

## CONSERVATIVES SWEEP PROVINCE; MAKE RECORD

**Liberals and Socialists Lose Deposits; Only One Opposition Member Gains a Seat**

Although the returns have not been fully made from all the districts, yesterday's elections resulted in a landslide for the Conservative Candidates for the Provincial Parliament. Every Conservative was elected except the candidate in Nanaimo where the Socialist, J. Place, was elected by a small majority. James H. Schofield, Ymir's Conservative candidate was returned to the Parliament by a goodly majority over R. P. Pettipiece, his opponent and in Nelson, W. R. Maclean carried everything before him with Harry Wright the independent candidate far in the rear.

Not a single Liberal was elected. Out of a house of 42, Premier McBride will have 41 supporters, including of course himself. Most of the defeated Liberals in the county districts lost their deposits. Only one opposition seat will be occupied by a lone Socialist in the next legislature. All along it has been conceded that the Conservatives would win, and no less than nine followers of Premier McBride were returned by acclamation.

### McBRIDE SEES MORE GENERAL PROSPERITY FOR FUTURE

In a dispatch sent out from Victoria last evening, Premier McBride discusses the result and the future policy of his government as follows:

"The government will more than ever realize its responsibility to the people of the province. The victory which the Conservative party has achieved is a victory for the future of the province, for the government will henceforth go on with those larger issues that are now but dimly dreamed of in regard to development and general prosperity. In the past we have labored with many handicaps and we have so far been enormously successful. That we will, as a government, continue to measure up to general expectations is my firm hope in view of the magnificent attitude of the people as shown at the polls. From now on British Columbia will forge ahead as she has never done before. Faith in the country's potentialities has been splendidly vindicated tonight. With that great warrant to back us, the government of the province hopes to inspire the same confidence in the investing world that the people themselves have so plainly exhibited."

The prosperity which the Province has enjoyed under the McBride government had a telling effect on the vote and a majority of the districts gave the Conservative candidates larger majorities than ever before. Parker Williams, Socialist of Newcastle, who had a seat in the last Parliament was beaten this year by four votes by R. B. Dier the Conservative. The vote was 393 to 389. The Hon. W. R. Ross, won out in Fernie riding over the Socialist Davidson by a vote of 1112 to 789. In the Slokan district where the Socialists were confident that they would elect Andy Shilland, William Hunter, Conservative, won by a vote of 108 to 173. The vote in Nanaimo where the only Socialist was elected was close being 621 for Place and 578 for A. E. Planté Conservative.

### BIG CITIES DO SOLID FOR CONSERVATIVE CANDIDATE

The Solid Five were elected in Vancouver. Liberal Brewster of Victoria who was one of two of that party to gain seats at the last election was beaten out this year by a good majority. He headed the Liberal ticket but could not approach his Conservative opponents. Premier McBride

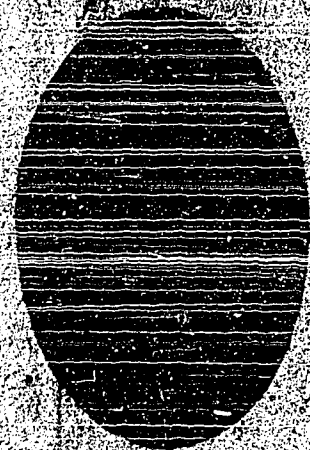

## SHOOT; THEN USE SHOTAS EVIDENCE

**CONSTABLE G. GUNN  
GIVES ADVICE**

**Urges Citizens to Protect  
Chicken Roosts  
With Guns**

Further reports that chickens have been stolen have brought forth some strong advice from Provincial Constable George Gunn. He says that the best way to stop the practice is for the people to keep shot guns and use the shot, pickers from their bodies as evidence when they are brought up for trial. He declares that this is the only way to stop the practice.

"During the past week a couple people have reported that their chickens have disappeared. In one instance the heads were chopped off in the house yard and left lying to prove to the owner that he had been relieved of his fowls."

### Will Not Prosecute

Constable Gunn says that in a number of instances where chickens have been stolen the owner of the fowls knew who it was that visited his roost but for neighborly or other reasons will not prosecute the guilty ones. This he says handicaps him in his work but if he can get sufficient information in any one case it will go hard with the chicken stealers.

All winter the newspapers of the little towns in British Columbia have been inviting space to the chicken thieves there but Creston was free from such thefts until the past couple weeks. Now Constable Gunn advises the people to purchase or borrow a gun and go after the thieves in the right manner.

## TIMMONS MADE SALES MANAGER

**GROWERS' UNION SELECTS PRESIDENT**

**Head Of New Organization  
Will Have Full Charge  
Of All Business**

The Creston Fruit Growers' Union, Limited this week selected D. B. Timmons as sales manager for the coming season. Several applications had been placed with the Board of Directors which had to make the choice but although Mr. Timmons had not applied for the position he was unanimously selected.

