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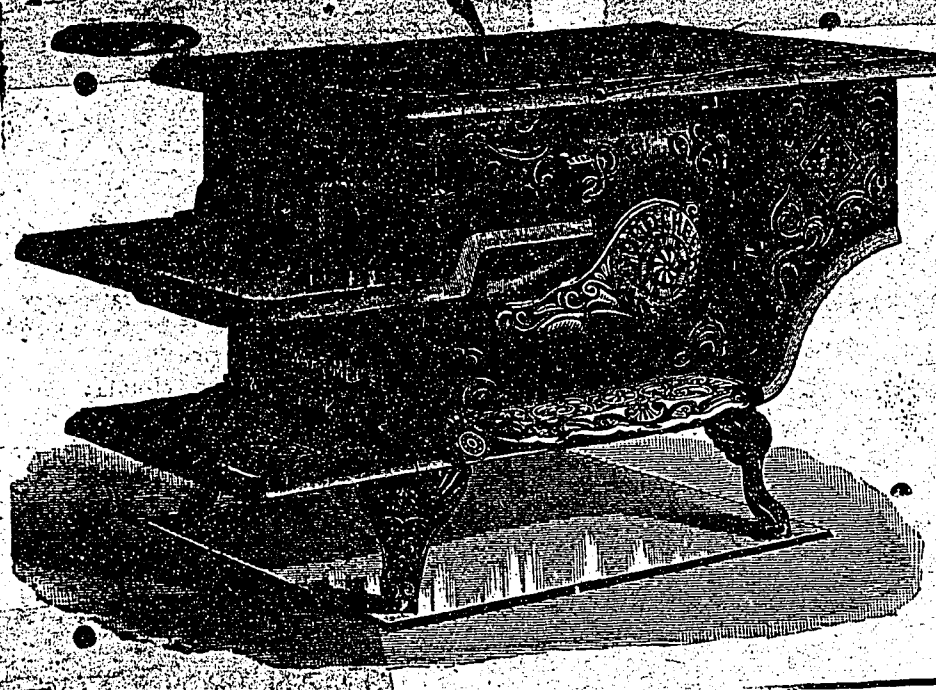

THE TRAMWAY

Company Submit a New Agreement to Council.

WANT A BONUS INSTEAD

Of Guarantee of Interest—Terms of Agreement to Be Considered at a Special Meeting—Other Business.

The Greenwood and Phoenix Tramway company have submitted a new agreement to the city. At the regular meeting of the council on Monday night F. J. Finucane addressed the council, and Clive Pringle, solicitor of the company, submitted the new agreement, which will be considered at a special meeting this week.

Mr. Finucane in bringing the matter to the attention of the council stated that the company were in a position to build the tramway, but in order to further benefit the town they were negotiating along certain lines that could not yet be made public. The new agreement which Mr. Pringle would submit was more business like than the old. Instead of asking for a guarantee of interest on \$100,000 they were asking for a \$50,000 bonus. The agreement also stipulated that active work must begin within 30 days of its passage and the tramway completed within one year.

The council being anxious to study the clauses of the agreement, the discussion thereof was deferred until a special meeting which will probably be held on Friday next.

Mr. Billings, of the Yale-Columbia company, addressed the council in reference to the improvements of Boundary creek and it was finally decided that the city should pay half of the improvements.

Bylaws were further considered. The revenue by-law was reported complete with amendments. In the health by-law Ald. Ross introduced a clause stating that "No laundry or person employed in a laundry shall sprinkle clothes in the process of wringing, pressing or ironing by sprinkling or spouting from the mouth," and the Sunday observance by-law was amended by insertion of a clause that no laundry shall deliver or take away clothes on Sunday. The by-law defining the area in which laundries may be established coming up, Ald. Ross held that it would be valueless, as it would not restrict Chinese laundries in any way. Ald. Sullivan agreed with him but suggested that Ald. Ross was not living up to his election promises. Ald. Ross wanted to know how this by-law would restrict Chinese laundries. What was wanted was a vigorous enforcement of the health by-law. He moved the six months' hoist which was carried.

BACK HOME AGAIN

Lieut. Leckie, of Strathcona's Reaches Greenwood.

FROM SOUTH AFRICA

A Popular Officer—The Other Greenwood Boys Did Well—A Story of a Sword Presentation.

"Jackie de Leck" is home, officially it is Lieutenant Leckie of Strathcona's Horse, the Greenwood hero of the South African war, a wearer of medals, chosen from many to receive the colors from King Edward VII, the idol of his men but Greenwood received him as Jack Leckie or more familiarly "Jackie de Leck." He reached the city on Saturday accompanied by his brother, Major Leckie, of Republic. He was met at the station by a large number of friends who took him in hand and did everything to demonstrate that Greenwood was proud of him.

