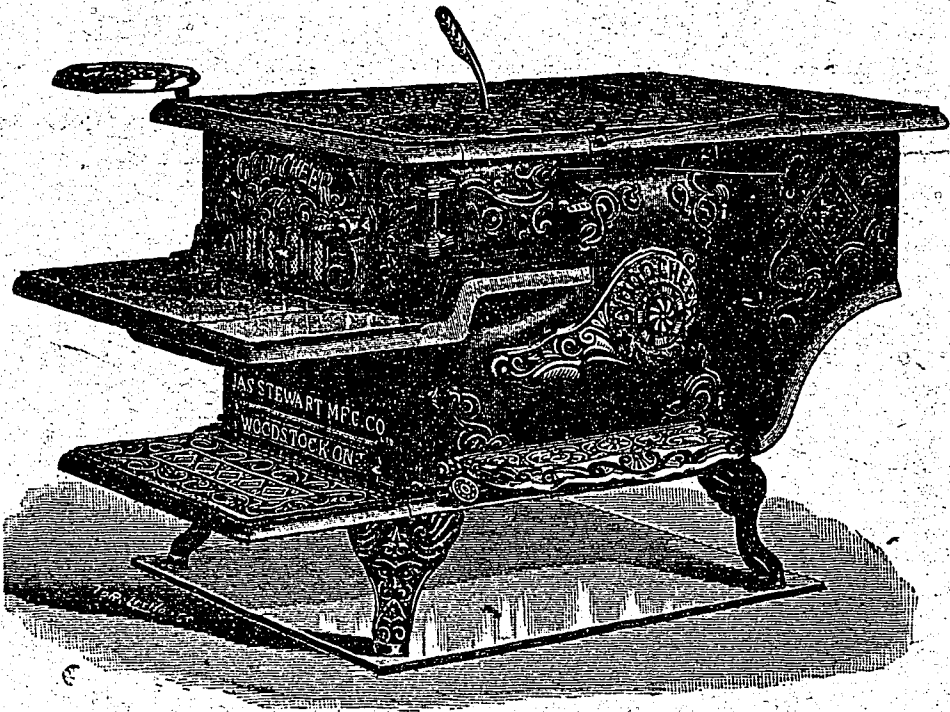

MOURNING SERVICE

Greenwood Citizens Attend the Memorial Services

IN LARGE NUMBERS

A Splendid Procession and Appropriate Services at the Auditorium.

Fully a thousand people took part in the services in honor of Victoria the Good. The residents of the town were augmented by many from Deadwood and other mining camps. The procession was nearly three-quarters of a mile in length and crowds were turned away from the Auditorium where the religious services were held.

At 1:30 the city council met in the city hall, passed a formal resolution of sorrow at the death of the Queen and fealty to the King, and adjourned to take part in the procession. The marshalls of the day were Messrs. A. Ferguson, R. Smailes, C. Scott Galloway and T. M. Gully. The Midway band led the procession. The band would be a credit to a large city. The music was most appropriate and excellently played. The order of procession was as follows:

The different fraternal societies were well represented.

At the Auditorium the services were under the direction of Rev. Mr. Anderson, pastor of the Presbyterian church. At a meeting of the clergy of the city the services published below were agreed upon and that Mr. Anderson should conduct the same.

To Charles J. Wood must be given a great amount of credit for the tasty decorations of the city hall and the Auditorium particularly. The stage at the latter place was a genuine work of art. Mr. Wood did the most of the decorating throughout the city and his work speak volumes for his judgment and taste.

The music was in charge of Mr. A. M. Whiteside and he was supported by a union choir from all the city churches. Mr. E. A. Duff presided at the organ. The only address was that of Mayor Jakes who in brief but eloquent terms referred to the death of the Queen. Revs. Robins, Balderston and Davey assisted in the services and a letter of regret was read from Rev. Father Bedard who was unable to be present. The services are given below:

RICE IS THE MAN

L. M. Rice the Well Known Railway Engineer

HAS BEEN SECURED TO

Take Charge of the Construction of the Greenwood-Phoenix Tramway. He Will Be Here in a Few Days.

The first step toward the construction of the Greenwood-Phoenix tramway will be taken in a few days when L. M. Rice, the well known railway engineer will arrive from Seattle for the purpose of taking charge of the construction of the line. Mr. Rice is well known in the Boundary. During the construction of the C. & W. railway he was the engineer in charge of the most difficult portions of that most difficult road to build. He has the reputation of being one of the most competent railway engineers on the continent and the fact that he has been secured for the purpose of constructing the tramway is a guarantee that the road will be well and quickly built.

Mr. Rice is well acquainted with the topography of the country between here and Phoenix. He made a survey for all the branch lines in the district and from the knowledge thus acquired prepared an excellent map of the district. It is understood that he has three practicable routes for the line between here and Phoenix, but choice will not be made until he goes over the ground. It is understood that the company who have acquired the charter have made arrangements to secure power for the system from the Cascade Power and Light company who own the power on the Kettle river at Cascade. This latter company was recently merged into a strong English company who have plenty of capital to harness the large amount of power at that point.

As already stated, Mr. Rice is so well acquainted with the country over which the tramway will pass that the preliminary surveys and preparations of estimates of work should be hurriedly done. It is quite possible that actual construction will be commenced as soon as spring opens.

MINING NOTES.

The force on the several properties of the Dominion Copper company, Phoenix camp, has been increased to over 110.

Harry Shallenberger has bonded from Jack Lucy, the Jennie, in Deadwood camp. The claim is situated between the Alameda and Gem, the former being owned by Mr. Shallenberger.

