New Municipal Hall is opened at Sechelt

When Sechelt's new municipal hall was opened at an official ceremony Saturday afternoon four generations were spanned when Julie Steele, great-granddaughter of T.J. Cook J.P., one of the original owners of land comprising the present village, cut the ribbon symbolizing the opening of the hall.

Ernie Pearson was master of ceremonies for the opening and close to 300 persons watched the ceremonies.

A painting, probably one of the first ever painted of the Sechelt area was presented the Sechelt Village Commission by Geoffrey Whitaker, great-grandson of the painter who in 1902 depicted the spot on which stood the first post office, the telegraph office, school room and hotel. This picture will hang in the municipal office as a reminder to the commissioners of the progress Sechelt has made since that time.

The building depicted in the painting was destroyed by fire. Capt. Sam Dawe received the painting on behalf of the village and he thanked the Whitaker family for the gift—what is now a priceless relic of old Sechelt.

After the hall had been declared open officially Mr. Pearson presented the commission with a finely made gavel, made by Mr. Ted Cook.

When it came time for the chairman of the commission, Mrs. Christine Johnson to make a few remarks before turning on power to Sechelt's 23 street lights, she quoted from the Bible and keeping her remarks brief said "Let there be light." And, lo, thanks to the able accomplishments of Bob Norrington of B.C. Electric and his staff, there was light.

Magistrate Johnston helped Mr. Pearson on his official duties and kept things moving along. Commissioner Ritchey, chairman of Gibsons Village Commission added Gibsons congratulations to the event and in passing said he was surprised at the number of citizens who had turned up for the event.

As guests entered the hall they signed a book and added the year in which they settled in this district. The book will be kept along with an album of old pictures being prepared by Mrs. S. Dawe and will become part of Sechelt archives.

Firemen protest party line

Request that the firehall be put on a private telephone line and not on a party line will be made by the Village Commission, it was decided at Tuesday night's meeting.

Reason for the request was the result of a complaint by Fire Chief Feeny who said efforts to find where fires were when the siren sounds were frustrated because party line phoners refused to get off the line so it could be cleared.

Fire Chief Feeny proposed that the Village Commission investigate the possibility of buying an Air Force fire truck now on the market through Crown Assets Corporation. Cost laid down in Gibsons would be in the vicinity of \$1000 and according to the fire chief would be an excellent buy for the village because the five-ton truck is fully equipped except for hose.

Considerable discussion followed on wider fire protection covering areas outside the village with the fire chief and Capt. John Bunyan taking part. Plans are apparently under way for an intensive drive to get the outside areas into a fire protection scheme.

The commission at the request of the firemen will purchase a space heater for the upper room in the fire-hall. Attendance at the firehall meetings has improved considerably, the fire chief reported.

Accounts totalling \$148.72 were checked and ordered paid. Of this total, \$30.60 was for roads and \$65.79 for water.

Building permits to allow W. Hendrickson and L. Petroni to build a \$1,000 extension to their house, also a \$75 lean-to on their boat works was passed. Mrs. K.M.E. Metcalfe was granted a permit for a \$450 garage. Ed Feidler was granted a permit for a \$1,500 storehouse and workshop.

First violin when aged 4

Violinist Arthur Polson was born in Vancouver in 1936, of Swedish parents. At a very early age, the child showed signs of musical aptitude, and when he was only four, Arthur's father began teaching the boy to play violin. Arthur's first instrument was a small-sized violin which his father had made him out of a piece of solid pine, using a jack-knife as his only tool!

Like most young children, Arthur hated to practice, and it was not until he was fourteen years of age, and he started studying with Gregori Garbovitsky that the violin suddenly had new meaning for him. At this point in his career, it became apparent to his family and his teacher that here was a violinist of more than ordinary ability. Within six months of the time he started taking lessons with Garbovitsky, Arthur Polson gave his first solo recital in Vancouver, and in the following season, the young violinist set out on a tour of Western Provinces under the auspices of the B.C. Registered Music Teachers. This tour took him as far East as Winnipeg, and during the course of four weeks he performed 22 concerts before major musical clubs and Associations in the West.

He did that thing, never even speaking of the shadow over his life, but cheerfully carrying on for over four years when his time on earth was done and he was, laid to rest. He faced the facts and his widow told me that he was keenly interested in everyday living. I did not know at the time that he had cancer and in the local church I have seen him discuss the inner details of affairs with skill and great tolerance.

