Victoria, Feb. 25.-There was a disgraceful scene in the legislature yesterday afternoon. Richard Mc-Bride, leader of the opposition, Joseph Martin, leader of the party formerly the opposition, but which voted with the government last session, and Smith Curtis, formerly Martin's first lieutenant, engaged in what nar ly averted being a fist fight. 

Situation, Environments and General Resources.

The City of Columbia is situated near the junction of the North Forks of the Kettle river with the main Kettle river, and is distant about 300 miles east of Vancouver.

The natural situation of the city for beauty is not excelled in America. A verdure-clad and flower-bespangled rolling prairie, traversed by a river of bright, sparkling waier, fringed with forest trees and surrounded by mountains, forffling a charming combination of picturesquesness and grandeur. The Columbia & Western railway, which was constructed by the Canadian Pacific Railway company, has its station, freight warehouse and yards in the center of Columbia, and the


