# THE PATHFINDER

Company Formed to Acquire Two North Fork Mining Properties

"The Pathfinder Consolidated Mining company has been incorporated to acquire the Pathfinder and the Little Bertha mines, with other crown granted properties on Pathfinder mountain on the North Fork of the Kettle river and the Kettle Valley railroad, fourteen miles north of Grand Forks, B. C." said J. W. Hays, president and treasurer, yes terday, according to last Sunday's Spokesman Review. "The resources are copper, gold and silver ores of a smelting grade contained in bodies of large dimensions; developed by several short shafts and tunnels.

A tunnel will be driven from the railroad tracks to tap the bodies at a depth of 1250 feet. The movement of ore from favorable outlets will proceed in the meantime. Shipments were made to Granby and Greenwood smelters in the early days of the properties, which were opened twenty years ago."

The capitalization of the company is \$200,000, divided into 2,000,000 shares. The board is composed of Mr. Hays; C. M. Kingston, M.D. vice president; A. A. Lewis, si-cretary; A. M. Petty, assistant secretary; F. H. Knight, A. E. Gallagher, G. Schnasse and W. K. C. Manly, residents of Spokane and Grand Forks. The properties lie on a moun tain at the apex of which is the Pathfinder.

"The Little Bertha ore is a quartz carrying silver and gold, the values of which are about equal," said Mr. Hays. "The Pathfinder values are principally in gold and copper. Several hundred feet of shaft, tunnel and stope work have shown large bodies of ore having a general average value of \$7.50 to the ton. On this property is a good plant composed of an 80 horsepower boiler, seven drill compressor, a hoist and a pump, mabuildings. The Little Bertha property has several hundred feet of shaft, tunnels and stopes showing good, strong veins of gold-silver ore averaging \$20 to \$25 to the ton. There are some fair mining buildings and a gasoline hoist.

"By installing a tramway from each property the ore can be removed to the ore bunkers over the railroad very cheaply. Frank M. Stevenson, a brakeman on the Canadian Pacific railway and well known in this city, was killed Tuesday morning near Porcupine It is believed that he slipped while walking across the top of eastbound freight train No. 84 and fell to the ground, sustaining injuries to his head which resulted in his death. Total Quantity of Resources Is Placed at 23,195,-581 Tons

The declaration by the Granby Consolidated Mining, Smelting & Power company of regular quarterly dividends at the rate of \$10 a year, while most of the copper companies are cutting deep into the hitherto prevailing dividend rate, makes timely an analysis of this company's operations, says a Boston report.

The Granby company was incorporated under a special act of the province of British Columbia-in 1901, and for this reason is not subject to the war taxation laws of the United States, although, of course, it is subject to any tax levies en forced by the Canadian government and individual shareholders in the United States must pay Uncle Sam's personal income taxes on dividends

The company's mining lands are at Phoenix, B. C., and comprise 43 claims and fractions aggregating about 1050 acres. The newly acquired lands of the Hidden Creek Copper company, of which Granby owns the entire capital stock, are situated in the northwestern part of British Columbia and comprise 412 during the last five years follows: acres. This is the property now providing the major part of the company's output.

The smelter plants are at Grand Forks and Anyox, B. C. There are eight blast furnaces, having a ca pacity of 4000 to 4500 tons per day.

Granby has for years been handi capped by high cost of coke and irregular deliveries. To obviate these difficulties it has acquired a high grads coal property, one seam of which shows 20,000,000 tons of high grade coking coal. Between \$1,200,000 and \$1,500,000 will be spent in developing and bringing the new property to a productive stage, all of which will be taken from earnings; but this should not interfere in any way with the main tenance of the present \$10 dividend

From the above expenditure Granby expects to derive an important income, as after meeting its own requirements it expects to have about 500 tons of coal daily to ship to Vancouver, where a ready market exists at high prices.

Value of Production in 1917 Is Placed at Over \$41,--000,000

According to figures compiled by E. A. Haggpn, of Vancouver, British Columbia's mineral production in 1917 was only about \$1,000,000 less than in the banner year of 1916. This is despite the loss of production brought about by strikes at Trail smelter and in the coal fields. Placer gold production shows an increase, lode gold a decrease, silver a decrease, copper an increase, and zinc a decrease. The total for the year is placed by Mr. Haggen at \$41,299,668, against \$42,290,462 in 1916.

Nearly forty miles of the location survey of the Spokane & British Columbia railroad line has been completed along the Spokane river since the work began last fall, says the San Poil Eagle. The Canadian Pacific Railway company appears to have started a pretty active propaganda against the nationalization of the Canadian railways. The big corporation probably knows that it has a very good thing, and does not want to take any chances of losing it. Nevertheless, government ownership of the transportation lines is inevitable in the near future.

Secretary of War Baker declares that the United States now has an army of 1,500,000 officers and that there is complete equipment for every man. A large portion of this army, he says, is now in France. When congress, last April, declared that a state of war existed between Germany and the United States the American army consisted a couple of hundred thousand officers and men, and the war secretary takes pardonable pride in the rapid augmentation of his fighting forces. One enthusiastic Washington senator wants to send 2, 000,000 American troops to France at once. Mr. Baker's statement has brightened the war outlook for the allies considerably. If the Hun is not at present able to hold his ground on the western front, how can he expect to advertisers this guarantee.
