic development of mining properties adjacent to Greenwood.

TEN YEARS AGO

KING LEOPOLD

King Leopold of Belgium died last Friday after an operation. The King was an old man being born in 1835. He was a son of Leopold 1 and Queen Louise, a daughter of King Louis Philippe of France. He married Marie Henrietta, a daughter of Archduke Joseph of Austria in 1835. The aged monarch came to the throne in 1885. With the aid of H. M. Stanley, the African explorer, he became the ruler of the Congo state. In recent years Leopold was the subject of severe criticism and condemnation in connection with the conduct of affairs in that territory, and demands for reforms were made by a number of European nations.

FOUNDER OF THE CONGO

Now that King Leopold has gone to his final account with his maker, and the whole world has stopped cursing him, for a while, for his mal-administration of the Congo and its reign of rubber terror, it is interesting to note that this vast territory was offered to England by H. M. Stanley, the great explorer, and refused, and that it was Stanley who founded the Congo state. He found a ready royal patron at Brussels, who read in the story of Stanley's vast undeveloped kingdom an opportunity for self-aggrandizement and fortune, which he made good use of.

GENERAL NOTES

Belgium is mourning for King Leopold. It's morning for the Congo, too.

Denmark was the first to make use of the postage stamp as a weapon to fight tuberculosis in 1904.

During the course of next year Prince Edward of Wales is to have his first taste of service with the fleet afloat.

On December 18, Grand Duke Michael Nicolaevitch, grand uncle of Emperor Nicholas, died at Cannes, France.

The report that Herbert Gladstone, secretary of state for home affairs, will be appointed governor general of United South Africa has been officially confirmed.

The E. P. U. tunnel is in 1,300 feet and the Argo tunnel 300 feet. Mayor Bunting and Oia Lofstad have arranged to shake hands under the Skylark mountain, but the date is not fixed.

A JAPANESE TRAGEDY

A terrible explosion occurred at the Onoura colliery, Japan, recently, involving the loss of 262 lives. The mine is one of the largest in Japan, employing 4,755 miners, with an output of 44,000 tons monthly. The mine management gave \$100 to the family of each victim and is providing food for the bereaved.

DYNAMO TUNNEL

Work is in full swing in the tunnel on the Dynamo claim near Greenwood. The bore in 300 feet and Mr. L. Portman, the principal owner of the property, is working three men there. There are three high grade gold veins on the surface and the tunnel will develop these at considerable depth.

THE E. P. U. MINE

The tunnel on the E. P. U. mine is in 1,300 feet and the ledge matter encountered last week is showing up well. The rock is somewhat different in character to the surface ore, but carries iron pyrites and apparently is wider than was anticipated. Word of the locating of the ledge itself is expected momentarily.

HARD LINES

ON DR. COOK

The University of Copenhagen has found that Dr. Cook's papers fail to prove his claim that he reached the North pole. After years of exploration, after hardships and privations in the farthest north, Dr. Cook is repudiated by most of the authorities on Northern exploration, such as Nansen, and even if the doctor did not actually stand on the coveted spot where all roads lead to the South, it is hard lines to have almost the whole world turn against him with the exception of a few faithful friends. Had he claimed to have gone within any reasonable distance of the pole no one would have doubted him, except Peary, who cannot believe anything good of the doctor, but he claimed no less than the pole itself. The world stands aghast at the doctor's delusion and its discovery.

C. H. Topp, city engineer of Victoria, has resigned.

Two armed masked men held up William Lough in Vancouver last week.

The Royal Vancouver Yacht club building was destroyed by fire on December 20. The Alexander cup was saved in the nick of time.

An eight-oared shell—the first of that type of racing boats in western Canada—will be seen darting around the inlet, propelled by a husky picked crew from the Vancouver rowing club, before the end of next May.

Manager Biesel, of the Snowshoe mine, is busy perfecting arrangements for the transfer of the land purchased at Boundary Falls for the proposed No. 7 concentrator to treat the No. 7 mine ore.
