## PRAISES BOY SCOUTS

### General Baden Powell Tells of His Trip to Canada and the U. S.

Declares the Movement Will Help to Develop the Imperial  
Spirit--Says Boys in Canada Have a Much Better  
Knowledge of Woodcraft Than Boys in  
the United States.

General Baden Powell on his return to Liverpool had high praise for Canada's Boy Scouts. He said the movement would help to develop the Imperial spirit, and the best men of the Dominion were taking it up. Referring to his visit to the United States, he said there was no doubt that the boys of Canada had a better knowledge of Woodcraft and more experience of the veldt, but some of the Canadian centers were growing into big towns and the scout movement would help to prevent the wastrel and hooliganism. General Baden-Powell on the voyage home wrote the Scout Guide book for Canada. He visited seventeen scout centers in Canada and found them all organized in the right way. The organization in Greenwood is in a flourishing condition, and

the parents of the boy members know that if their boys follow along the line of its teachings they will grow up to be better men. The boys of today are the men of tomorrow, and the destiny of the country lies in their hands. The tendency of the world seems for the better. More and greater efforts are being put forth to stimulate the young mind and direct it in a channel of usefulness. The early instillation of morality and civic righteousness in the mind of the youth very rarely deserts him in his manhood. Thus we are confronted with the great work of early education of the boys of today that they may be the guiding stars of tomorrow. All praise to General Powell in his noble work of forming a society that will learn our boys self-maintenance and honorable manhood.

## LADIES HELP

That mail clerks do not remain at their positions long enough to justify the exclusive hiring of men in the offices is the reason given out by local C. P. R. officials for their decision in declining to hire any more men as clerks. Instead, women are taken on in all positions, as stenographers and clerks, by the company and in the future the weaker sex will be granted all positions in the local offices of the company.

According to one high official of the company who spoke of the new system a few days ago, male clerks are preferred to women, but because of the fact that the majority of those of the stronger sex who are engaged, few remain for any long period. As soon as they become acquainted with the routine of the office, and are used to the duties which they are supposed to perform, the men give up their jobs, leaving the company to break in

new clerks. This means the loss of office efficiency, besides a monetary loss to the company. The women clerks are paid practically the same amount as the men, and the small difference in salary covers the difference in efficiency between the men and women.

At present the offices of the general passenger agent are the only ones in which the changes are going into effect, though it is thought that in a few months practically the whole clerical force of the C. P. R. will be women.

## THE MIDWAY COAL MINES

Strike a Rich Vein of Coal in Paying Quantities.

CHEAP FUEL FOR ALL  
Stock Advance From 25c to 50 Cents a Share.

A party of stockholders of the Midway Coal properties made a trip to the mines this week and their views of the situation was most optimistic. The appearance of the mines and its possibilities was a big surprise to them and made them certainly feel good as holders of stock in the company.

Work is fast progressing and the company will ship three cars of coal about the first of Nov. One car goes to Spokane, one to Grand Forks and one to Greenwood and can be sold to consumers about half what we are asked for.

The outlook is so gratifying that stockholders are now quoting 50 cents a share, which was formerly 25 cents. This is the most convincing evidence that Midway coal is no hot air proposition, and the men who have shares in the mines had better freeze on to them.

The direct benefit to Greenwood in having a coal supply almost at our door, and at a reasonable cost, appeals strongly to the citizens of this town, and that they will take advantage of the opportunity is a foregone conclusion.

The coal is classed as very good bituminous coal, suitable for home or manufacturers.

## PORTUGAL GOVERNMENT

### New Administration Said to Be in Good Financial Condition.

### Change of Affairs Has Been Agitated for Many Years by the Leaders in the Uprising of a Few Days Ago. Republic Form of Government Believed to Suit the Majority of People

President Bragas of Portugal has not many spare moments, but he was kind enough to receive the Associated Press correspondent. He particularly desired it to be understood that the revolution had no military or personal aim, but like those in Brazil and Turkey, was purely the outcome of philosophical ideas. The Braganza dynasty had failed to keep abreast of modern progress, he said, and had done nothing to render people masters of their own destinies. One of the means by which the late dynasty had tried to maintain its position he said was continually to menace the people with British intervention to crush popular sentiment;

as if an ancient alliance between the two nations was one between dynasties and not the peoples. Senior Bragas added that he had every confidence in the national resources and was convinced that an honest administration would suffice without adventitious means to put the finances of the country on a satisfactory footing and achieve the moral and physical improvements the nation had so much needed. A striking proof of the readiness of the whole country to adopt a new form of government was the fact that the provinces were calmly awaiting the publication of a manifesto and the constitution of the government and then would rally to the republic.

