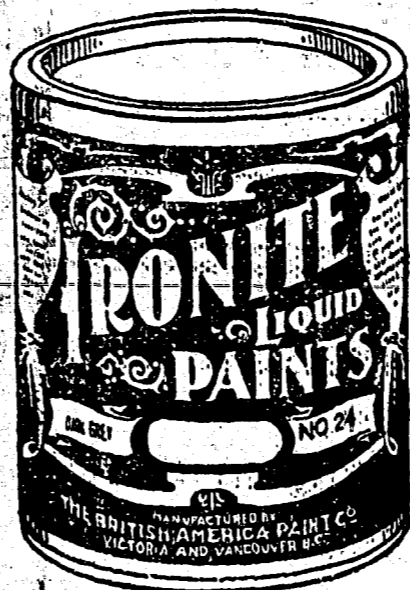

of the Province of British Columbia at
its next session for an Act incorporating
The Campbell River Power Company,
Limited with all the powers give to power
companies under the "Water Act,
1909," and for the purpose of conforming
to the Campbell River Power Company,
Limited, a company incorporated under
the "Companies Act, 1897" in the 17th
day of April, 1909, all the rights, powers
and privileges contained in the Com-
pany's Memorandum of Association, which
are set out in issue of the British Columbia
Gazette of 22nd day of April, 1909 at pages
1567 and 1568, and also all the li-
cences and privileges heretofore or here-
after granted or applied for or obtained,
and in particular, but not so as to limit
the generality of the foregoing, for the
following purposes:—

- (a) The construction or operation of
works for the supply or utilization of water
under the "Water Act, 1909."
(b) To apply for and obtain under the
provisions of the "Water Act, 1909,"
or to purchase or otherwise acquire, water
rights or water licenses.
(c) To supply water for domestic pur-
poses as defined by the "Water Act, 1909."
(d) To manufacture gas for sale to
consumers, and for such purposes to build
main and operate all necessary building,
machinery and plant.
(e) To construct, equip, operate and
maintain telegraph and telephone sys-
tems and lines.
(f) To construct, operate and main-
tain, and improve houses, factories, ware-
houses, shops, wharves, buildings, erec-
tions, works and conveniences of all
kinds.
(g) To construct, operate and main-
tain electric works, power works, generat-
ing plant and such other conveniences
as may be necessary for generating elec-
tricity.
(h) Producing power in any manner
and of any kind.
(i) Generating electricity for light,
heat, power, the operation of motors,
engines and machinery of all kinds, prop-
elling tramways, driving, running, lift-
ing, crushing, smelting, drilling, milling,
or for any other purpose for which it can
be used, either alone or in connection
with any other power.
(j) Transmitting electricity or any
form of developed power, by the use of
the same in any manner by any municipal-
ity, company, corporation or person.
(k) For rendering water and water-
power available for use, application and
distribution by erecting dams, improving
the level of water in any existing body of
water, or extending the level of water, di-
verting the waters of any stream, pond,
or lake, into any other channel or chan-
nel, laying or erecting any line of flume,
pipe, or wire, constructing any reservoir,
reservoir, aqueduct, weir, or building,
or other erection or work which may be
required in connection with the improve-
ment and use of the said water, and water
power, or by altering, raising or extend-
ing, improving, repairing or maintaining
any such works, or any part thereof.
(l) Compensating for and using the
power for all purposes.
(m) Flaming, making, laying, fitting,
maintaining and repairing electric lines,
accumulators, storage batteries, electric
bells, valves, wires, pipes, gas pipes, con-
ductors, branches, electric motors, dyna-
mos, engines, machines or other apparatus
or devices, cuts, drains, and reservoirs,
pipes, poles, buildings and other erections
and works, and erecting and fitting any
electric line, cable, main wire, or other
electric apparatus, on or below ground.
(n) Constructing, maintaining and op-
erating single or double line overhead
or underground tramways, with all the
rights and powers for the paving,
of cars, crossings and all kinds of plant
capable of being used upon or in connec-
tion with a tramway, up and down, across
streets, bridges, which shall be the line of
the tramway intended to be built by the
power company, and for erecting wire and
other plant and structures in connection
with the tramway intended to be built.
(o) To take the transfer and carry passen-
gers, merchandise and goods of all kinds
on the tramway, by any motive power
which may be used or that may be used in
the future.
(p) To supply consumers with electricity,
light and heat, or any other form of de-
veloped power, whether by wire or other
means whatsoever.
(q) To erect, maintain and repair poles,
wires and lines, for the purpose of trans-
mitting electricity, or any other form of
developed power, or to erect any other
plant or structure in connection with the
transmission of electricity.