The selection of Mr. Timmons as sales manager gives the Union a man who is an expert fruit grower the full charge of the company with the Board of Directors as the governing body. It is doubtful if a better man could have been chosen in this valley for the work of the organization that will have to be accomplished. The company will have to be built up this year and it will be Mr. Timmons' work to do the building.

### Negotiate For Spur

The first action of the new company will be to get into communication with the C. P. E. authorities concerning the placing of a spur into the property which the company occupies south of the station. As soon as it is certain that such a spur will be built the warehouse plans of the company will be put into effect. The Board of Directors figure upon using the material which will have to be taken out for the foundations in grading for the spur. Only a short spur will be needed for the warehouse at present.

The new company will probably rent or build an office for temporary use in the near future. The contracts which will be made with the fruit growers for the coming season will soon be distributed and the company is getting down to business at once.

It consists in smoothes of lamp-black ejected by compressed air from a funnel-shaped tube attached to the forward edge of the upper plane of a bi-plane. The apparatus is under the control of the aviator, who, having familiarized himself with the Morse Code, indicates dashes with a long puff of smoke and dots with a shorter ejection. Lieutenant Roy C. Kirkland is responsible for the idea, and the preliminary experiments have proved immensely successful, the signals being easily read off by observers on terra firma.

## Prices are Still Soaring.

The Department of Labour's wholesale prices record up to date shows a still higher level for February than for January, notwithstanding that the latter month was reported as having been the highest prices since 1882-4 and possibly since 1873. The index number rose during February from 131.4 to 134.3, these being percentages of the average level of prices during the last decade of the last century. The upward movement was largely the result of advances in grains, animals and meats, dairy products and potatoes. Retail prices were also upward, especially in the food products derived from the lines above mentioned.

Looking gravely down at him, the pastor solemnly said:—"Ah, my friend, sinners stand on slippery places."

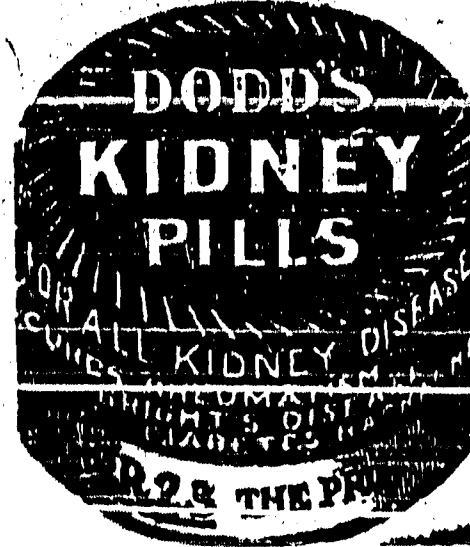

## Bullet Proof Shield.

Lieut. Bisbini of the Thirty-second Infantry, who is now at Tripoli, has invented a bullet proof shield which can be put to different uses with great advantage. The shield consists of a light plate of tempered steel 12 inches wide and 16 inches long, shaped like a spade. When fitted to one of the tent poles the shield can serve the purpose of a spade for digging trenches in the sand. In skirmishes soldiers can use it to take cover by lying on the ground and firing from behind the shield through the hole, which is large enough to admit the barrel of the rifle. The shield can also be used when soldiers fire kneeling, and in bayonet charges it can be strapped over the left arm and serve the purpose of a regular shield. On the march the shield, which is very light is hung over the knapsack. The Bisbini shield has been experimented with successfully and found bullet proof at 100 yards, so that very probably it will be adopted as an essential part of the equipment of Infantry soldiers.

## Industrial Accidents.

According to the record of industrial accidents kept by the Department of Labour, 64 persons were killed and 173 injured during February, 1912. This record compares very favorably with that of January, when 85 workmen were killed and 214 injured. Compared with February, 1911, the record is still more favourable, as 93 were killed and 197 injured in that month. The worst disaster of the past month was the premature explosion of dynamite on construction work near Fort Frances, Ont., on the line of the Canadian Northern Railway, by which 13 construction hands were killed and six others seriously injured.

