## LAMENTABLE TRAGEDY

Charles W. Vedder the Well-known Insurance Man Fatally Shot Thursday Afternoon. Coroner's Jury Bring in a Verdict of Willful Murder by Some Unknown Person.

The business men of this city were horrified at one o'clock Thursday afternoon when the report quickly circulated that C. W. Vedder, of the firm of Vedder & Cunningham had shot himself in the back rooms of the firm's office on Copper street. The report was quickly verified. Medical men were soon in attendance, but the wound was fatal. The unfortunate man never recovered consciousness and death came at four o'clock the following morning. No reason can be assigned for the act. Mr. Vedder apparently was never worried and as the firm was doing a good business financial matters could scarcely be responsible.

During the afternoon of Thursday and on Christmas day he was in his usual good spirits. He attended service in the Episcopal church Christmas morning and spent a happy day with his wife and family. About ten minutes from one on Thursday, his partner Mr. Cunningham left the office saying "I'm going to lunch Charlie". At one Mrs. Vedder telephoned from their residence to the office but got no response. Immediately after one J. W. Hartline who has desk room in the office came in and began writing a letter. He heard someone breathing heavily in the back room but thought nothing of it for a time. The heavy breathing continuing he went into the back room and found Mr. Vedder seated in a chair with his back towards the door. He called his name but got no response and going up to him shook him but the poor fellow was unconscious. Mr. Hartline ran across to the office of Dr. J. E. Spankie who immediately went over to the office. The doctor found that Mr. Vedder was bleeding from the nose and very freely from the side of the head two inches above the right ear. The doctor noted that he was sitting upright, head forward, chin resting on the chest, feet apart and hands crossed between the legs. Every muscle was relaxed. He examined wound in head and exclaimed to Mr. Hartline that Mr. Vedder had been shot. He quickly glanced round and found revolver on the floor on left side of chair, handle pointing towards the wall and barrel behind left front leg of chair. The gun was a 38 Smith and Weston.

After thorough examination Dr. Spankie considered the case hopeless and called in Drs. Schon and Foster for consultation. As the bullet travelled downwards and forwards over base of right frontal lobe of brain nothing could be done to save life.

The suicide was a painful surprise to Charley Vedder's most intimate friends. He would be the last man in the world one would expect to end his own life. Of powerful build, big hearted and taking the ups and downs of the world with unusual good nature, it could not be imagined that he would thus end his life. His home life was of the happiest deception. He leaves a most estimable wife and four little daughters. Mr. Vedder was born in New York state about 42 years ago but lived in the west for several years. He was associated with Mr. Allenburg in the insurance business in Spokane before coming to Greenwood about a year and a half ago.

After the above was written the theory of suicide was shattered by the verdict of the jury at the coroner's inquest. In the absence of Mayor Jakes who is coroner for the city Dr. Westwood of Grand Forks came over on Friday to hold the inquest. The following jury was empanelled: J. W. Grier (foreman), F. F. Ketchum, J. A. Mathot, Jno. O'Brien, Fred Bishop and D. A. McKenzie. After viewing the body, the inquiry was adjourned until Saturday morning when evidence was taken. Drs. Spankie and Schon gave evidence confirming particulars already given above, J. W. Hartline

told of finding the deceased as already described and Officer Lawder gave particulars of the effects found on his person. There was absolutely nothing in the evidence that could convince the jury that it was suicide. The only document that could be construed as intimating an intent was a pencil written undated note attached to a policy in the Equitable Life and addressed to his wife, in which Mr. Vedder stated that should anything happen to him the money from the attached policy was to be kept for herself and the children. The jury retired but was unable to arrive at a verdict and asked for more evidence. Saturday evening Messrs. Cunningham, Johns, Galbraith, Keefer, Powell and Officer Lawder gave evidence but little additional light was thrown on the mystery. Officer Lawder stated that he had visited Mr. Vedder's residence and Clara Vedder the twelve-year old daughter said that the gun used was not the gun her father had in Spokane, none of the second-hand stores in the city sold such a gun. The jury again retired and after an hour's deliberation brought in the following verdict: "That a certain person to the jurors aforesaid unknown on the 26th day of December in the year aforesaid at the office of Vedder and Cunningham in the City of Greenwood in the County of Yale did feloniously, wilfully and of his malice aforethought kill and murder with a certain pistol loaded and charged with gunpowder and a leaden bullet one Charles W. Vedder against the peace of Our Lord the King, His Crown and dignity."