**PORTUGUESE AFFAIR**

Two features of the revolution in Portugal present themselves to the observer at this distance. One is that it is mainly a military movement. The army and navy have brought about the situation. It is like a change of government in decaying Rome—or in a Latin American republic. The second aspect of the case is that the revolution appears to be purely a Lisbon affair. Lisbon is a city of 400,000 population, but Portugal has 6,000,000 people. Will the course of the six millions be determined by the four hundred thousand who are themselves controlled by a half dozen regiments and their crews of a small squadron of ships? One would answer this question in the negative, if it were thought that the people of Portugal had much interest in the matter, or that they were attached to the royal house or to the monarchical institutions. It may be found that they are ready to acquiesce in any change and not disposed to fight for kings or against them. If the Portuguese accept the republic no other European state will interfere on behalf of King Manuel. They may protect the life of the royal family, which is connected with other royal houses, but will recognize any government that is set up and proves able to keep the peace. Yet the situation is likely to cause grave anxiety. Spain is in a troubled condition, and has an ardent republican party. Spain has also the same ecclesiastical controversies as have contributed to the troubles in Portugal. In both countries there are socialists and anarchist agitators, with a large following. But in Spain the king and the government have so far retained the loyal support of the army, and the army is able to prevent a revolution in Spain, as well as it is able to produce a revolution in Portugal.—Vancouver Daily News.

**IRISH HOME RULERS**

New notes are struck in the speeches delivered by Mr. Redmond, the leader of the Irish Home Rulers, and by his colleagues on their present tour, both

in Canada and in the United States; and one or two notes formally sounded are no longer heard. In place of dwelling on the woes of the Irish people and the iniquities of the landlords, they now speak with congratulation of the transfer of ownership of the land to the actual worker and of the greatly improved outlook before the country so far as the condition of the people is concerned. For the legislation which has made this possible they claim credit; though as a matter of fact it was formed, introduced and put through by a Unionist government. Perhaps it would be expecting too much from the human nature of politicians to expect Mr. Redmond and Mr. O'Connor to give political opponents their due. Again, in place of the bitter anti-British animus which formerly pervaded their appeals to the Irish-American, we find a new spirit of something like imperialism—not only a recognition of the greatness of the British Empire but actually a sort of pride in it as of a great inheritance in which they have a share. Not only do they want Home Rule for Ireland; they also want to retain their part in this great empire.

In their demands there is a corresponding modification. Instead of prophesying the ultimate downfall of hated England, they are advocates of Imperial Federation. Instead of looking forward to an Ireland entirely separate from Great Britain, they now propose only local self government in local affairs, combined with representation in an imperial parliament which shall deal with imperial affairs. The mere profession that this was their object would not go for much. What lends weight to it is the new spirit of pride in the Empire, the new feeling that it is theirs and not something alien, and the new recognition that to part with their place in this empire would be a loss.—Nelson News.

It is difficult to understand how any one could be so base as to perpetrate the awful outrage of which the employees of the Los Angeles Times were the victims. We can only express horror at

the deed, sympathy with those who suffered by it and the hope that justice will speedily overtake those whose guilt caused it.

One hundred and fifty miners are entombed in the Las Esperanza mine, Mexico, through an explosion.

It looks as if the meat trust will buy out Douglas Lake property, the biggest cattle concern on the continent.

The Province of British Columbia has lost fully half a million dollars through chinese immigration frauds.

J. P. Shaw, M. P. P., has offered a handsome cup for competition between lacrosse teams of Yale-Cariboo and Kootenay.

Much hostility is shown against any movement made towards reciprocity with the United States, by Liberals interested in manufactures in the east.

The medical health officer of Toronto has warned doctors to report all cases of infantile paralysis, as it is said to be not only fatal but very contagious.

Thirty blue jackets of the battleship New Hampshire, were drowned while returning to their ship, by the upsetting of a tender, apparently overcrowded.

Gunner Allen was sentenced by Chief Justice Hunter at Victoria, to be hanged on Dec. 2 for the murder of Capt. Elliston of the R. C. G. A. on August 1 last. The jury brought in their verdict after being out for an hour and three-quarters.

