## MINING

Nelson, November 10.—With the beginning of winter on the highest slopes of the mountains, properties which have been developing all the summer are now beginning to ship under more advantageous conditions. While this is particularly true of the Slocan, other properties in Rossland and in the Boundary are also coming to the front as shippers. The big event of the week is the proving of a parallel lead upon the Nugget Mine on Sheep Creek. The Sheep Creek district, hardly one year old, and which has now an output of close on 700 tons weekly, is negotiating for power to run its properties on a more economical basis. In Rossland the Silver Belt mine, not shipping since 1896, is again under lease. The Centre Star mine, with a shipment of 4,677 tons this week, makes a record, while the Trail smelter, with its receipts of 9,953 tons, has again established a record.

Rossland, Nov. 9.—At the lead refinery of the Consolidated Co., at Trail 60 tons of lead is turned out each day. Most of this lead is shipped to Shanghai, China, and to Yokohama, Japan, and the remainder to Toronto. Another large copper-gold furnace is being installed which will have a capacity of about 500 tons a day. This is intended to replace a smaller copper-gold furnace that was torn down some time since. When this furnace is completed the smelter will have a capacity of about 1,600 tons of copper-gold ore a day. The increased quantities of ore that are being received from the Centre Star and its allied mines, and from the leased and owned properties of the Consolidated Co., in the Phoenix camp, make the additional furnace a necessity.

In nine months this year New South Wales produced 195,592 fine oz. of gold valued at \$4,042,887.

Vermont produced 650,425 lb. copper in 1907.

### Prince Albert

The deferred election in Prince Albert resulted in the return of Rutten, Liberal, by a large majority, thus giving nine of the ten Federal seats of Saskatchewan to the Liberals.

### Hill Scars Seattle

The statement made by J. J. Hill at Vancouver that the big Great Northern liner, Minnesota, would probably be transferred from Seattle and in future operate from Vancouver has caused a sensation in Sound shipping circles.

The trouble is due to the attitude of the Interstate Commerce Commission regarding the rating of trans-Pacific freight and requiring the publication of the tariff on the railroad haul.

Already at San Francisco a big fleet of liners is laid up and things look very bad for the American merchant marine on the Pacific.

Their business has fallen to almost nothing and it is hoped that by the transfer of the Minnesota to a Canadian port the big steamship might be kept in commission.

## YALE-CARIBOO GONE WRONG

### Perversion of Local Issues Results in Disaster for the Upper Country

The tidal wave of unreasoning and unreasonable hostility to the policies of the Laurier Government which began at the coast, overwhelmed the Liberals of Yale-Cariboo and Kootenay yesterday.

The Oriental question and Beller Terms exploited by local Tories and backed up by unscrupulous misuse of patronage and power by the McBride Government secured majorities in favor of the two Conservative candidates which surprised even the most enthusiastic members of that party. In Yale-Cariboo where a victory for Mr. Ross was generally conceded by those best acquainted with the district, large majorities were secured by Mr. Burrell in all the centres of population. Of all the towns and cities in the district Phoenix alone came up to the expectations of the local Liberal committee, who are entitled to the greatest credit for the splendid work done by them.

Even Greenwood, Mr. Ross's home town, gave Mr. Burrell a majority, although the night before the election Conservatives conceded a Liberal majority of 50. The story of the deal by which such an extraordinary result was secured in Greenwood can best be told in a later issue. It begins with the selling out of Greenwood business men by the passage of that silly Board of Trade resolution and ends up by the clubbing of 25 out of 27 voters employed by the local Smelter into voting for the Tory candidate. In Kootenay the result is even more disastrous for the Liberal party. Mr. Smith Curtis who was counted a sure winner, being downed by the same forces which defeated five out of a solid delegation of seven Liberal members from British Columbia.

### NOTES.

Judging by the result in Grand Forks it is quite evident that Mr. Ross did not get the Hindoo vote.

The sleighing is fine in Greenwood.

Now if Geo. H. Cowan had only addressed that Liberal audience the result might have been different.

British Columbia generally does the wrong thing at the right time.

The fault does not lie with the workers of the Liberal party. The only way to successfully fight the devil is with fire. ### Tram Line Fatality.

A terrible accident occurred last Sunday morning on the Vancouver-Westminster inter-urban line due to the mistake of switchman Ellis who had been stationed at Cedar cottage because of the foggy weather.

Murdoch McDonald, motorman of the Central Park car was instantly killed, and Ralph A. Jamison, of the Westminster car has since died in the General Hospital.

Jameson was a married man and leaves a wife and several small children.

Both conductors were badly injured as were also a number of passengers, six of whom were taken to the hospital.

