ANOTHER EXPLOSION.

Jacob's Creek, Pa. Dec. 19—An explosion of gas in Dart mine at the Pittsburg Coal Co. mines located here to-day entombed between 200 and 250 miners and it scarcely a ray of hope that a single one of them will be taken from the mine alive. Explosion partially wrecked buildings in vicinity. Examination shows that explosion was terrific. 130 bodies have been taken out up to 9 o'clock. They are terribly mangled. Caused by mine gas.

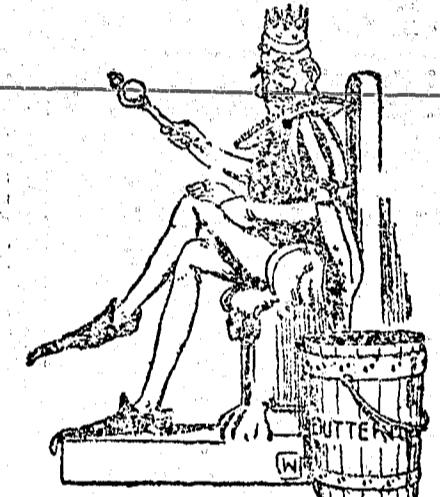

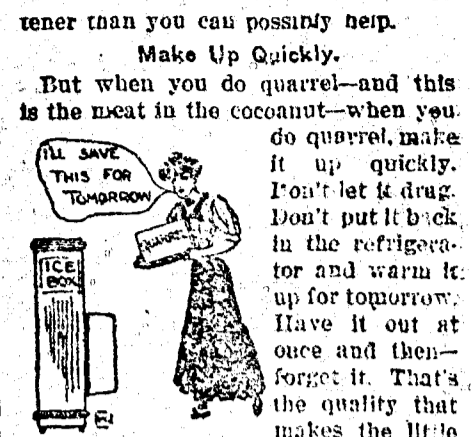

Your Little Disagreements.
 It's hardly necessary to say, my dear, that I am not telling this story exclusively for your entertainment. Make Up Quickly.
 But when you do quarrel—and this is the meat in the coconut—when you do quarrel, make it up quickly. Don't let it drag. Don't put it back in the refrigerator and warm it up for tomorrow. Have it out at once and then—forget it. That's the quality that makes the little husband and wife happiness; that's the gentle art of forgetting. One of the happiest couples I ever knew was old Jerry Palmer and his wife, who used to live just around the corner from us. I really believe there never was a day that they did not have a quarrel, and I am just as confident they never had it on their minds when they went to sleep. I mention them just to show the possibilities of forgetting, not as an example for you to follow—not by a long shot. Palmer and his wife were exceptional cases.

Then your quarrels will be like little summer clouds that obscure the sun for awhile, but make it seem all the brighter when they pass. There is nothing much sweeter in life, my dear, than the submissiveness of love and trust which follows a domestic shower—that is, if the love and trust are there and undimmed.

 The trouble is, my dear, that too many quarrels are not allowed to pass.

 Like prize chickens, they are fed and nursed and petted and grow stronger and harder to kill every day. They are drawn out—it's quarrels I'm talking about now, not chickens—they are drawn out day after day until they grow tired and slip out the front door, never perhaps to return. And all for what?