**SEVERE COMMENT**

Giving judgment for wages to six Grand Trunk Pacific laborers, Magistrate Byers, of Edmonton, Alberta, declared the treatment of its employees that came under his notice disgraceful. "I myself have known men to have to wait for three weeks before they could leave town when they had another situation ready for them at some other place. During this time they had to pay their board and wait around for their money, besides loss of that time. While this may not be very much to a wealthy company like the Grand Trunk Pacific, it is a very large item to a poor workingman who has to work from day to day in order to live." Addressing the G. T. P. counsel, Mr. Collison, the magistrate advised him to bring the state of affairs forcibly before the management and endeavor to keep such a name as the Grand Trunk Pacific out of common police court trials.

It appears that the Grand Trunk Pacific has no pay office in Edmonton and authority must be secured from Winnipeg before pay checks can be honored. Since last spring over 100 of these cases have been settled in the police court.



**MINES AND MINING**

The Granby company has leased and bonded the Cliff & Consolidated St. Elmo mines in Rossland.

A nugget weighing 27 ounces was taken off bed rock at China Charley's claim in the Stevens creek, Cariboo.

In the Similkameen, the United Empire Coal mine is working three shifts, and will be ready to ship when the railway spur is finished to the property.

A body of asbestos, 4 1/2 ft. wide and with a streak of fibre 12 to 14 inches in width, has been located on Manard's ranch, two miles from Okanagan Falls. Nickel and graphite are also associated.

At the foot of Babine Lake a new strike is reported, a sample of which is reported to have run 480 ozs. silver to the ton. Several locations were made. This is the locality where is located the Silver Fox, recently bonded by C. S. Anderson to Portland people.

The production of 642,341 pounds of blister copper by the British Columbia Copper company during August was the highest figure to be reached since last March. Gold of 2317 ounces and silver yield of 8067 ounces also were greater than any previous month since March.

It was rumoured in Rossland that the Great Northern Railway company had purchased the Le Roi mine, and it was also rumoured that orders have been issued to put the road-bed and all bridges in a state of thorough repair between the mine and the Granby smelter. W. S. Rugh, who is now in charge of the Le Roi offices, has not heard a word about it.

The fact that the Consolidated Mining & Smelting Company's operations for the past year resulted in product of \$5,811,767 in value, or over \$400,000 more than last year, in spite of the lower prices for metals, is a striking proof of a steady development of the mineral industry of British Columbia, particular in Kootenay and the Boundary, from which the Trail smelter derives almost its entire ore supply.

Granby Consolidated's annual meeting of stockholders was held on Tuesday, Oct. 4. The annual report, which will be sent to stockholders, will contain a detailed statement of operations, and also reports on the property by General Manager Graves, Mine Superintendent Smith, the smelter superintendent and Dr. Sussman.

These reports will have a tendency to correct the extremely pessimistic opinion generally held regarding Granby's present value and future prospects.

**NO INSULT INTENDED**

Father Vaughan, the English cleric, has explained in an interview in Toronto that he meant nothing offensive in saying at Montreal that Protestantism was a "soulless religion." He was badly reported. The context showed that he was speaking of the mass as the soul of religion, and the mass not being recognized by the Protestant religion it was therefore from this point of view soulless. He added: "I think that Protestants are infinitely superior to the religion which they profess. I admire them, their zeal, their energy, enterprise, their philanthropy, their extraordinary generosity, but I can't admire their religion."

Protestants can accept this compliment without reflection on their religion, says the Stratford Beacon. A religion which develops "zeal, energy, enterprise, philanthropy and generosity" cannot be "soulless" or bad. Father Vaughan, who has said so many good things since coming to Canada in which Protestants as well as Catholics can agree, may be pardoned for his view of Protestantism. His stand on race suicide, on the purity of home life and denunciation of the frivolity and wickedness of the fashionable world made well worth while his coming to Canada.

**TIPPING SYSTEM**

A crusade has been started in Philadelphia against the long established and orthodox custom of tipping the hat as a salutation to lady friends. In the cases of wearers of panamas and fedoras the practice entails prompt executive ability, and the object of the respective salutation act is completed. If a compromise can be effected whereby the military high sign could be substituted for the present complicated and ungraceful habit it would mark a distinct forward step in social emancipation.

