Motor Carrier Regulations

This is published for the information of operators of public freight and passenger vehicles, to remind them of their responsibilities, and perhaps to save someone trouble due to forgetfulness.
 Unless otherwise ordered by the Commission in writing with respect to any vehicle, every licensed freight vehicle shall, while being operated on a highway, have displayed on both sides thereof, so as to be clearly visible to the public, in letters and figures not less than two (2) inches high, the name and address of the owner of the vehicle, as registered under the "Motor Vehicle Act," or the registered trade name and address of the owner of the vehicle.
 Every holder of a license for a motor vehicle shall cause to be clearly marked in a conspicuous place on both sides of the vehicle in figures or letters not

less than one inch in height, in the case of a freight vehicle, the gross weight of the motor vehicle and in the case of a passenger vehicle, the maximum number of passengers that may be carried under the terms of the license; and no person shall operate on a highway a motor vehicle for which a license is required unless it is marked as required by this section.

In this section "Gross Weight" means the maximum weight of a motor-vehicle when loaded to the maximum capacity authorized under the license of the vehicle.


"Freight Vehicle" includes a public freight vehicle, a limited freight vehicle and a private freight vehicle."

The provisions of the Motor Carrier Act and Regulations do not apply to— Any private freight vehicle while operated for the transportation at any one time of not more than 300 pounds of freight.

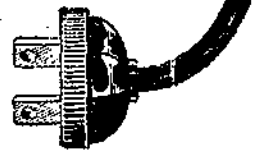

A fund of one hundred thousand dollars has been set up, which it is likely will be loaned to students at \$900.00 each, in an effort to encourage more to train as teachers, and help fill the ever growing demand.

The teachers training under this loan, it is stated, will be required to begin their teaching in rural areas, where the need is greatest, at least until the loan has been repaid to the Government.

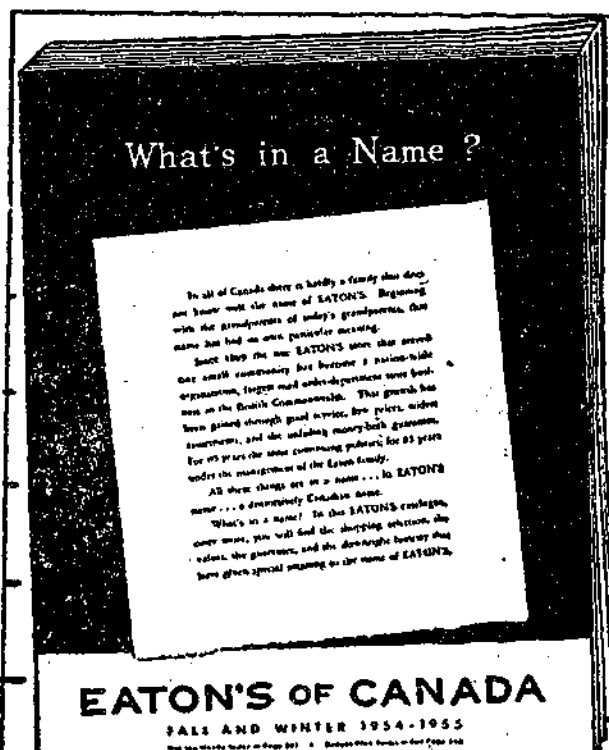
At present there are 1400 new teachers required, and only 550 graduated last year. The number is constantly increasing.