The switchman, who is blamed for the accident, has disappeared and it is thought that he may have committed suicide in his grief at the awful affair.

### Newfoundland

The returns from Newfoundland give the result of the elections in the ancient colony as a tie, 18 to 18.

### Wallace Mountain

The Bell Mining Co. after three months of active work on their Wallace Mountain property, will drive a 500 ft. tunnel to tap seven known veins on the surface every one of which carries ore in paying quantities.

The tunnel will tap the ground at a depth of from 110 to 200 feet. The properties are in the high-grade silver belt on Wallace Mountain, and these fissure veins cross the formation which is an altered granite.

It is claimed that there is no barren quartz on Wallace Mountain for wherever their is quartz there is pay.

The Bell Company has made some 500 assays of their ore, and in only forty did the result show less than \$30 a ton, 20 oz. of silver being the lowest assay the quartz has shown.

Mining matters are looking up on the West Fork, and with the different works of development now going on there promises to be considerable activity during the coming year.

### Police Court

The adjourned case against Ernest A. Shute charged with assaulting the Chief of Police while that officer was endeavoring to arrest him, will be proceeded with tomorrow before Police-Magistrate Hallett.

The accused was released on bail of \$500 furnished by himself, and two sureties of \$250 each.

### A Strange Find

One of the local section hands on the C.P.R. made a strange discovery this morning.

While emptying a water-barrel on the the bridge near Anaconda he found a white vest and a black dress-coat with a stone on top of them to keep them at the bottom of the barrel.

It is presumed that the articles were stolen and placed in the barrel for concealment.

**THE GREATER CANADA.**

The disparaging editorials of a section of the American press in regard to the G. T. P. and the proposed Hudson's Bay railway, must only serve to advertise the great unfarmed regions of our Canadian West.

Their jubilation over a rumor that the Hudson's Bay is not a practicable route is very much out of place, and is quite in line with the much-repeated statement that the country through which the Grand Trunk Pacific will pass would never produce anything but Xmas trees and wood-peckers.

The emigration of large numbers of the most progressive American farmers to the wheat fields of the Canadian West is a matter of tender moment to those who seek to check the movement, and Canadians are delighted to know that influential American journals have seen fit to call attention to Western Canada in such an effective manner.

With two ocean to ocean railway lines, the short haul of the Hudson's Bay road, and the Georgian Bay Canal in operation, there will be no necessity for the shipment of Canadian grain through Yankee ports.

And this is the point which worries the people of the American ports.

Greater Canada is already a demonstrated fact, and the great projects under way for the transportation of our products might well excite the envy of our enterprising cousins to the South.

Mr. Barnard's majority has been increased to 13, and Victoria wonders if their bad luck will ever cease.

The New Westminster Columbian commenting editorially on the growth of Canada puts the population of Winnipeg at only

42,340 and doesn't mention Vancouver's 80,000 in its list of the six principal Canadian cities.

The new member-elect from the Columbian office will do well to add to his statistical knowledge before he goes to Ottawa.

That "Duty of the Hour" pamphlet issued by the Toronto Conservatives proved to be one of the most effective political boomerangs ever thrown.

Race and religious cries no longer have a place in Canadian politics and it is time that our Conservative friends in the East were aware of the fact.

The electors of New Westminster are now suggesting that Robert Jardine should go to Ottawa to impress on the Minister of Public Works the necessity of pressing forward the improvements to navigation in the Fraser river.

Why not let the man they elected attend to these matters in which Westminster seems to be so suddenly concerned?

Since October 26th there has been a decided falling off in the number of compliments from the Conservative press to that "good old friend," Joseph Martin.

If Geo. E. Foster wins all his libel suits, the Conservatives will not need to look elsewhere for a campaign fund at the next election.

The action of some of the members of the Asiatic Exclusion League in proposing to impeach President John Jardine for his support of Ralph Smith and Wm. Templeman will be regretted by all friends of the cause for which the League is supposed to stand.

**MINING**

The production of the St. Eugene silver-lead mine at Moyie during the year ending June 30th last was 155,419 tons with a total value of \$1,319,022.

At Hadley, Alaska, 60 men are at work in the mines and 40 at the smelter.

Bert Campbell is in charge of the 1,500 ft. tunnel on the Knob Hill, near Danville, Wash., where they have already driven 1000 feet.

Development work is being done at the old Republic mine in Ferry County, Wash.

An old prospector has come out of the Golden Ears mountain, Fraser Valley, with \$3,000 worth of gold.

A rich gold discovery is reported from Pender harbor, 50 miles from Vancouver, where it is said 100 claims have been staked.

