I respond to your generous request I beg to announce myself a candidate for this District in the approaching Dominion Election.

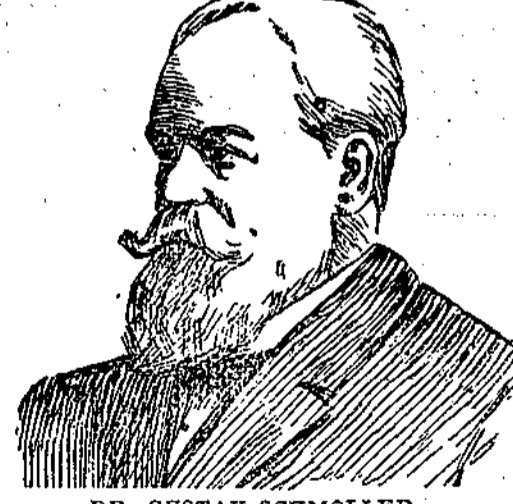

CHRISTOPHER FOLEY CHOSEN.

Result of Labor Convention at Nelson Last Week.

From Nelson Miner. James Wilks, as predicted by the Miner, was the choice of the labor convention and was tendered the nomination Thursday afternoon, but he declined it, and Christopher Foley, of Rossland, was named and an acceptance was secured from him.

There were four names placed before the convention, James Wilks, of Nelson; Christopher Foley, of Rossland; Arthur Ferris, of Rossland; and John McEaren, of Rossland. The latter two gentlemen withdrew, and on a division Mr. Wilks beat Foley by a large vote. Mr. Wilks was given until this afternoon session to decline or accept the nomination, and during the noon recess some of the fastest political work ever executed in Nelson was indulged in. Mr. Gallier's friends did not want Wilks nominated, and influences were brought to bear upon the nominee to induce him to decline the nomination. Whether or not Mr. Wilks was influenced in any way by these, is an open question, but in any event, he declined the nomination at the afternoon session. Mr. Foley, being the second choice of the convention, was offered the nomination by wire, and after a short delay an acceptance was secured from him.

A campaign committee, consisting of the following, was appointed: Rossland, Thomas Brownlee; Greenwood, Charles Wilson; Sandon, Percy Johnston; Moyie, H. H. Dimmock; Kimberley, Harry White; Slovan City, John A. Foley; New Denver, Duncan J. Weir; Silvertown, Joseph Brandon; Whitewater, J. J. MacDonald; Ymir, Alfred Parr; Kaslo, Duncan McPhail; Nelson, Walter Kee; Phoenix, James Riordan; Revelstoke, Frank Craig; Kamloops, John Savage.

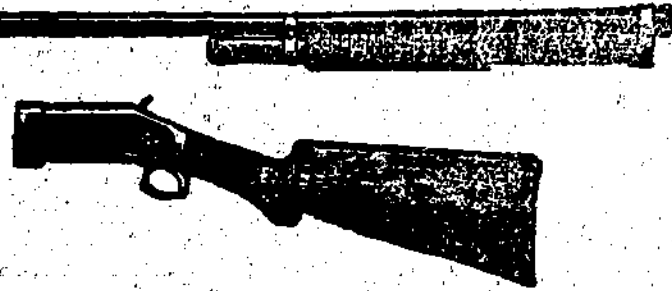
