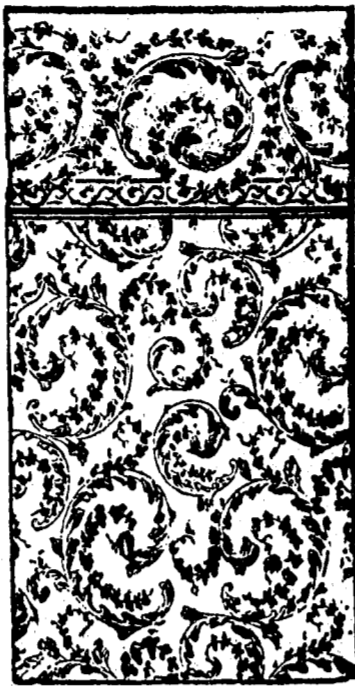

The speaker said that he was delighted at what he had seen of this portion of Vancouver Island, and said we should be proud of this grand heritage of ours and should do our utmost to make it what it should be. He spoke of the necessity of a thorough system of advertising, along with personal and combined enthusiastic work. The other speakers of the evening were, W. Duncan, J. B. Holmes, R. Grant, M. P. P., R. C. Wilson, J. McPhoe, J. Stewart and Mr. Shaw, all the addresses being splayed and to the point. Mr. McGaffey, through the courtesy of Mr. R. Grant, M. P. P. who placed himself and carriage at his disposal was enabled to visit Comox valley and enjoy the beauties of that portion of Vancouver Island. The Vancouver Island League are to be congratulated in securing the services of such an able and enthusiastic secretary, who we are sure will secure grand results for this island. Mr. W. Willard, president, of the local league, acted as chairman.

CITY COUNCIL

The City Council met in regular session last evening, a full board being present, with the exception of Alderman Stewart.

The minutes of previous meeting were read and on motion adopted.

Communications, from R. Grant & Co., objecting to assessment on their Dunsmuir Avenue property, the assessment standing the same as prior to the fire; From constables McLellan and Gray asking the city to supply them with uniforms, this communication was referred to the police commissioners.

Constable Gray's report for month of May, scavenger, \$101.25; night watchman, \$75.50; dog tax, \$50.00, Campbell Bros., \$17.00; scavenger buckets, \$11.70; hall rent, \$8.00; hay scales, 75c.

Accounts, C. H. Tarbell, 85c; A. Gatz, 6.00; electric light, 80.60; Cumberland News, 10.00; R. Grant & Co., 20.21; Byron Crawford, 10.25;

Mr. Monaco's communication received at last meeting and laid over until present meeting, asking for increase of pay and three nights instead of two to do scavenger work, was taken up and discussed. It was moved by Ald. Bate and

seconded by Ald. Partridge, that the Mayor be empowered to hire a man to go around with Mr. Monaco to see if the work can be done in two nights. Ald Daniels moved in amendment, seconded by Ald. Bickle, that Mr. Monaco be given thirty days notice to quit, and tenders be called for to do the work. The amendment carried.

It was moved by Ald. Bickle, seconded and passed that Mrs. J. L. Roe and Mr. M. Magnoni be notified that their water closets must be moved back to the alley, within ten days, if not legal proceedings will be taken against them.

It was decided that in future, ashion sidewalks be eight feet wide.

The city clerk, reported a shortage in funds for the payment of teachers and civic salaries. It was moved and passed that the Mayor and city clerk be empowered to arrange for an overdraft with the bank.

The council adjourned.

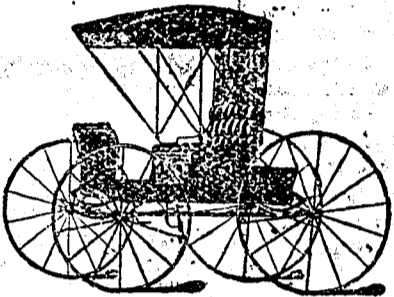
