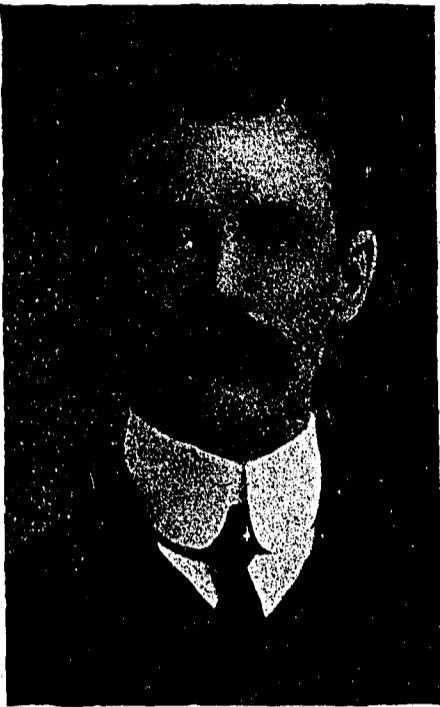

WESTERN CANADIAN EDITORS

A series of articles describing their lives, their aims and their influence.

No. 33.

Editor and Proprietor of the Alberta Advocate.

The contribution of Ontario to Western Canada, in men, brains and money, will be an ever abiding debt. The West will be under obligation to the premier province in this regard for all time. The obligation is recognized universally, and honored gracefully. Sometimes, it is true, the amount of the debt is overstated by overzealous Ontarians, and this leads, not to resentment, but to correction. The men who do this are usually politicians, anxious to win a little cheap local or provincial popularity by lauding to the skies the accomplishments of their own people, even at the expense of truth. But though Ontario has not done for the West all that is sometimes claimed, it has undoubtedly done much, and Westerners would be the last people to belittle the work by which Manitoba and the Territories has so greatly benefited. Ontario farmers were the pioneer tillers of the present generation of Western tillers of the soil. Ontario commercial houses established western branches, and the biggest of enterprises now flourishing in the west, were founded by Ontarians. In every department of effort and activity the same is true, and in no department is Western obligation to the older province more distinctly asserted than in newspaper work, for much more than half the editors and publishers of Manitoba and the Territories are of Ontario birth and training. In new, unpainted prairie towns, built to await the coming of the railroad, in mining villages in the mountains, as well as in the older and more populous centres, it is much better than even betting that the editor of the local paper is of Ontario origin, and the odds are that he learned the case and stuck type on a six or eight page weekly somewhere on the back concessions "down east."

Among the Ontario newspapermen now firmly and finally settled in the West is Mr. Shoemaker, one of the editors and proprietors of the Alberta Advocate, published at Red Deer. Mr. Shoemaker is a Port Elgin boy, and like many another future journalist, washed rollers and devilled, and learned his business right from the bottom. It was in the office of the Port Elgin Times, one of the most respected and reliable of eastern local papers, that Mr. Shoemaker learned the mechanical department of the publishing business.

ness. He worked his way upward until he knew practically all that was to be learned in a small newspaper office, and, still desiring to improve, he turned his eyes to a bigger centre. Naturally, Toronto was the centre of attraction, and there Mr. Shoemaker spent some time, improving his technical knowledge, and widening his experience. When he felt himself sufficiently equipped, his desire to still further broaden his knowledge of the printing craft took him still further afield. He went west. His first stopping place was Chicago, in which city he received valuable training in metropolitan journalism. From the Windy City Mr. Shoemaker went further west until he got to the Pacific slope. He worked in some of the best offices in Vancouver and then headed east again, stopping for a time at Fernie, B.C. Three years ago he located in the Canadian West in June, and last year, in partnership with Mr. D. A. McLean, he purchased the Alberta Advocate.

