AT THE EMMA MINE WILL BUILD ROAD

Development Work Now Great Northern Will Build Being Done.

This Summer.

Shaft Down 115 Feet-Electric Power | Another Rich Section Becomes Tribu-Will Be Used.

Mr. and Mrs. Frederic Keffer, Mr. Ellis Lovejoy and a Times reporter visited the Emma mine, one of the properties owned by the B. C. Copper Co., one day last week. Mr. Lovejoy is a mining engineer from Columbus, Ohio, and had been in the Loomis country, state of Washington, inspecting some properties in that section; on his way through he spent some time in this camp and looked into the methods adopted by the companies operating the immense low-grade copper lodes, particularly the Mother Lode.

When told last summer, by a lady visitor to his home, of the system followed, Mr. Lovejov was very sceptical, but he left thoroughly convinced that that he had been correctly informed. At the time of going to press the depth attained is about 115 feet and the ore body had not yet been struck, although there was every indication of its proximity, and some ore was being sent up from the bottom.

From plans made it is not expected that the ore body will be encountered until the shaft has been sunk to 130 feet depth. The probabilities are that by the end of next week the shaft will be down to the required depth and that the drifting on the vein will be started.

Two shifts of men are working and the power is obtained from the air compressor on the Oro Donoro. The The shaft is single-compartment, with man-hole, and is a distinct credit to the superintendent, Mr. Morrison. It is timbered throughout and struck the writer as being a particularly fine piece of work.

LARGE VEIN OF GOOD ORE MAIN LINE TO SIMILKAMEEN

tary to U. S. Business Men.

In the latest number of the Hedley Gazette an article appears from which it is gathered that the Great Northern Railway company has decided to build into the Similkameen from a point on their main line near Wenatchee. While no one can reasonably blame the Great Northern it is a deathblow, if true, to this section. It was hoped by almost all that the company would build from Midway west and give Greenwood connection. Such it now appears is not the intention. The following is the conclusion of the article

in question: "The consensus of opinion among those who claim to be 'in the know' is that the road is coming in from Wenatchee and the section from Midway to the lower end of the Similkameen is abandoned for the present at least.

"How British Columbians in the Boundary and the Coast will like this remains to be seen. To them it may seem death to Canadian interests to have an American railway boring into the heart of British Columbia's plum pie, but to the trail tramper of the Similkameen

"There are some who claim that Pat Welch now has the contract to build from Loomis to Princeton, and that this portion is to be graded first, the supplies for same to be toted in.

"What the C. P. R. Will do in the matter nobody knows, and the Similkameen has quit caring. If Vanconverites don't like the present outlook of the Great Northern running in from Wenatchee and quitting this side of Hope mountain instead of building from Midway and going on to the coast they can have it out with their coast representatives at Ottawa. If these men had supported V. V. & E. legislation at Ottawa in 1894, or even in the early part of the present session work would have probably been undertaken."

If anything further were required to show the utter folly of the government's do-nothing policy, surely it is abundantly evident from the foregoing. A DISAPPOINTING SESSION

For the benefit of those of our readers_who_do_not_receive_the coast papers'we reproduce in full the leading article from last Saturday's Victoria Colonist entitled "A disappointing session," wherein that paper expresses its entire disapproval of the famous Mc-Bride policy of do nothing. Conservatives in this district are. almost to a man, bitterly outspoken regarding the failure of the famous quartette, Fraser (Grand Forks), Shatford (Similkameen), Macgowan, Vancouver, and Grant of Comox, to stand by their pre-election pledges and obtain railway legislation even at the expense of the defeat of the McBride government. Coast opposition papers all tell of their "open revolt" on Saturday last and their subsequent "falling into line" and acquiescence in the now famous government railway policy. The Colonist's flop is a very high tribute to the constant stand taken by the brilliant leader of the opposition, Mr. J. A. Macdonald. The article referred to follows:

"It is the general expectation that with today's sitting, the 1905 session of the Provincial Legislature will terminate with an unusual suddenness, and with results and accomplishments in the form of legislation added to the statute book that will not by any means approximate the expectations of the country at the opening of Parliament. It had been hoped that a cleancut and progressive policy would be enunciated and developed, the natural working out of which would be a stim-

lation, and an impetus to legitimate provincial growth. With all the world looking to Western Canada, the occasion seemed ripe for accomplishments. But the dying days of the session find few of the rosente hopes destined to realization. The promised railway policy has ended in barren debating, behind the closed doors of the caucus, of the various proposals advanced by those companies which sought co-operation of the government in the carrying out of their construction projects. The Assessment Act has, it is true, been amended in a measure to correct some of the manifest injustices demonstrated in its working during the last recess; and the finance minister has been able to show an economical conduct of the general routine of busines: of the province, and in his estimates to indicate a consistent disposition on the part of the administration to curtail expenditure in every possible manner. This, however, does not meet the demands of a province aiming to be progressive, and whose natural resources and opportunities, with wise legislative assistance, assuredly destine it for greatness. Instead of assisting natural progress born of individual enterprise, the legislation added to the statute book during the present session has, indeed, a recognized tendency in a contrary direction, as for example in the bill of the member for Nanaimo city further limiting the employment of underground workers in the colleries out of which it is greatly feared there must come suspension on this Island of one of its most important industries. In consenting to the passage of this measure, as in reluctance to present a straight-cut railway programme, the government of the day will be condemned by many of independent minds shibboleth of expediency. It were infinitely better, these critics will contend, to go down to defeat upon the Surveys on Kettle River and West issue of a tangible policy for the betterment of provincial conditions, than to live by grace of acquiescence in illconsidered and even distinctly harmful and dangerous laws. The session ends with the government of Hon. Mr. Mc. Bride still in the saddle, but its results have weakened instead of strengthening the ministry in the eyes of the people. The electorate will recognize and accentuate the undeniable fact that it is highly dangerous for any government to seek to carry on with so variable and insufficient a majority as to make recourse to the support of a party, divergent from its own; a first necessity of existence in power. Hon. Mr. McBride and his ministry it appears to many would have better proven their recognition of their duties to British Columbia had they set their political course and held to it even in the face of defeat through devotion to a decisive and consistent Conservative policy recognizing and based upon the conditions and necessities of the province as it is today."

A BY-LAW TO RAISE BY WAY OF DE-BENTURES THE SUM OF \$15,000 FOR THE PURPOSE OF EXTENDING THE WATERWORKS SYSTEM OF THE CITY OF GREENWOOD.

WHEREAS it is necessary and ex edient to extend the waterworks system of the City of Greenwood and for that purpose to borrow by

way of debentures the sum of \$15,000;
AND WHEREAS a petition signed by the owners of at least one tenth of the value of real property in the City of Greenwood, as shown by the last revised assessment roll, has been presented to the Municipal Council requesting them to introduce said bylaw; AND WHEREAS for the payment of said

deben tures, sinking fund and interest it will be necessary to raise the sum of \$1,440.00 by special rate in each and every year and WHEREAS the whole rateable lands and im-

provements or real property of the said Municipality according to the last revised assessmentroll is \$1,124,525.00 and WHEREAS the existing

the municipality amounts to \$75,950.00 and no principal or interest is in arrears.

Therefore the Municipal Council of the City of Greenwood enacts as follows: 1. It shall be lawful for the Corporation of

the City of Greenwood to raise by way of loan from any person or persons, body or bodies, Corporation or Corporations, who may be willing to advance the same on the credit of the debentures hereinalter mentioned the sum of \$15,000 and cause the same to be paid into the hands of the City Treasurer of the said City of Greenwood, for the purpose aforesaid, and with the object hereinbefore recited.

2. It shall be lawful for the Mayor to cause any number of debentures to be made, not exceeding in the whole the sum of \$15,000 in sums of not less than \$100 each as may be required, and all such debentures shall be sealed with the seal of the Corporation of the City of Greenwood, signed by the Mayor, and countersigned by the Treasurer of the said City.

