

LET US REASON TOGETHER.

To the Editor of the News.

Sir:—Any one who has followed the course of Dominion politics for the last thirty years can easily see that this is the Liberal party's last time in power. When Sir John Macdonald passed away, the headless Conservatives soon went under, and Sir Wilfred's passing will leave the Liberals in even worse condition, there being no man in his following of the calibre of those whom Macdonald left behind him. This was the reason why Sir Chas. Hibbert Tupper, the real head of the Conservative party, let the last go by default, he saw the Liberals needed one more term to make them ripe for the sickle.

Now how does this affect the electors of Comox-Atlin? Thus—Mr. Sloan, in spite of his many protestations to the contrary, has made way for Mr. Templeman. Why? Because, being a young man, he wants to dodge the falling house, whereas Mr. Templeman, being an old man, may as well go down with it. He in any case, will never run again in any constituency, the Senatorial Home is waiting for him. But what recommendations does he bring to the people of Comox-Atlin? One, and only one, he is a cabinet minister. But he was a cabinet minister when he represented his own city, where all his interests are. Yet his own city cast him off. Now if he was of so little use to his own city where all interests are, of what use will he be to the District of Comox-Atlin, where he has no interest at all, and where he will certainly never seek re-election? Those of us who remember the raid of the Hon. T. B. Humphreys on Comox, will know just what to expect from Mr. Templeman.

I do not know who his opponent may be, but if he is a man with an interest in the District, or

falling that, if he is a young man identified with the coming party and liable to return to his constituents, common sense should teach us which way to vote. In any case, it would be difficult for us to find a poorer representative than Mr. Templeman.

A CONSERVATIVE VIEW.

Queen Charlotte News (Conservative): If the Colonist is guilty, as accused, of tampering in any manner with R. L. Borden's telegram its resignation as a Conservative journal should be handed in and accepted at once. And every honorable Conservative in the Comox-Atlin district, and the Liberals to a man, should see that Hon. Wm. Templeman is returned to Ottawa either by acclamation or with a handsome majority. The occasion demands it and the circumstances fully justify his return for it is to the best interests of the entire province of British Columbia. Undoubtedly a disgraceful injustice has been done that should be rectified as far as possible. A most commendable feature in connection with Hon. Wm. Templeman's defeat in Victoria was the fact that he stood true as steel by his leader. Sir Wilfred Laurier, even though he went down to defeat on the Asiatic question. Men of this character are not to be feared in any honorable contest, and should certainly be appreciated as politicians. The most important question is "what have we to gain or lose?" Sir Wilfred Laurier is willing and anxious to retain Mr. Templeman in his cabinet as Minister of Mines for British Columbia. This is all we could ask or expect under the present conditions, and the people of the Comox-Atlin district cannot afford to lose a cabinet minister in preference to a more aspiring member in the back ranks of the opposition, for we are in that stage of development that required every government assistant that is due us, and no part of the Dominion or province has more resources

nor brighter prospects than the Comox-Atlin district, now will any part of the province produce more revenue in the near future. And while it is with the deepest regret we lose so valuable and esteemed a member as Mr. Sloan, we must realize and believe that he considered his resignation for the best interests of the people in his constituency, for no man was ever supported more loyally than he has been in the past years, and we must realize that he is making a sacrifice in our favor that should be appreciated.

NOTE:—Since the above was put up in type, the Hon. William Templeman was elected by acclamation on Feb'y, 8th.

Longboat Wins.

New York, Feb. 6.—Maintaining an even swinging stride, which rarely varied throughout the race Tom Longboat, the Onondaga Indian from Canada, wrested the laurels of an indoor Marathon race last night at Madison Square garden, when victory seemed within the grasp of the plucky Englishman, Alfred Shrubbs, who collapsed in twenty-fifth mile, leaving the Indian to finish the long race of 26 miles 385 yards alone.

Longboat's time for the race was 2 hours 53 minutes 10 2/5 seconds, which is nearly eight minutes behind the record made by Dorando, the Italian, in his race with John Hayes, the Olympia Marathon winner last fall. The Indian finished in fine fettle and was in no wise distressed.

