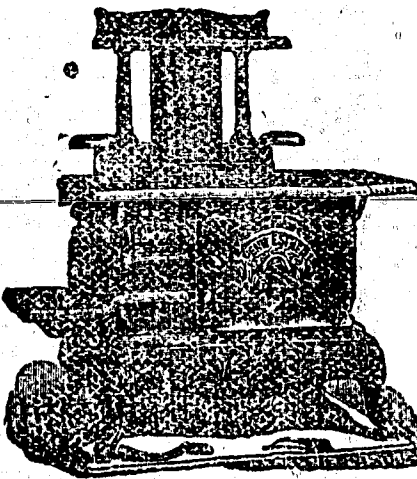
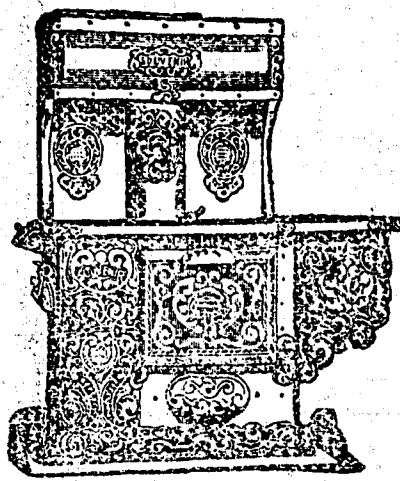

FOOTBALL NOTES

The replay for the Cum-
berland and District Cup took place
on the Recreation Grounds, on
Thanksgiving Day, Nov., 9th, in
the presence of a large crowd of
spectators. When the teams lined
up it was seen that there was a
charge in both teams from the
teams that played two weeks ago
Crawthorn displacing Walker in
the Mixtures, and D. James for
Latham in No. 5. The day
proved an ideal one for football
and the people took advantage
of the fine weather. Referee
Stewart started the game on
time, the Mixtures kicking down
hill, having won the toss. From
the start it was seen that the
game was going to be hard and
fast, but some good chances were
lost on both sides by over-excitement
on the part of the players. The first half finished with hon-
ors about even, the teams cross-
ing over without a goal being
scored. The second half was
full of excitement, first one goal
and then another being visited;
No. 5 scoring the first goal of the
game. This reverse seemed to
put sting into the Mixtures, and
they were not long until they
equalized the game. At the end
of an hour and a half's play the
scores stood two goals each. The
teams commenced again to play
half an hour extra time. Most
of the players were by this time
beginning to show signs of the
wear and tear of the game. Ex-
citement reached fever heat
when the Mixtures scored the
leading goal. But No. 5 replied
gamely, and in the last five min-
utes of the game the scores were
equal again. The game finish-
ed a draw, three goals each. The
result was a fair verdict of the
day's play. It would have been
hard lines on either team to
have lost after putting up such a
hard fight. For the Mixtures
Walker in goal, played a splen-
did game and time and again
saved his goal when he seemed
beat. The sooner some of the
players learn to obey the ruling
of the referee the better it will be
for themselves and the game.

Godfrey a logger at Donne's camp,
Union Bay, was fatally wounded
yesterday by accidental discharge
of a rifle in the hands of a com-
panion named Burroughs. The

out of his rifle.

Believing that the shells were
all out, Burroughs raised the rifle
and pulled the trigger, the ball
striking Godfrey, who was sitting

to the hospital at Cumberland,
where he died this evening.

An inquest was held by Cor-
oner Abrams; the Jury bringing in
a verdict of accidental death.

berland cemetery.

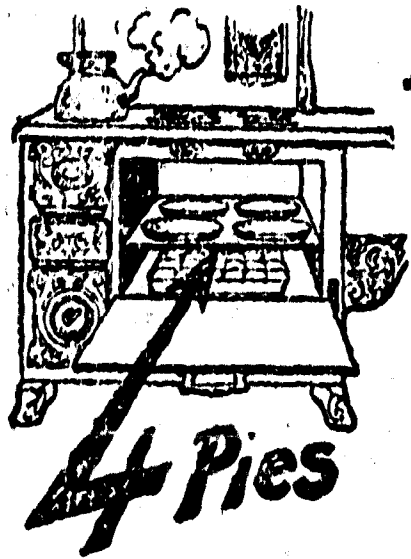

During the past week two en-
thusiastic and largely attended
meetings have been held of men
who took part in the South African
War, and who are not entitled to
participate in the land grant under
the Volunteer Bounty Act of 1908.
An Association has been formed
to be called the "Imperial South
African Veterans' Association." The
object of the Association is to
seek to have the above Act exten-
ded so that all men of the Anglo-
Saxon race who took part in the
South African war, and who are
not already entitled to participate
in the land grant, and who were
residing in Canada at the time the
said Act came into force, shall be
included in its provisions. Lord
Milner and Lord Northcliffe, who
have been staying here, and the
newly elected members of the Do-
minion Government for this city,
have expressed their sympathy
with the proposed amend-
ment. Mr. Sheford Grimwood,
3-Metcalfe Street, Toronto, has
been appointed President of the
above Association, and is also act-
ing as Organizing Secretary for the
Dominion, and as soon as all the
names of the men living in Canada
are to hand, a deputation will wait
on the Government at Ottawa.