There are 250 men at work in the mines adjacent to Sandor.

The British Columbia Copper Co. is operating a diamond-drill on their Lone Star and Washington properties at Danville which has cut 90ft of \$26 ore.

It is reported that the rich lead in the McAllister group near Three Forks has been struck in the cross-cut tunnel.

A thirty-day option has been given on the Golden Zone group at Hedley.

Wm. Sloan, M.P., says that the prospects of Atlin are better than for several years past.

Large bodies of heavy sulphide ore have been found in the Idaho mine, Rossland.

After 858,000 tons of ore had been shipped during the year the known reserves of the Granby mines, proved by diamond drilling, were larger at the close than at the beginning of the year.

The Granby is building a new tunnel at the entrance to No. 4 tunnel of their Phoenix mines.

A new spur is being built at the Granby Smelter, Grand Forks to be used for the storage of coke.

The mining outlook looks very bright for Kootenay this winter.

**PROVINCIAL ITEMS**

The Artic Brotherhood had a very successful gathering at Victoria.

American cattlemen have leased a tract of 10,000 acres of grazing land in the Chilcotin district from the provincial government at an annual rental of 15c an acre and an option of purchase at the end of 20 years.

Chief Justice Hunter has granted an appeal to the negro Jenkins, sentenced to death at New Westminster.

British Columbia will be represented at the Spokane Fruit fair by exhibits from Grand Forks, Kamloops, Creston, Nelson, Mynaster, the Okanagan and the coast districts.

Notch Hill has produced a muskmelon weighing 65 pounds, and the big Ontario pumpkin will be fed to the cows.

E. P. Davis, K.C., of Vancouver, has been retained by the heirs of the late Joan Dunsinuir in the suit regarding the ownership of an immense amount of property on Vancouver Island.

The Sechart whaling station on the West coast of Vancouver Island captured 600 whales during the past season.

The contract will shortly be let for the 150-mile section of the G.T.P. between Aldermere and Kitsilas Canyon on the Skeena river.

\$200,000 will be expended on the streets of Prince Rupert.

J. J. Hill was banquetted in Vancouver.

Penticton had a \$4,000 fire last week.

The Vancouver health committee has reported that many of the restaurants in that city are not in a clean condition.

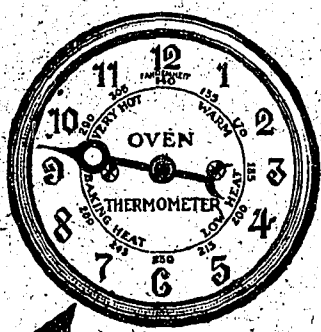

## Synopsis of Canadian North-West

### HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

ANY un-numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting Band 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 150 acres, more or less.

Application for entry must be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Land Agency or Sub-agency for the district in which the land is situated. Entry by proxy may, however, be made at any Agency on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader.

DUTIES.—1. At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years. 2. A homesteader may, if he so desires, perform the required residence duties by living on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of his homestead. He may also do so by living with father or mother of appointment of a sub-joint ownership in land will not meet this requirement.

3. A homesteader intending to perform his residence duties in accordance with the above while living with parents or on farming land owned by himself must notify the Agent for the district of such intention.

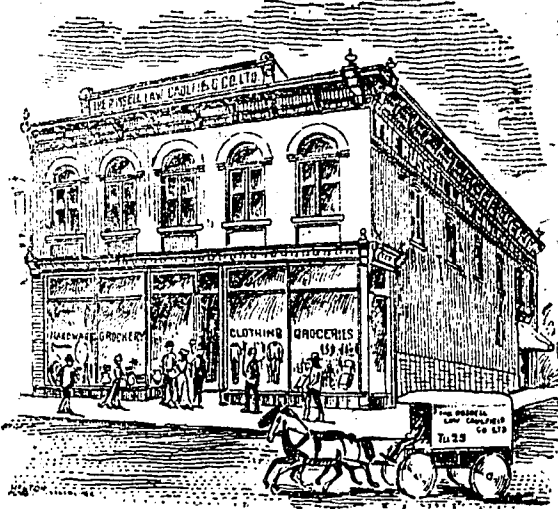

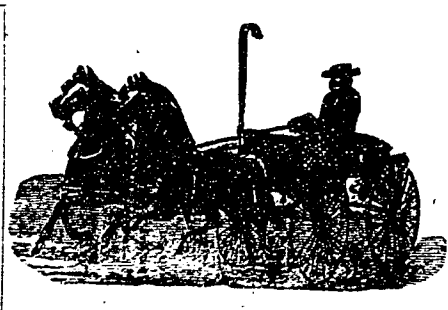