While Lieutenant Leckie relates many stirring incidents of the South African campaign his story is marred by his modesty. One has to go superior officers and his men to discover that he was one of the pluckiest and most efficient officers in that grand body of Canadians who have won the plaudits of the entire British Empire and the admiration of their doughty opponents.

Returning members of Strathcona's Horse who have reached Vernon, Fairview, Fort Steele and elsewhere are

was a distinguished member, determined to present him with a sword. The idea met with instantaneous and enthusiastic approval when it was first suggested, and the subscriptions were correspondingly liberal as a consequence. The sword purchased was a very handsome one, and it was determined to make the presentation of it an event. But the best laid plans "gang aft agley," and so it was on this occasion. On the evening selected for the ceremony the committee formed themselves together properly, befringed and coated and all ready to hand over the sword a full hour before the time set for that event.

"The anxiety to do the thing properly that got them together an hour too early was the very thing that led to their undoing. Time hung heavily on their hands, and in a fatal moment the rash suggestion was made that taking a drink would be an agreeable way to pass the time. Indeed, so successful did the idea prove to be as a time-killer that Leckie, the sword and the reason why they were together passed for the nonce out of the united mind of the committee. Nine came and went and Leckie waited. Finally, the sword not coming to him, he went to the sword, that is, he started to go to the sword, but got no further than joining the party, when straightway that strange forgetfulness of the why and wherefore of their being together on that particular occasion overcame him also, and he gave no further thought to the sword. B. T. A. Bell had been chosen to present the weapon to Leckie, and during the festivities where he went the weapon went too. The evening waxed and waned, and the party broke up into groups. A friendly scuffle ensued, in which Bell's frock coat was split up the back. He said afterward that to save the sword he lost his coat. He couldn't use his hands because of guarding the sword, and that was why his raiment was rent. After this catastrophe Bell concluded that the proper time had at length arrived to pull off the presentation, and he proceeded to do it in style. Waving the sword over his head he danced up to a group, 'Is Jack Leckie here?' he demanded. 'He is,' responded the owner of the name. Then, Jack, said Bell, cheerfully, as he handed over the cause of all the trouble, 'take your blankety blank sword, for I'm tired of carrying it round.' After so formal and ceremonious a christening Leckie could do naught but put it to the good use he did in South Africa."

Lieut. Leckie left on Monday for Republic where he will remain for some time.

RECORD AGAIN BROKEN.

Last week's record at the Greenwood smelter has again been broken. On Monday last 402 tons of ore were treated in 24 hours or 21 tons more than that of the record-breaking day last week. For week ending Monday, the world's record for a 300-ton furnace was also broken, the total tons of ore treated being 2,700 tons in seven days. The best record made at Grand Forks for one week was 2,100 tons, although the furnace there is 10 inches longer and two inches wider than at the Greenwood smelter.

TOWNSITE OF RENDELL

Placed on the Market—A Perfect Title

After considerable delay the owners of the townsite of Rendell are the first to secure a perfect title for their land. As is generally known a number of townsites on the West Fork were placed on the market last year, but owing to there being no crown grants issued for the land, considerable difficulty arose. The owners of Rendell have secured a crown grant from the government for the Bell pre-emption and are now ready to give perfect titles for lots in the townsite. They have appointed Gance & Wickwire their agents and a heavy sale is expected. Rendell is situated at the mouth of Beaver creek. It is surrounded by many of the big mines of that locality, among them being the Washington and Idaho, Sally, Rob Roy, Wellington, Bounty Tiger, King Solomon, Springfield and Duncan. It is the natural distributing point for the West Fork country and is the point from which the wagon roads diverge to the different mines. Rendell is on the route of the West Fork railway. Last year an hotel and store were built and other improvements made and the owners intend immediately to expend considerable money in grading the principle streets and otherwise improving the town.

In speaking to a Times representative Lieutenant Leckie gave information concerning the other Greenwood boys who joined Strathcona's Horse. Bob Palmer was wounded in the foot at Geluk Farm last fall and invalided home. Lieut. Leckie saw him in London fully recovered and he was looking for a commission in the South African constabulary which he was likely to receive. O'Brien, teller at the Bank of Montreal here, was shot through the arm last December. He also recovered and came home with the troop, remaining at Montreal where he will again join the bank's staff. Alex. Shaw, a nephew of C. E. Shaw of this city, escaped free and will join the South African constabulary.