Synopsis of Canadian Homestead Regulations.

Any available Dominion Lands within
the Railway Belt in British Columbia,
may be homesteaded by any person who
is the sole head of a family, or any male
over 18 years of age, to the extent of one
quarter section of 161 acres, more or less.

Entry must be made personally at the
local land office for the district in which
the land is situated. Entry by proxy
may, however, be made on certain con-
ditions by the father, mother, son, daugh-
ter brother or sister of and intending
homesteader.

The homesteader is required to perform
the conditions connected therewith
under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months' residence upon
and cultivation of the land in each year
for three years.

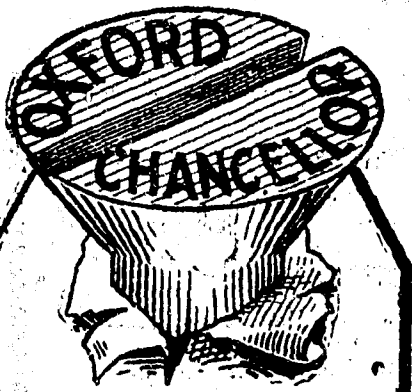
(2) If the father (or mother, if the
father is deceased), of the homesteader
resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the
land entered for, the requirements as to
residence may be satisfied by such person
residing with the father or mother.

(3) If the settler has his permanent
residence upon farming land owned by
him in the vicinity of his homestead, the
requirements as to residence may be sat-
isfied by residence upon the said land.

Six months' notice in writing should
be given to the Commissioner of Domini-
on Lands at Ottawa of intention to ap-
ply for patent.

Coal.—Coal mining rights may be
leased for a period of twenty-one years
at an annual rental of \$1 per acre. Not
more than 2,500 acres shall be leased to
one individual or company. A royalty
at the rate of five cents per ton shall be
collected on the merchantable coal mined.

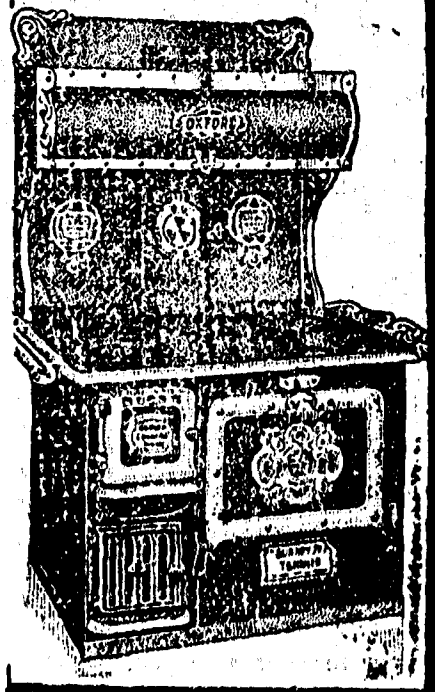

A TALE OF PORTO RICO

Curious Story of the Haunted
Sentry Box.

LIGHT ON THE OLD LEGEND.

One of the Many Mysterious Disap-
pearances From Fort San Cristobal
Accounted For by the Revelation of
the Lost One Himself.

Writing in the Journal of the Mil-
itary Service Institution, Captain Ar-
thur P. S. Hyde of the coast artillery
tells this curious story of "the haun-
ted sentry box" of Fort San Cristobal,
the ancient Spanish built fortress
which guards the entrance to San
Juan, Porto Rico:

"A number of picturesque sentry
boxes built of masonry and appearing
like minarets are placed at points of
vantage in and around the fort. One
of these on the sea front, and reached
only through a long and dark tunnel
from the interior of the fort, is popu-
larly known as La Garita del Diablo,
or the devil's sentry box, usually, al-
though incorrectly, translated the
haunted sentry box. This name was
given to it by the Spanish soldiers for
the reason that a number of sentries
stationed there disappeared in a most
mysterious manner and were never
again heard from.