The interment will take place in Spokane. The body will leave Greenwood on Monday's train and a service will be held in the Masonic building about 1:30 p. m. The deceased was an enthusiastic Mason and a K. of P.

The Spokesman-Review referring to the tragedy says:

"The deceased was an uncle of Attorney Morgan Strong of 2225 First avenue. He was born at Schenectady, N. Y., and came west when about 20 years of age. He enlisted under General Custer, and was with that famous Indian fighter in a number of border engagements, but left the service prior to Custer's last fight on the Big Horn in Montana. He was in the general merchandising business at Wallace, Idaho, for a number of years. His store burned about five years ago, since which time he has been engaged in the real estate and insurance business. He came to Spokane about three years ago, where he remained until November, 1900, when he removed his family to Greenwood, B. C. He leaves a wife and four children.

The news of his death was a shock to his relatives here, who had heard nothing until notified by the Spokesman-Review. As far as known by his relatives, he had not been deponent, and no cause can be assigned by them for the taking of his own life."

A special meeting of the Kootenay Presbytery was held in Grand Forks on Wednesday last when H. C. Shaw on behalf of the Greenwood congregation presented a unanimous call to Rev. Dr. McRae. The Presbytery sustained the call and fixed the induction services for January 7th.

A. E. Sanderson representing the Rossland World was in the city this week securing new subscribers for his paper.

J. A. Hartman manager of the Vancouver Mercantile company, Grand Forks, appeared before Police Magistrate Hallett on Friday on a complaint of A. A. Crowston, that he did unlawfully and by false pretences obtained goods to the value of \$140.88. Ernest Miller, Grand Forks, defended while J. R. Brown appeared for Mr. Crowston. After hearing the evidence the magistrate dismissed the complaint.

laughed and imagined itself benefited, but it turned out that the majority of people were forced to subscribe to both systems so that telephonic communication could be secured with all the persons who used the telephone. The result was that taken in the aggregate, the rates for service were higher to those who were forced to use both systems and a great deal of dissatisfaction was felt.

Early in the game Messrs. Oakes & Aris felt the loss of the money which they had invested, and finally they were forced to sell their holdings to Mr. C. O'Brien Reddin, well known throughout the province as a mining and investment broker. When the sale was put through Messrs. Oakes and Aris' losses were figured up at about \$10,000—not a small amount for a mining men like Mr. Oakes to pay for the privilege of owning a telephone line for a short while.

The Columbia Telegraph & Telephone system was maintained for a time by C. O'Brien Reddin, who was at that time a resident of Rossland. Its destinies did not remain long in his hands for he sold out to Messrs. Donald and Davey of Grand Forks, and it is rumored that when the telephone interests and Mr. O'Brien Reddin parted company his experience in the opposition telephone company was not a happy one.

Messrs. Donald and Davey concluded that they would force the fighting and put the opposition of the Vernon & Nelson Telephone company on the shelf. With this idea in view they interrelated the financial aid of a well known institution of Grand Forks. Backed by practically unlimited capital Messrs. Donald and Davey extended the system of the Columbia Telegraph & Telephone company and the plant was put in such condition that it was at all events the equal of that belonging to the opposition company. A great deal of ready cash was invested in these improvements, but the proprietors found that as their operations became more extensive there was even a greater shortage in the receipts than had formerly been the case. Messrs. Donald and Davey felt the loss to a certain extent, but their financial backers bore the brunt of the cost of maintenance, and it is reported that close on \$100,000 was sunk in a very short time. All this occurred during the past two years, and during that time the Columbia Telegraph & Telephone company has been steadily losing money, and so did the Vernon & Nelson Telephone company, till the Columbia company was, as the suit indicates, forced to the wall.

The suit which was instituted by Mr. Houlgate will likely culminate in the purchase of the interests of the Columbia Telegraph & Telephone company by the Vernon & Nelson company, and so the disastrous competition, which has been continued so long, will end. It is estimated that the loss to the financial institution which backed it will not be less than \$70,000—not very satisfactory for the backers.

It is but the natural sequence of events that where two telephone companies seek patronage in one particular district one should be forced to the wall. From the point of view of The Province's informant two telephone companies are a decided nuisance and competition in such cases is a thing not to be desired again by those who have experienced the experiment. With few exceptions competition is a good thing, but in the case of telephone companies it is something which one should pray to be preserved from.

#### Corporation of the City of Greenwood.

#### BY-LAW NO. 68.

A By-law to regulate the Closing of Shops within the Corporate Limits of the City of Greenwood.

WHEREAS a petition has been presented to the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the City of Greenwood, praying for the passing of a By-law under the Shops Regulation Act, 1900, requiring the closing of the classes of shops hereinafter named situate within the Municipality, and for the times hereinafter specified, viz:

For shops wherein the business of Clothier, Dry Goods, Groceries, Hardware, Furniture, Millinery or Butcher is carried on not later than 7 p.m.

For shops wherein the business of a Tailor is carried on not later than 8 p.m.

All subject to the following exceptions viz: On Saturdays and days previous to public holidays on which days the hour of closing shall not be later than 10 p.m.

AND whereas the said Council is satisfied that such petition is signed by at least three fourths in number of the occupiers or shops within the Municipality belonging to each of the classes to which such application relates, and above enumerated:

Therefore the Municipal Council of the City of Greenwood enacts as follows:

1. From and after the 2nd day of January, 1902, all shops within the corporate limits of the City of Greenwood of the classes hereinafter enumerated shall be closed at the times and hours hereinafter set out.

1. From shops wherein the business of Clothier, Dry Goods, Groceries, Hardware, Furniture, Millinery, or Butcher is carried on not later than 7 p.m.

2. For shops wherein the business of a Tailor is carried on not later than 8 p.m.

2. Notwithstanding anything anything contained in Section 1 hereof on Saturdays and days previous to public holidays the hour of closing shall not be later than 10 p.m. for all classes of shops hereinafter mentioned.

3. Such shops when so closed shall remain closed until the morning of the next following legal day.

4. No shop of any of the class or classes hereinafter enumerated shall be open during the times prohibited in the preceding sections, and every owner or occupier or manager of a shop belonging to any of the classes hereinafter enumerated who suffers or permits such shop to remain unclosed during any of the times hereby prohibited shall be guilty of an infraction or breach of this by-law.

5. Any person or persons who shall be guilty of any infraction or breach of this By-law, or non-compliance therewith, shall upon conviction thereof before the Police Magistrate, Mayor, Justice or Justices of the Peace, having jurisdiction in the matter, forfeit and pay such fine or penalty as the said Police Magistrate, Mayor, Justice or Justices of the Peace convicting shall award, not exceeding twenty-five dollars, together with the costs of prosecution, and in default of payment of said penalty, and costs or costs only, forthwith said penalty and costs or costs only shall be collectable by distress and sale of the goods and chattels of the offender, and in case there be no distress found out of which the said penalty can be levied, the said Police Magistrate, Mayor, Justice or Justices of the Peace convicting, may commit the offender to the common goal or nearest lockup house for a term not exceeding thirty days.

6. This By-law shall come into force on the 2nd day of January, 1902.

7. This By-law may be cited for all purposes as the Shops Regulation By-law, 1901.

#### PUBLIC NOTICE

Sec. 14.—The Council of every City Municipality incorporated after the 23rd day of April 1902, and of every City Municipality hereafter incorporated Act, "Shall consist of a Mayor and not more than nine nor less than five Aldermen;

(a) After the first municipal election the persons qualified to be nominated for and elected as the Mayor of such city shall be such persons as are male British subjects of the full age of twenty-one years, and are not disqualified under any law, and have been for the six months next preceding the day of nomination the registered owner, in the Land Registry Office, of land or real property in the city of the assessed value, on the last municipal assessment roll, of one thousand dollars or more over and above any registered incumbrance or charge, and who are otherwise duly qualified as municipal voters;

(b) After the first municipal election, the persons qualified to be nominated for and elected as Aldermen of such city shall be such persons as are male British subjects of the full age of twenty-one years and are not disqualified under any law, and have been for the six months next preceding the day of nomination the registered owner, in the Land Registry Office, of land or real property in the City of the assessed value, on the last municipal assessment roll, of five hundred dollars or more over and above any registered incumbrance or charge, and who are otherwise qualified as municipal voters.