- (r) To erect poles, posts, pillars, lamps
globes, and any other apparatus in or up-
on highways, roads, streets or bridges,
or against any wall erected on the same or
adjacent thereto.
(s) The use of water or water-power
for hydraulic mining purposes and for
milling, manufacturing, industrial and
mechanical purposes, other than the gen-
eration of electricity.
(t) To dig trenches and drains and
therein to lay cables, lines and wires, and
to put electric cables, lines, wires, swit-
ches, and connecting boards from any ca-
bles, lines and wires in, under, along, or
across all roads, highways, streets and
bridges, and from time to time cut, alter,
remove, replace, repair and relay all or
any such cables, lines, wires, switches
and connecting boards, or other apparatus.
(u) To acquire by purchase or other-
wise, the right to use and enjoy electric
or any other power already developed by
others at any point or points.
(v) To construct, maintain, alter, re-
pair and repair devices for measuring
light, heat and power.
(w) To sell or let for use, light, heat,
power, and any and all devices and appar-
atus used for measuring the same, or oth-
erwise used in connection with the com-
pany's business and works.
(x) To fix rates and charges for the
use of light, heat and power, and the
carriage of goods and passengers.
(y) To require all persons supplied
with electric light to place and use only
such lamps and appliances as are approv-
ed by the Company.
(z) To sell, assign and transfer to
any other company lawfully empowered
in that behalf its license or licenses, un-
der taking and works.

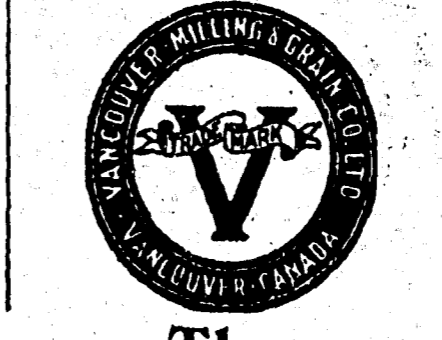

Murder at Bayne Sound

On Saturday morning last, the
body of Andrew Høglørg was dis-
covered lying near the cabin of
Mike Watt, a logger and resident
of Bayne Sound, in a terribly mu-
tilated condition. His head was
nearly severed from the body and
smashed to a pulp. Beside the body
was a grindstone, which was one
of the weapons used, and an axe
covered with blood and hair, was
found in Watt's cabin, with which
the ghastly wounds in the neck
were undoubtedly caused. Con-
stable Thomson and Coroner Ab-
ramson were at once summoned to
the scene of the tragedy and ar-
rested Watt, on suspicion. The
hat and cap of the murdered man
were found in Watt's cabin, which
goes to show that the victim was
in the accused's cabin on the night
or morning of the murder. Høg-
berg and Watt were together on
the Friday previous, and had a
couple of drinks and purchased
two bottles of whisky at the Palm-
er hotel, and were to all appear-
ance, friendly, and had been for
some time past. An inquest was
held at Cumberland, on Monday,
August 16th, and the verdict of
the jury was, that in their opinion
according to the evidence the de-
ceased came to his death by
wounds inflicted by the accused,
Mr. Høglørg, better known as
Anderson, has been for many years
a resident of Bayne Sound, and
was well known throughout the
district. We omitted to say that
Watt was the first to give infor-
mation about the body lying out-
side his cabin. The prisoner was
committed for trial.