3. The said debentures shall be payable in twenty years from the day herein mentioned for this bylaw to take effect at such bank in the City of Green wood as the Council may by

resolution direct. 4. The said debentures shall have coupons attached for the payment of interest at the rate of six (t) per centum per annum on the amount of said debentures and shall be made payable yearly on the 4th day of May in each and every

5. A special rate on the dollar shall be levied and raised in each and every year, in addition to all other rates, on all the rateable property of the City, sufficient to pay interest, and create a sinking fund for the payment of the debt hereby created at and when thesame shall be-

come due. 6. The sum of \$900 shall be raised annually for the payment of interest on the amount of the debt incurred during the currency of the debentures hereby incurred, by way of sinking

8. It shall be lawful for the Corporation from time to time to purchase any of the said debentures at such prices as may be mutually agreed upon, and al! debentures so purchased shall be cancelled, and no reissue of any debentures or debenture shall be made in con-

sequence of any such purchase.

9. This Bylaw shall before the final passing thereof receive the assent of the electors of the corporation in manner prescribed by the Municipal Clauses Act and Amending Acts. 10. This Bylaw may be cited as the Water-



INDUSTRIAL CONDITIONS. In general business, the year 1904 rials. was not without its vicissitudes. The lumber industry did not enjoy so much prosperity as during recent years, chiefly owing to a diminished demand from the United Kingdom, which was only partly compensated for by the steady consumption of the United The dairying industry, which is of such growing importance in the East realized considerably less money for the producers than in 1903, and had not been for the good harvest in the West, we should probably have seen a partial set-back in the growing prosperity of the Dominion.

THE WHEAT CROP.

.Naturally, the progress of the crops lety, for the success or otherwise of the harvest in that great country is no longer a question of merely local in-terest. In certain parts of the country the crops were damaged by rust, and in consequence of this the grade of wheat was not so high as the hopes of the farmers had led them to antici-The crop was, however, bountiful, being estimated at sixty million bushels; while the inferiority in quality was more than made up by the higher price obtained, and it is estimated that the wheat alone will realize forty million dollars. The influx of settlers consequently continues, many still coming into the country from across the boundary, and bringing with them not only capital but valuable experience. New lands are being constantly taken up, while farmers already on the ground have been adding to their holdings. This is, perhaps a weak spot at the present time, for, encouraged by the success of past seasons, and seeing the price of land steadily adncing in value, no doubt many have tlers is only natural; but there is reason to fear that the speculator has also ion of that sort actually retards the progress of the country. It is also noticeable that the number of commercial failures in Manitoba and the Northwest Territories has increased although the total of such liabilities has not increased in like proportion. It is difficult for us who remain at home, or perhaps pay an occasional visit to the West to realize the amount of self-restraint that is necessary in there western communities, if business to be kept on a safe basis, the no-

permanent, and a return to greater ac- | Canada. Hitherto wheat has been subexport only. In future, wheat is to be included amongst such raw materials. I do not intend to wander on to the debatable ground of fiscal questitions, but this action by the United States Treasury may have effects not at present contemplated. This shows an increase of more than \$2,-000,000 over the production of 1902 and 1903, but just falls short of 1901, when

the output reached \$20,000,000.

This increased production has not, however, been accompanied by any better results for the shareholders in either the Canadian companies or those established in the United King-dom, and in all alike, profits, where existing at all, have been meagre in the extreme. Efforts are now being made by influential persons in Canada and the United Kingdom, representing some of the principal companies in the Rossland Camp, to bring about an amalgamation of interests, and should these efforts meet with success there should be brighter days ere long. In the Yukon, on the other hand, the output of gold showed further diminution, barely reaching \$10,000,000 in 1904, compared with \$11,000,000 in the preceding year. 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

Synopsis of Regulations Governing the Disposal of Dominion Lands within the Railway Belt in the Province of British Columbia.

A LICENSE to cut timber can be acquired only at public competition. A rental of \$5 per square mile is charged for all timber berths excepting those situated West of Yale for which the rental is at the rate of 5 cents per acre per annum.

In addition to the rental, dues at the following rates are charged :--

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
