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## VON Drive Nets \$2,186 For Second Peninsula Nurse

IT WAS a very great pleasure and privilege to attend as guest the meeting of delegates representing the various V.O.N. groups on the peninsula held in Sechelt Inn on June 17. Mrs. C. Arnold presided and I was astonished in looking back, when this lady, a nursing sister in World War I, organized the first Auxiliary just three years ago in West Sechelt, to see what has been accomplished and how many new groups there are.

Thirty delegates attended this meeting. Mrs. W. B. Billingsley, West Sechelt; Mr. Ben Lang, Mrs. G. Powell, Mrs. H. L. Brookner, Sechelt; Mrs. G. Colson, Selma Park; Mrs. M. Jackson, Wilson Creek; Mrs. Edmunds and Mrs. Shaw, Roberts Creek; Mrs. J. Meikle, Mrs. Mears, Mrs. Tait, Mrs. T. Beasley, Mrs. Burrows, Half Moon Bay; Mrs. Ritchie, Silver Sands; Mr. Bob Burns, Dr. Alan Inglis, Mr. Trumen, Mr. Marsden, Mrs. Frith, Mrs. McKay, Mrs. Stedman, Mrs. Donaldson, Gibsons; Mrs. Godfrey, Granthams Landing; Father Baxter, Sechelt; Mrs. Spare, Mrs. Haddock, Madeira Park.

Everyone had something worthwhile to report on their activities in the recent drive. Hopkins and Granthams have collected \$175, their quota is \$400. Gibsons \$510, with \$1,000 as their objective. Roberts Creek has \$178.20 out of \$500, Wilson Creek \$125 as against \$250, Selma Park \$129.03 against \$250. Porpoise Bay and Sechelt \$265 against \$300, West Sechelt \$150 against \$250, Half Moon Bay \$346.60 against \$400 and Madeira Park \$50 against \$100. Lamb Logging Company, Universal Timber, and Standard Oil donations amounted to \$258. Total collected \$2,186.83. It was pointed out here that although Mrs. Arbo, the secretary, had written 36 letters these three firms were the only ones who responded, which is not very good in a community of this size.

Mr. Marsden of Gibsons spoke very briefly on the nursing service with reference to the school children and pointed out that there has been an enrollment increase of 100%. Nurse Irvine, in her very comprehensive report, also stressed this. It was pointed out by Mrs. Donaldson (Gibsons) that the nurse spends much of her time on the school records and that preventive measures have helped considerably to keep down communicable diseases and epidemics among the children.

Father Baxter advised the meeting that the government grant was only \$235 per year. He will be going to Victoria as the official delegate and it is hoped with the help of Herbert Gargrave, MLA for the Mackenzie riding, that assistance may be forthcoming from the Department of Social Services and Welfare. Mr. Bob Burns, whose views on these matters are well known, also made a few pointed remarks on the question.

With regard to the raising of the quota, there were only two groups who felt they might be

unable to raise the stated amount—Roberts Creek and Selma Park. Mrs. Shaw and Mrs. Edwards of Roberts Creek said how difficult it would be owing to the fact that Roberts Creek has no payroll and the people are mostly retired residents on small means. Mrs. Colson, Selma Park, thought it would be difficult owing to so many other organizations and lack of interest.

The new nurse is expected here in July and will reside at Sechelt as Miss Irvine has decided to stay at Gibsons. The meeting was assured by Mr. Burns that a new car has been on order for some time and will be coming to the Sechelt area. Mr. Turner, principal of Gibsons High School, briefly outlined the new federal scheme for hospitalization and its relationship to V.O.N. service.

Many are the plans for raising money before the end of the fiscal year. A gigantic carnival is to be held at Sechelt July 1, 2 and 3. Proceeds will be used to help the general quota. The Half Moon Bay orchestra came in for a word of praise on its offer of help, and it was felt the orchestra members were mainly responsible for the magnificent showing at that point.

The meeting ended with the usual gracious hospitality of Mrs. Ethyl Frederickson, hostess at the Inn.

- To conserve all available U.S. dollars for essential purchases, a travel ration of \$150 U.S. per person for the 12 months between Nov. 15, 1947 and Nov. 15, 1948 has been established. Be sure to get the necessary forms and details at your bank, well in advance of your trip.

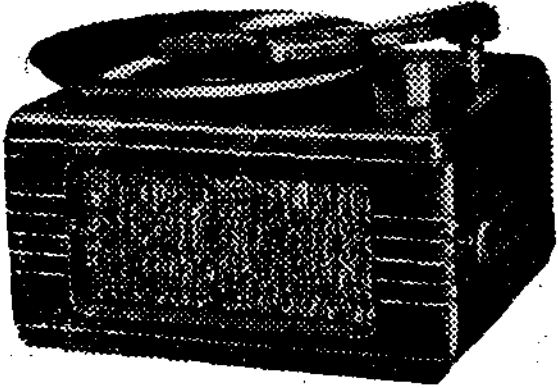

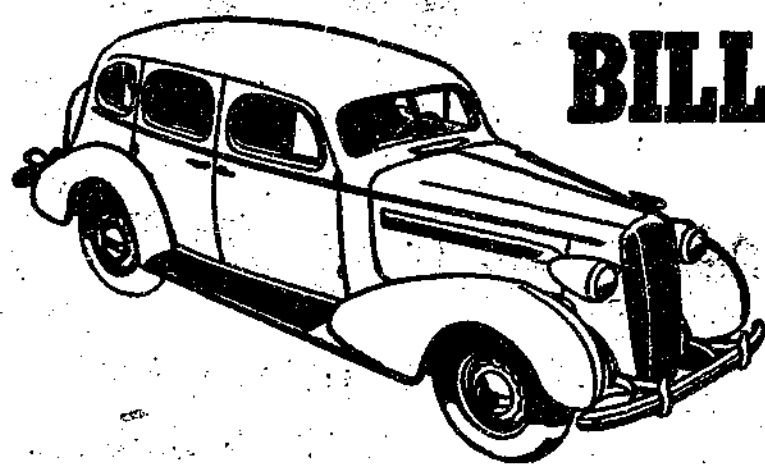

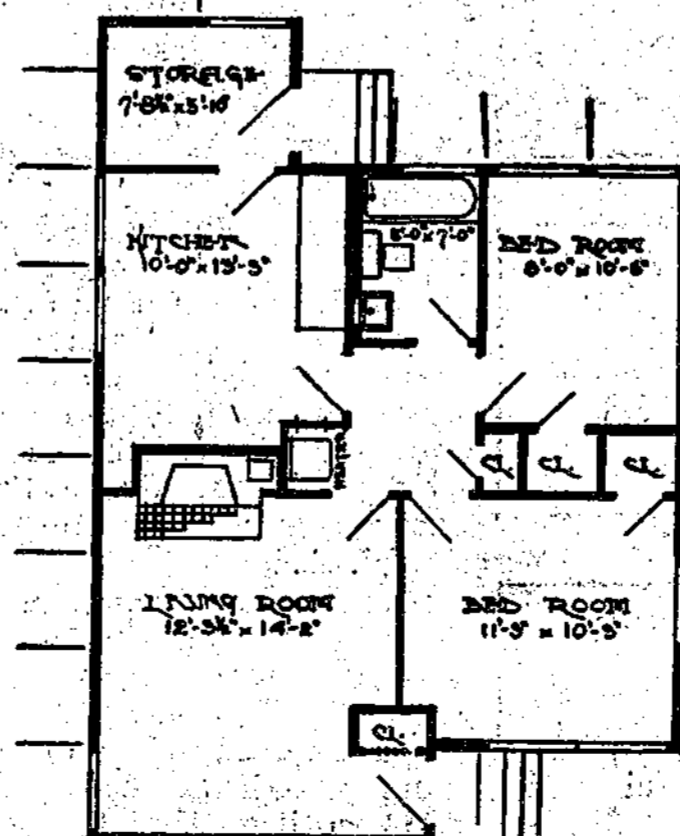

Then the fashionable idea of three or more varieties on one tree is sound and interesting: We like the story of the Vancouver Islander whose main ambition was to get 57 varieties grafted on a sound but dull apple tree! May he live long to enjoy the fruits of his labour.
