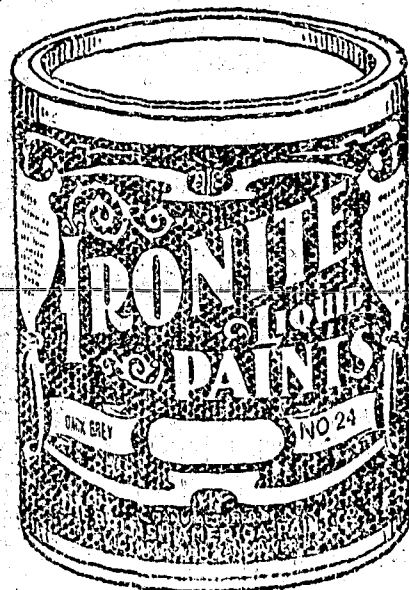

City Council.

The Council met in regular session last evening, there being present Aldermen Stewart, Daniels, Horwood, Bickle and the Mayor. The minutes of previous meetings were read and adopted.

Communication, James Brown tendered his resignation as city man, to take effect at the end of the month. Mr. Brown's resignation was accepted.

Communication from D. W. Stewart, protesting against high assessment of lots lately purchased by him. Mr. Stewart will be informed that the council cannot deal with same, this year, but must go over until next year's Court of Revision.

Communication was received from H. Murlock on behalf of the band, asking for financial aid, so as to enable them to attend the A. Y. P. Fair, held at Seattle on September 8th. It was regularly moved, seconded and carried that a public meeting be called to consider the matter.

Constable Gray's report—Seavenger, \$105.25; Night Watchman, \$77.50; Road Tax, \$76.00; Dog Tax, \$6.00; Hall Rent, \$5.00; Hay Seales, \$2.75; Seavenger tickets, \$1.20.

Quite a large number of citizens waited upon the council and protested against the action of that body in allowing the impounding of cattle without previous immediate notice, also that the penalty was too severe. Sceldom has the council been honored by such a large gathering. The council and anti-cowiters carrying on a bitter and animated discussion. One of the speakers, Albert Pichard, in his closing remarks called the mayor and councillors "mankeys" and the council passed a resolution, and the mayor ordered constable McLellan to take the offender in charge, which was done.

The decision of the council was that the by-law be carried out as soon as a new pound keeper can be secured. Mr. Brown refusing to act any longer in that capacity.

A request was made by R. S. Robertson that the Dunsmuir Avenue sewer be lowered so as to drain the cellars of his and other property—Referred to board of works.

Ald. Bickle gave notice that at next regular meeting of council, he would bring in an amendment to the present liquor by-law. Leave was granted.

A special meeting of the council will be held on Wednesday evening.

There being no further business the council adjourned.