Lieut. Leckie is loud in his praise of his men all of whom were from Kootenay and Boundary. They had pluck, grit and brains and any success that was obtained was due to their efforts. The troop were kept scouting the greater portion of the time they were in South Africa and while they were in but few heavy battles they were furnished with plenty of excitement and hard work. Lieutenant Leckie has many trophies of the war, among them a rifle taken from a wounded Boer. He also prizes a handsome sword presented to him by the members of the Canadian Mining Institute before his departure for South Africa.

In connection with the presentation of this sword a good story comes from the east. Says the New York Tribune: "Richard Alexander, of Montreal, in speaking the other day at the Waldorf-Astoria on the part taken by the Canadian troops in the Boer war, told an amusing story.

"One of the lieutenants in Strathcona's Horse," said Mr. Alexander, "was a great friend of mine named Jack Leckie. Strathcona's Horse, as you know, made a great record for themselves. Leckie got a D. S. O. (Distinguished Service Order), and he it was who was selected to receive the colors presented by King Edward VII. When Strathcona's Horse were about to depart the Canadian Institute of Mining Engineers, of which Leckie

GOSNELL TO GO.

He Will Open London Office for Mr. Turner

VICTORIA, April 1.—The legislature will be adjourned for two weeks from Wednesday. The object is to allow the members to consult their constituents on the railway question, the government having decided to be guided entirely by their supporters on this question. The budget speech will not be delivered until after the recess, and it is expected that the then finance minister, Turner, will announce his retirement from public life to take the position of agent-general of the province at London, Eng. This office will be opened in May, and it is expected that R. E. Gosnell, secretary to the premier, will go over. It will cost the province \$10,000 a year. A movement is on foot to bring the returned members of Strathcona's Horse to the capital for prorogation.

[Mr. Gosnell, mentioned in the above dispatch, resided here for some time and was secretary of the Board of Trade. He is one of the best informed men in the province and will make an excellent assistant for Mr. Turner.]

JNO. HOUSTON, M. P. P.

The exigencies of the newspaper business sometimes demands a modification of opinion, but it would be a special case indeed, that would change an erstwhile rational man into a shrieking obstructionist of public measures. For years Jno. Houston, M.P.P., editor of the Nelson Tribune, was a power in the Kootenays because he was a stalwart champion of the masses against class and monopoly. It is needless to discuss the influences that brought about the complete change in his opinions. There were probably mitigating circumstances which forced Mr. Houston into the position he now takes. They are of a personal nature but when Mr. Houston uses his position as a member of the legislature to needlessly interrupt legislation he at once makes himself subject to criticism.

If Mr. Houston would only use argument in the house and in his newspaper, he would occupy a better position than he does today, but the public are nauseated by a continual screeching about the fate of this poor country and the necessity of rallying around one Jno. Houston to save it from J. J. Hill! The Nelson Tribune from the outset has not offered a single sensible argument against the granting of the application for a charter to construct a railway from the Crow's Nest coal fields to the south. Its diatribes against the charter completely stultify the John Houston we once knew, the John Houston whose trenchant pen was directed against railway monopoly and for competition, who fought for the Nelson and Fort Sheppard railway and the Red Mountain railway, who claimed to believe that in railway building, in smelting, mining, in coke production, in fact in all industries, the widest measure of liberty should be allowed.

The John Houston of other days was right and the John Houston of today is wrong.

So far as the Crow's Nest Southern railway is concerned we believe the same liberality should be extended to them as to other companies and that both federal and provincial governments are armed with sufficient power to guard the interests of this province without loading the charter with useless restrictions.

It would be a mistake to burden a railway charter with any provision about serving one market before another. Such provision could have no effect except to hamper an enterprise that must enter a field in which competition is already keen. If the Crow's Nest Coal company should disregard the interests of the Dominion or province it can be brought to time on short notice with an export duty or a special royalty. It must be allowed to enter a competitive field without any restriction other than the need of caring for Canadian interests and maintaining the good will of the province or Dominion. The company must be in a position to make time contracts with American consumers, otherwise it cannot reasonably expect to secure its share of the trade. If obliged, when soliciting contracts, to approach the best customers with special exceptions regarding an impossible clause in a railway charter it would be severely and needlessly handicapped. It must be as free as its competitors in contracting to supply all consumers and any restriction that could be incorporated in or made conditional on a railway charter would simply restrict business while serving no good purpose.

pose. The managers have declared their willingness at the present time to enter into contracts for the supply of Canadian smelters or other Canadian consumers of coal or coke. That with the power of both the provincial legislature and Dominion parliament to impose restrictions and imposts should be ample assurance that no local or Canadian interest will be made to suffer through the building of the proposed railway connection.