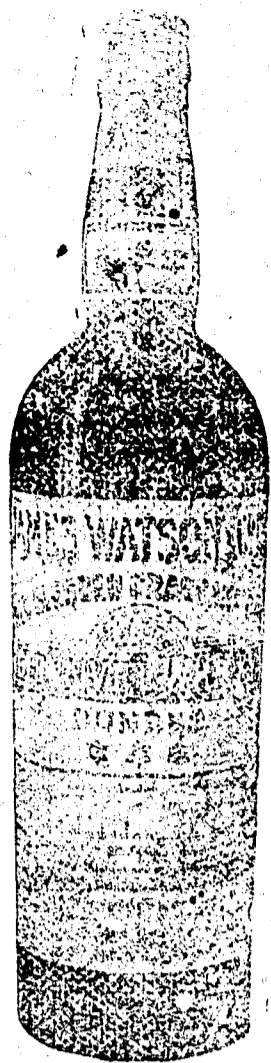
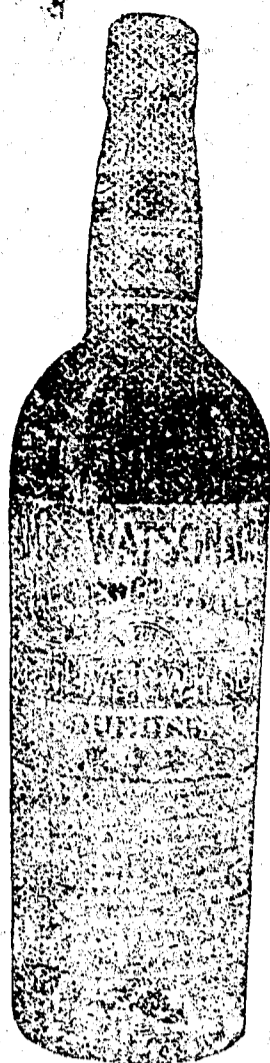

FOOD FOR CANNIBALS.

One of the Many Tragedies Enacted in Polynesia.

It is not so very long ago that cannibalism was rife throughout Polynesia, so that to be killed, cooked and eaten was the almost invariable fate of sailors who chanced to be so unfortunate as to be cast away on any of the outlying little visited islands.

Perhaps the most awful tragedy of the kind on record was that which happened in connection with the loss of the St. Paul, Captain Pommeroy, while on a voyage from Hongkong to Sydney. This fine steamship carried, besides a full crew, 327 passengers, mostly emigrants.

On Sept. 30, 1858, she was wrecked on the island of Rossel, but all got safely on shore. A little later the captain and eight of the crew left the island in search of assistance and were picked up by the Prince of Denmark schooner. Eventually the French steamer Styx was dispatched to the island and brought away one emigrant. The remaining 324 had been massacred and devoured by the natives.—Pearson's Weekly.

Philadelphia's Anti-Tipping Scheme.

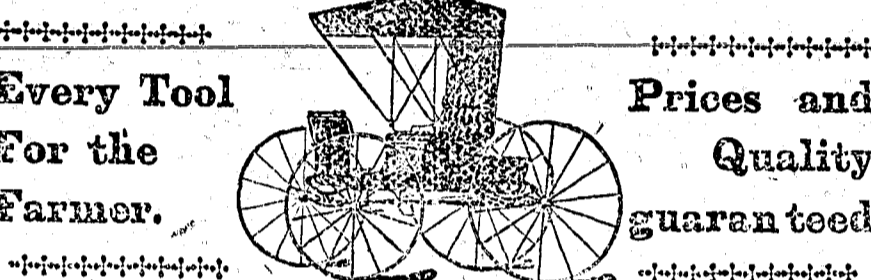
"You are such a tremendous 'brusher' I will give you this money if you can brush it out of my hand."

Synopsis of Canadian Homestead Regulations.

Any available Dominion Lands within the Railway Belt in British Columbia, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one quarter section of 60 acres, more or less.

Entry must be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated. Entry by proxy may, however, be made on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter or brother or sister of and intending homesteader.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) If the father or mother, if the father is deceased, of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his home land, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands in Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.

Coal mining rights may be entered for a period of twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1 per acre. Not more than 2,500 acres shall be leased to one individual or company. A royalty at the rate of five cents per ton shall be collected on the non-reimbutable coal mined.
