



A Liberal Land Slide

The Meeting Saturday Night was a Good Indication of Public Opinion. Sure Victory.

The Liberal meeting in the Auditorium on Saturday night was the biggest political gathering ever held in Greenwood, or perhaps in the Boundary district. Long before the meeting opened the hall was filled, and by the time the first speaker had begun his address standing room was at a premium. All three candidates of the Greenwood riding were in attendance, and as each appeared he was enthusiastically received by his own particular following.

The meeting was at times exciting and tumultuous, in fact almost riotous, due to ineffectual efforts on the part of the Conservatives and their allies, the Socialists, to annoy and harass the Liberal candidate while addressing the audience. It was plainly apparent that a well understood plan of campaign in regard to the meeting, existed between the Tory and Socialist factions, and that G. R. Naden had been selected as the center of attack from the combined forces. However, they underestimated their man. The Liberal standard bearer stood to his guns like a veteran and answered every question fairly and squarely in a way that won him

many supporters. Before entering upon a discussion of the main issues of the campaign Mr. Naden paid his respects to the critics of his civic administration. Regarding the \$500 graft charge, published in the last issue of the Greenwood Ledger, he showed that at the time the appropriation was made he was not even in Canada, and therefore could not be held responsible for what occurred in his absence. He contrasted the finances of Greenwood today with what they were five years ago, and declared that if provincial finances were in the same healthy condition he would not be on the platform as an antagonist of the McBride government.

Coming to his attitude upon the smelter eight hour law, the question raised by his Socialist opponents, he stated his position as that which he had already announced through the columns of the Boundary Creek Times, and read to the audience the much disputed letter from the union recording the union's appreciation of his services in their behalf. He announced his belief in the justice of a compulsory

eight hour law for employees whose occupation was dangerous and unhealthy and stated further that a compulsory eight hour law for all kinds of labor had no terrors for him; and when the question came to the front, as come it must, he would be found giving it his cordial support.

Coming to the matter of the government appropriations for roads, etc., he showed that while the Similkameen riding, represented by a supporter of the administration, had drawn \$72,000 of public funds, during the McBride regime, Greenwood had been favored in the same period with but \$9,000, and promised, if elected, he would be party to no such unjust discrimination.

In a general criticism of the late administration he showed conclusively the friendship existing between the administration and the G. T. P., and in connection with the railroad taxation question announced his intention of supporting a measure conferring upon municipalities the right to tax railroad property within their borders, denounced the system of subsidizing railroads with money or land, and stated his intention of opposing a continuation of this policy if elected to the house.

Mr. Naden, who was repeatedly interrupted by volleys of questions from the Socialist quarter of the audience, gave a clean, concise statement of his

attitude on the various local and provincial issues, and surprised even his friends by his thorough knowledge of the questions that enter into this campaign.

Mr. E. G. Warren, the Conservative candidate, who was well received, followed Mr. Naden in a short address. Mr. Warren did not attempt to go fully into any question. He referred to the improved financial condition of the province, claiming credit for the McBride administration on this account. He twitted the leader of the opposition regarding his policy, which he wished to hear explained, and announced his willingness to stand or fall by the administration of Mr. McBride.

Mr. Edgar Dynes, the Socialist candidate, next occupied the platform. He began by a short reference to the meat scandal, but quickly passed from that to an attack on the attitude of the Liberals on questions relating to labor legislation, denying credit to Macdonald or his supporters for any of the measures now in force. The presence of McInnes and Ross was cited as examples of the interference of the Ottawa government in provincial affairs, and made use of the Rossland Miner's rookback about McInnes not wishing support of labor men. Mr. Dynes here created the only unpleasant feature of the meeting, refusing to take his chair when his time was up, with the consequence that for the next ten minutes the meeting was in an uproar. Eventually the Socialist candidate was compelled to abandon his attempts to force himself upon the audience and resumed his seat amidst a fusillade of jeers from his opponents and shouts of encouragement from his supporters.

Mr. F. J. Deane, of Nelson, followed in a brief speech, in which he handled Hawthornthwaite's record in the house, showing that it had disgusted even his Socialist friends to such an extent that some of the candidates now in the field had repudiated him as a leader.