**SAYING AND DOING**

The Canadian Manufactures are in favor of a policy of substantial and effective tariff protection. Some of the representatives think that it is not a time to say much about it, but they are all disposed to do all they can to give effect to their opinions. The manufactures are not concerned about the things Sir Wilfrid said in the west. They are a great deal more interested in the things which he may do in Ottawa. If the premier can satisfy the grain growers by solemnly agreeing with their free trade arguments, and can also satisfy the manufactures by retaining the protective tariff he will have followed the line of least resistance to some purpose.

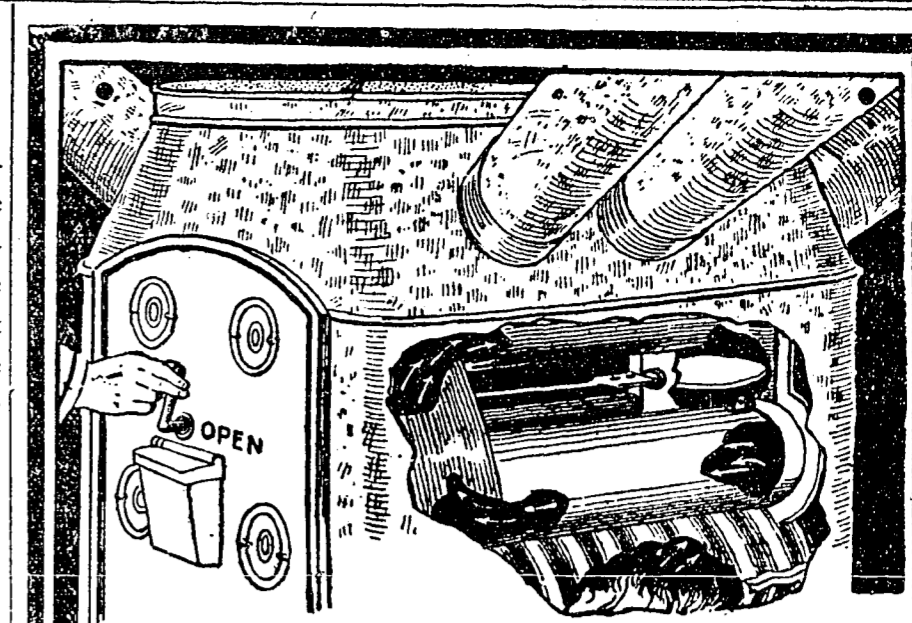
**LADY HENRY SOMERSET**  
**A Leader in British Philanthropic Work**

Lady Henry Somerset, president of the British Temperance Women's Association, and a leader in all philanthropic and social reform work, is a mighty influence for good, and has consecrated herself and her fortune to the service of humanity. She was born in England, the daughter of Earl Somers, for thirty years a member of the House of Lords and a man of noble character, who cared little for society, but spent his time in travel and scientific research. Ruskin, Garibaldi and Mazzini were his closest friends. He fell in love with the lady who became his wife through a portrait by Watts exhibited in London. It appealed to him as no living or pictured woman ever had; he sought the original, and after a romantic courtship, married her.

Lady Isabel, later Lady Somerset, was born in 1851, and even in the days of her girlhood found in social questions a theme of deep interest and was greatly influenced by the works of John Stuart Mill. After her presentation at Court she was caught in the social whirl and for years was a lady of fashion and pleasure, from which the present earnest, self-denying and enthusiastic worker for humanity was evolved in the days of sorrow, suffering and unhappiness through which she was soon to pass.

When she was twenty-one she was married to Lord Henry Somerset, second son of the Duke of Beaufort. The serious side of an unfortunate married life turned her mind to higher things; she helped those who needed it and was an angel of mercy and inspiration. She was interested in Biblical criticism, and in the maze of disputes and sophistries of many writers. One day while walking and thinking in her garden, she even doubted the existence of God. Then it seemed to her as if she heard an actual voice speaking to her very soul: "Act as if I were, and thou shalt know that I am."

Vividly impressed she went to her room, read her Bible, and in the morning told her friends she was going to retire from the world for a time. Taking her boy she went to Eastnor Castle, a beautiful place in the Malvern Hills, and fought out her battle with the Bible, realized her destiny, and conscious of the sins, shams and shallows of society, determined to give her strength to helping the world. With the poor at her own gates she started a temperance society, and gave an address in the school-room. Later she held Bible meetings in the billiard-room of the Castle, and thus began a successful work for good that has literally encircled the world in its influence and inspiration.
