School Board Meeting

SECHELT—Indians, old age pensioners and veteran's allowance persons may soon get a new deal, according to Arthur Laing, M.P. addressing a meeting of Sechelt and District Liberal Association, in the Legion Hall, Thursday.

Mr Laing seemed unaware of the small pittance allowed Indians on relief. He spoke on new outline of the coming Indian Act, taking exception to the arbitrary settling of certain relief sums on every type of Indian in Canada.

He believed each province has different situations and should be treated accordingly.

On the question of old age pensions (Mr Laing is on the Parliamentary committee now charged with overhauling the present system) he pointed out there would quite probably be contributory systems in Canada. There would also be two age groups.

One. at the age of 70, would be without the means test while the second, granted to persons in ill health before the 70 limit, would be subject to a means test. Pensioned soldiers should have the same as old age pensioners, Mr Laing contended. He hinted this would also be taken care of in the near future.

At present many burned out soldiers get much less than the old age pension plan allows.

Respecting Indians, Dr D. T. R. McColl and E. Parr Pearson pointed out that only \$7.50 were allowed the indigent members of the tribe, then the government decreed what could be bought with even that small sum.

Mr Laing promised he would look into the matter following his return to the centre of government.

Captain Andrew Johnston, local Liberal party president, was in the chair.

Refreshments followed the meeting which was attended by more than 40 persons.

The position is hardly one to be taken lightly. Despite small gatherings from which these members were appointed, and the seeming disinterest of the public in general, it should be pointed out that the Peninsula is actually watching the actions of our school trustees, with considerable interest.

It may be well to remark that every child attending school has parents somewhere on the Peninsula. Those parents are hardly completely disinterested in the School Board's action.

New members will be well to sit back for at least one meeting and silently absorb the workings.

We know of one new representative who has threatened to shake up the Board. We know of this man's ability (not Drage this time) and we forecast he will remain a representative and will be denied the position of trustee. This man's attitude is hardly a healthy one. Our representatives will elect trustees on the last day of this month. We hope they do so with a belief in the future of our children and not for the sake of appointing some wiseacre to create a disturbance.

Men like Mr Tom Humphries and Mr A. Funnell are not on the Board to be "flim flammed" by some know it all. They are the type of men who are the backbone of School Boards. Their's is the planned decision, slanted for the betterment of schools and pupils.

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
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CREASE CLINIC OF PSYCHOLOGICAL MEDICINE Essondale, B.C.

The Provincial Mental Health Services are administered through the Department of the Provincial Secretary and provide suitable treatment and care to meet the many and varied needs of the community.


The Preventive Services comprise a group of Child Guidance Clinics situated in Vancouver and Victoria with a travelling unit covering other areas of the Province at stated intervals.


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Veterans' Gathering



ing with the younger children, Mrs B. Williams would be only too pleased to hear from them.

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
