CITY ESTIMATES NEARLY \$50,000

Contemplated Improvements Require Increased Ex- penditure of Cash

The mayor and all the aldermen were present at the meeting of the city council on Monday night.

A communication from the government electrical engineer, stated that it would be necessary for the city to obtain a new certificate of registration. The clerk was instructed to comply with the request.

O. M. Davis, of Winnipeg, made application for the position of city engineer. Filed.

J. F. Armstrong, water commissioner, requested the council to obtain a certificate of approval of the city's water rights. The clerk was instructed to comply with the request.

A communication from John D. Ronald, of Ontario, regarding the purchase of some city debentures fourteen years ago, and offering to sell the same back to the city, was referred to the finance committee.

A communication in reference to blue print copies of the city map was referred to the water and light committee, with power to act. A price of \$2.50 for paper copies and \$8.00 for cloth-lined was quoted.

A communication from Mrs. Z. B. Larsen, asking for free water and light for her private hospital, was referred to the water and light committee, with instructions to report at the next meeting.

A petition from the required number of property owners for a three-plank sidewalk on Minto avenue, from the Pacific hotel for a distance of 2000 feet, was referred to the board of works, with power to act.

An account from Davis & Flood of \$59.25 for the repair of a transformer, claimed to have been burned out owing to a short circuit, was referred to the water and light committee.

A petition from Wm. Dinsmore and Charles Bickerton for a three-plank sidewalk on Lonsdale avenue, from Columbia street to the latter's residence, was referred to the board of works.

Dan Wilson made an offer of \$50 for lot 11, block 12, plan 22. Referred to the finance committee.

An offer of \$25 was received from R. Campbell for lots 8 and 9, Van Ness addition. Referred to the finance committee.

In connection with the school estimates, Secretary Hull, of the school board, wrote that the tenth room would be opened after the midsummer vacation, and that an

extra division would be opened in the high school for the purpose of taking up a commercial course.

John T. Lawrence and R. Hughes addressed the council concerning the bad condition of the road between the Cooper bridge and Trotter's house. They were assured that the road would be put in good condition as soon as practicable, and the matter was referred to the board of works.

An account from the provincial government for city prisoners in the jail at Nelson was laid over until the next meeting.

The chairman of the board of works made a long report. The city's gravel supply, was becoming short. He suggested that the clerk call for tenders for the year's supply of lumber, f.o.b. Grand Forks, and the council authorized the clerk to carry out the suggestion. A shed was needed for the city vehicles and implements, and the matter was referred to the board of works. In reference to opening the street to the Great Northern station, the manager of the Townsite company had suggested to him that city trade some of its lots for a right of way through the company's property. After the matter had been discussed at length by the council, it was referred back to the board of works, with instructions to carry on further negotiations with the Townsite company.

The board of works was instructed to complete the grade for the cement sidewalk at the upper end of the post office block.

The chairman of the water and light committee reported that Dr. Kington had made a request for material and labor at cost for wiring his new hospital. On motion, the council decided to charge the prevailing rate.

Ald. Donaldson, on behalf of the Five and Drum band, asked permission to erect a bandstand on city property. The request was granted, provided he could find any city property suitable for the purpose.

On motion of Ald. Manly and Henniger, John A. Hutton, as assessor, was instructed to prepare the assessment roll for the city of Grand Forks and the Grand Forks school district for 1914, and to return the same to the council on April 27.

After the chairman of the finance committee had recommended the payment of the monthly accounts, the council adjourned.

CHANGE FAIR DATES

Fall Exhibition Will be Held on September 29 and 30 This Year

At the semi-monthly meeting of the directors of the Grand Forks Agricultural association, held in the secretary's office on Monday night, it was decided to change the dates of the next annual fair to September 29 and 30, so as not to interfere with the Nelson fair. The directors expressed themselves in favor of a spirit of co-operation between the two cities, and if Nelson is similarly inclined, a special train may be run to the fair in Nelson, if that city will reciprocate. Another advantage in the change will be that Grand Forks will be able to secure some of the Nelson attractions.

The details of the new exposition were considered, and the subject was fully discussed. The government grant for the fair is now assured.

A VISITOR FROM SOUTH AMERICA

A well attended meeting in the Baptist church on Thursday evening was addressed by Rev. A. B. Reekie, of Bolivia, South America. Mr. Reekie also visited the Granby smelter Thursday afternoon, and yesterday he visited the public school, going to Nelson on the 1.30 C.P.R. train. He will speak again in that city.