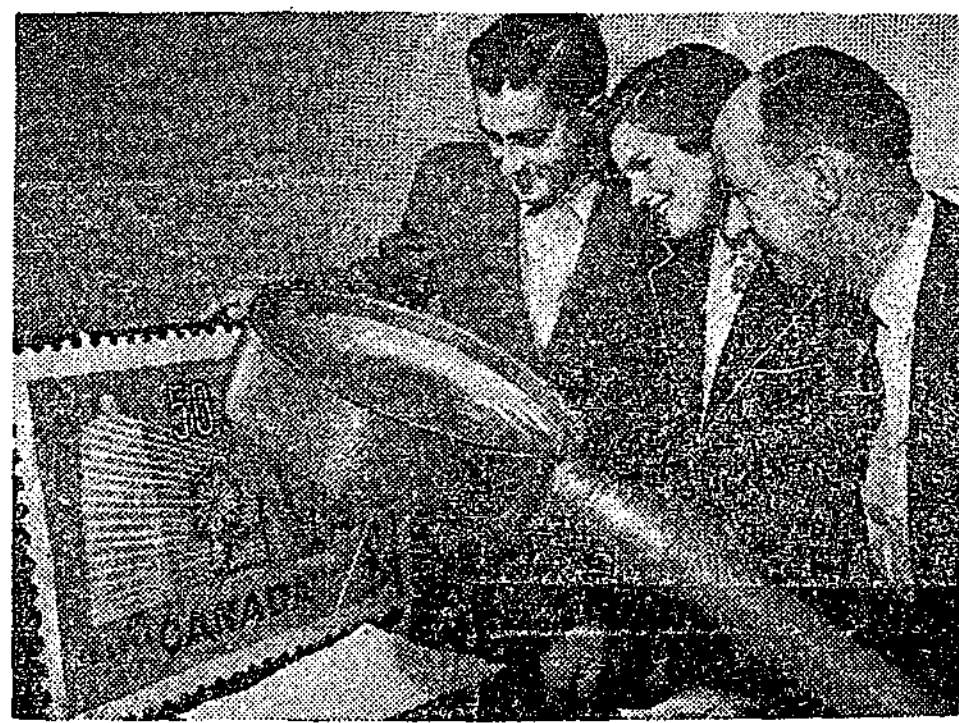

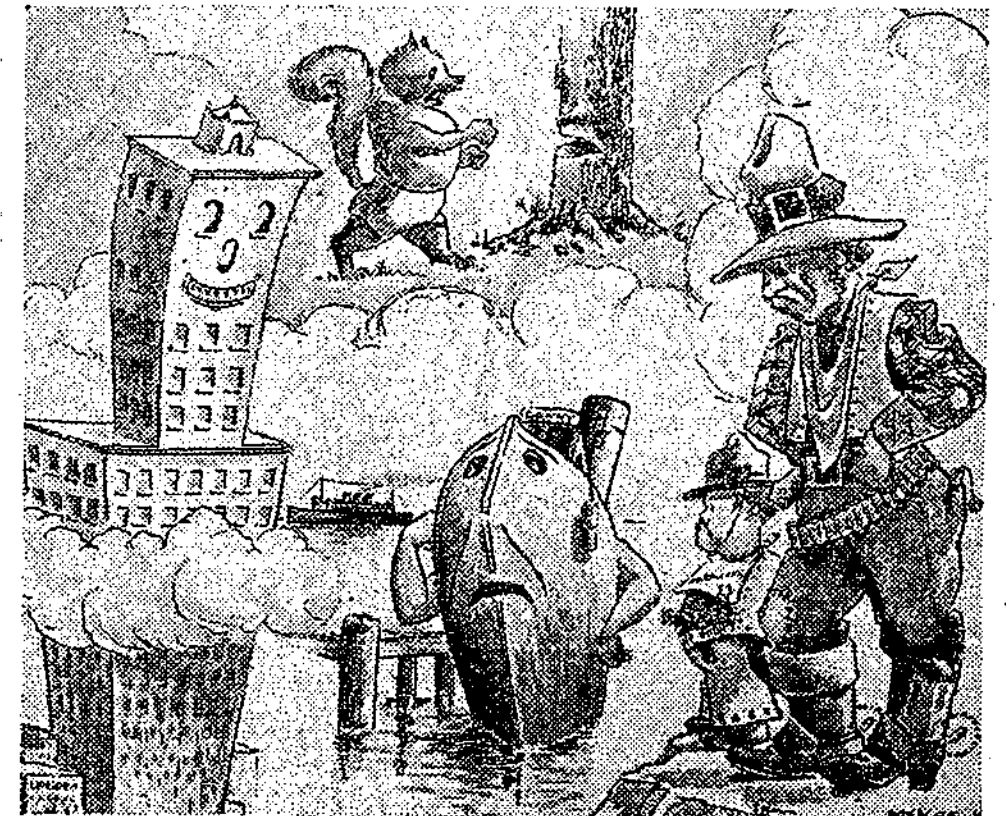