Mr. J. A. Macdonald, the Liberal leader, closed the meeting in what was generally recognized as the best political speech ever heard in Greenwood.

When he began his remarks, the meeting had not quite subsided from the turmoil created by the Socialist speaker's endeavor to force himself upon the audience, and questions and interruptions were the order of the day,

but in a few minutes Mr. Macdonald was in control of the meeting and his remarks were followed closely by even his strongest political foes. The Liberal leader replying to the Socialist candidate, explained fully his attitude on all questions affecting labor, and showed how his attempts to improve the workmen's compensation act had been blocked for political purposes by J. H. Hawthornthwaite. Continuing on matters relating to labor improvement, he stated his disapproval of the system of paid immigration, as being unjust to men who paid their own way here, and announced his intention, if returned with a Liberal majority, of creating an immigration bureau to deal with such matters, as it came entirely within the limits of provincial authority to do so.

Mr. Macdonald then paid his respects to the McBride railway policy, showing that the unpaid taxes due from C. P. R. railway lands would have been more than sufficient to meet the amount for which the assessment act was necessary.

Coming to the better terms question, Mr. Macdonald showed that by mutual arrangement the question was not to be considered a party one. That the Liberal members in the legislature had assisted the government in its efforts to secure a readjustment of terms and that he himself had drawn up the resolutions which McBride presented to the conference of premiers. This was a hard blow to the Conservatives, who have been making all possible capital out of the better terms attitude of Premier McBride, and any impression favorable to the late administration created by the premier's visit, faded away before the clear, convincing logical array of facts presented by the Liberal leader, like snow before a summer's sun.

Mr. Macdonald was given something of an ovation upon the conclusion of his remarks. While his criticism of the administration was severe, his fairness in keeping silent on all charges against the government that as yet he has not investigated, was the subject of much favorable comment by political friend and foe alike.

The meeting Saturday night was a clincher, and will tend to further swell the Liberal majority on February 2nd.