A Yukon Bonanza.  
One of the best since the days of the Klondike discovery in 1898 was made here last week, about seventy miles from the mouth of Sixty-mile River, 120 miles southwest of Dawson and

A new gold discovery, regarded as twenty-five miles from the Alaska line. The find is said to average about \$1 to the square foot of bedrock. Some two hundred men have already gone from here on a stampede to make claims, withstanding a temperature of 30 degrees below zero and snow on the ground fifteen inches deep. A very reliable miner, who has been engaged in mining here since the gold rush in 1908, was the discoverer. He reports the formations in sinking a shaft 19-12 feet to bedrock as follows: Six inches of muck; 6 feet of gravel containing gold, 3 cents to the pan; 6 feet of muck and 7 feet of gravel to bedrock where the gold is found. In cleaning up the surface of the bedrock a space of 5 by 8 feet, he obtained \$40 worth of high grade gold, as shown by the gold commissioner's scales here. He reports the valley in which the discovery was made to be 20 miles long and 2,000 feet wide, with good working gravel quite similar to that of the famous Bonanza Creek of the Klondike, and frozen solid from the surface to bedrock, making a safe roof for mining.

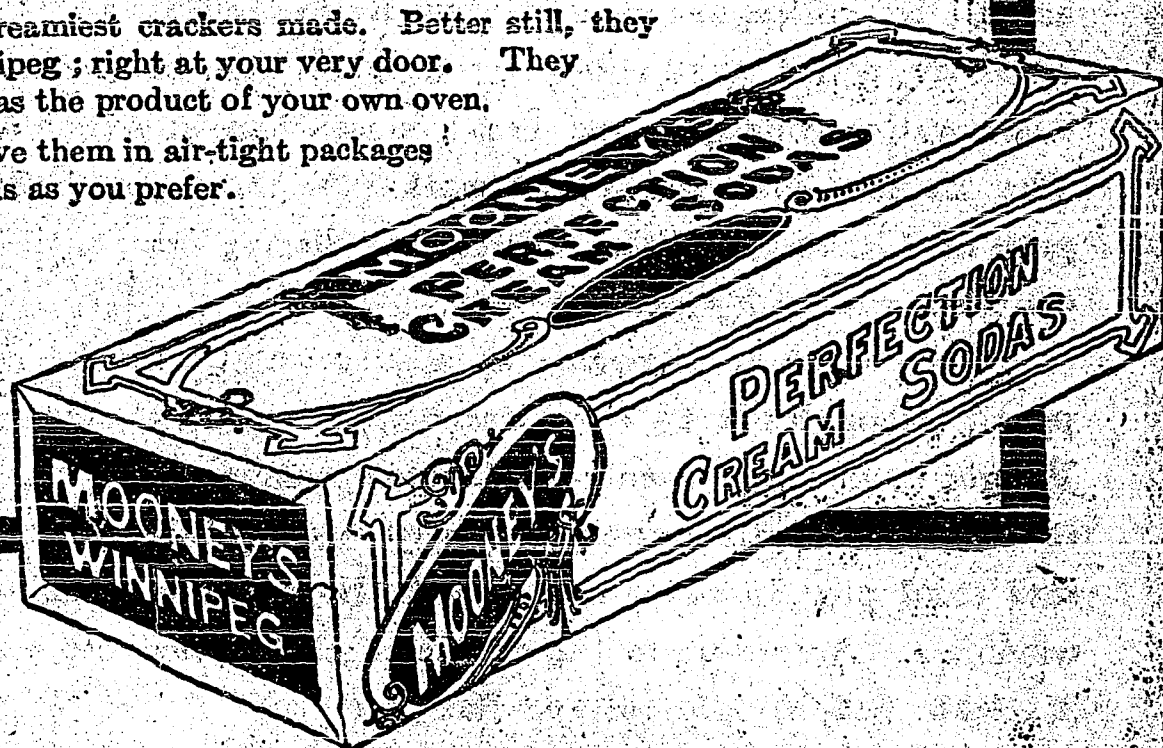

## CONSERVATIVES SWEEP PROVINCE; MAKE RECORD

(Continued from Page 1)

and all his colleagues were returned to the legislature. Mr McBride polled 3228 votes or 700 more than his nearest Conservative colleague and 1200 more than any Liberal. The election just passed over marks the turning of a new page in Canadian politics, there never having been such a complete victory for any one party.

The Nelson results came as a surprise to a number of people although not to the Conservative workers. Harry Wright upon whom even a few Creston people had placed their bets, was badly beaten, narrowly missing being pushed into third place in the running by A. Harrod, the Socialist candidate. According to the unofficial returns, the vote was Maclean, 528; Wright, 190 and Harrod, 177.

Both Wright and Harrod lost their deposits. Mr Maclean's majority over his nearest opponent was 94 votes greater than the previous record established by Mr Wright in the provincial election of 1909.

It was a landslide in favour of the Conservative nominee. The polling in spite of the unfavourable weather was higher than expected by the campaign workers and was taken as evidence of the determination of the citizens of Nelson of all parties that Mr Maclean should go down to Victoria with a record majority. It was the greatest majority ever secured in any election in Nelson.

