The farmers of the Valley are becoming alarmed at the steady spread of Canadian thistle and are trying to devise ways and means to prevent their further encroachment. It is generally conceded that the most effectual check is to keep them out during the growing season, which saps the strength of the plants and also prevents the seeds from ripening and then spreading. If allowed to grow, it is evident that it will be a very short time ere every bit of slashing and pasture land in the vicinity of the infested lands will be overrun with this pernicious weed.

### Telegraphic News

**New York, 21st**—The wave of intense heat which held the city in its grasp for more than a week caused nearly 200 deaths several times that number of serious prostrations and untold suffering to millions has been strangely shaken. The relief came yesterday when a violent storm of wind and rain swept through the city and although but of few minutes duration left a cooling breeze and a comfortable night followed.

**Lady Smith, 21st**—Mr Lucas of Comox is negotiating with J. S. Scott of this city for the bakery premises intending to engage in business here immediately if negotiations are successful.

**St Petersburg, 21st**—Private advices received say that Japanese warships have been sighted near Nikolaievsk at the mouth of the Amur river. Many of the inhabitants of Nikolaievsk and Vladivostok it is added have fled to Khabarovsk.

**St Petersburg, 21st**—The Novoe Vremya today devotes a leading article to the Berlin Tageblatt dwelling specially on the specification against double tracking the the Siberian railroad which the

paper declares is utterly unacceptable in every way being equivalent to the political and economic suicide of Russia.

**Ottawa, 21st**—Parliament prorogued today.

**Tokio, 21st**—It is officially announced that Russians who have thus far surrendered at various points of Sakhalien Island number 461 including 1 colonel and 14 other officers.

**Shanghai, 21st**—The boycott against the U. S. has been put in force.

**Nanaimo 21st**—Yesterday Ralph Smith, M. P. received a telegram from W. Mackenzie King, Deputy Minister of Labor, stating that the Union had accepted the department's offer of intervention but the company had telegraphed that the only question at issue between the company and some of its employees was the recognition of the U. M. W. of America which the company will not accede to and that it feels that nothing can come of the intervention. Mr Stockett has visited the Sound. Howard is in town. The local union of the U. M. W. of America commence paying strike benefits today. Both parties in the dispute seem inclined to sit down and make a long siege of it.

**Greenwood, B. C., 21st**—The strike at the B. C. Copper Co's. smelter ended yesterday by the strikers, unconditional surrender. The Company refuses to re-employ the men who caused trouble.

**Nanaimo, 21st**—The Quarry contractor turns out to be an immense help to Nanaimo. The Western Construction Co. has secured contract for all the stone work for the buildings and an immense dry dock at Mare Island navy yard at San Francisco. The dry dock will be the largest on the Pacific coast and will admit the largest battleship afloat. It will cost several million dollars in construction and will require many millions of cubic yards of stone. All the stone will be cut and dressed at Newcastle quarry and the work of putting up buildings and installing stone dressing and sawing machinery is to commence at once.

The contract will require 3 years to fill and 200 to 300 men will be constantly employed and in a few months quite a village will be built on the Island.

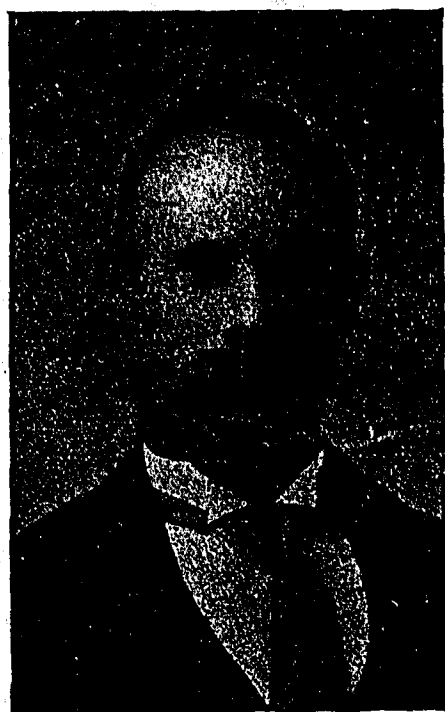

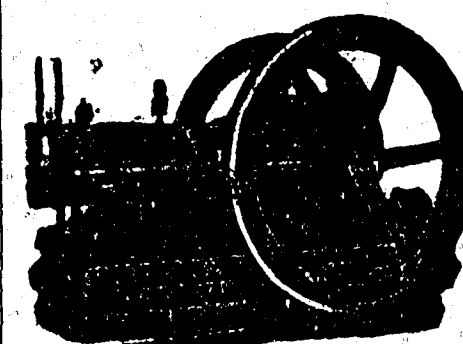