Students of history know that Queen Elizabeth the First, would not allow those around her to speak of advancing years nor would she look into a mirror which revealed her wrinkles; the proud arrogant queen refused to face the truth.

In the days of Nehemiah, he was apprehensive when he had to enter the King's presence with a sad countenance and when he did so he was reprimanded by the King who demanded an explanation. But there are facts of life that to ignore is sheer folly. I do not mean that we should cease to take a lively interest in life but to take a superficial view of the facts is to live in a fool's paradise. Like my friend we must accept the will of God. Knowing as Socrates said to his judges, "no evil thing can befall a good man."

The great Charles Darwin expounded the thought of annihilation and said: "Believing as I do that man will be a far more perfect creature than he is now, I believe that in the future, he will continue his spiritual progress and to this faith, I heartily subscribe."

When Sir Walter Scott knew that the end of his life was near, he asked to be taken once again over the grounds at Abbotsford. "I have seen many beautiful places," he said, "but nothing to compare to my beautiful home." Then to his son-in-law, Lockhart, he asked that his favorite book be read; "Which Book?" asked Lockhart. Sir Walter said: "There is only one book now, read to me the words of Jesus in John 14th. 'Let not

your heart be troubled, neither let it be afraid, in my Father's house are many mansions."

There is much to bewilder us in this life, a great deal we cannot understand, but we all know in our hearts that we can await our Father's loving care and mercy. No doubt many of our fears have been fruitless and unnecessary. When Charles Kingsley was dying, he said, "How beautiful God is." Sir Walter Scott's last words to young Lockhart were: "Be a good man, be a religious man, when you come to lie here as I do, nothing else will give you comfort."

Bowen Island trips cause change in ferry schedule

Black Ball Ferries, Ltd., will begin regular service to Bowen Island Friday, Dec. 7, it was announced by Colonel George Paulin, president. Passenger service only will be offered on three round trips daily between Horseshoe Bay at West Vancouver and Snug Cove on Bowen Island. At the same time Col. Paulin announced an adjustment of the ferry schedule across Howe Sound effective Dec. 7 to provide the

Bowen Island service. Black Ball will utilize the MV Bainbridge for the 20-minute crossing to and from Snug Cove.

The Bainbridge will leave Horseshoe Bay for Snug Cove daily at 8:15 a.m., 12:15 p.m. and 6:25 p.m. Departures from Snug Cove will be made daily at 8:40 a.m., 12:40 p.m. and 6:50 p.m.

Adjusted times for the Black Ball ferry schedule between Horseshoe Bay and Gibsons will provide 10 daily round trips by the Bainbridge and the S.S. Smokwa. Daily departures from Horseshoe Bay for Gibsons will be made at 7:30 a.m., 9:15 a.m., 10:15 a.m., 1:10 p.m., 2:25 p.m., 3:50 p.m., 5:45 p.m., 7:25 p.m., 8:25 p.m. and 10:15 p.m.

Daily departures from Gibsons for the 70-minute Howe Sound crossing to Horseshoe Bay will be made at 6:55 a.m., 8:55 a.m., 10:55 a.m., 1:05 p.m., 2:30 p.m., 3:45 p.m., 5:10 p.m., 7:05 p.m., 9:00 p.m. and 11:05 p.m.

Between Earl Cove and SALTERY Bay, Black Ball's MV Quillayute will make seven daily crossings in both directions on the new winter schedule. Northbound departures will leave Earl Cove daily at 8:35 a.m., 10:55 a.m., 1:15 p.m., 4:35 p.m., 6:55 p.m., 9:10 p.m. and 11:25 p.m. Southbound, the Quillayute will leave SALTERY Bay each day at 7:30 a.m., 9:50 a.m., 12:10 p.m., 3:30 p.m., 5:50 p.m., 8:05 p.m., and 10:20 p.m.

Eight of the ten daily round trips across Howe Sound between Horseshoe Bay and Gibsons will allow for through connections with six of the seven daily round trips across Jervis Inlet between Earl Cove and SALTERY Bay.

The MV Bainbridge visits Snug Cove on Bowen Island on a trial run in preparation for the inauguration of Black Ball ferry service to and from Vancouver on December 7. Three daily round trips will serve passengers between Horseshoe Bay and Snug Cove, available facilities making it impossible at present to accommodate vehicles.