OTTAWA DELEGATION.

Those who had charge of the organization of the delegation from the Eastern British Columbia Boards of Trade to Ottawa are responsible for the only partially representative character of the delegation and the diversity of opinion that exists among those who left Kootenay Landing on April 6th. It was understood at the outset that the delegation was to go to Ottawa for the purpose of discussing with the Dominion government all matters of a federal nature considered by the Associated Boards of Trade at the annual meeting held in Greenwood. The delegation was for a similar purpose as the one sent to Victoria to discuss matters of a provincial character with the local government. Had the delegation been organized along these lines every board of trade in Eastern British Columbia would have been fully represented and the delegation would have accomplished much. But apparently the organizers were influenced by the paltry reduction made by the C. P. R. in fare to Ottawa and return and as a quid pro quo undertook to stifle the voice of the people on railway and other matters. Indeed, one prominent member stated that a condition precedent to the delegation's going at all via the C. P. R. was that railway and labor questions were not to be discussed at Ottawa. Without suggesting that the opinions of the Kootenay and Boundary business men could be changed by reason of a cheap trip to Ottawa, we do think that if such were the intention of the C. P. R., the reduction made was very niggardly indeed. A fare of \$50, exclusive of sleeper and dining car, from Kootenay to Ottawa cannot be considered an unusually low one. Indeed we believe that lower rates will be offered during the Buffalo exhibition. The delegation goes to Ottawa united upon no definite policy. They go having diverse opinions upon matters of great importance to this province and while all will hope that the visit may result beneficially to the province, there cannot be but grave doubts that such will be the case.

THE SMALLPOX.

Dr. R. W. Jakes, provincial officer of health, is to be congratulated upon the energetic methods used in preventing a spread of the smallpox contagion and also on his professional acumen in properly diagnosing the disease. This mild type of smallpox has been epidemic in the province and elsewhere for nearly two years. It is of such mild type that medical men have been slow to properly diagnose the disease and the contagion allowed to spread before a proper quarantine was established. Dr. Jakes, however, took hold of the matter at the outset with the result that the disease has not spread.

In doing this he received valuable assistance from some of the medical men at Phoenix, and Dr. Schon, the city health officer, who took all reasonable precautions to prevent the dread epidemic securing a foothold in Greenwood.

In this connection, it is only right that a protest should be made against those who insinuated that the scare was started by medical men for mercenary motives. Smallpox, under the most favorable conditions, is repulsive and although the outbreak in Boundary was mild, the medical men should be commended and not criticized because they took rigorous measures to stamp out the disease.

STOCKING LONG LAKE

The Department of Marine and Fisheries has arranged to stock Christina Lake next fall. The attention of the department was directed to desirability of stocking the lake by residents of Cascade and A. K. Stuart who is interested in some property at English Point. Christina lake is a beautiful sheet of water and when it affords good sport for the angler will be much patronized.

The people of Greenwood could do something nearer home. Fish have been unable to get above Boundary Falls and Boundary creek above that point also Long Lake is not inhabited by the finny tribe. It is natural to suppose that the young fry placed in Long Lake would grow and thrive there and a fish ladder could be placed at Boundary falls giving small but vigorous trout that are to be found below the falls an opportunity to get nearer home. Representations should at once be made to the department of Marine and Fisheries that the ladder should be constructed and Long lake stocked at the same time as Christina lake. Long lake is not so large nor does it possess such scenic grandeur as Christina lake, but it is a beautiful

sheet of water and would be visited by hundreds of fishermen from the surrounding towns and mining camps if it were teeming with fish.

DIFFICULTIES ADJUSTED.

The city council have arranged a settlement of the Miller Bros' suit against the city for \$1,450, each side to pay its law costs. This suit was pending for some time. Miller Bros. sued the city for \$5,000 damages to their property and business on account of altering the grade on Copper street.

Another difficulty which the present council had to consider was a number of claims for lands expropriated to open the alley between Copper and Silver streets. This matter is also in a fair way towards settlement so that in a short time, it can be confidently expected that Greenwood will be free from legal entanglements that have done much in retarding its progress and impairing its credit.

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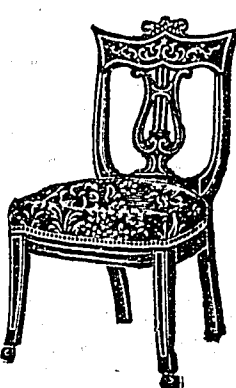

COMMITTED FOR TRIAL.