Mr. Reekie is the founder of what is now a prosperous evangelistic and educational mission in the republic of Bolivia. He is a graduate of McMaster university, Toronto, from which he went to start his work in the "neglected continent" eighteen years ago.

He was much interested in the smelter, as Bolivia is coming to be recognized as one of the richest mining countries in the world, especially in copper, silver, tin and gold, and there are also immense timber tracts of over 150 varieties of wood in that country. Of late the American commercial interests have been seeking investments in Bolivia. These include the Standard Oil the Guggenheims and more than a score of millionaires who visited the country last year. As a result, railway and mining operations are opening up rapidly.

Educationally and morally the people, who number about two millions, have been, until recently, like the rest of this southern continent, at the bottom rung. But in the last ten years they have advanced more rapidly than in the whole previous one hundred years. This upward move began after the last revolution, about twelve years ago, partly through which the separation of church and state, civil marriage, religious liberty for all, and other big reforms were secured.

Today the stability of Bolivia's modernized government, its universities and schools, is assured, and there is little likelihood of another civil war for years to come. Mis-

sions and moral reform among all classes are receiving great encouragement, and are no small factor in the public security and good name of the naturally rich state.

Mr. Reekie, in his evening address, told of some interesting incidents in his earlier experiences of native transformations, of narrow escape from death, which had been for centuries the penalty for those engaged in such work, if not of the state religion. He spoke of the deep conviction that was upon him from boyhood that his life work should be in some part of South America. He affirmed it as his belief that the greatest need of this continent today, as of Mexico, was the consecrated service of men and women in the evangelization and regeneration of its millions of people, who as a whole are above the average in natural gifts and possibilities.

EQUAL SUFFRAGE

Local Liberal Association Will Settle the Question Without Militancy

There was a good attendance at the monthly meeting of the Grand Forks Liberal association in the Miners' Union hall on Wednesday evening. A great deal of routine business was transacted, and the political situation in the province and the Dominion was thoroughly discussed.

An interesting feature of future meetings will be a debate on some live subject. The subject selected for the April meeting was: "Resolved, That Equal Suffrage is Desirable." The leaders in the debate for the affirmative will be E. C. Henniger and T. A. McIntyre; for the negative side, Neil McCallum and B. Lequime. H. H. Spinks, W. C. Chalmers and The Sun man were appointed judges.

THE FARMERS' INSTITUTE

A general meeting of the Grand Forks Valley Farmers institute was held in the city hall last Saturday afternoon. The attendance was large and representative. A communication in reference to feed in carload lots was read and ordered filed.

The final arrangements were made for the short course lectures, which will be held in the Miners' Union hall on Saturday, March 21.

A resolution was adopted asking the government to hold the pruning and packing schools earlier in the season in future.

Wm. Sayers read an instructive paper on "Farmers' Co operation," which was followed by a lengthy discussion.

The next meeting of the institute will be held on March 21 in the Miners' union hall.

DEALS WITH MANY SUBJECTS

Board of Trade Holds Im- tant Session in Its New Quarters

The Grand Forks board of trade held its first meeting in its new home on Wednesday night. The attendance was large, and a great deal of important business was transacted.

E. E. Gibson brought up the matter of restocking the waters in this vicinity with fish fry. After discussion, the secretary was instructed to write to the fish commissioner at New Westminster asking that 5000 bass fingerlings be placed in Christina lake and 150,000 rainbow trout fry in the main Kettle river and the North Fork.

The secretary was instructed to write to the postal officials for data as to what is required for any communication to obtain rural free delivery, and also to urge upon the department the importance of placing letter boxes at the C.P.R. and Great Northern stations.

Mr. Rust, of Nelson, addressed the board. He explained the nature of the Chahko Mika carnival to be held in Nelson in July. After the matter had been discussed, Mr. Rust was assured that the board would assist in making the carnival a success. The question will be gone into more fully at the next meeting of the board.

The matter of renting the board of trade rooms two nights a month to a chess club now being organized was referred to the executive committee.

The secretary was instructed to write to the secretary of the Associated Boards of Trade asking that the annual meeting of that body be held in this city this year on September 28, so as to permit of the business being transacted on that day and night, and giving the delegates an opportunity of attending the fall exhibition the two following days.

The secretary write to the immigration departments of the C.P.R. and Great Northern railways, setting forth the advantages of this district for settlers.

The industrial committee will meet in the board of trade rooms next Monday night to discuss matters relative to Franklin camp. The committee has been augmented to include the following members: Jeff Davis, Fred Clark, E. C. Henniger, F. M. Kerby, Louis Johnson, Frank Hutton and G. A. Evans.