It will thus be seen that Mr. Shoemaker is a man of wide experience in the mechanical work of newspaper production. He has worked in offices ranging from such as those prevailing in the majority of western centres up to the biggest papers published on the continent. On the news writing side he has fully approved his ability. He has the "nose for news." He has clearly defined ideas as to the field that a country paper should cover, and in which field it should be supreme, and his constant endeavor is to embody those ideas in his own newspaper. The consensus of opinion among his fellow workers is that he has succeeded well in this endeavor. The Advocate is a fine example of what brains, energy and taste can do in the production of a newspaper in a town so small that nowhere else than in Western Canada would it be dreamt that it was possible for it maintain a successful paper. But it does, and does it well. The editor does his part—he gets the news, writes it up, always understandably, and sometimes with grace and humor. He expresses without prejudice, his opinions on public questions as they affect local interests, and his editorial remarks soon become crystallized into the prevailing local judgment. And the merchants and the farmers do their share to maintain and prosper the enterprise. The latter all subscribe, and the former finance the proposition by their liberal advertising support. The printer-editor sees that the makeup is tasteful and the presswork good, and thus by the hearty co-operation of all concerned, a paper is produced that is a weekly wonder to any easterner knowing the sparseness of Western population, but unaware of the triumphs accomplished by Western enthusiasm.

The Advocate is in many respects a sample of the product of Western conditions. Hitherto it has been a success. The prospects are it will continue to be one, and greater as the continued inrush of immigration and the increase of population give its proprietors ampler means and wider scope for their enterprise.

First Railroad Charter.

The first charter ever granted in this country or probably any other for the building of a railroad was granted in 1819 to Henry Drinker by the Pennsylvania legislature for a road of that kind from the Delaware valley to the headwaters of the Lehigh river over the route now occupied by the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western railroad from the Water Gap to Scranton. That was before the days of steam, and the "wagons" that were to be run on the road were to be moved by horse power. That old charter and the rights it conveyed were purchased by the original Delaware and Lackawanna company for \$1,000.

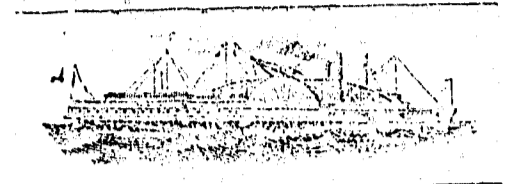



for years if necessary. Russia is not crushed as the Foreign Press has led the world to believe. Her Manchurian army is now nearly double the strength it originally was and is prepared to assume the aggressive when the time comes.

London, 18th.—Construction of largest and most powerful battle ship in the world is about to begin. She will cost \$10,000,000 so heavily will this vessel be armed that she will be equal to any two battle ships now afloat and her striking power at such a range as that at which the engagement opened in the battle of Sea of Japan will be as great as any three battle ships of Togos fleet. The displacement will be 18,000 tons. The Dreadnought as she will be called will mount twelve 12 inch guns of the latest type, throwing three, 850 pound shells every two minutes. The vessel will be driven by turbines and make 20 knots.

Victoria, 18th.—The crew of the Str. Quadra went on strike today and left the steamer because of ill treatment by the mate.

Nanaimo, 18th.—A special meeting of the U. M. W. is called for Thursday afternoon when Thomas Burke will address the miners on the issue. It is also reported that the first strike pay will be disbursed among the men.

Nanaimo, 18th.—The Str. Tricolor which arrived today brings news of a fatal accident which occurred on the U. S. light ship Umatilla, at entrance to the straits yesterday the boiler of the lightship exploded killing several men. The Umatilla was lying helplessly adrift and the Tricolor towed her to Neah Bay.

St. Petersburg, 18th.—Gen. Linevich under yesterday's date reports that the Japanese are bombarding Naituchi on the southeast coast of the Island of Sakhalien.

Tokio, 17th.—It is officially reported that Gen. Linevitch forces numbers nearly 400,000 and it is reported that he is using water transportation extensively to bring forward men, supplies and ammunition.