Can Now 'Phone' Victoria

The H. C. Telephone Company
has completed a long distance line
between Victoria and this city. The
line was formally opened on Wed-
nesday evening last, when the
Cumberland News sent a message
of congratulation to the Colonial
office, and received one in return.
The line has been in course of
construction for the past six months.
It is all of copper, making the
transmission perfect. Wednesday
evening the message from Victo-
ria could be heard very distinct-
ly.

The linking up of one of the
most northerly settlements with
the extreme southern point is an
important stride forward in the
development of the island. With bet-
ter means of communication de-
velopment is aided.

Nanaimo was the farthest point
north reached by the telephone
system formerly. The new line
adds another seventy miles of wire
and gives communication with
Parkerville, Little Qualicum and
Union Bay. At the present time
the company is installing a branch
exchange in this city and Cour-
tenay.

### Alaska-Yukon Exposition

Seattle, Aug. 17.—In the most magnificent pageant ever seen in the West, twenty-five thousand Masons from all parts of the Pacific Coast, will parade the grounds of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition on Shriners day, Wednesday, August 25th. Over a half million dollars worth of costumes alone will be used in the procession. Camels, elephants, and a whole menagerie of animals of various kinds will be used in the parade. At night, a baroque parade will be held on the Pay Street, in which fire effects will play a prominent part.

The week at the Exposition from August the 25 to August the 29th, will begin with North Dakota Day on Monday. A large delegation from that state will take part in the programs of the day, which will be held in the Washington State Building.

On the same day, the National Indian Educator's congress will begin the annual convention at the Auditorium. Exhibits of the work of the educators among the Indian have been received from all of the agencies of the West and these will be put on display at the Auditorium.

The Coming of the famous Tabernacle choir on Utah Day, Wednesday will be one of the musical features of the Exposition. The choir, which has been celebrated throughout the entire country, will give concerts in the natural amphitheatre. The Utah Day program will be held in the Utah State Building, which is a reproduction of the Hopi Indian Pueblo. A subscription of \$15,000 has been raised in Utah to send the Utah high school cadets to the Exposition for Utah Day.

### FOES OF THE LEVEES.

Sources of Danger to the Artificial Banks Along the Mississippi.

"People who know little about our system of levees, the artificial banks built to confine the flood waters that pour into the Mississippi, no doubt imagine that the heavy rains are the only enemy with which the levees have to contend," said a Baton Rouge man.

"On the contrary, the levees, both during times of flood and low water, are subject to the incessant attacks of living foes, the destructive work of which costs millions of dollars. These foes are alligators, turtles, muskrats, field rats, fresh water terrapin and crawfish. Of all these burrowers that prey on the levees, excavating within them goodly chambers or tunnels, the crawfish do the most damage, with the turtles and terrapin a good second. The harm done by the alligators is comparatively small.

"In repairing the banks crawfish holes are often found of immense size. It is these hollow spaces that in time of freshets cause a caving in and break of the levees, which of course bring on an inundation of all the adjacent country. The worst part of the business is that no way of exterminating these pests has yet been found, and the only thing to be done is to try to keep them away from the banks as much as possible."

To Operate This Masterpiece Air is the First Necessity.

Of all the engines cunningly devised by man not one can equal that masterpiece of construction, the engine of the human frame. To run that engine air is the first necessity. Construct it how you will, the greater part of the energy which feeds a power plant is lost before it reaches the applying machine. The body only has the power of using energy really economically and efficiently. Its food is its fuel. To be available all the constituents of that food must be burned, producing heat and power. For that burning the oxygen of the air is essential. Equally true is it that nitrogen must be present to prevent the rapid combustion which would take place in oxygen alone. But, whether the combustion be fast or slow, the action is the same. The body burns the carbon and by means of its food and gives out the oxides of these substances, carbon dioxide (carbon acid gas) and hydroxide oxide (water). The water that is formed within the body by the burning of hydrogen is of comparative slight importance in a consideration of the first question of the effect of the air upon the individual and the key factor, the carbon dioxide formed in the body, is of direct importance. Health depends on it.