Two Men Sent Up for Unlawful Assembly.

W. H. Norris, J. P., on Saturday last, at the city hall, Greenwood, heard the evidence in a trial of more than ordinary interest. On January 5th last, J. L. Parker, superintendent of the Dominion Copper company, started from Greenwood for Phoenix with a Chinaman whom he had engaged as a domestic. He was met at the outskirts of the city by a large crowd who sent the Chinaman back, the citizens being determined to keep their town free from Chinese or Japanese. The matter was reported to the provincial government and W. Bullock Webster, chief of provincial police, investigated the case with the result that John Meagher, M. H. Roy and Fred DuRelle were summoned to appear before the magistrate. The crown was represented by A. M. Whiteside, and R. B. Kerr, of Phoenix, appeared for the defendants. Evidence was produced to show that Meagher had not been from his place of business at the time, while the other two admitted they were in the crowd. The case against him was dismissed and the other two were committed for trial. Bail was fixed at \$500 which was immediately given and the men released.

A MUCH-NEEDED RAILWAY.

Commenting on an interview with Robert Wood of this city, the News-Advertiser strongly endorses Messrs. Wood and Kerr's scheme for extending the Shuswap and Okanagan railway to the Boundary. After pointing out the advantages that must naturally accrue from connecting the agricultural district on the north with the mining district on the south, the News-Advertiser says:

"There is, however, another matter in connection with the proposed extension of the Shuswap and Okanagan railway which appeals directly to the provincial taxpayer. That is the fact that under present conditions the provincial treasury is drawn upon annually to the extent of about \$40,000, to meet the insufficiency in the road's earnings to pay the interest on the bonds which the province has guaranteed. We think there is little doubt that were the line extended so as to afford it not only local but through traffic, the earnings would be sufficient not only to pay the interest on the new outlay but to extinguish the present deficit on the old bonds. The annual payment by the province represents the amount of interest and sinking fund on \$1,000,000. If such arrangements could be made as would not only stop this annual outlay, but also aid in the development of rich sections of the province, it would be an achievement of which any government might be proud."

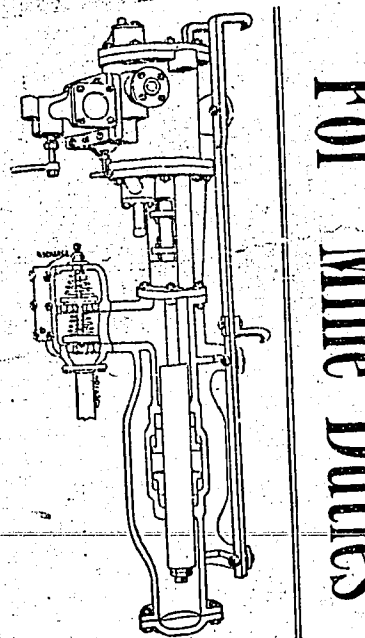

BOARD OF TRADE.

Annual Meeting Today—The Secretary's Report.

The annual meeting of the Greenwood Board of Trade was adjourned from Wednesday evening till four o'clock this afternoon. The following is the secretary's report.

To the President and Members of Greenwood Board of Trade:—

Sirs:—In accordance with requirements of the constitution and by-laws governing our body, I beg to submit herewith a brief summary of the affairs of the Board since my election as secretary on July 7th last.

Upon assuming office I found the affairs of the same in a somewhat dis-jointed condition. A large amount was due the late secretary on salary, an overdrawn bank account existed, and sundry bills were standing against the board pressing for payment. The situation was laid before the membership who came readily to the relief by payment of arrears for fees and dues, and the secretary has the pleasure to announce that every known account against the board, except part of the former secretary's salary, has been paid, the year's expenses met, and a small balance on hand. For definite particulars a detailed financial account is herewith appended.

During my nine months of office there have been four meetings of the board and 16 meetings of the council. An annual report of 5,000 copies was published, of which 4,500 copies were distributed in bulk through the British Columbia agency at the Paris Exposition, the agent general's office in London, the Canadian Pacific railway, and several of the large mining companies, and 111 copies mailed to individuals requesting the same.

The secretary has sent out 216 circulars and post cards, and 152 letters. Interviews have been held by the board and council on matters of public interest with the Hon. Mr. Sifton, Hon. Mr. Turner, Hon. Mr. McBride, Hon. Mr. Curtis.

The results of these interviews have been duly reported from time to time. The financial affairs of the board have been audited by the council and the following statement found correct:
