Trade Board Moves To Aid Hotel

GIBSONS. — The Board of Trade has taken in hand the current provincial ban against release of materials with which to construct hotels.

At a special meeting, the Board went on record by means of a resolution to the Attorney General urging every assistance be given in considering application by private firms in construction of a hotel here.

First move is circulation of a petition in this area. Upon the petition findings will rest the government's approval or otherwise of holding a plebescite. Upon the plebescite findings will rest the next move, which is application from one or more of "several" groups now interested in building a hotel here.

The last time a plebescite was held here it was narrowly defeated, this had the effect of stopping all hotel construction moves then under way.

It is believed there are only two sites in the Gibsons area being considered by the prospective hotel builders.

The Board of Trade, at a previous meeting, had gone on record as approving the construction of a hotel in the locality. It is felt that such a unit is essential now but more so when the car ferry starts operation, bringing tourists to the Peninsula.

The nearest hotels are in Sechelt. Built many years ago, neither of them have license to sell beer.

Farmer's Fair Is To Be Largest

GIBSONS. — Plans for the Annual Farmer's Institute Fair are now well underway.

"It is hoped" said the Institute Secretary Mrs. Margaret Lefevre, "to make this the largest and best ever."

Members of the committee charged with promoting the display include Vic Metcalfe representing the Gibsons and District Board of Trade, Mrs. E. Pilling, nominee from the local PTA, Mrs. M. Second Car Ferry Is Granted Federal O.K.

OTTAWA. — First move in the second car ferry for the Sechelt Peninsula has been made by the federal government as revealed in a wire from James Sinclair, MP.

"Minister of Transport has authorized entry of second ferry, M.V. Bainbridge. This completes federal assistance," the wire stated.

Black Ball Ferries, in its provincial application for the exclusive franchise, had promised to start a second ferry service across Agamemnon Channel, "Within one year of commencement of the Gibsons Horseshoe Bay link."

It is believed the Bainbridge will be used in either of the two legs which will bring Powell River with its estimated 1300 automobiles into closer relations with the city of Vancouver.

"Eastern" end of the Gibsons link will be built at the end of Keith Road at Horseshoe Bay, according to information released from the provincial Department of Public Works.

Work as now commenced on reconstruction of the first ferry now being repaired in North Vancouver Ship building docks. Ferry officials will not hazard a guess as to when the first trip will be made, but suggest sometime in June.

A special edition of this paper will come out to commemorate the great day which can well be the first step in a completely new way of life to us.

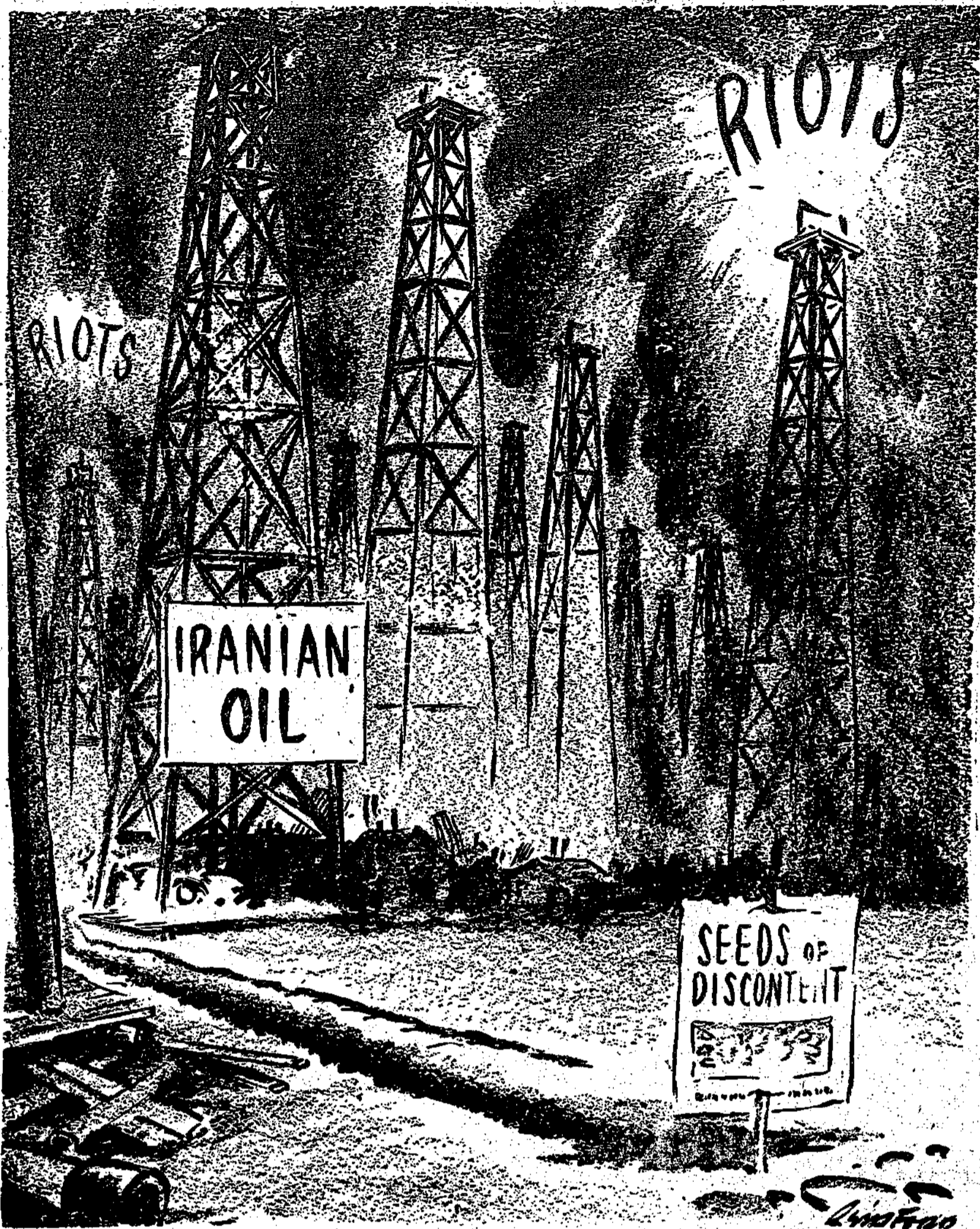
The Board of Trade will attempt to get cooperation from other Boards in order to have the day the ferry arrives, a Peninsula holiday.

PENINSULA BRIDGES
EDITOR THE NEWS.
SIR.

In the hope that my misfortune in wrecking my equipment in the collapse of the bridge on the Sechelt Highway, may help to save loss of life and property in future I herewith submit some pertinent facts.

This bridge, like many others between Gibsons and Sechelt is placed in the highway in such fashion the road curves to approach it from either side, and also goes down grade to do this. The logical and economical thing - barring unsurmountable obstacles, which do not exist in this instance - would be to run the road straight and level as possible, place a culvert and fill and eliminate this hazard, as well as saving gas and time of the travelling public. Total cost is

much less than a new bridge and is permanent. The best bridges rot in a comparatively short time and these were never built in the first place to carry today's traffic.

Secondly it was not overload that caused this accident, nor speed. The rot in the wood is apparent for anyone to see who cares to look, also there is side thrust, centrifugal force generated by a vehicle making a turn on a roadway. This roadway being a bridge sitting between two banks without any ties of any sort to the earth, simply shoved over and collapsed like a house of cards. It might have been a bus with adults and children aboard, or a logging truck, or a moving van or any moderately loaded vehicle. Even a fast moving car, if brakes were suddenly applied, could have had the same effect.

So it behooves all who travel on this road to keep these facts in mind, and back up the

efforts of all in authority from our local road crews and foreman to our worthy M.L.A. Mr MacIntyre. Get these bridges replaced as soon as humanly possible with safe, permanent culverts and fills and on a straight course whenever possible.

It is not only possible but also easier and would shorten the road distance and decrease the grades. As our geometry lesson stated in theorem. "A straight line is the shortest distance between two points 2.E.D."

SPRING SALADS

It's Spring at last and time to serve cool, crisp, tangy, colorful, tantalizing salads. Watch your meals take on new sparkle. Salads does the trick. Given a chance, their colorful crispy goodness will pep up every lunch and dinner for you.

A few simple rules followed for salad making will ensure success. Buy only fresh greens. Wash them and keep them refrigerated in covered refrigerator pans until used. Tear, do not cut lettuce into bite-sized pieces for tossed salad. If you like a touch of garlic, rub the bowl with the cut side of a clove of garlic before mixing the salad. Make dressing early, but mix with the salad only at the last minute.

Always think of eye appeal as well as taste - appeal. Even the plainest of tossed green salads can be beautiful with the use of several shades of green garnished with tomato

wedges, carrot, of radish flowers, green pepper rings, celery curls, olives, cheese balls, pickles etc.

WHOLE MEAL SALAD

This is a delicious main course salad. You will find the combination really delightful.

2 cups mixed salad greens, (lettuce, water cress, spinach or endives)

2 cups orange slices.

1 cup cooked ham slivers.

1 cup diced celery

2 hard cooked eggs, sliced

French dressing.

Break crisp salad greens into bite sized pieces in a large bowl. Combine with oranges, ham, celery and French dressing. Toss lightly, garnish with slices of hard - cooked egg. Makes six servings.

JELLIED TURKEY

or Chicken Salad.

This is a delightfully elegant salad that can be made with left - over chicken or turkey.

2 tablespoons gelatin

½ cup cold water

1 tablespoon lemon juice

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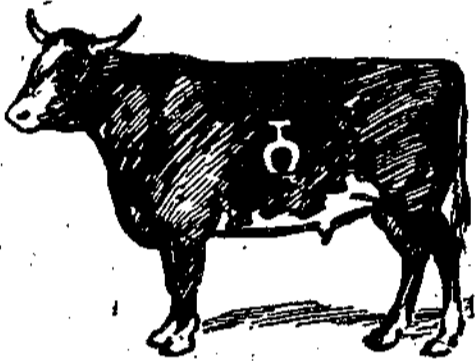
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Sonny Scouler Is Team's Big Gun

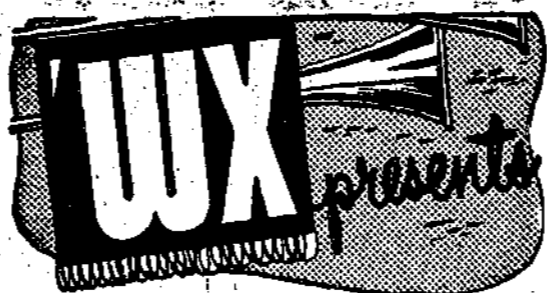
- ½ teaspoon salt
- 2½ cups turkey or chicken, cut into pieces
- ¼ cup pimiento, chopped
- 2½ cups clear stock or chicken soup
- ½ cup celery, chopped
- 2 hard - cooked eggs, one — chopped, one sliced Grape - fruit section

Soften gelatin in cold water for five minutes. Dissolve in boiling liquid. Add lemon juice and salt. Arrange egg slices and grapefruit sections in desired design on the bottom of an oiled ring mold. Just cover with some of the gelatin mixture. Chill until set. Combine chicken, pimiento, celery, chopped egg with remaining gelatin mixture when it has partially congealed. Pour into mold over the set design. Chill until firm. Unmold and serve on crisp lettuce and garnish with mayonnaise and olives. Serves 8 to 10.

GARDEN SALAD BOWL

- 1 pound fresh asparagus or 1 package frozen
- 1 small head lettuce
- ½ cucumber
- 3 green onions
- 2 tomatoes
- ½ cup sliced ripe olives
- 2 hard -cooked eggs
- French dressing.

Prepare asparagus and cook until tender in a small amount of boiling salted water. Drain and cool. Slice eggs. Peel and slice cucumber. Slice onions very thin. Cut tomatoes into bite - sized pieces in salad bowl. Arrange asparagus, tomato, and cucumber in groups over the lettuce to form pattern. Sprinkle onions over all. Centre with eggs and sliced olives. Serve with French dressing. Serves 4.