"An American officer was once on
duty that took him into the remote in-
terior of the island, and while spend-
ing one night in a small settlement he
engaged in conversation with a num-
ber of the inhabitants of the place.
One old man, on learning that the of-
ficer was stationed at Fort San Cristobal,
became especially interested and
in the course of the conversation told
the following story:

"I used to be a soldier in the Span-
ish army and was stationed at Fort
San Cristobal. A number of soldiers
while on sentry duty had mysteriously
disappeared from the sentry box down
by the sea, and we had all become
convinced that it was haunted by the
devil, who, we thought, used to come
and steal the soldiers away.

"One stormy night it fell to my
lot to go on duty in the devil's sentry
box, as we called it, at midnight, and
it was with some doubts and misgiv-
ings that I went with the corporal of
the guard and relieved the former sen-
try. When they left me I listened to
the sound of their footsteps reverberat-
ing from the walls and ceiling of the
dark and narrow passage, ever grow-
ing fainter and fainter as they reced-
ed, until finally the noise of the storm
and the sea completely drowned it,
and I was left alone with the mad ele-
ments.

"It was a mad night and one well
calculated to add to the feeling of awe
that the devil's sentry box always in-
stilled into the man on duty there at
night.

"Presently my attention was at-
tracted by some lights in a small tar-
n on the shore below the fort, where
many of us were wont to go when off
duty for a glass of rum. Then I be-
gan to think that I might be able to
climb down over the rocks to the
shore, get a glass of rum at the tar-
n and return to my post.

"The more I thought of it the more
determined I was to go, so finally,
leaving my rifle and belt in the sentry
box, I climbed over the wall and down
on to the rocks and so made my way
with great labor and difficulty and no
little danger to the little house, where
the occupants were making merry
with dancing and drinking. I soon
fell to and enjoyed myself with them.

"When one is dancing with a fair
senorita he sometimes forgets the pas-
sage of time, as I did on that fatal
night, and not until long after 1 o'clock
did I begin to think of returning to
my post. Then, realizing that the cor-
poral had made his inspection and had
found me gone from my post and
with my rifle and belt left behind, I
saw only a court martial and the gar-
rote staring me in the face, for in
those days for a sentinel in the Span-
ish army to quit his post meant sure
death, even in peace.

"To go back was out of the ques-
tion. There was only one thing left
for me to do, and that was to desert.
My heart sank within me. If I should
be captured, the same fate would be
meted out to me; but, I reasoned, if I
were to go back the fate would be cer-
tainly, whereas, if I deserted at
least I had a chance of keeping out
of sight of the authorities. I deserted
before morning was out of the city
and on the way to the moun-
tains.

"I have lived in this little hamlet
for years and have never been back to
the capital since that day, nor have I
ever told my story to a single soul un-
til tonight, but now that the soldiers
are gone I no longer fear for my life."
"Thus we have the story of the dis-
appearance of the sentry of the devil's
sentry box, one of the many mys-
terious who so mysteriously disappeared
from it, and it would seem to be prob-
able that the other disappearances
could be accounted for in a similar
manner were the truth known. Que-
sada?"

Captain Hyde mentions an interest-
ing fact that, although for centuries
Porto Rico was considered the legit-
imate prey of buccanniers and was at-
tacked at various times by regular
organized expeditions of the English
and the French during times of war,
with none of her numerous forts, Es-
tado Barro never been captured by an
enemy, and the only surrender was to
the Americans in 1898. A strange
feature of the island is that it has
never been visited by a hurricane.

Gravely injured by the earthquake,

An Election Euchre

For a large card party try an Election Euchre instead of a regular Military Euchre. Instead of a card, each table will represent a political party, as Republican, Democratic, Labor, Woman's Suffrage, Prohibition, etc., and posters hung around the rooms will give the names of the candidates, and perhaps a campaign motto or saying.

Each table has a ballot box for the votes won, and also a supply of colored slips to give out as votes when it loses; four people are at the table, and play for the party represented by their table. Arrange so that the same couples do not play against each other more than once.

The length of time for each game is optional, but ought not to be more than one or two minutes. A regular score should be made for each game, which will tell the table to be visited each game, so that there will be no conflicts. Any one who has played at a Military Euchre can do this.

Quadrant place cards can be made which will assign the guests to the party for which they will play during the evening. Simple prizes, consistent with the election idea, such as horns, drums, etc., will prove the funniest. Have the winners carry out the idea of free lunches, such as cider, and wishes, cheese doughnuts, etc.

Score cards, posters, ballot boxes, etc., can all be easily made, and a great deal of fun will lie in their originality. — Mary A. Monahan, Vancouver Woman's Home.