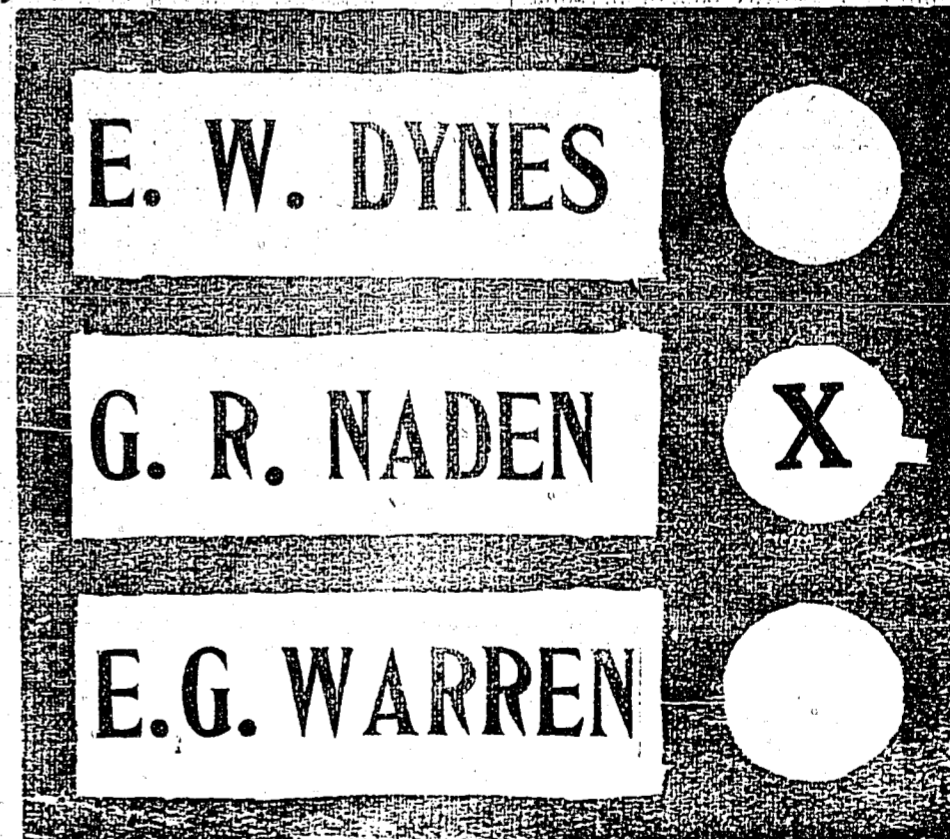

A DENIAL

An examination of the records of the Militia Department at Ottawa will show that British Columbia was represented in the South African war by 9 commissioned officers and 560 non-commissioned officers and men.

On the floors of the Legislature at Victoria, Robert F. Green, Land and Works Commissioner, in reply to a question, stated that up to date, which was during the session of 1905, he had issued South African war script to 789 persons. This can be proven by anyone sufficiently interested by turning to page 20 of the Journals of the House, session of 1905.

Further than that, last week at a meeting in Kaslo, he announced that the list to date totalled 808. That is, he has issued script to 239 individuals more than were entitled to it under the South African war land grant act. A clear steal of 38,240 acres distributed among the heelers and friends of the administration.

In the face of this evidence no weight can be attached to the denial issued from government circles and being distributed around town. Any one wishing to prove for himself the utter untruthfulness of the denial of these facts can see the Journal of the House for himself in the Times office.

Synopsis of Canadian Homestead Regulations.

ANY available Dominion Lands within the Railway Belt in British Columbia, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less. Entry must be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situate.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased), of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

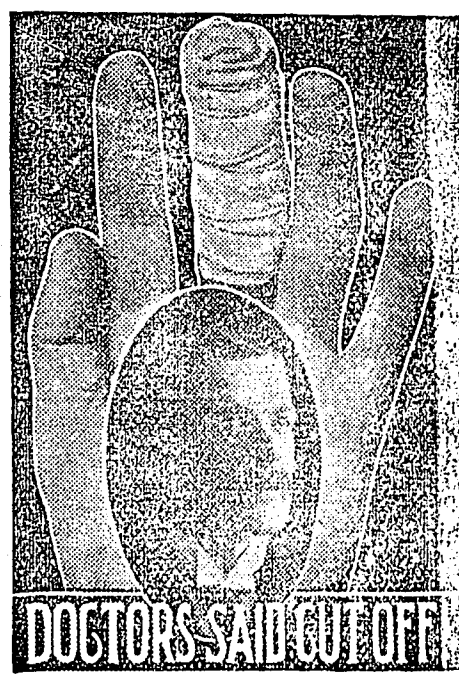
(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.

Coal lands may be purchased at \$10 per acre for soft coal and \$20 for anthracite. Not more than 320 acres can be acquired by one individual or company. Royalty at the rate of ten cents per ton of 2,000 pounds shall be collected on the gross output.

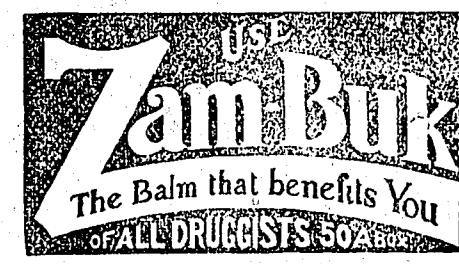

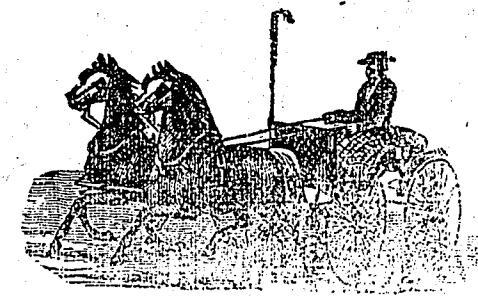

MIDWAY MEETING

Monday night a large and enthusiastic Liberal meeting was held in Midway in the big dining room of the Crowell hotel, at which addresses were delivered by Geo. R. Naden, the Liberal candidate, and Duncan Ross, M. P. Thos. Hardy of Midway, spoke in behalf of E. G. Warren, Conservative candidate.