Massam & Laidlaw, who are financing the McRae Copper Mines, limited, have let a contract for 125 feet additional sinking on the Ah There in Deadwood camp. The shaft is now down 120 feet.

The force on the Emma, in Summit camp, is to be increased at an early date to 15 men. A siding from the B. C. mine spur is to be put in and surface ore will be shipped to the Pyritic smelter when the plant is ready to receive the same.

Shipments of coal and coke are now being made daily from Fernie to both the British Columbia Copper company's and the Standard Pyritic Smelting company's reduction works. The local smelter is scheduled to "blow in" on the 15th inst., and the Pyritic some time about the first of March.

Randolph Stuart has issued an excellent map of the Boundary district. It contains all the surveyed claims in the different mining camps covered by the map. It is accurate, neatly gotten up and well worth the price to any one desirous of securing accurate information regarding the Boundary.

The Jenckes Machine company has shipped for the Carmi mine, a 60-horse power horizontal tubular boiler, a 16-horse power double-cylinder link motion hoist, cable and other accessories. The plant will be hauled up on sleighs from Midway during the week. The Carmi has 1,200 tons of shipping ore on the dumps and a number of teams are now employed hauling out the ore to Midway, where it is loaded on the cars and sent to the Pyritic smelter.

ASSOCIATED BOARDS OF TRADE

The Associated Boards of Trade of Eastern British Columbia is one of the most important bodies in the interior. It includes every board of trade in Yale and the Kootenays. The Associated Boards of Trade was organized in Rossland some two years ago. It was felt at that time that all the boards of trade of the interior have interests in common and that amalgamated for the purpose of taking action on all questions affecting the general welfare of the people residing within the jurisdiction of the association and more particularly all matters pertaining to and affecting the mining industry, more good could be accomplished than by the boards acting separately. The following boards are at present included in the Associated Boards of Trade: Nelson, Kaslo, Rossland, Moyie, Grand Forks, Fort Steele, Cascade, Revelstoke, Trail, Greenwood, Phoenix, Vernon and Kamloops. The annual meetings of the board are held on the Thursday following the opening of the legislature which this year falls on February 28th. At the annual meeting in Nelson last year it was decided to hold the annual meeting in Greenwood. There will be present in the city about 40 representative business men, as delegates of the various boards. In addition to these there will also be members of the coast boards of trade and also of the Spokane Chamber of Commerce who have expressed their intention to visit Greenwood to see the blowing in of the smelters.

Greenwood has already a reputation for its hospitality and we feel sure that the reputation will be increased by the treatment accorded the prominent visitors who are coming to the city.

THE MIDWAY BAND.

The personnel of the Midway band, who took part in the procession last Saturday, under the leadership of G. E. Richardson, is W. H. Webb, G. D. Cunningham, W. H. Parmell, C. H. Crouse, J. A. Unsworth, C. E. Melville, J. W. Reid, F. W. Luscombe, J. O. Thompson and W. V. Melville. The band has only been organized about four months and made a most creditable showing on the occasion of its first public appearance. Especially when it is considered that the music played was learned in only three practices and had all to be prepared by the leader. The two pieces the band played at the station just previous to leaving on the train for Midway, a march and a waltz, were well rendered and heartily encored by those who happened to be at the depot. Should the Midway brass band again visit the city on another and more happy occasion than that of Saturday, it will doubtless render an excellent account of itself.

A PROCLAMATION.

EDWARD VII., by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, King, Defender of the Faith, &c., &c.

To all to whom these presents shall come or whom the same may in anywise concern—Greeting:

David Mills, Attorney-General, Canada. WHEREAS, the second day of February, has been fixed for the obsequies of Her late Majesty, Our Royal Mother of blessed and glorious memory:

And whereas, well knowing that Our deep grief is shared by Our loving subjects in Canada, we are desirous to afford them an opportunity of testifying their sorrow and their sympathy with us in the grievous affliction which has befallen us and them:

Now, therefore, We have thought fit, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council for Canada, to appoint and set apart, and we do hereby appoint and set apart, Saturday, the second day of February next, as a day of general mourning, to be observed by all persons throughout Our Dominion of Canada:

IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF, We have caused these Our Letters to be Patent and the Great Seal of Canada to be hereunto affixed: Witness, Our Right Trusty and Right Well-beloved Cousin, the Right Honorable Sir Gilbert John Elliot, Earl of Minto and Viscount Melgund, County of Forfar, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom; Baron Minto, of Minto, County of Roxburgh, in the Peerage of Great Britain; Baronet of Nova Scotia; Knight Grand Cross of Our Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, &c., &c., Governor-General of Canada.

At Our Government House, in Our City of Ottawa, this twenty-sixth day of January, in the year of Our Lord one thousand nine hundred and one, and in the first year of Our Reign.

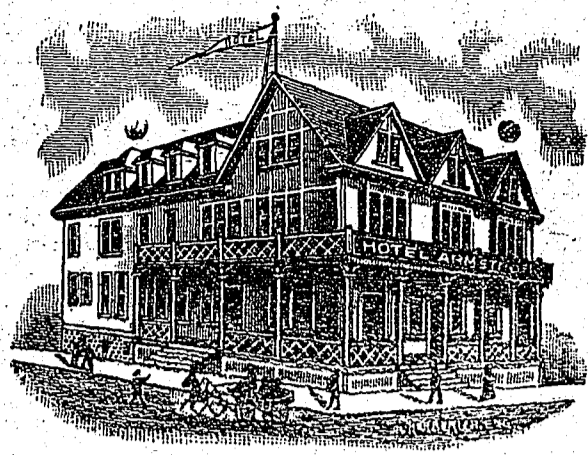