### SCHOFIELD CARRIES YMIR WITH EASE

James H. Schofield was an easy winner over his Socialist opponent, R. P. Pettipiece, in this riding. While here Mr Pettipiece predicted that he would break even with Mr Schofield in his home city, Trail. The figures sent out from that place last evening give Schofield 230 to 66 for the Socialist candidate.

Voting in the Creston Valley was pretty heavy and Mr. Schofield ran far ahead of his opponent. The Creston poll was 135 to 24, a number of the Liberals throwing their votes to Schofield. In the last Provincial election held two and a half years ago, Mr. Schofield polled 97 votes as against 37 for his Liberal opponent. In the Dominion election last year the vote was 95 Conservative to 47 Liberal. The gain this year in figures is most marked.

The vote at Erickson was light there being only 8 votes cast, 6 for Schofield and 2 for Pettipiece. At Sirdar, the vote was: Schofield, 20; Pettipiece, 9; at Kitchener, Schofield 10, Pettipiece, 2 and at Rykert, Schofield, 3 and Pettipiece, 1.

Candidate Pettipiece lost his deposit as a result of the good showing of Mr Schofield. The returns from outside the Valley for 11 polling places give Mr Schofield 559 votes to 186 for Pettipiece. Fair view which had been feared by some of the Conservatives gave a vote of 108 for Schofield and 60 for Pettipiece. Ymir gave 22 to Schofield and 26 to his opponent. Proctor gave a vote of 52 to 1 in favour of Schofield and Salmo 42 to 22. Waneta gave 24 to 1 for Schofield.

One of the O. P. R. freight crews had a mailman at the expense of Bob Ried this week. One of Bob's prize Wyandotters was killed by the engine on the track and lost his head as a result. The mailman did not ask Bob's permission but immediately picked up the chicken and began preparing it for the evening meal.

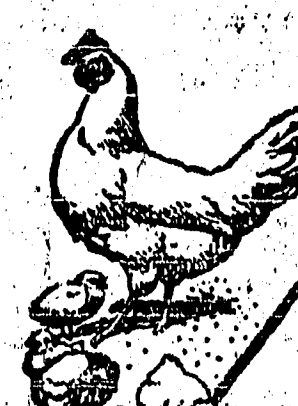

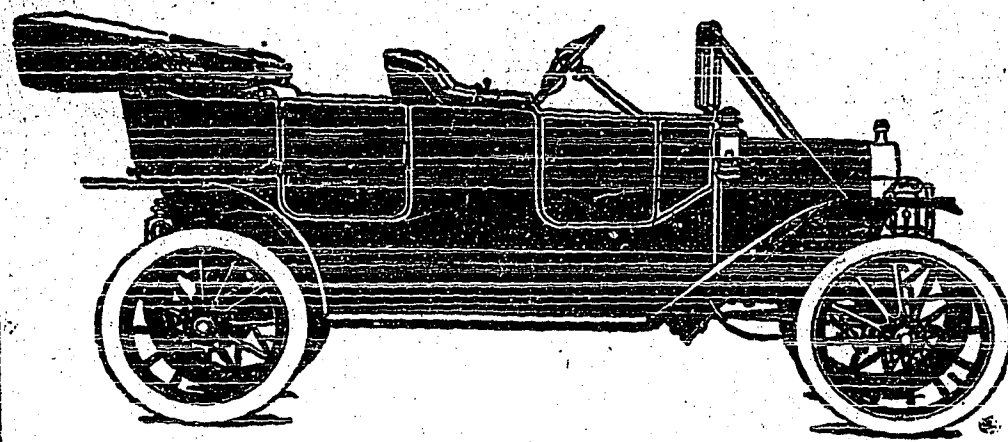

### SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST MINING REGULATIONS

COAL—Coal mining rights may be leased or twenty-one years, renewable at an annual rental of \$1 an acre. Not more than 2,500 acres can be leased to one applicant. Royalty five cents per ton. In unsurveyed territory the tract must be staked out by the applicant in person, and personal application to the Agent or sub-Agent of Dominion Lands for the district must in all cases be made and the rental for the first year must be paid to the agent within thirty days after filing application.

QUARTZ—A person eighteen years of age and over, having made a discovery may locate a claim 1,500 feet by 1,500. Fee, \$5. At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year or paid to the Mining Recorder when \$500.00 has been expended or paid, and other requirements complied with, the claim may be purchased at \$1 an acre.

PLACED MINING CLAIMS are 500 feet long and from 1,000 to 2,000 feet wide. Entry fee \$5. Not less than \$100 must be expended in development work each year.

DREDGING—Two leases of five miles each of a river may be issued to one applicant for a term of 20 years. Rental, \$10 a mile per annum. Royalty, 2½ percent after the output exceeds \$10,000.