Mr. Naden, who received a flattering reception, made a strong speech, vigorously criticising the McBride administration and clearly defining his own position on all public questions, paying special attention to issues which more closely affected the local riding.

Ernest Mills, who was the Socialist candidate in the last provincial campaign, addressed the meeting in the interests of the Socialist candidate, Edgar Dynes, and made a strong plea in favor of returning Dynes as a representative of the labor interests to the house. Midway is a point where Socialism has not obtained any serious following, and consequently the remarks of the Socialist speaker were but coolly received.

Mr. Hardy, who followed Mr. Naden, was handicapped by his evident knowledge that he was in an extremely hostile camp. Further, it was apparent that on several questions at issue his knowledge is somewhat limited. Mr. Hardy, however, is never daunted by any circumstance, and his championship of the government candidates cause was, perhaps, as good an effort as could be made, considering the nature of the subject matter.

Duncan Ross, M. P., who followed Mr. Hardy, made one of the best speeches of the campaign, and surprised both friends and foes by the vigor of his arguments and the ability with which he handled all questions involved in the present political fight. In discussing the railroad policy of the McBride government, he showed conclusively that the C. P. R. was the dominating power in B. C. politics, and in explaining his presence here in this campaign, he stated that no matter what legislation affecting B. C. interests was introduced into the house at Ottawa, they would run up against a strong C. P. R. lobby, which was apparently working hand in glove with the McBride administration here. He cited the Midway-Vernon fiasco as an example of the power the C. P. R. exercised in B. C. affairs, and announced amid cheers that he was here to assist, as far as it was possible for him to assist, in removing the confederates of the C. P. R. lobby from power, and placing there, men who were absolutely clear of all corporation connections.

The member for Yale-Cariboo, who has put in some hard campaigning in Similkameen and Okanagan, was in great form. His Ottawa experience have developed him into an able campaign speaker, and his vigorous speech was greatly appreciated by the large audience in attendance.

The sound financial condition of Greenwood's finances is one of the very strongest proofs of the Liberal standard bearer's capabilities for the position of a representative, and one that the Greenwood electors will do well to investigate before casting their ballots tomorrow.

POLITICAL NOTES.

"Even the prospect of a general eight hour law for the province has no terrors for me, and when this question comes to the front, as come it must, I will be the first to support it."—G. R. Naden at the meeting in the Auditorium.

The tactics of the Socialists at the meeting Saturday night will hardly commend itself to the fair minded portion of the community. The action of their candidate in refusing to vacate the platform when his allotted time had been taken up, was decidedly boorish, and in sharp contrast to the conduct of the other candidates at Socialist meetings.

According to official reports, there were in British Columbia 9 officers and 560 non-commissioned officers and men entitled to land under the South African war land grant act. On February 5th, 1905, the department of lands and works had issued 789 grants, and it is known that since then this number has been greatly increased. Will some enterprising Conservative explain this little matter.

The weak point of the Socialists seems to be their inability to stand intelligent criticism. This was plainly noticeable at Saturday night's meeting when the slightest reference to their attitude on public issues met with howls of disapproval. The question naturally arises, if they are so intolerant of criticism now, what would they be if by any chance they should succeed in obtaining the reins of office.

The New Westminster Columbian, in an editorial attack on John Oliver, declares that the time has passed when the man with the "muck rake" is needed in British Columbia politics. With this suggestion the general public will cordially agree. In view of the scandalous revelations of the inner workings of the lands and works office, it might be advisable to drop the rake and go at it with a shovel or spade.

The Liberals held 17 seats out of 42 in the last legislature. They are not likely to lose any of these seats in the coming contest. They will win from the Conservatives, Skeena, Comox, Esquimalt, at least three Vancouver seats, Richmond, New Westminster, Kamloops, Okanagan, Kaslo and Nelson. The Liberals have also good chances to win in Similkameen, Ymir, Revelstoke and Alberni. The result may be a landslide, and the Liberals may win 32 or 33 seats. In any event, they cannot win less than 25 or 26. The Socialists will not have more than three members in the next legislature.
